The annual learn to swim classes will start Monday morning, June 21, at 8 o'clock, at the County Swimming Pool in Goldthwaite, according to announcement by W. C. Barnett, pool manager.

Instruction will be given Monday through Friday for two weeks, June 21 through July 2, by qualified instructors. There will be no charge for the instruction. Each participant will be required to pay the admission to the pool, which is announced.

All those participating will have to have physical examination and written consent from parent or guardian. Doctors will be available at the pool Monday morning at eight o'clock when registration starts.

Mills County FFA Rodeo Arena Is Taking Shape

The Mills County FFA Rodeo Arena being constructed in Goldthwaite is taking shape, it was announced Tuesday morning by officials of the association.

Construction is about 60 per cent complete at this time. All pens and arena posts have been built and are now set up and ready to be concreted.

The entire structure is made of steel pipe and metal and the welding job is about two-thirds complete.

The arena is being constructed on land owned by Goldthwaite Independent School District north of the Elementary school.

FUND DRIVE

The fund drive for the project is still moving ahead with about one-half of the \$5,000.00 goal paid in cash and labor.

School Census Shows Decrease In Mills County

The school census count for Mills County as of January 31, 1965, shows a decrease of 31 scholastics from the count of a year ago, according to official figures certified by County Judge and Ex-Officio County School Superintendent, Cecil Egger.

Total nose count for the four districts this year is 802 while on January 31, 1964 it was 833 and on January 31, 1963 it was 867.

Goldthwaite district gained 13 the past year; Mullin lost 25; Star lost 5 and Priddy lost 14.

Twenty-five proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution were recommended by the 59th Legislature. Amendments will be voted on in three different elections during 1965 and 1966.

First election is September 7 on the proposal to increase size of the state senate from 31 to

The committee now has enough money to provide park maintenance for this year. Committee members were gratified at the response from interested citizens without a personal solicitation campaign again this year for this county project.

Many families, organizations and fraternal groups are using the park for their outings and enjoying the nice appearance and facilities provided there.

A message of appreciation to those who came through in support of the park maintenance fund this year appears in this issue of the paper.

The committee has an annual goal of 100 persons to contribute a minimum of \$12.00 to make up the \$1,200.00. A number gave more than the suggested amount again this year which helped make up the goal.

39 members.
Ten amendments will be voted on November 2. They would:

- Extend to four years terms of governor and other statewide elected officials now limited to two-year terms;
- Increase state representatives' terms from two to four years;
- Permit full state participation in federal medicare programs;
- Authorize the Legislature to set salaries of the lieutenant governor and speaker;
- Set up an \$85,000,000 student loan fund;
- Authorize \$200,000,000 more in veterans land bonds;
- Require district and appellate court judges to retire at 75 and set up a system for removal for misconduct;
- Expand the investment authority of the public school retirement system;
- Increase the state property tax from 42 to 47 cents and allocate the extra five cents to college buildings;
- Exempt from the property tax locally a hospital which spends as much as \$1,500,000 a year on care of indigents.

Fourteen amendments on the 1966 general election ballot would:

- Add \$200,000,000 more to the water development fund and permit use for conveyance and associated facilities such as canals or pipelines;
- Expand court of criminal appeals from three to five

members;
• Repeal the poll tax;
• Allow the state to hold private funds until receipt of federal matching grants for private groups to use in rehabilitation services;
• Relax residence requirements for voting for president and vice president;
• Authorize regional airport authorities;
• Abolish residence requirements for servicemen to vote;
• Set swearing-in day for state representatives on first day of a legislative session;
• Provide state aid to survivors of firemen and law enforcement officers killed on duty;
• Set up a retirement system for state employees and officials;
• Remove Arlington State College from the permanent university building fund;
• Permit farm land to be assessed only at its agricultural value (despite proximity to big city real estate developments);
• Extend terms of conservation and reclamation district directors from two to six years;
• Provide that school district boundaries can be changed without invalidating tax bond issues.

Special Elections Are Coming Up; County Voting Boxes Are Reduced

Two special elections are coming up this year, September 7, and November 2, when voters will cast their ballots on proposed constitutional amendments.

Mills County voters will be casting their ballots under the new schedule of voting precincts which was worked out by the Commissioners' Court last year, County Judge Cecil Egger announced. The new voting box schedule became effective in February of this year.

Five Mills County voting boxes were annexed with other voting boxes under the new arrangements which had been under study for a long time.

Under the new arrangement the county has 13 regular voting boxes and the absentees, where formerly there were 18 regular boxes and the absentees.

Eliminating the five small boxes will result in considerable saving to the taxpayers of the county in the general and special elections. It will also be a saving to candidates in the primary elections.

Boxes effected with the changes are as follows:
Pompey Mt. box 20 annexed to Mullin box 8.
Mt. Olive box 18 annexed to Caradan box 7.
Rock Springs box 12 annexed to Big Valley box 11. The Big Valley box was also moved from the old school building in the lower valley to the basement of the Baptist Church building in the upper valley.

Ratler box 13 and Regency box 14 annexed to Ridge box 16.

Boxes two and 17 had been annexed with others a number of years ago.

Consolidating the five boxes with others was the first step in many years to up-date the outmoded and expensive method of holding elections with large number of small election boxes in sparsely populated rural areas.

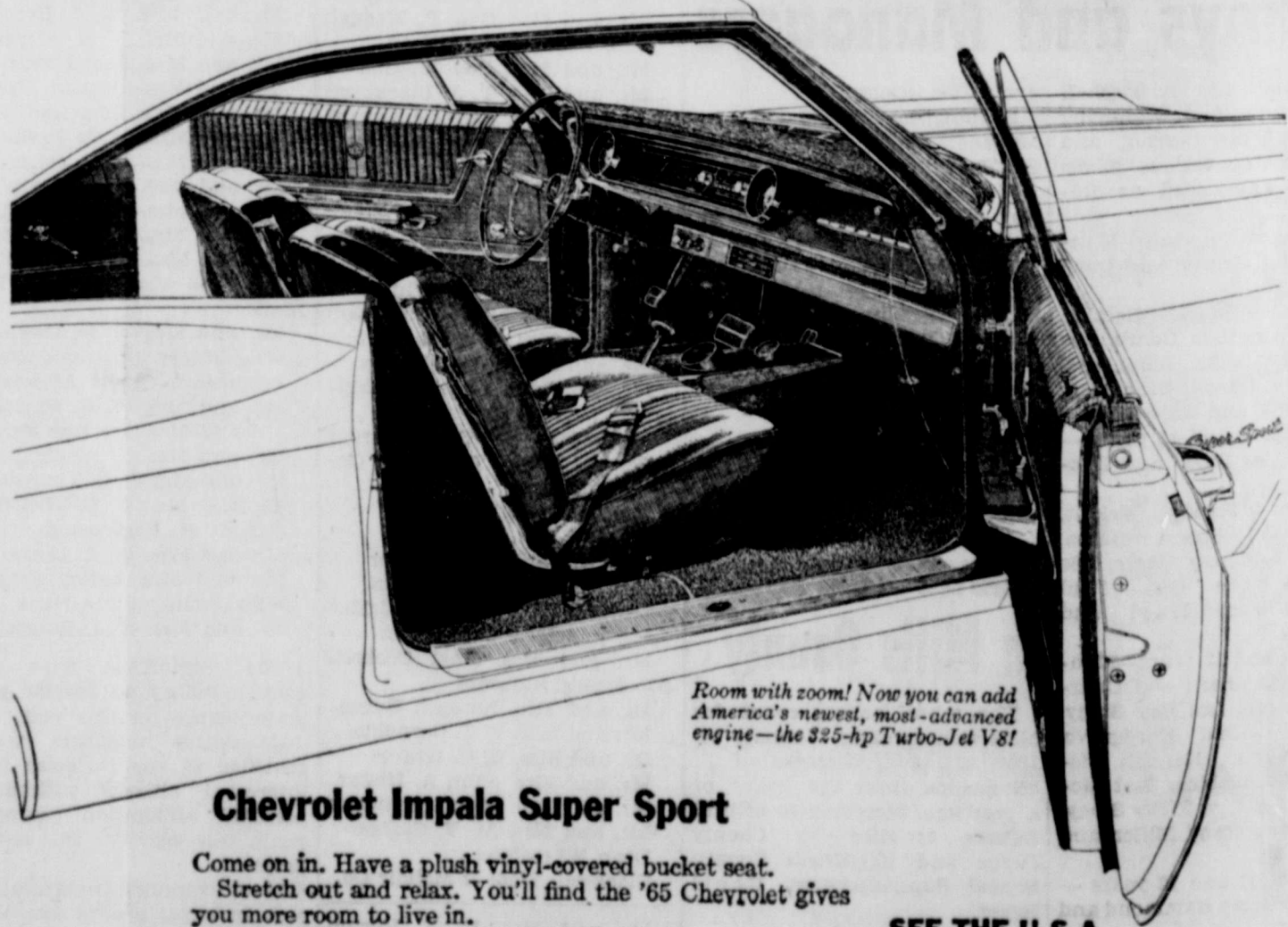

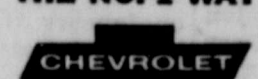

434 Lacking Fish Permit Are Hooked

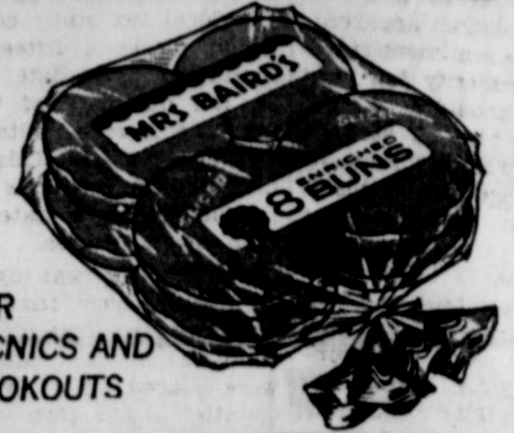
The overhead on fishing spurred sharply according to the last Texas Parks and Wildlife Department arrest report showing 434 tags in one month for fishing without a license.

Your REPRESENTATIVE Reports



The People of Mills County: major issues of the 59th Legislature have been disposed of. This report will be followed next week by a final one. Several weeks ago, the report in our district apparently reflected the sentiment stated by the majority felt that compromise should be worked between the Governor's and the T.S.T.A.'s Plan. As probably are aware this is what the legislature when it passed the compromise version of Senate Bill 1004 supported a compromise of the two plans, 23% support of the T.S.T.A. Plan, 17% of the Governor's Plan, and 16% against any raise for our school teachers. Thank you very much for this indication of your feelings.

The compromise bill which passed provides an average increase of \$535.00 per year for the public school teachers of Texas. The increase is most substantially to teachers who have less than six years or more with a master's degree and eight years or more with a bachelor's degree. Under the compromise there was no basic alteration of the existing Minimum Salary Program which provides for 80% state funds and 20% local participation. The money to finance the increase of the teacher pay is \$71 million, provided by the Legislature following the recommendation of Governor Connally's to place

an additional 3¢ tax on cigarettes effective July 1, 1965. The increase in the state tax on cigarettes will raise the state rate per package from the current 8¢ to 11¢. Secondly, there was passed an administrative change in the inheritance tax law, recommended by the state and local tax study committee, which places a fifteen month limitation from date of death on the due date of the state tax; the former limitation was eighteen months. This \$6 million increase conforms with the federal law on a state tax and with several states.

Redistricting was by far the greatest problem that the Legislature faced. Five of the seven counties of our 65th District were placed with five of the counties in the 65th District to form the new 55th District. Our new district will be Mills, McCulloch, San Saba, Lampasas, Kimble, Mason, Llano, Kerr, Real, and Bandera. Over my strong objections Burnet County was removed and placed with Travis County while Gillespie County was removed and placed with Blanco, Hays and Caldwell. This places Representative Jim Nugent of Kerrville and me in the same district. The 16th senatorial district has been changed into the 12th with the consolidation of our present senator, Louis Crump of San Saba, district and that of Senator J. P. Word of Meridian. The new district is comprised of 27 counties which are too numerous to mention. However, all of the seven counties in our House district which Senator Crump represents, including your county, are still retained

Dove Nesting Outlook Okay

A normal native population of mourning doves seemingly exists as the nesting season reaches seasonal proportions, according to E. A. Walker, assistant director for wildlife of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

He said field reports indicate that the state's most popular upland game bird has had average nesting and food conditions to date.

One area reportedly has advanced conditions, with some doves already laying a second batch of eggs, said Information-Education Officer Harley Berg of Waco.

Texas normally produces one of the largest crops of doves in the nation with the harvest enhanced by migrating birds during the fall.

Ordinarily, the harvest season, prescribed by the United States Fish and Wildlife Service, open in the north zone September 1, with a later shoot provided in the south zone.

Walker pointed out the number of birds available to the hunter this fall will largely depend upon weather conditions and food production during the months from now until September.

Baseball Season Off To Good Start

The Goldthwaite baseball season is off to a good start with about a fourth of the games played and most of the players on every team have seen action, Charles Conradt, president of the Baseball league announced Tuesday. Some of the boys have seen double action since there are not enough boys to go around on some of the teams.

Goldthwaite has six teams competing and the Tigers have the best record of any local team. They have not lost a game to date while they have had some narrow escapes.

Conradt expressed appreciation from the entire community to all of the managers of the teams for their work with the boys. It takes a lot of time to manage a team and parents of boys on the teams are urged to give their support to the managers. If no one cared to manage a team then the boys and their baseball program would be in sad shape, he stated.

The season will be over before long and officials are reminding parents that the least they can do is help with the transportation of the boys.

The club furnishes the bats, balls uniforms and catcher's

equipment. But, with over 100 boys taking part in the program, there is also need for money.

This Friday, June 18, is baseball day in Goldthwaite, Conradt stated. Those who have not made their donation to the baseball program by that time are urged to do so.

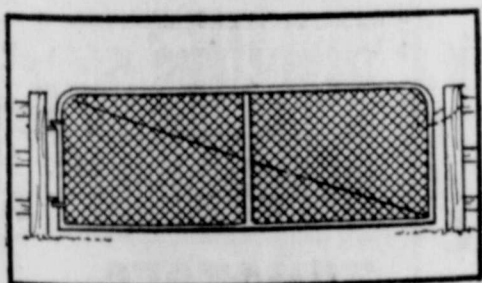

PUBLIC NOTICE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON SEPTEMBER 7, 1965.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 44 proposing an amendment to Sections 2 and 25 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to provide for an increase in the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members; to require apportionment of the membership in the House of Representatives at the time of the next general election; to require apportionment of the Senate according to population; and to delete the limitation that no county is entitled to more than one Senator.

IT IS RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Sections 2 and 25 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read respectively as follows:

Section 2. The Senate shall consist of 39 members. The members of the Senate shall be elected for two-year terms, beginning on the 1st day of January next following the general election in the year in which the term of the Governor expires.

Section 25. The state shall be divided into Senatorial Districts of contiguous territory having approximately equal population, as far as possible.

Should the Legislature enact enabling legislation in pursuance of this Amendment, no such law shall be effective until the next general election.

This Amendment shall become effective upon its adoption.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the 7th day of September, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment increasing the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members, retaining the present membership of the House of Representatives, requiring apportionment of the Senate according to population, and deleting the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment increasing the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members, retaining the present membership of the House of Representatives, requiring apportionment of the Senate according to population, and deleting the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

Students participating in this non-partisan program were named by High School superintendents in Mills County.

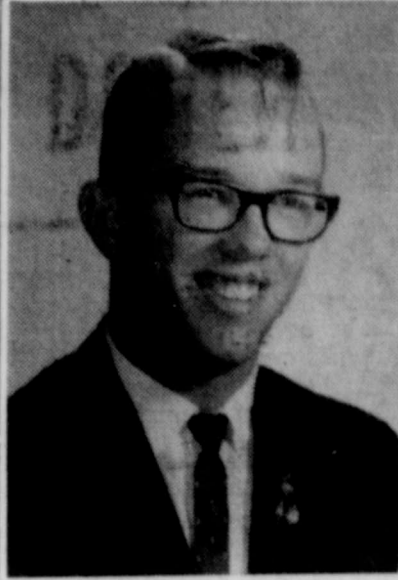
They were asked to write a theme on "Why I Would Choose To Live Under A Democratic Form Of Government."
