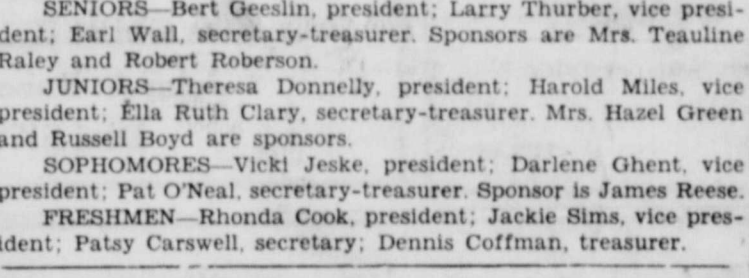
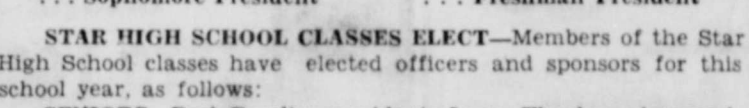

Micro-Wave TV For Goldthwaite

Micro-Wave TV for Goldthwaite moved a step closer last week Wednesday when application for Micro-Wave permit to serve this area was approved by the FCC in Washington.

Louis Bone of Cable-Vision, Ltd., which serves Goldthwaite, told the Eagle last Thursday that the permit was approved October 27, and plans will now be moving forward at a rapid rate to get the installation completed as soon as possible.

Last week workmen were busy pouring concrete foundation for a new Cable-Vision tower to be erected here. The new 250 foot tower will replace the one now in use here.

New cable-vision lines are being installed in Goldthwaite to insure customers better reception as the new service is placed into use here.

More announcement of this new service will be made during the coming weeks.

Five of the proposed changes for the Texas Constitution received a favorable vote in Mills County while five were turned down by local voters.

Amendments favored by Mills County voters included: 2. Veterans' Land Fund; 3. Aid to Needy; 5. Teachers' Retirement Funds; 6. Texas Opportunity Plan and 8. Judges' retirement.

Last Rites For R. E. Clements, Pioneer Citizen, Held Friday

Funeral services for Roger Earl Clements, Mills County pioneer, were held in the First Methodist Church of Goldthwaite Friday afternoon, October 29, at 3:00 o'clock. Services were conducted by Rev. Phillip Riley, pastor of the church, assisted by Rev. M. O. Childress. Burial was in Goldthwaite Memorial Cemetery under the direction of the Roy Wilkins Funeral Home.

Mr. Clements was born March 26, 1878 on Herd Pen Branch, Williams Ranch, Texas, son of the late Phil H. Clements and Mary Goodwin Clements. He passed away at his home in Goldthwaite, 707 Reynolds Street, early Thursday morning, October 28, 1965, after an extended illness. Mr. Clements came to Goldthwaite with his parents at the age of 9, when Goldthwaite was a town of tents. His father helped organize Mills County and the educational and development of the frontier by serving many years in the Texas Legislature.

The first school he attended in Goldthwaite was in a two room block house. By 1890 Goldthwaite could boast of a large stone building of two stories, two rooms up-stairs and two down—known as the Ella Goldthwaite Academy from which Mr. Clements graduated and then entered the University of Texas.

The Eagles swooped down to carry the Santa Anna Mountaineers (SAM) off with a 56-14 victory Friday night at Santa Anna. This was the Eagles' second conference victory and their seventh win for the 1965 grid season.

The GHS Eagles have a 7-0 victory for the season, while at this time last year they had three victories with four losses.

Last year the Eagles took over the Santa Anna Mountaineers with a 44-0 victory on Eagle field.

It was a good night for the Eagles as well as for the Mountaineers as no one was seriously injured. The Eagles made 33 points in the first quarter with nine points added in the second quarter and eight in the third. In the fourth quarter they made 6 more. SAM made both touchdowns and two extra points in the fourth quarter making the final score 56-14.

Jim Childress made the first touchdown after a long drive by the Eagles in the first quarter making the score, after Emmett Miller's kick, 7-0. Charles Blackburn took the ball on a hand-off and ran 63 yards for the second touchdown. Miller's kick was again good. Now the score stood at 14-0. The Mountaineers fumbled the ball and Randy Holland recovered for the Eagles. Tommy Hudson made the next two touchdowns, both on quarterback sneaks. And Miller's kick both times was no good. Making the score 27-0. Charles Blackburn made the final touchdown for the first quarter, but again Miller's kick was no good. The score for the first quarter was 33-0.

Bobby Rountree ran 40 yards for the sixth touchdown of the evening. Miller kicked a 10 yard field goal, this added three points to the score for a 42-0 lead at the half.

In the third quarter Tommy Hudson passed to Charles Blackburn who ran 40 yards on a sweep play for the first touchdown in the third quarter. Jerry Rountree ran the ball over for the extra two points, after a pass from Tommy Hudson, the Eagles leading 50-0.

Early in the fourth quarter Eddie Jones of SAM scored a touchdown on a drive play and a 19 yard scamper. The try for the extra point failed but the score changed to 50-6. The final touchdown for the Eagles came when Bobby Rountree rased over the goal line. Miller's kick again was no good. Santa Anna then took over for the final touchdown of the evening when Eddie Jones ran 20 yards for the second touchdown for SAM. Roy Harvey tossed the ball to Gary Rider for two extra points making the final score for the victorious Goldthwaite Eagles 56-14 over the Santa Anna Mountaineers.

Blackburn carried the ball six times for a total of 189 yards.

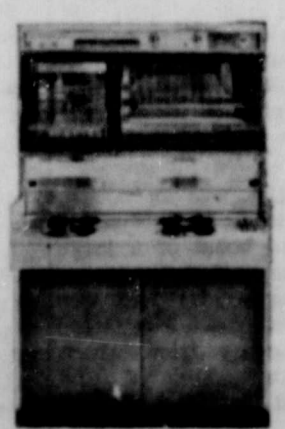

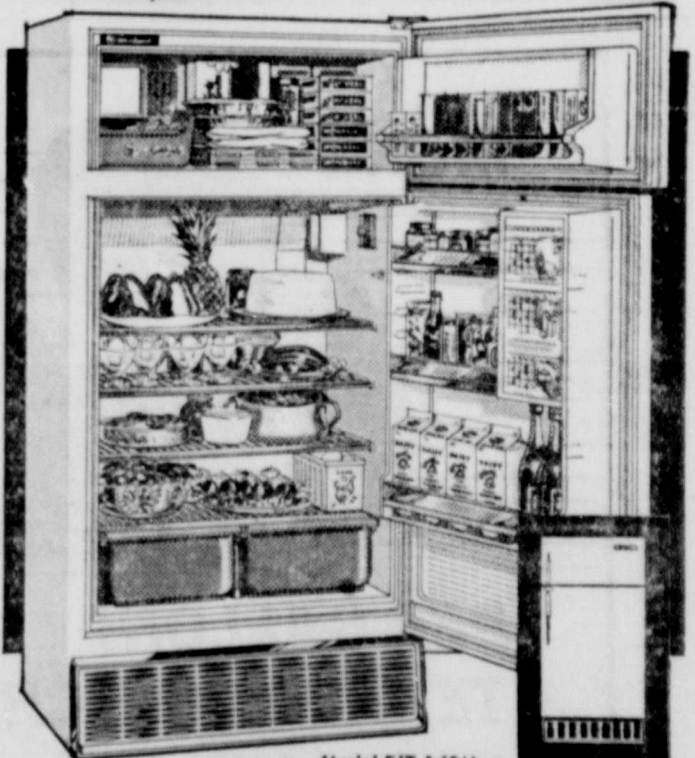

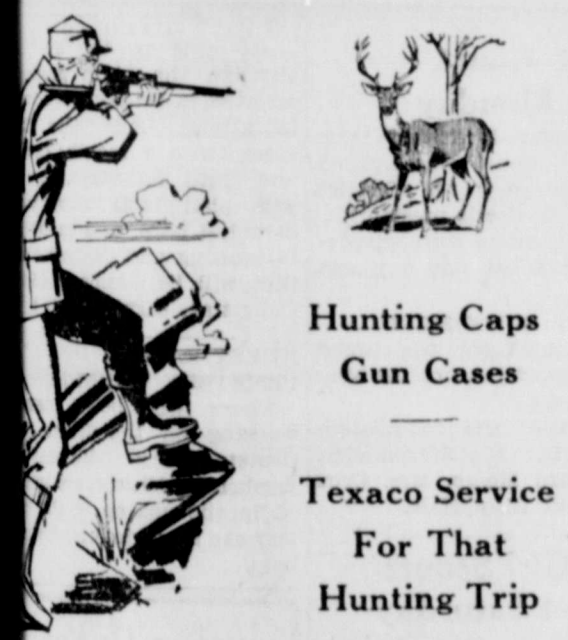
