First Primary Election This Saturday

Two Contests For County Offices

The first Democratic Primary election of 1966 will be held this Saturday, May 7.

Democratic Executive Committee Chairman, Claudia Cockrum, has announced that the polls will open at 8 a. m. and will remain open until 7 p. m. There are 13 voting boxes in Mills County.

Absentee voting has been considerably lighter than two years ago. Absentee voting closed Tuesday, May 3, with 117 votes cast, according to County Clerk, Walter A. Bryant.

Seven state offices will be in contest with two or more candidates making their bids in the primary election. There is a possibility of a run-off in more than one contest.

A close race is predicted by some observers in the contest for U. S. Congressman in the newly aligned 17th district, of which Mills County is now a part.

Two offices are in contest in Mills County with the possibility of a run-off in one of them. Candidates for governor are Johnnie Mae Hackworth, Stanley C. Woods and John Connally. Two candidates are on the ballot for Lieutenant Governor, Bill Hollowell and Preston Smith.

Waggoner Carr and John R. (Jack) Willoughby are candidates for U. S. Senator. For Attorney General there are three candidates, Crawford C. Martin, Franklin Spears and Galloway Calhoun.

Jerry Sadler and Fred Williams are candidates for Commissioner of General Land Office. For Railroad Commissioner there are three candidates, P. S. (Puss) Ervin, Byron Tunnell and Paul B. Haring.

John F. (Jack) Onion and W. T. McDonald are candidates for Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals. Candidates for U. S. Congressman are Eldon Mahon and Omar Burleson. Other State and District offices are without contest.

Four Year College Scholarship Awarded To Bertram B. Geeslin, Jr.

An 18 year old Star High School student with an ambition to be an engineer has been awarded a full 4-year college scholarship by the ROCCO C. CAFFARELLI TRUST and its administrator, the Frost National Bank of San Antonio. The Caffarelli Trust awards the scholarships annually to outstanding students selected from the Finalists of the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test Program.

The deserving young man is Bertram Beal Geeslin, Jr., the son of Mr. and Mrs. Bertram B. Geeslin of Route 3, Goldthwaite. Young Geeslin was one of over 1,900 finalists from approximately 800,000 high school students taking the preliminary National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test across the nation. He also took a second test to become a Finalist. With the latter test, he also submitted academic and other personal records. He became a Finalist by repeating his high performance on the second test.

In addition to test scores, the students were selected on the basis of their high school grades, accomplishments outside the classroom, extra-curricular activities, school endorsement, and supporting information by the students and their schools.

City Water Users To Get Reduced Summer Rates For Three Months

City water users were granted a special gift by the city council meeting in regular session Monday night.

The council approved reduced water rates for three summer months, June, July and August.

Reduced summer rates will apply on the June 20, July 20, and August 20, meter readings with the July 1, August 1 and September 1, billings.

Under the summer rates minimum water users will receive a special package of additional 500 gallons, from 2,500 to 3,000 gallons, for the minimum charge of \$2.00.

The rate charged per 1,000 gallons on water used over the minimum of 3,000 will be reduced from 65 cents to 50 cents per thousand during the three months period.

The summer rate represents a reduction of approximately 20 per cent for all water users.

The city now has an ample supply of water and this move by the council in reducing the rates for the summer months is some encouragement to residents of the city in keeping up lawns, flowers, shrubs and trees.

For about 20 years, before the past summer, Goldthwaite residents heard the cry each summer: "Use Less Water."

This summer the message will be the same as last summer: "Use More Water and Beautify Your City."

OTHER BUSINESS

In other business the council heard monthly operating reports from City Manager W. C. Barnett on receipts and disbursements for the various departments for the month of April.

The council approved and accepted \$1,500.00 in three \$500.00 amounts from Mrs. Fannie A. Jackson to be invested in trust by the city with proceeds to be used for perpetual care of three cemetery lots in Goldthwaite Memorial Cemetery.

Status of the Housing Authority and progress being made on the local project was discussed.

The council also discussed again the possibilities of providing water for the new track field. City Manager W. C. Barnett was instructed to prepare cost figures for such a project and present the information to interested parties.

Outdoor Theatre Planned For Park

An Outdoor Theatre for Mills County Park is being planned as one of the future projects in the overall development plan of the park.

This phase of the overall program was discussed at a special meeting of the Park Board and members of the Garden Club Park Committee the past week.

The architect who provided the overall park development plans has been contacted to work out details for the Outdoor Theatre for the group.



COOKED SALAD DRESSING

If you don't have a favorite
cooked salad dressing, here's
one from the U. S. Department
of Agriculture that's simple but
good. Serve it hot or cover and
refrigerate until used.

- 2 tablespoons flour
- 1 tablespoon sugar
- 1 teaspoon powdered dry
mustard
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup milk
- Dash of cayenne
- 1 egg slightly beaten
- 1 tablespoon butter or
margarine

1/3 cup vinegar or lemon
juice

Mix dry ingredients in top of
double boiler. Gradually stir in
the milk.

Cook over boiling water, stir-
ring constantly, until mixture
begins to thicken. Cover and
cook 10 minutes stirring occa-
sionally.

Stir a little of the hot mixture
into the egg and then add this
to the cooked mixture. Cook 3
minutes stirring constantly. Add
the fat.

Remove from heat. Slowly
blend in vinegar or lemon juice.


