## 1965 Feed Grain Program Signup Gets Underway Monday Morning

The signup for the 1965 feed grain program now is under way in the ASCS County Office, E. L. Burkett, Chairman, ASCS County Committee, has announced. The signup period started February 8 and will continue through March 26. The Chairman explained that the program for 1965 is basically the same as in 1964. It is voluntary, and combined corn, grain sorghum, and barley in a single feed grain base. Participating farmers will qualify for diverted-acre and price-support payments, and they will be eligible for price-support loans. Farmers who take part in the program may divert for payment as small an acreage as 20 per cent of the farm's feed grain base or as large an acreage as 50 per cent of the base—or 25 acres, if this is larger. Two rates of diversion payment are offered. The lower rate applies to the first 20 per cent of the feed grain base actually diverted. The higher rate applies to diverted acreage in excess of the minimum. If both the intended diversion and the acreage actually diverted are equal to at least 40 per cent of the base, the higher rate applies to the entire acreage diverted. New provisions in the 1965 program include (1) an opportunity to substitute feed grains for wheat or wheat for feed grains by growers who take part in both programs, and (2) a special provision for designated varieties of malting barley. Applications to take part in the 1965 feed grain program may be filed in the ASCS County Office from Monday through Friday at any time between the hours of 8 a. m. and 5 p. m.

## Texas FHA Director Gives Details On First Anti-Poverty Loans Made

The first loan to help a Texas low-income rural family raise their income and attain a better standard of living under President Johnson's War on Poverty Program was explained today by Lester J. Cappleman, State Director for the Farmers Home Administration.

Mr. Cappleman gave details on a loan being made to a family who operates a small farm near Long Branch, Panola County, which Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman today announced as one of eleven such loans being made throughout the country.

The loan was made to a 57 year old farmer and his wife, parents of 8 children, living near Long Branch, Panola County, Texas; \$2,500 for 15 years to refinance a mortgage which is overdue against his small 25-acre farm, purchase a milk cow and a mule, carry out some land development work and pay operating expenses on his 1965 truck crop which will consist of 2½ acres of tomatoes and cucumbers. The family of ten also will raise a large garden and some pigs to meet their family food needs. Improvements made with the loan will enable this family to make a 50 per cent increase in their gross income which last year totaled \$1,540.

Cappleman said approximately 75 applications for economic opportunity loans have been received.

The loans are authorized by the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964, which includes a rural credit service involving \$35 million in Federal funds.

In addition, three other loans have been approved in Texas; one to a 51 year old farmer who lives in Harrison County near Marshall, Texas.

There are five children in this family. The total amount of the loan is \$2,500. The funds will be used to purchase 12 acres of land, and move and repair a house to be located on the 12 acres being purchased. This will provide a more adequate dwelling for the family.

The third loan made this week in Texas, according to Mr. Cappleman, was one made to a widow living near Hempstead in Waller County. A loan of \$820 is being used to assist this widow in purchasing livestock and drilling a well so that she and her family will have a sanitary water supply for domestic purposes.

The Farmers Home Administration County Supervisor for Washington and Waller Counties, Temple Evans, has developed a farming program on the small acreage which should result in an increased gross income of approximately \$400 per year.

The fourth loan was made to a couple living in Bell County who operate a small farm. The loan funds will be used to enable them to add an additional source of income through the construction and equipping of a small tractor and farm implement repair shop. With this additional source of income, the family will be able to raise their level of living from \$1,200 per year to approximately \$2,000 per year after the business is in operation. This will amount to a 50 per cent increase in their gross income from all sources.

The State Director of the Farmers Home Administration in Texas stated that all personnel are enlisting the assistance of rural agricultural and business leaders, school teachers, ministers, welfare workers, charitable organizations and others to assist this agency in informing low-income rural families of the opportunities available to them in the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964.

According to Mr. Cappleman, "The 1960 Agricultural Census showed approximately 375,000 rural families, both farm and non-farm, living in the country and in communities of less than 2,500 population, receive a gross income of \$3,000 a year or less from all sources. This means we have a real challenge in

Texas in providing opportunities for these families to improve their level of living."

All of the loans bear a 4-1/8 per cent interest. Economic Opportunity Loans may be made in amounts up to \$2,500 to finance small family businesses, trades, services, and farming enterprises.

The rural families eligible for anti-poverty loans are confronted with such problems as limited resources; low incomes; indebtedness beyond their present ability to repay; lack of management skills, and an unsatisfactory level of living. To help overcome these problems and assure success of the new businesses or farming enterprises, borrowers will be provided with intensive and continuing management aid by local county supervisors of the Farmers Home Administration.

To be eligible for the new rural credit program, an individual applicant must:

1. Live in a rural area which includes towns up to 2,500 population.
2. Have an income so low it does not cover basic family necessities.
3. Be unable to obtain credit from other sources, including the regular loan programs of the Farmers Home Administration, and
4. Show a reasonable promise of succeeding in the enterprise to be financed by the loan.

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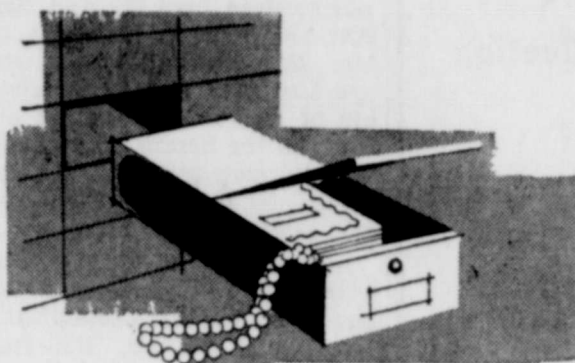

## 11,017 Books Checked Out Of Jennie Trent Dew Library In 1964

The Jennie Trent Dew Library Board met in regular session in the Courthouse January 26, with Judge Cecil Egger, chairman of the board, presiding.

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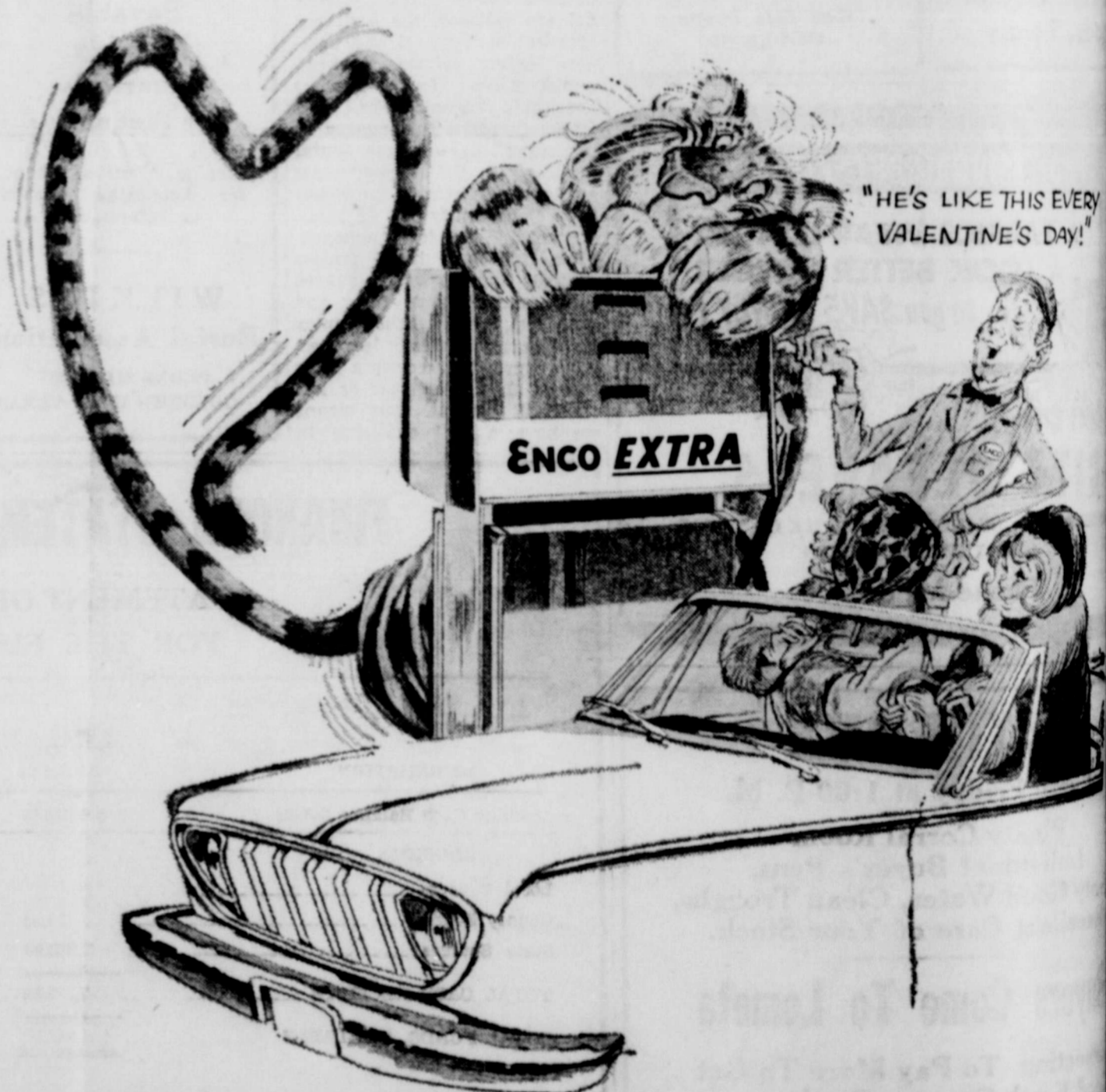

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Mineola, who is sponsor of the TSTA-backed "\$45 in '65" program, both called for a cooling-off period. Compromise seemed unlikely due to strong feelings on both sides.

Sen. Jack Strong of Longview and Rep. W. S. Healy of Paducah, chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, introduced the Governor's 10-year pay plan—with substantial support. Among sponsors of the two bills are 17 House members who endorsed both measures.

Teachers complain the Connally program offers too little, too late. They charge it would put 70 per cent of raises on local school districts.

Connally produced figures showing cost of the 10-year program at \$40,200,000 for the next biennium. He said the state would pick up \$32,100,000 of the tab and local districts \$8,000,000. His financing plan suggests that local school boards start paying a share of the cost of textbooks and teacher retirement, now wholly paid by the state.

Connally believes his program would maintain the 80-20 cost ratio between state and local districts.

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
