Next Monday, January 31, is the last day for citizens of Mills County to pay their poll tax and be eligible to vote in the 1966 elections.

Mills County Tax Assessor-Collector H. G. Brooks announced that there was a big rush on poll tax payments the past weekend after notice came out in the paper last Thursday about the deadline for paying poll taxes being only a few days away.

While the poll tax payments have stepped up considerably during the past few days there still many Mills County residents who will have to pay their poll tax if they expect to vote in the elections scheduled for this year. These include school trustees, county commissioners, state elections, special elections and school trustees.

Everyone is reminded that poll tax receipt is still required in Texas (unless one is exempt) to vote in the elections to be held in 1966.

Mills County Schools have been approved for a \$48,162.53 grant under the Elementary and Secondary Education Act, Title One, according to announcement by school officials. The schools also received a grant under title two, which covers the library program.

The Star School is serving as fiscal agent for the project with Supt. Wayne Poe as chairman. The grant is for the four county schools, Goldthwaite, Mullin, Star and Priddy. It will be for the remaining part of this school year, until September 1, 1966.

The project with the grant will involve a program with 11 additional personnel and is without matching local funds. Under Title One, the program will provide one remedial reading teacher and four teacher aides for Goldthwaite; one teacher for Mullin; one teacher aide for Priddy and one teacher and one teacher aide for Star.

The following teachers and teacher aides have been employed by the schools. In Goldthwaite school Mrs. Wincel Page has been selected as teacher and teacher aides are Mrs. Horace Gray, Mrs. Bobby Wilcox, Mrs. Donald Padgett and Mrs. Jerry Covington.

Mrs. Barbara Collins has been added as a teacher at Mullin. At Star Mrs. Wilson Head has been selected as a teacher and Mrs. Carolyn Henry as teacher aide. Mrs. Opal Schrank has been named teacher aide at Priddy.

In addition to the additional teachers and aides for the various schools some of the funds will be spent on the reading program for equipment, supplies and materials at each of the schools. The four schools will also have a librarian and equipment custodian and a reading program co-ordinator. These are yet to be named, according to school officials.

Title Two funds will be primarily for library improvements which will include books and library materials. Funds received by the various schools for the library program under title two of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act are as follows: Goldthwaite, \$1,240.65; Mullin, \$418.89; Star, \$401.13; and Priddy, \$465.74.

meta High School. An alumnae of Howard Payne College, Mrs. Turman is currently attending Graduate School at The University of Texas.

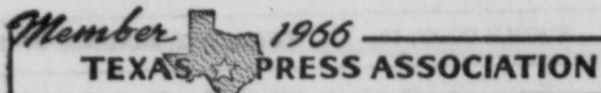

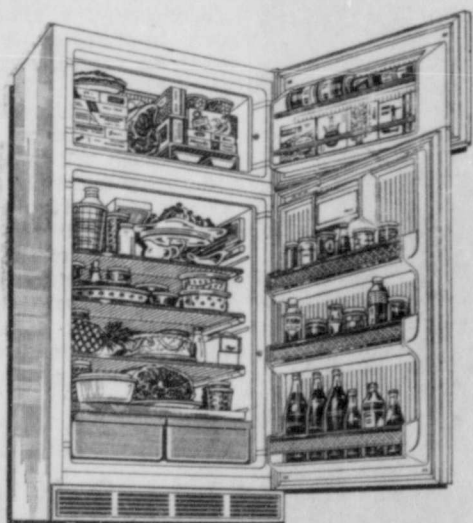

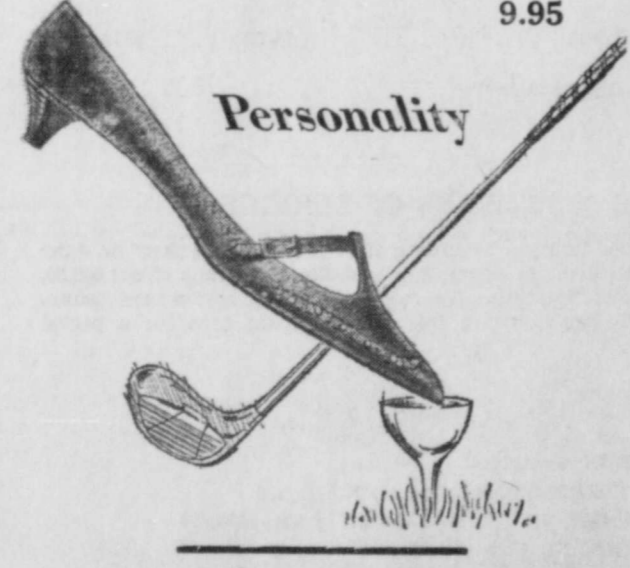
