Amarillo Firm Gets Highway Job

A contract for 12.0 miles of construction on F. M. Road 586 in Brown and Mills Counties has been awarded to a Amarillo firm, it was announced in Austin this week by the State Highway Commission.
Cooper and Woodruff, Inc. submitted the low bid of \$230,040.22 on the project. Grading, structures, base and surfacing from U. S. 377, 0.7 mile north of Dulin, East to F. M. 45, is expected to take 175 working days, according to E. M. Pritchard, District Highway Engineer at Brownwood.
R. S. Martin, Resident Engineer at Brownwood, will be in active charge of the project while it is under construction.

Linda Kay Yarborough, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Yarborough, Goldthwaite, Texas, is receiving special training in psychiatric nursing at Austin State Hospital, according to Dr. C. R. Miller, Acting Superintendent.
Miss Yarborough graduated from Goldthwaite High School in 1962 and attended Tarleton State College. She is now attending Hillcrest Baptist Student Nursing School.
The psychiatric nursing program at Austin State Hospital is designed to train nurses in the recognition of psychiatric disorders, techniques useful in caring for emotionally ill patients and of community agencies established for dealing with social problems arising out of mental illness, Dr. Miller said.
Students spend three months in ward training and classroom instruction under psychiatrists, psychiatric nurses, social workers, psychologists, rehabilitation therapists, dieticians and chaplains.

PETITIONS

The council received petition from residents on Live Oak street requesting that that street be paved. It will be included in the city's work program for the coming summer season on a cost share basis.
A petition from a large number of residents on Hannah Valley Road, Live Oak street and Procter Drive requesting sewer service for that area was presented to the council.
After some discussion the council authorized Manager Barnett to consult with engineers and start survey work for the project to ascertain estimated cost.
The council heard a request from P. H. (Bud) Hamilton for larger water main on Priddy Road to serve more residential units he is moving in on his property. The city will extend the main water line on that street of sufficient size to supply water pressure needed.

The City Council meeting in regular session Monday night in the City Hall ordered the regular city election to be held on Tuesday, April 6, 1965.
Purpose of the election is to elect two aldermen for a regular two year term.
Aldermen whose terms expire this year are R. L. Steen and J. C. Wesson.
Holdover members of the city official family are: Mayor Howard B. Campbell, and Aldermen Ray Duren, Lewis T. Hudson and V. A. Hudson.
Candidates will have until March 6, to file and have their names placed on the official ballot for the election to be held on the first Tuesday in April.

OTHER BUSINESS

City Manager W. C. Barnett presented monthly operating reports of receipts and disbursements for the various departments. He also reported on tax collections for the City of Goldthwaite and Mills County Fresh Water Supply District No. 1.
The city's tax roll to be collected for 1964 was \$16,984.33 and the tax roll for the water district was \$16,455.77. City taxes paid before February 1, totaled \$15,176.34 and tax payments for the water district as of February 1, were \$15,404.95.
It was reported that the sewer extension project on Cline and Brim streets has been completed.
The council discussed taking the park property and other areas owned by the city into the city limits. Lewis T. Hudson and J. C. Wesson were named on a committee to check details involved and to report at the next meeting.
Barnett reported that a radio set for the city's communications system has been installed in the car of Sheriff H. G. Brooks. Also the track type loader and pickup truck purchased by the city in December have been delivered.

890 Poll Tax Receipts Issued

Eight hundred and ninety Poll Tax receipts for 1964 were issued to Mills County residents, it was announced this week by H. G. Brooks, Mills County tax assessor-collector.
The office experienced heavy traffic of citizens coming in to pay their poll tax during the last few days before the January 31 deadline.
This year's poll tax payments show a decrease from last year when 1,450 were issued for 1963. In 1962, 1,041 were issued. Three years ago 1,174 were issued and five years ago 1,566.



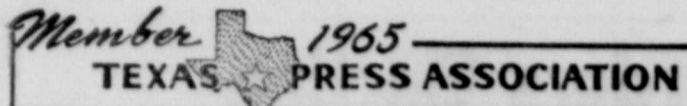

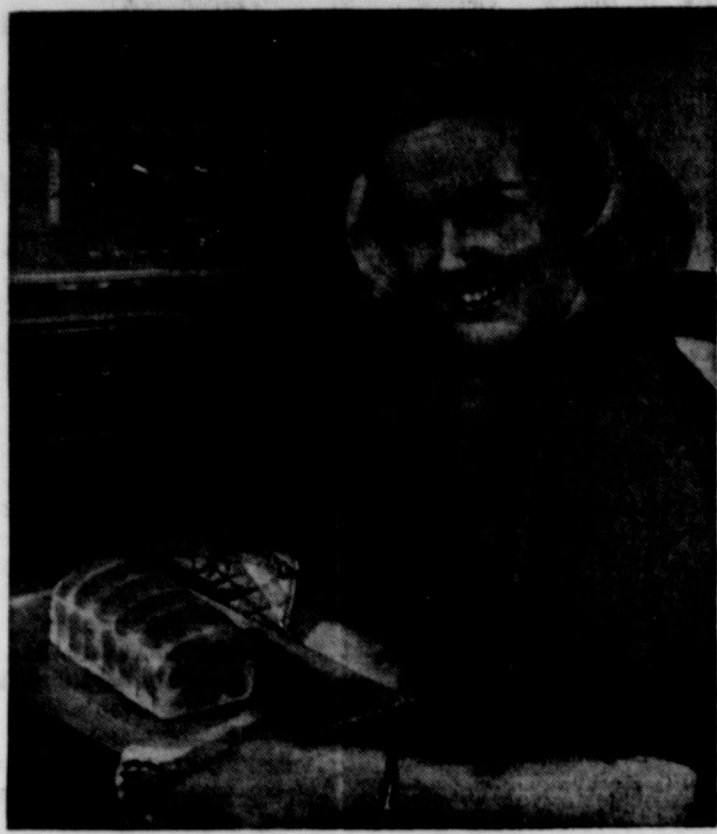

Postmaster Announces Breakthrough With Electronic Zip Code Reading

Postmaster Lucile Fairman said today she has received word from Postmaster John A. Grounoski in Washington that a big "breakthrough" has now been made on electronic machines to "read" zip coded addresses on mail.

The Postmaster General said he expects to begin installing these machines in major offices starting in about a year.

Mrs. Fairman said each machine will be able to sort, as well as read, at the rate of 35,000 letters an hour.

The offices to get the address readers have not been announced, but the local postmaster said they will have significant effects on the mail in and out of each community regardless of whether it gets the new machines.

This is because they will speed incoming mail to smaller offices from major cities and step up the dispatch of mail deposited in smaller communities but which must be processed en route at major mail massing points.

The postmaster emphasized, however, introduction of the "seeing eye" device next year does not mean ZIP CODE is not already useful. "ZIP CODE," she explained, "is important in mail handling under the system of mail processing already in use which will continue to be used as the basic system at

most points. These machines will be just another step — in conjunction with the mechanical mail sorting machines we have developed—to help keep pace with the growing volumes of mail. Neither will these machines endanger jobs—they will only help us meet mail expansion with minimum manpower expansion."

Rural Traffic Accident Report For Mills County

Texas Highway Patrol Sergeant J. O. Tanner of Lampasas released Mills County's Rural Traffic Accident Summary for December, 1964.

The Highway Patrol investigated 3 rural traffic crashes in Mills County during the month of December, 1964. As a result of these 3 crashes, no people were killed, 4 people were injured and the combined property damage amounted to \$1,815.00.

For the year, 1964, Mills County's rural traffic accident records show a total of 20 rural traffic crashes resulting in death to 1 person, injury to 18 people and a combined property damage amounting to \$20,425.

During 1963, for the entire year, the accident records for this county show a total of 14 rural traffic crashes, resulting in no death to people, injury to 18 people and a total combined property damage amounting to \$19,875.00.

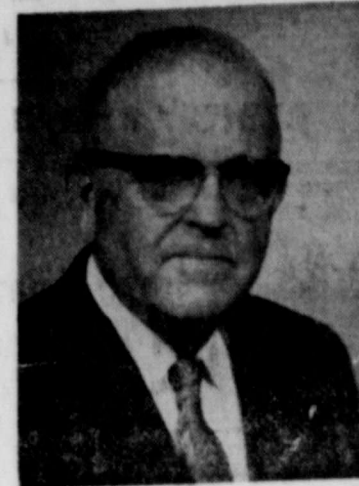
District Agent R. G. Burwell To Retire Effective January 31

Russell G. Burwell, district agricultural agent in Central Texas since 1947 with headquarters in Stephenville, will retire on January 31.

The transplanted Mississippian has served Texas agriculture for 40 years: first as a teacher of vocational agriculture at Santa Rosa, then as a U. S. Department of Agriculture plant quarantine inspector and since 1930 as an employee of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Burwell began his long and distinguished career in the Extension Service as county agricultural agent in Willacy County in 1930. In 1934 he was transferred to the same position in Hidalgo County and in 1940 was named district agent for the South Texas district with headquarters in College Station. He moved from Bryan to Stephenville in 1947.

In making the announcement, Extension Director John E. Hutchison, said Burwell has made many outstanding contributions to Extension during his 35 years of dedicated service. His ability to counsel and train young agents, his sense of humor and devotion to duty are but a few of his attributes. Burwell has always been a strong teacher with the ability to see the practical approach to most problems. Few Extension workers have ever enjoyed more

their contacts with the residents of the area they served than has Burwell.

"We will miss his sense of wit and his practical philosophy as applied to work in the field of education. We wish for him continued good health and happiness in his retirement," the director added.

Burwell will continue to make his home in Stephenville where he is active in church and civic affairs. He is a long-time member of Epsilon Sigma Phi, honorary Extension organization and of other organizations working for improvements in agriculture and rural living.

Director Hutchison said no successor to Burwell has been named.

Social Security Tax Rate For 1965 Continues Same As In 1964

"There has been no increase in the social security tax rate for employees, employers, and the self-employed for 1965," Jack Calvert, district manager of the Social Security Administration in Temple, stated today. "The rate continues at 3 5/8 per cent of an individual's annual earnings up to \$4800 for employer and employee alike, and 54 per cent on net earnings up to that amount for the self-employed," he said.

Calvert explained that he was stressing this point at this time because in some sections of the country questions were being asked at social security offices about "the new tax rate for 1965," with the inquirers asserting that they had read about a change in rate in certain business publications.

The source of many of the misconceptions has been traced to several privately-produced leaflets outlining a number of proposed amendments to the social security law which were considered by Congress in 1964, but not enacted. The leaflets were sent out in sample lots to prospective bulk purchasers while the legislation was still under consideration.

"The failure of the legislation to pass the Congress should have ended all interest in these publications; and in most cases, it did. However, at several widely-scattered locations these

leaflets, which mentioned a proposed social security tax increase for 1965, were understood to mean that the proposed changes had been made. This was evidently why people began asking for more details," he said.
