## Grain Harvest Nearly Over

The 1966 grain harvest in Mills County is nearly over. An average crop for county farmers and ranchers, according to report from County Agent George Reese.

While there are still some fields to be harvested, most should be completed in the next few days.

The yield in oats this year ranged up to 53 and 60 bushels per acre, in some fields. Many fields yielded 30 to 40 bushels per acre.

Wheat yields were reported to range up to 28 and 30 bushels in some cases while most of it ranged from 12 to 20 bushels per acre.

This year's grain crop was estimated to be about like last year's which was off some from years ago when Mills County had a bumper crop.

From the grain crop reported Mills County farmers and ranchers received the major portion of their benefits from the grain crop through the grain grazing during the past winter was considered as the best in many years.

**7 Inches Of Rain Last Week**

Rainfall recorded here during the past week measured 1.17 inches, Harry Allen, weather reporter.

## Pasture And Fertilizer Meeting Slated Wednesday

A Pasture and Fertilizer meeting will be held in the Mills County Courthouse next Wednesday, June 29th at 1:30 p. m.

All farmers and ranchers are invited to attend this meeting.

Mr. A. C. Novosad, Extension Pasture Specialist and Dr. C. D. Welch, Extension Soil Chemist, with Texas A&M University will discuss Pastures and Fertilizers.

Mr. Novosad will discuss the use of temporary pastures for this section of the State and he will bring the latest information on the care, management, seeding and varieties of these crops.

Dr. C. D. Welch will discuss fertilizers, how to apply, time of application and he will also discuss the soil testing and soil fertility program. "We believe that much valuable and timely information can be obtained on these subjects by attending this meeting," said County Agent George Reese in announcing the meeting.

Everyone there had been looking forward to Midway School's first homecoming, which had a registered attendance of 352.

After a while of greeting and visiting, Miss Laurie Petsick, an ex-teacher of 1918-19, rang her old school bell for "books."

The program arranged by Miss Petsick, Nina McNeil Booker, and Virgie Lee Koen Ripley was presented as follows:

Homer Doggett, vice president, called the house to order. Mrs. B. C. Wicker, president, gave the welcome, and the invocation was given by an ex-teacher, Raymond Williams of Odessa. Then Miss Petsick asked everyone to stand and sing "America" the usual school song which meant more to all now than in their childhood school days.

Mrs. Wicker introduced the twelve ex-teachers that were present with each giving a brief summary of the past while teaching in the schoolhouse and of

the present time since they have been away. Ex-teachers, Miss Ruth Murry Germany, was represented at the homecoming by a letter written to her Class of 1920-21. Among those attending was Mrs. Dula (Payne) Leverett, the first teacher to teach in the schoolhouse. She taught the year 1913-14. Only 413 voted in the special election.






