

33 Park Boosters Contribute \$706. Maintenance Fund Drive Continues

Thirty-three boosters of Mills County Park have contributed a total of \$706 during the past three weeks after announcement made by the committee that funds were needed for park up-keep for this year. The park committee has through contributions provided funds for caretaker to insure park maintenance for the past

several years. Originally the committee started the drive with the idea of getting a minimum of 100 interested persons to donate on the basis of \$1.00 per month, or \$12 a year, to do the job. During the past several years a number of park boosters have contributed more than the \$12. This has been a great help and has made the drive successful without personal solicitation campaign. Last year the committee raised \$1,231.00. This took care of the park maintenance for the season. Three weeks ago the committee opened the fund drive for this year with an appeal for "At least 100 persons to contribute a minimum of \$12 to insure park maintenance through this year." The response has been very gratifying, according to park committee chairman, W. P. Duren, and the committee is hopeful that the \$1,200.00 will be forthcoming in short order. With 33 interested parties giving \$706.00, more than one-half the goal, since the appeal was announced, the committee feels that the goal will be reached at an early date. Checks should be made out to Park Fund, and may be turned in to members of the park committee or mailed to Mills County State Bank.

Eagles Take Third At Clifton; Try For Regional Crown Saturday

The Eagle track team took third place honors at Clifton's Cub Relays Saturday, April 17, with 59 points, behind Bangs with 62 and Clifton with 60. Eagle high jumper Kenneth Hollingshead won his specialty with a school record jump of 5'10 1/2". He also placed fourth in the 120 yard high hurdles with a time of 15.9.

The 440 yard relay team ran a record time of 44.9, but was disqualified for passing the baton out of the exchange zone. Jim Childress set a new school record of 21 seconds flat in placing sixth in an extremely fast field of 120 yard high hurdlers.

Another first was added by Phil Duren as he ran his 880 specialty in 2:00.3, which was only 3 tenths of a second off the meet record of 2 minutes flat. Phil's 1:59.6 at the District 9-A meet is the third best in Texas Class A competition.

Second place in the 100 yard dash went to Charles Blackburn with a time of 10.1. Jerry Rountree turned in the outstanding performance of the meet as he won the 220 yard dash in 22.4 to break both the meet and school records. This places him second in Texas Class A competition.

The Eagle mile relay team of Ronnie Hill, Owen Yarborough, Jerry Rountree, and Phil Duren broke the school record which they set at the district meet a week earlier as they finished third in a time of 3:33.3. The Eagles go to Denton this Saturday for the Regional Meet. They have the depth to win the regional title and to qualify in several events for the State meet.

Star Tigers Set Two Records And Win 17-B Track Crown

Bert Geeslin was the outstanding athlete from District 17-B as he led the Star Tigers to the district track championship at Stephenville, Saturday, April 10. All first and second place winners will return to Stephenville this Saturday, for the regional meet. Two district records were broken by Geeslin, the 440 yard dash in 53.6 and the broad jump with a leap of 20'2 1/2". Geeslin also placed 2nd in the 220 yd. dash, tied for 1st in the high jump, and won the shot put with a throw of 43'2 1/4". Bobby Burns, a freshman from Star, tied the district record of 11 feet in the pole vault.

Sears Wins 9-A Tennis Tourney

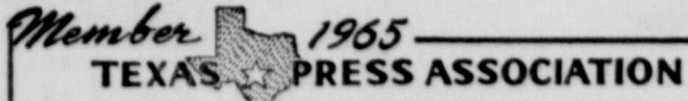

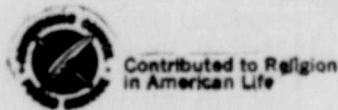

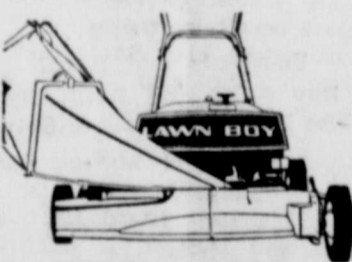

SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS

Some of the district cooperators planting native or introduced grasses this spring were R. D. Egger, W. L. Alexander, and J. A. Cawyer. These grasses were planted on old fields or on rangeland following brush control.

Site 16, Blanket Creek, located on the Alton Keeler stock farm, is nearing completion. Site 20 on the Herman Jones Ranch, will be completed in the near future. The Jones flood prevention dam will be the first such structure in the Mills County portion of the Brown-Mills SCD to be constructed.

Four of the 20 structures planned in Bennett Creek watershed are in Mills County. Other than the Jones Site two more are under construction. Site 19 on Edgar Smith place and Site 18 on the P. V. King place. Land rights have not been cleared on Site 17.

"Ad" Long has proof of the benefits of a conservation cropping system using annual legumes. He has two fields that are similar with just a fence between them. Both are in small grain and button clover. Both have had the same grazing pressure. One is out-producing the other being taller, more vigorous and joining between drill rows. The other is weaker, with little tillering, and has never filled out between the drill rows. The difference, seven years of conservation crop rotation with button clover compared to one year of

clover—ask him about it.

The Work-Plan investigation on Mullin-Brown Creek is progressing, according to Watershed Planning Party staff leader Paul Kenner. Tentative sites have been located and are being checked for engineering and economic feasibility. 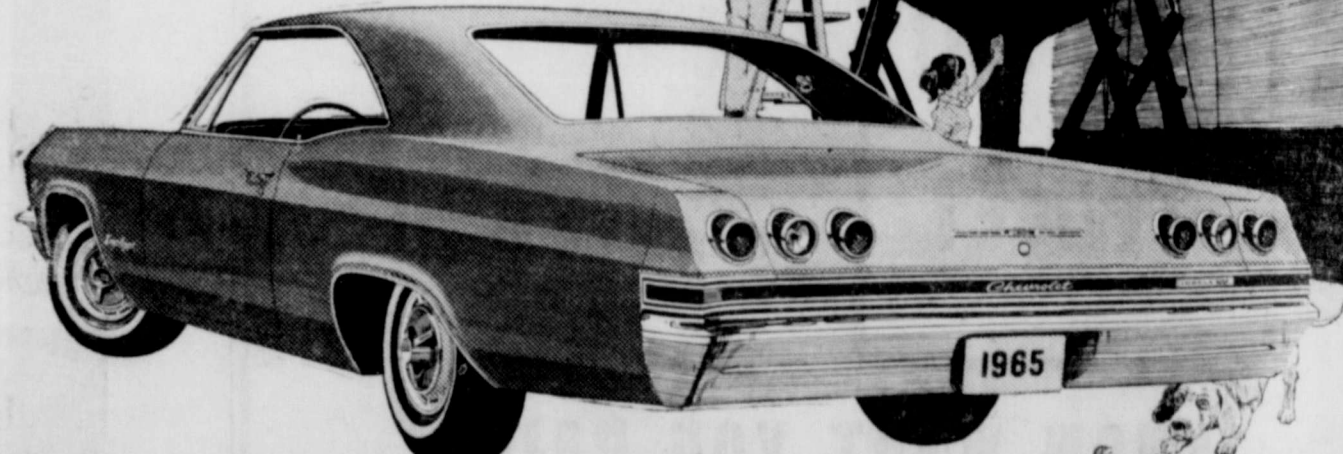
