Delinquent Tax Collection Drive Approved By County Commissioners

Mills County Commissioners Court meeting in regular session Monday voted to start a drive to collect all delinquent county and state taxes, County Judge Cecil Egger announced.

Arrangements were made with County Attorney A. M. Pribble who was instructed to proceed with the delinquent tax collection project. It is expected to get started about October 1, and is to be completed by July 1, 1966.

The drive to collect past due taxes on property will include all delinquent taxes dating back to 1919, Judge Egger said. This will include many small parcels such as city lots in Goldthwaite, Mullin, Star and Priddy.

Delinquent tax suits will be

filed and property will be sold for back taxes.

This is the first time in many years that a concerted effort has been made to collect delinquent county and state taxes. In 1953 some delinquent taxes were collected but no suits were filed for collection.

In taking action on the delinquent tax situation the commissioners feel that something needs to be done to get property back on the active tax rolls.

Many parcels of real estate have more back taxes, penalty, and interest against them than they are worth on the market today. As long as they stay delinquent the situation gets worse.

A number of parties have expressed an interest in some of this property, if it were not for the back taxes.

If such property is sold for back taxes and the delinquent tax situation is cleared up much of the property will be placed back on the active tax rolls and will start producing tax revenue again, according to Judge Egger.

The Eagles flew to the top last Friday night with a 14-8 victory over the De Leon Bearcats for their second win this season.

This game was a sweet victory for the Eagles, not only because they beat the San Saba Armadillos, a class AA team, the Friday night before with a 33-15 win, but because De Leon beat the Eagles last year 26-6.

The De Leon Bearcats had lots of confidence in winning this game after they beat AA Hamilton 20-0 in their first game of the season.

Goldthwaite has played two games and won two games, starting the grid season with a bang.

The Eagles met the Bearcats at 8:00 on the Bearcats' field in De Leon. They scored the first two touchdowns in the first quarter with Hudson and Blackburn carrying the ball. The Bearcats scored early in the third quarter with Bruce Sanders and Donnie Sharp making the only score.

The Eagles' first touchdown was made by Tommy Hudson, quarterback, pushing over the 1 yard line, with 5:35 left in the first quarter. Emmett Miller kicked for the extra point to

bring the score to 7-0.

In the second quarter Charles Blackburn added to the score with a 69 yard run, with the clock showing 12 seconds left. Emmett Miller again kicked and again the kick was good. This upped the score to 14-0.

Donny Sharp, a Senior, with the score now standing at 14 to 8 in the fourth quarter, ran his team through three plays. The final play falling short of its goal, when the Bearcats were penalized on the one yard line and the clock running out. They were penalized five yards and again the Bearcats made it to the one yard line and again were penalized without making a touchdown. This time the clock ran out and the Eagles won 14-8.

Mullin School District To Vote Again Saturday On Tax Increase

Taxpayers in Mullin Independent School District will vote again this Saturday on a proposed increase in the school maintenance tax for operation of the school.

The second special maintenance tax election was set for Saturday, September 18, after voters turned down the proposition by a vote of 96 to 94 in a special election on Saturday.

Proposition to be voted on is whether to increase the maintenance tax to a maximum of \$1.50 per \$100 valuation of taxable property.

The district has a present tax rate limit of \$1.50 per \$100 valuation for local maintenance and bonded indebtedness combined. Of the \$1.50 tax levy \$1.25 has been used for operation of the school while 25¢ has been set aside for retiring the bonds.

If the proposition is approved the school board of trustees may assess ad valorem tax of not to exceed \$1.50 for local maintenance. Bonded indebtedness would be in addition to the local maintenance tax.

In announcing the special election members of the school board stated that they feel the move is necessary if they are to maintain their school.

The district owes \$81,000 in bonds. This requires 35¢ per \$100 of present valuation for retiring the debt.

The proposed increase for local maintenance along with debt service requirements would make the total tax \$1.85 per \$100 valuation if the maximum of \$1.50 for local maintenance is assessed, according to school officials.

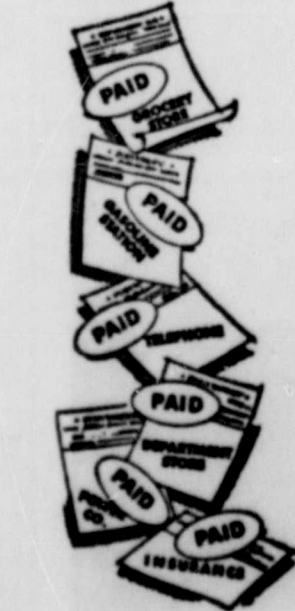

Last week Brown-Mills SCD supervisors W. G. Bishop and Wilford Witzsche, County Judge Cecil Egger and Commissioners Guy Rudd, Ray Lindsey, Fred Wall, and Andy Rowlett, meeting with the SCS officials, discussed future plans for flood prevention in the Middle Colorado.

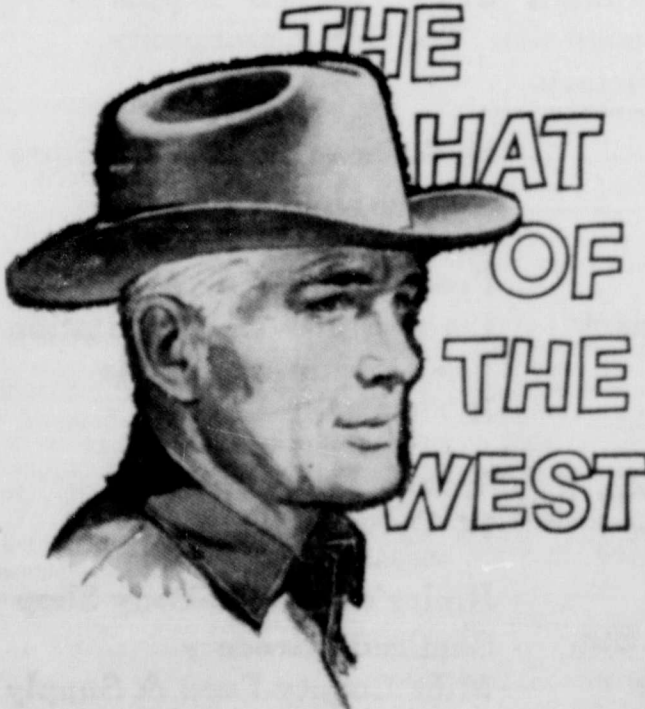
