## 800 Pound Mills County Bred Hereford Sells For \$14,600.00

Rhonda Cook, 14 year old 4-H Club member from Star, exhibited her Hereford steer to the grand championship of the Houston Fat Stock Show for 1965, last week.

Miss Cook is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lynn Cook, Route 3, Goldthwaite. Her champion steer sold for \$14,600.

Rhonda showed her entry earlier to first place in the lightweight Hereford class and as champion of the Junior show before being named grand champion of the show.

The 800 pound red steer, named Lynn, was a Mills County steer, bred by Rhonda's father, a Mills County Hereford breeder.

This is the second time for the Cook family to experience showing a grand champion steer. In 1960 Rhonda's sister, Lynda, exhibited the grand champion steer in the livestock show at the Texas State Fair in Dallas. Lynda's champion sold for \$6,000. It also was bred by Lynn Cook.

This year's grand champion steer brings to four the number that won by county club members with Mills County bred animals.

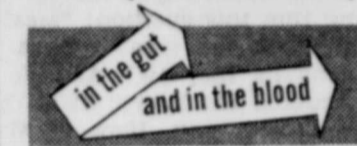

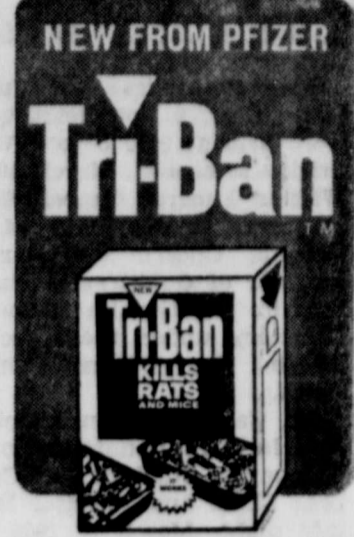

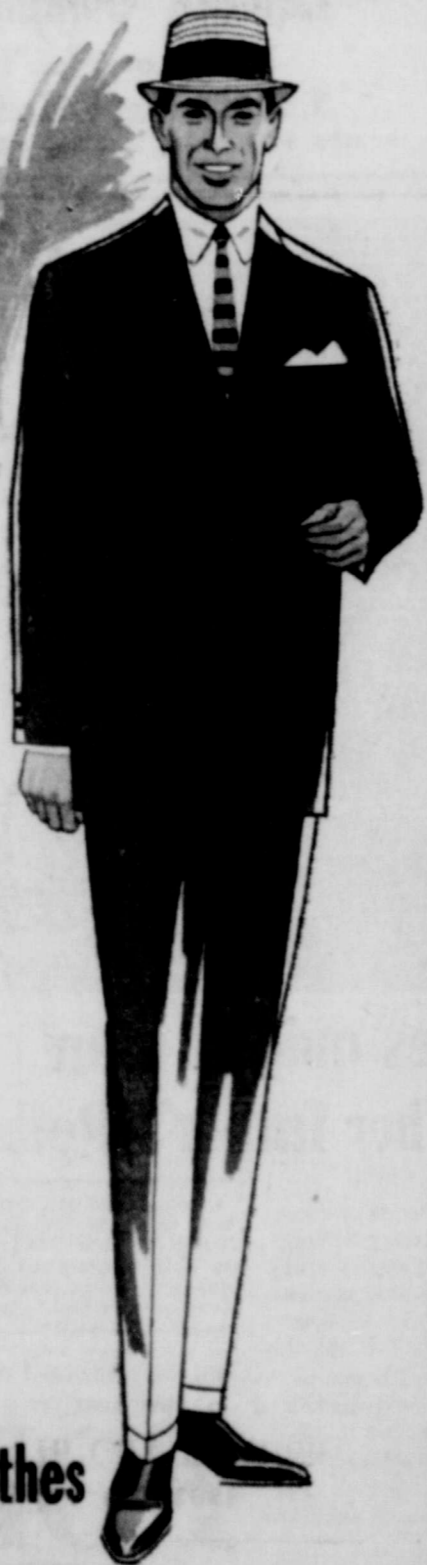

## Tax Guide For Farmers

The Internal Revenue Service has prepared a free booklet of tax advice for farmers. Called "Farmer's Tax Guide," it is available from county agriculture agents or the nearest Internal Revenue Office.

Mr. Virgil W. Newman, Administrative Officer of the Brownwood office of Internal Revenue said the booklet is written in non-technical language and contains numerous examples showing how tax rules apply in actual situations. A sample filled-in return form is included.

On page 3 is a list of "Important Dates to Remember." These tell farmers when to pay income and social security taxes, file returns, and meet other tax requirements. New items in this edition are also listed on this page.

The booklet was written primarily to help farmers prepare their 1964 tax returns. It is also useful as a tax reference guide throughout the year.
