Glynn Collier Is Named Chairman For Salvation Army Fund Drive

Glynn Collier will head the Annual Salvation Army Campaign in Goldthwaite and Mills County, according to Loy Long, who heads the local Salvation Army Service Unit. Collier will name captains and workers for the mid-April campaign.

A goal of \$1,000 has been set by the Unit in order to take care of the immediate need of people who have emergency problems. Most of the aid given last year to 153 distressed people was for food, groceries, lodging, clothing, and transportation.

In addition to local service, the Unit cooperates with the state-wide welfare services of the Salvation Army to make available a variety of welfare services including the well known disaster service.

Two trustees are to be elected to the board in each of the respective districts. All are for a three year term.

Eagles Set Records And Win Relays On New Track

With a class A record upset and a time of 43:1, the Goldthwaite Eagles started the finals in the sprint relay last Saturday afternoon. The time, clocked by J. Cook, G. Warlick, J. Rountree and C. Blackburn, broke the state record two-tenths of a second, and the team proves to be an excellent bid for the Class A state championship.

A 10:0 won the 100 yard dash for Charles Blackburn, and broke the old record of 10:1, but a 9:9 in the preliminaries by Cross Plains' Bo Strickland went into the record books. Gary Warlick had a speedy third place in the same event.

A finish line kick and a time of 2:08 gave half miler Ronnie Hill a surprising first place in the 880 yard dash, but was not enough to break last year's record of 2:03.4.


With a team total of 146 points the Eagles easily finished over second place Hamilton with 85.

The park committee is now in a receptive mood for contributions from all who are interested in the welfare of Mills County Park.

Members of the committee attending the meeting last Wednesday were: W. P. Duren, Harold Yarborough, Lee Roy Stacy, Houston Duren, W. C. Barnett, Lewis T. Hudson, Vic E. Koleber also attended. Two members of the committee, Charles Conradt and Ed Thornton, were not present.

The committee needs a minimum of \$1,200.00 for the caretaker alone through the growing season. The city plays a big part in the park project with respect to roads and other details.

Last year interested parties contributed \$1,429.00 to the maintenance fund. This was done without personal solicitation on the part of the committee and reflected county-wide interest in the park.

It was pointed out at the meeting that it is that time of the year again. The growing season is here and it is time for

park maintenance to get underway in full force.

On another page of this paper appears an official appeal from the committee for financial support of the project.

The committee hopes to enlist at least 100 persons to contribute \$12.00, or more, per year for park maintenance.

Last year a good many raised their contribution. A number gave \$25.00 or more which helped put the drive over the top. Committee members feel that this will hold true again this year.

The park committee hopes that interested persons will again respond with their donations as they have done in the past so that mail campaign and personal contact work will not be necessary to insure park upkeep for the season.

Past support is appreciated by committee members who are now ready to receive this year's contributions. Chairman Duren stated.

Questions And Answers Regarding Low-Rent Public Housing Project

A series of questions and answers regarding low-rent public housing have been released by Goldthwaite Housing Authority chairman, L. B. Burnham and Executive Director Clyde Cockrum to help acquaint residents of the city with the program.

Other Commissioners of the Housing Authority are: Houston Duren, Harold Yarborough, Kellis Landrum and Doug Collier.

Q. What will low-rent public housing cost in local taxes?

A. Nothing. No tax levy is needed, no tax increase is needed.

Heart Fund Drive Collects \$399.40

Returns from the 1966 Heart Fund Campaign in Goldthwaite totaled \$399.40, it was announced this week by Janeth Woodard, local Heart Fund Campaign chairman.

"The splendid response from the people of Goldthwaite to the 1966 Heart Fund appeal is evidence that they understand the seriousness of the heart problem," Mrs. Woodard said. "It also demonstrates their strong conviction that the Heart Association's program of research, education and community service constitutes the most effective way to combat and eventually to control this leading health menace."

In addition to applauding the public's support of the drive, Mrs. Woodard extended the Texas Heart Association's appreciation to the local newspaper for its cooperation, and to the laymen, physicians and related professionals who volunteered their time and effort to help conduct the drive.

The federal government, through loans or guarantees of loans, makes possible the financing of housing, and makes an annual contribution to enable rents to be set within reach of low-income families.

Q. Is this type of housing "free"?

A. No. Tenants must pay their rents, just as Mr. Average Citizen anywhere else. Rents are, by law, lower than those charged on the private market, permitting low-income families to acquire decent housing within their means.

Q. Is low-rent housing something new and untested?

A. By no means, the low-rent public housing program was created by Congress in the Housing Act of 1937, as a local federal - aid to communities through which they may provide decent, safe and sanitary housing to shelter low-income families unable to afford substandard housing. More than 250 communities in Texas have low-rent housing.

Q. Who decides how many units will be built?

A. This is determined by the Public Housing Authority, based on the need and demand for such housing in this area.

Q. Is the Local Housing Authority appointed by Washington, D. C.?

A. Emphatically no! The Local Housing Authority of Goldthwaite is a product of this community. It's headed by five local citizens who serve as Commissioners and are appointed by the local Mayor. Policies and operations of the Authority are determined here!
