Public Invited To Open House This Sunday For Graves Dental Building In Goldthwaite

Dr. T. C. Graves, his family, and members of his staff will play hosts to the public with open house for the new and modern Graves Dental Building in Goldthwaite, this coming Sunday, March 28.

Open house will be observed Sunday afternoon from 2 to 5 o'clock. Everyone is invited, to visit the impressive new architectural addition to the business and professional community of Goldthwaite.

The story of Dr. T. C. Graves' professional career is an interesting one.

It covers a period of 29 years with a meager beginning in 1936 with \$800 borrowed capital, a part time office girl-receptionist, one dental chair, a reasonably good number of patients and many long and hard hours of work to the 1965 opening to the new dental building with an investment value of approximately \$60,000.

Dr. Graves started his dental practice in his native Goldthwaite in August 1936 after he returned from Dental College in Dallas. Before going to Dental College he taught school for three years.

He hung out his shingle with office on the second floor of the Joe Palmer Building which housed the Piggly Wiggly Store on the first floor.

Recalling some of the early experiences in getting started Dr. Graves said: "I hung out

my shingle and you know how it goes with young professional men getting started their first year. Everyone would sit back to see what happened. Well, during the first few months I had a chance to get caught up on my reading. I read just about every essay, or book that came along. There were two full time Dentists in town when I started."

But, start he did. He rented office space and he and the equipment company representative set out to fix up the office. The landlord told him to fix it up any way he wanted it and to take the cost out of the rent. In 1936 money was a little hard to come by, as those who got their start about that time still remember.

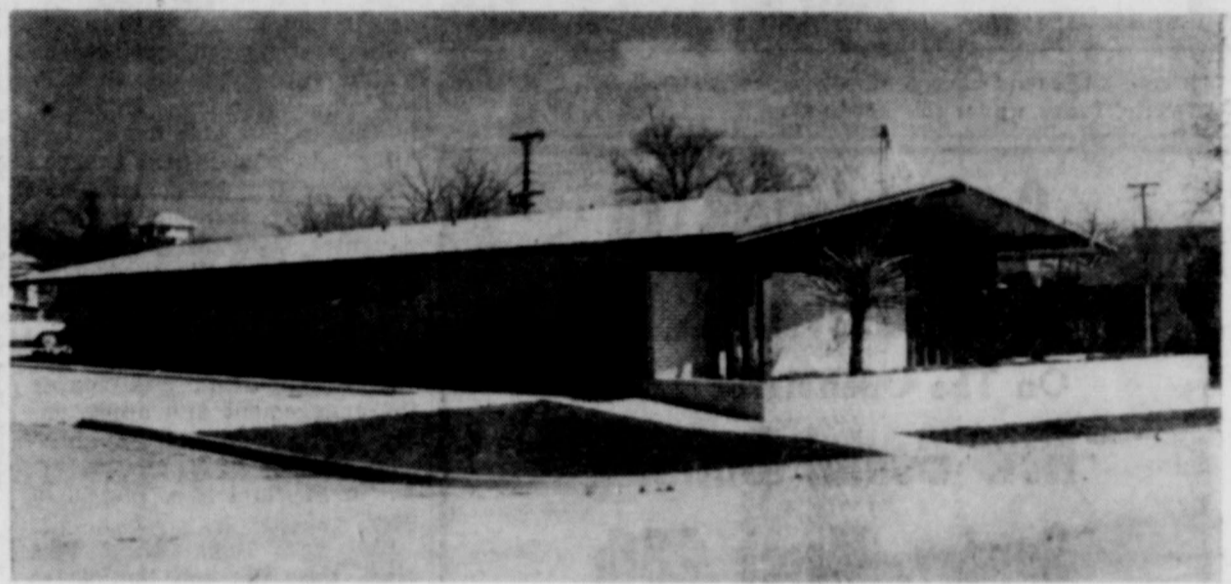
They fixed the office, then set out to get a loan for the equipment. Dr. Graves had his mind set on a loan of \$1,800, with \$800 for regular equipment and \$1,000 for an X-Ray machine. Lending agencies and individuals during the 1930's were operating on the "Talking Down the Loan" system. Dr. Graves got an \$800 loan. The X-Ray machine just had to wait a while.

His practice started with one dental chair and a part time office girl-assistant. His receptionist was shared with a medical doctor who had an office across the hall. The office girl cost Dr. Graves \$5.00 per week. She was paid \$10.00 per week, but the medical doctor paid the other \$5.00.

During that time the fee for extraction of a tooth was \$1.00; filling \$1.00; cleaning teeth \$2.00 and a set of dentures cost \$40.00. These prices have changed though and today an extraction costs \$2.00, average filling \$2.00, cleaning teeth \$4.00 and set of dentures range from \$100 to \$150.

Dr. Graves recalls that his second office girl was on a full time basis. She was paid \$2.50 per day or \$15.00 a week — for

Open house to the public will be observed this coming Sunday, March 28, from 2 to 5 p. m. Construction is of brick and glass with Terrazzo floor. The building is 28 feet wide, and 90 feet in depth, and is completely air-conditioned. Contract for the building was let last September. The new building contains large reception room, business office, three dental rooms, denture room, laboratory, lounge, dark room, private office, storage room, mechanical room and wide hallway. There is off-street customer parking on a paved area on the north side of the building and private parking for personnel at the rear of the building. In addition to regular entrance with steps at the front of the building on Fisher street, there is also a walk-up ramp from the north, near the customer parking area for easy access.

Members of the committee attending the meeting last Wednesday were: W. P. Duren,

Chairman, Harold Yarborough, Houston Duren, Lewis T. Hudson, W. C. Barnett, Charles Conradt, and Lee Roy Stacy. Vic E. Keleber also attended. Other member of the committee is Ed Thornton.

The committee needs a minimum of \$1,200 for a caretaker alone through the growing season. The city plays a big part in the park project with respect to roads and other details.

Last year interested parties responded in a splendid way by contributing \$1,231.00 to the maintenance fund. This was done without personal solicitations on the part of the committee and reflects countywide interest in the project.

It was pointed out that it is that time of the year again. The growing season is here and it is time for park maintenance to get underway. With the favorable moisture condition of the fall and winter season the need this year for park maintenance is greater than ever.

On another page of this issue appears an official appeal from the committee for financial support of the project.

The committee hopes to enlist at least 100 persons to contribute \$12.00, or more, per year for park maintenance.

Last year a good many raised their contributions. A number gave \$25.00 which helped to put the drive over the top. Committee members feel that this will hold true again this year.

The park committee hopes that interested persons will again respond with their donations as they have done in the past so that mail campaign and personal contact work will not be necessary to insure park upkeep for the season.

Past support is appreciated by committee members who are now ready to receive this year's contributions, Chairman Duren stated.

Honor roll of park maintenance fund contributors will be published along.

Bennett Creek Project Approved For Planning

According to announcement by Scott Lanford of Blanket, Chairman of the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District, the State Soil Conservation Board has granted a watershed planning priority to Bennett Creek.

E. W. Buchtien, Soil Conservation Service Watershed Planning Staff Leader, located at Waco, is in charge of the Planning Party. Buchtien will be assisting the three Sponsoring Local Organizations in developing the Work Plan, namely the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District, Mills County Commissioners' Court and Mills County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1, covering the Bennett Creek project.

Bennett Creek WCID was organized about 10 years ago and was one of the first districts in the State. Since organization of the WCID, the sponsoring local organizations have been waiting for approval of the watershed application and a planning priority to be assigned.

Watershed priorities are based on the per cent of soil and water conservation applied on the land. Ninety-three per cent of the area is under agreement with the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District and 76 per cent of the land treatment has been applied.

The number of flood prevention structures which may be included in the work plan will be determined by the available sites in the watershed and cost of construction in proportion to annual flood damages.

Bennett Creek, located in the eastern part of Mills County, lies within Soil Conservation District zones 3 and 4. Wilford Witzsche is the Supervisor in zone 3 and W. G. Bishop is Supervisor in zone 4.

According to E. J. Hughes, Area Conservationist in Brownwood, the Planning Party will be getting the field work un-

derway about the middle of April. Elgin Smith is local Soil Conservation Service representative at Goldthwaite.

Novis Williams has joined Landrum & Collins Motor Company, Mills County Ford Dealer, in the service and parts departments. Kellis Landrum announced this week.

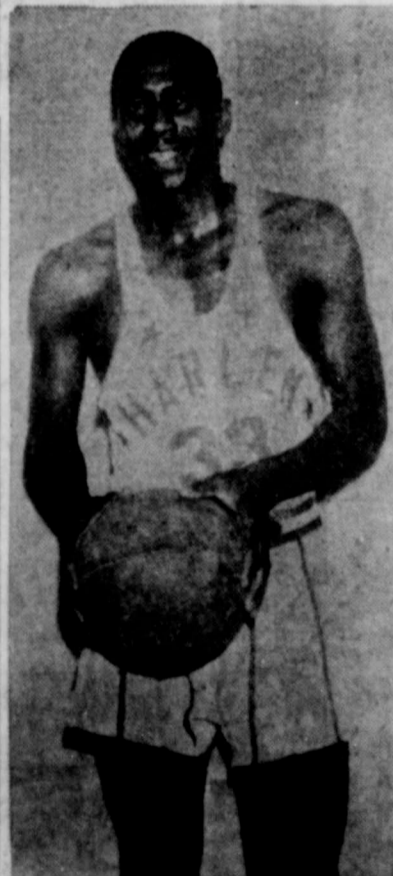

Marble Falls Wins Eagle Relays With Home Team In Second Place

The Goldthwaite Eagles and the Marble Falls Mustangs had a dogfight for first place in the Second Annual Eagle Relays held here last Saturday. Marble Falls finally won the team trophy by scoring 143 1/6 points to the Eagles' 135. However, the Eagles won both relay trophies and set new records in each. The Eagle mile relay team not only broke the meet record, but also tied the school record of 3:36.4.

Five old records were broken, or tied at the meet and Goldthwaite set four of these. Phil Duren, who held the old record of 2:05.4 in the 880, came through with first place and a new record of 2:03.4. Owen Yarborough came in second ahead of M. F. and Gary Holcomb followed in fourth place.

Jerry Rountree tied the record set in 1964 by running the 220 yard dash in 23.5.

The mile relay team composed of Ronnie Hill, James Cook, Jerry Rountree, and Phil Duren slimmed the old record 2.4 seconds with their 3:36.4.

Forty-six flat won the 440 yard relay and set a new record. The runners were Gary Warlick, James Cook, Jerry Rountree, and Charles Blackburn.

Goldthwaite took the first three places in the 115 yard high hurdles. Jim Childress placed first with 16.1, while Johnny Hammond and Kenneth Hollingshead followed with 2nd and 3rd.

The Eagles placed second in three events: 100 yard dash—Charles Blackburn; 440 yard dash—Emmitt Miller; and high jump—Kenneth Hollingshead. Jim Childress placed 3rd in the discus and Mac Rowlett placed fourth in the shot put.

The Star Tigers came in sixth in the Eagle Relays with 9 points and the Priddy Pirates scored 5.

The Eagle Tracksters are preparing for a big weekend at the Dragon Relays in Bangs Friday night and in the Indian Relays at Comanche Saturday night.

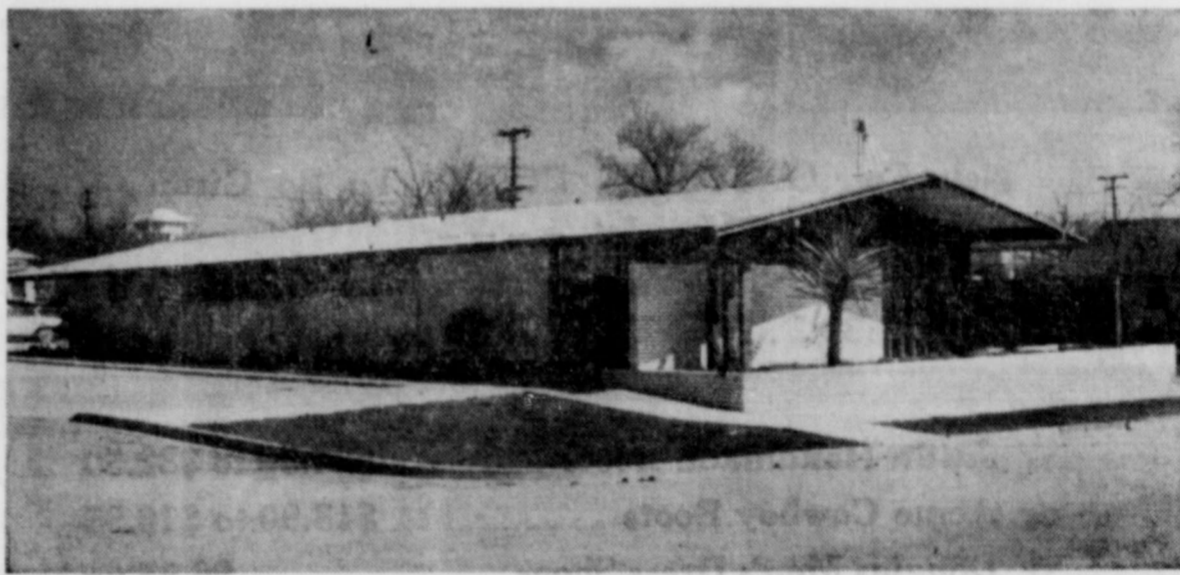

Wheat Growers Reminded Of '65 Program Sign-Up Deadline Friday

Farmers whose wheat allotment acreages total 54 per cent of Mills County's wheat allotment for the current crop year signed up last fall to participate in the 1965 voluntary wheat program, E. L. Burkett, Chairman, ASCS Committee, reports.

The county report shows 81 farms signed up in the wheat program; wheat allotments of these farms total 1,597 acres.

The sign-up now under way at the ASCS County Office applies primarily to feed grain and domestic cotton, the Chairman explained, since it provides for the initial enrollment of operators who wish to take part in the 1965 feed grain program.

During the current sign-up period, however, wheat farm operators in this area have an opportunity to change their

sign-up intentions regarding the number of acres they signed up last fall for diversion under the wheat program.

Wheat farmers with feed grain base acreage who wish to use the program's acreage substitution provisions—as between wheat and the feed grains — also need to sign up in the feed grain program at this time.

The current sign-up extends through Friday, March 26.

County Stockmen To Participate In Screwworm Eradication Fund Drive

The Mills County Screwworm Eradication Committee is laying plans for this county's participation in a concentrated drive to raise \$300,000 from the Texas livestock industry for the Screwworm Eradication Program.

"The goal for our county is \$3,240," stated L. B. Burnham, chairman of the local committee. He pointed out this goal can be obtained if every farmer and rancher will contribute on the basis of 10 cents per animal unit. An animal unit consists of one dairy or beef animal, or one horse, or five sheep, goats, or hogs.

The fund drive will begin Monday, March 29, and will be concluded, Monday, April 12.

Livestock producers can leave their contributions at the Mills County State Bank in Goldthwaite or the Farmers and Merchants Bank at Priddy. Donations can also be made to members of the screwworm eradication committee, which includes: L. B. Burnham, Goldthwaite; Jim Soules, Star; Carl A. Jeske, Priddy; Herman Jones, Mullin; Clayton Egger, Mullin; V. Z. Cornelius, Goldthwaite and their local committee members who will be working on this program.

Necessity for additional producer funds was announced earlier this month by the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation which, along with the State of Texas and the U. S. Department of Agriculture, is conducting the eradication program.

The program needs approximately \$1.1 million to operate through April, May, and June, Burnham explained. The Texas Legislature has already voted \$250,000 and Congress is expected to appropriate \$550,000 for the three-month period. These government funds cannot be spent, however, unless producer money is also made available, the county chairman stressed.

The screwworm fly has been eradicated from the Southwest, but a barrier of live flies must

be maintained along the U. S.-Mexican border to prevent fertile flies from Mexico reinfesting the U. S. Approximately 100 million sterile flies will be needed each week during April, May, and June. If funds are not made available, the Southwest stands to lose the gains that have already been made.

George Reese, county agricultural agent, said in the three years the program has been in existence, savings of more than \$168 million have been realized by producers. He said no screwworm infestations were detected in this county since the Fall of 1962.

Congress is considering a USDA request for \$5 million which would make the program financed entirely by the Federal government beginning July 1.

**Fawn Time!
Keep Fido
Off The Range**

A report of the season's first fawn deer prompted J. B. Phillips, law enforcement coordinator for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, to urge Texans to restrain their pets in the deer range this spring.

Game Warden J. C. Moore of Mason, said the birth date of the early arrival has been established as between February 17 and 20. In a nearby county, seven-year records place the earliest first fawn date as April 21. Peak production ordinarily comes the last of May or the first of June, but Department biologists predict an earlier fawning season this year due to abnormally early breeding last fall.

Phillips said regardless of the new trend, if any, this year that female deer are heavy with fawn now and therefore deserve protection from roaming dogs.

He said Texans generally realize this and that abuses from dogs running wild in the deer range "is because of thoughtlessness more than anything else."

"It's natural for the dogs to get out and chase something," said Phillips, "so they cannot be blamed. Therefore, it's up to the pet owners to know where the canines are, especially at night."

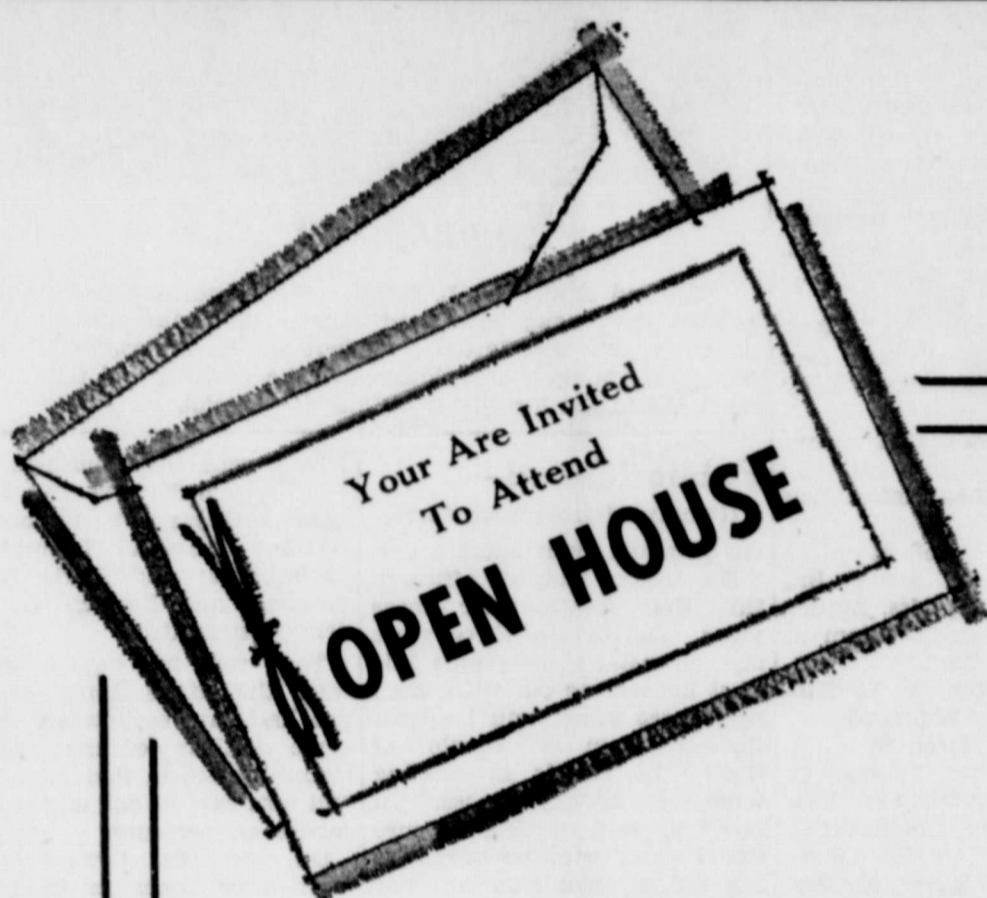

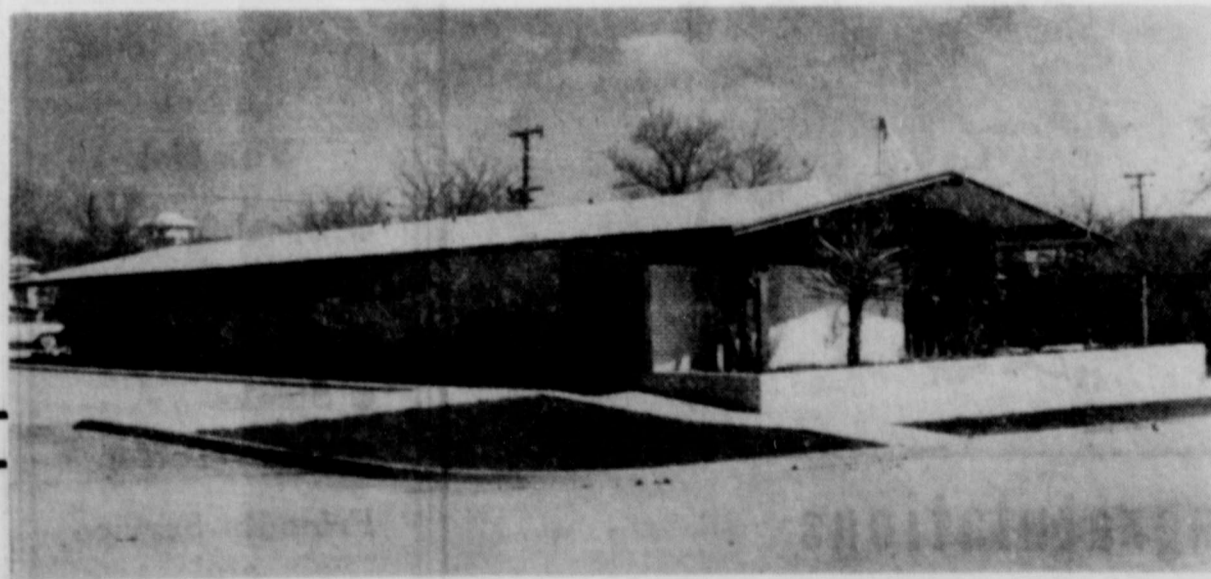

six days and eight hours a day. Dr. Graves had his office in this first location for three years. "During the three years my downstairs neighbors almost burned me out with small fires three times, and I almost flooded them a couple of times," he recalls in relating some of his experiences. "In fact," he said, "I thought sure that I would wind up having to pay for a truck load of flour one time after our water hose to the dental chair became disconnected and started leaking during a weekend."

It was also during the days of Kerosene fired heaters. Part of the job of the office girl was to tend to this chore. At one time the office girl got busy while attending to this and the kerosene ran wild and down through the floor dripping into the grocery store. After three years Dr. Graves moved to the semi-fireproof Saylor Hotel Annex in which his dental office was located for the past 26 years. Before he moved, though, his practice grew to three chairs. He paid back the \$800 loan the first year, and he got the X-Ray machine the second year. For one year during the first three he had associated with him his brother, Dr. John Graves. He left and entered the Navy for military service and on his return established his own practice in Kermit, Texas. Dr. Graves' dental practice has continued to grow through the years and he has maintained a staff of five persons, full time, for many years. His present staff includes:
