## Eagles Beat Johnson City 49-6 For Third Victory This Season

Last Friday night Eagle Field was the setting for the third straight victory for the Goldthwaite Eagles as they beat the Johnson City Eagles 49-6. The GHS Eagles were too strong for the Eagles from Johnson City and came up with a football victory over the President's alma mater.

Charles Blackburn and Gary Warlick scored two touchdowns apiece with Jerry Rountree, Jim Childress, and Emmett Miller each getting a single touchdown, helping the Eagles soar to the top.

Blackburn scored the first two touchdowns in the first quarter with 38 and 17 yard runs. Blackburn ran over the goal line to catch the passes thrown by quarterback Tommy Hudson to make the two extra points for the Eagles after each touchdown.

The Johnson City Eagles also scored in the first quarter with Seltis scoring the lone touchdown. Thus bringing the score in the first quarter to 16-6.

In the second quarter Jim Childress ran 7 yards and scored

a touchdown, but the attempt for the extra point failed, bringing the score to 22-6.

The third quarter was a big thriller for the Eagles when Hudson and Jerry Rountree completed a 79 yard pass-and-run, boosting the score another 6 points. Again the attempt for the extra point failed but the Eagles were leading 28-6.

The Eagle reserves took over

in the third period and made 21 points. Gary Warlick cut loose for a 35 yard run and touchdown early in the third quarter, and then added the extra points to give the Eagles a 36-6 lead. Warlick scored a second touchdown on a 52 yard run. Emmett Miller, fullback, closed the scoring with a nine yard run for the final touchdown, bringing the score to 49-6.

## Mullin Voters Approve School Tax Increase

Mullin School District voters approved a tax increase for school maintenance by a vote of 132 to 104, according to unofficial returns of the special election held Saturday.

The special maintenance tax election was the second one held in two weeks. In the first election on Saturday, September 4, the issue was defeated 96 to 94.

The proposition approved by voters will give the board of trustees the authority to assess ad valorem tax of not to exceed \$1.50 per \$100 valuation for local maintenance. Bonded indebtedness will be in addition to the local maintenance tax.

The district owes \$81,900 in bonds which requires 35¢ per \$100 of present assessed valuation for paying off the debt.

If the maximum of \$1.50 per \$100 valuation is assessed by the trustees for local maintenance the total tax assessment will be \$1.85 per \$100 valuation.

In calling the special elections members of the school board stated that because of the ever increasing cost of operation they felt the move was necessary if they are to maintain their school.

Goldthwaite B Eagles will be host to the Comanche Indians for their second game of the season, tonight on Eagle Field.

The Eagles traveled to Bangs last Thursday for their second scheduled game this year. This game was not played since the Bangs team failed to show.

The B Eagles' first game of the season was a victory over Marble Falls, 16-0.

Fire of undetermined origin destroyed a large barn on the Will Rose place six miles from Goldthwaite on the Caradan Road Tuesday afternoon. More than 250 bales of hay and about 400 bushels of oats and barley were lost although more than 1,500 bushels of the grain were saved after the blaze was dis-

covered. To date, according to a report of the Greathouse Gin in Goldthwaite, there has been only 30 bales of cotton ginned this year. This amount is quite a decrease over 175 bales ginned to the same date last year.

Marriage license were issued to V. G. Landin and Corene Ray; D. Greathouse and Irene Perry; Winston Harvey Tidwell and Billie Brinson Bray; C. D. Gregory and Vada Lee McCarty.

Fall weather is apparently increasing the interest in the weekly stock auction sales that are being held every Monday at the Fair Grounds in Goldthwaite.

Mohair has been coming in at a lively rate this month, and it is estimated that at least three-fourths of the fall clip has been sold. Prices have averaged at 45c for grown hair and 55c to 60c for kid hair. These good prices have increased the demand for goats, and the market has been very active.

Gov. W. Lee O'Daniel has announced that the organization of county draft boards to classify and induct men in the new draft has been completed, and it is expected that the members will be announced soon. Mills County presents an unusual situation in that the members of the County Draft Board in 1917-1918 are still living here and are capable of functioning. Members of the Board were Dr. J. M. Campbell, J. A. Hester and J. V. Cockrum.

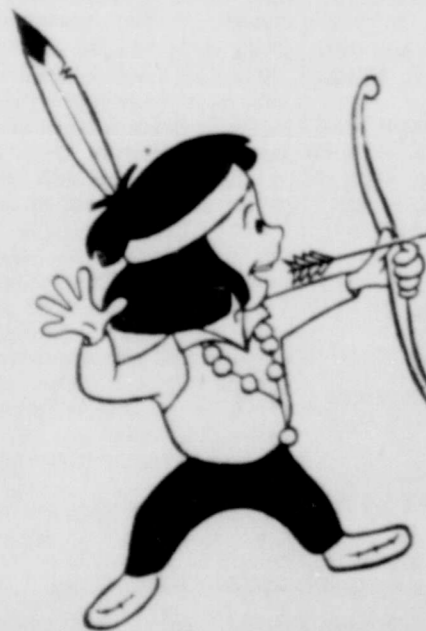

## 4,894 Books Circulated During Library Summer Reading Program

The Reading Program, sponsored by the Jennie Trent Dew Library in cooperation with the State Library, was concluded on September 1st, with 122 children taking part. Of this number, 112 were school children and 10 were of pre-school age. Fifty-two children received certificates and 36 read over and above the 12 books required for a certificate.

Delliah Wilcox, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bobby Lee Wilcox of Goldthwaite, read and reported on the greatest number of books, Delliah, a third grader, read 62 books. Dale Page, son of Mr. and Mrs. Wincel Page, also in the third grade, read 55 books for second place.

Gayle Hall was third with 53 books. She is an eighth grade student in Junior High.

Students from each of the four schools in the county participated in the program. They were required to read and report on 12 books, to receive a certificate. Each child was given a Reading Log, furnished by the State Library, so each could have a record of what he

read during the summer.

The State Library also furnished the Reading Certificates. The local library presented a U. S. Flag Kit to the highest reader above the sixth grade and the same to the highest reader in the sixth grade and below. Delliah Wilcox and Gayle Hall received these awards.

Total number of books checked out during the summer was 4,894. Of these 3,712 were juvenile and 1,182 adult. This is a splendid record for a library in a town of this size. No more worthwhile project could be found than putting that many good books into the hands of children and adults. The whole project is a credit to the citizens of Goldthwaite and especially to the most efficient librarian, Mrs. V. C. Bradford. Such a project not only furthers the education of children but helps build good moral character as well.

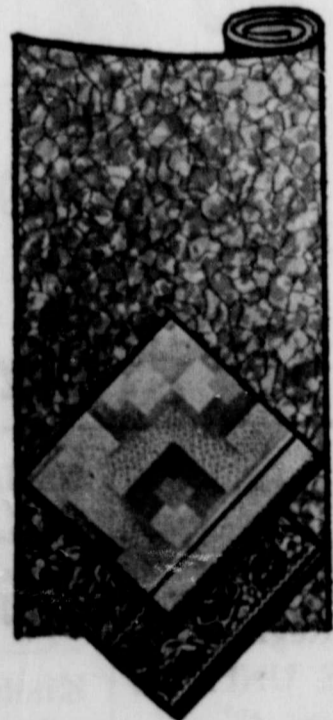

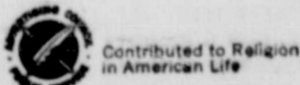

## Local Telephone Business Office To Close Under New Service Plan

A. J. Lacy, division manager for Southwestern States Telephone Co., said Goldthwaite would be one of 23 area cities to be served from a "regional service center" in Brownwood, beginning in early 1966.

In this one centralized location will be located the specially-trained people, records and equipment necessary to perform all service functions for a wide area of West Texas, Lacy said. From this location all records will be maintained and orders for service as well as repair reports will be received, assigned, dispatched and recorded upon completion of work.

Some of the advantages he cited of the new operation would be faster repair service, more current and accurate billing, quicker installations, readily available answers to inquiries about customer accounts, service charges, etc., and prompt handling of any request involving service.

Lacy described how the service center would work for Goldthwaite customers:  
"You dial the service center number (no long distance charge, of course) to one of a group of specialized telephone answering representatives whose job it is to handle service requests, inquiries about charges on bills, repair reports, and any other questions about telephone service."

"With motorized rotary files containing complete customer records at their fingertips, these representatives will be able to give immediate attention to any service matter, regardless of its nature."

"Dispatching of our field crews, by direct phone lines from the center, will follow while new controls in the center assure that the matter is handled properly."

Since all service matters will be handled by telephone and locations for paying telephone bills will be established, there will no longer be any need for a local business office operation, Lacy explained. The local office will close when the regional service center goes into operation.

Firm date of the change and information about how to call the service center will be announced later.
