Nuisance Calls Tracing Device Available Here

A device for tracing nuisance calls is now available for use in the Goldthwaite office, according to A. M. Chappell, division manager for Southwestern States Telephone Company.

The device, termed a "Called Party Control Plug," is installed in the central office and permits the called party to "hold-up" the circuit until the call can be traced and the calling number identified.

Texas law prohibits the use of the telephone for the purpose of "harassing, abusing or otherwise intimidating" other parties. Obscene telephone calls are included in this category. A conviction under this law carries a maximum penalty of one year in prison, one thousand dollar fine, or both.

Last year the Society aided

14,395 Texans in the form of treatments, services, equipment loans and related aids. The Society is carrying out a program to reach every disabled person in the state who needs assistance. This program is to insure that every disabled child and adult has an equal opportunity at a normal way of life.

Mr. Collier urged that any person needing assistance from the Easter Seal Society contact him at the Mills County State Bank, Goldthwaite. There is no charge for these services, he added.

Disabled Texans are aided by the Texas Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults regardless of age, race, cause of disability or financial status. Mr. Collier said that to secure services that a disabled person or their family should contact him.

The Texas Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults is the oldest organization providing direct care and treatment for the crippled children and adults of Texas.

Services will be held each evening at 8:00 o'clock. Sunday

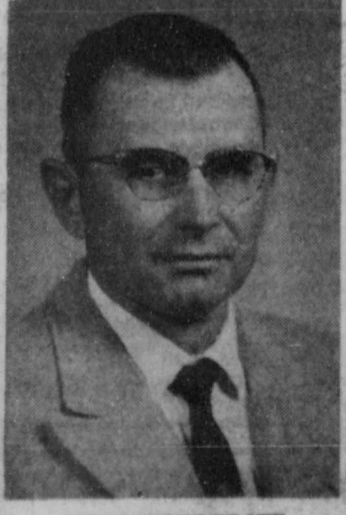
services are Bible Study at 10:00 a. m. followed by the communion service at 10:45 and the Worship Service at 11:00 o'clock.

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

AUSTIN, TEXAS — There could be a new look around many Texas county commissioners courts under a reapportionment opinion laid down by the Texas Supreme Court in the case brought by Mayor Hank Avery of Midland.

Avery maintained that it isn't constitutional for one Midland County Commissioner to represent 95 per cent of the county's population — the City of Midland — while the other three commissioners represented only 5 per cent of the people.

Supreme Court agreed, 8-1, but with reservations. It held that the ratio was not fair representation, but that the re-division of county precincts, which it told Dist. Judge Joe B. Dibrell of Coleman to order, could consider factors other than population.

Declining to extend the population-only rule which the U. S. Supreme Court has applied to state legislatures, Supreme Court held that a commissioners court is not a legislative body. Court's majority wrote that the road, bridge and tax activities of the commissioners courts have more concern to rural residents than to city dwellers. In recent years, such courts have concerned themselves mainly with non-urban areas, leaving city matters to the city governments.

Supreme Court concluded that not just population, but also factors such as miles of country road, taxable values and geography, plus the "convenience of the people" set out in the Texas Constitution, can

be taken into account by a commissioners court in dividing the county into four precincts. High court agreed with Judge Dibrell that the present Midland County situation obviously is arbitrary and should be declared invalid.

Case either will go back to Judge Dibrell for final decision or will be appealed to the U. S. Supreme Court by either Mayor Avery or Midland County — since neither won a clear-cut victory.

Attorney General Speaks

State Savings and Loan Department has authority to decide whether a business not under its regulation may use the term "savings" as part of its name, Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr ruled.

In other recent opinions, Carr concluded that:

- Newly - authorized farm machinery exemption from motor vehicle inspection requirement does not necessarily include trucks and jeeps primarily used on farms.

- Board of Economic Opportunity of Laredo and Webb County can hire relatives of its members without violating the State's nepotism laws.

- A constable who advertises he won't work traffic accidents has not neglected his duty, but an actual refusal to attend such accidents where there is reason to believe a violation has occurred does constitute neglect.

- A justice of peace may appoint counsel for an indigent in an examining trial, but a section of the criminal code permitting inclusion of fees for appointed lawyers in court costs is unconstitutional.

- Appropriation for construction of a museum building at Washington State Park cannot be used for repairing or restoring historic buildings already at the park.

- A person placed on probation cannot get fine and court costs back on completion of probationary period.

- Unclaimed property in hands of peace officers for 30 days is to be sold (does not apply to intoxicants or autos).

- Wilbarger County Hospital District (but not county commissioners) has authority to buy land for community center for mental health and retardation services to be operated by the state.

- July 20 deadline for setting tax rate is applicable to Brazoria County.

That's All For Now

There will be no more free-voter registration periods for Texans this year.

A three-judge federal court in Austin refused a U. S. Justice Department request to reopen registration during April 8-19 and August 22-October 8. Decision was made final, as was the February 9 order declaring the poll tax an unconstitutional voting requirement for future elections.

Acknowledging that the March 3-17 free sign-up period for 1966 elections, as provided by the new state registration law enacted last February, was "extremely short," the court nevertheless found it "afforded reasonable opportunities to register."

"The United States," proclaimed the judges, "has not demonstrated that this court should undertake to substitute its judgment for . . . legislative action."

More than 2,900,000 Texas adults now are registered to vote in the 1966 elections. This includes the 635,600 signed up during the March period. About

2,000,000 adults have not qualified as voters.

As for the registration itself, Asst. U. S. Atty. Gen. Stephen Pollak said the FBI found no evidence of racial discrimination during the 15-day period for free registration, and county tax collectors, who served as registrars, did a good job in the brief time allowed them.

Texas' Attorney General, Waggoner Carr, maintained that if the request for two additional registration periods had been granted, the next move would have been to require more than one day for elections.

Courts Speak

On May 11 the Court of Criminal Appeals will hear the motion for a new trial for Jack Ruby, who was convicted of murdering presidential assassin Lee Harvey Oswald.

Ruby's attorneys are seeking to disqualify District Judge Joe Brown of Dallas on grounds he agreed to write a book about the celebrated trial in which Ruby was given the death penalty.

State Supreme Court says the Seventh Court of Civil Appeals must decide if \$3,250 in damages against an Amarillo loan company is excessive. In the case in question the firm recovered money from a divorcee after a loan to her and her ex-husband already had been settled. High court found evidence to support the trial-jury finding of malice on the part of the company.

Appointments

Wales Madden, Amarillo attorney, is the new member of the Governor's Committee on Public School Education. He succeeds the late Kermit Kyche of Alvin. Committee is making a three-year study of school needs.

Connally also picked Dr. Sterling H. Pruitt Sr. of Fort Worth for the State Board of Chiropractic Examiners. He reappointed Dr. Harvey H. Kennedy of Longview and Dr. Walter H. Fischer of Temple to the same board.

Governor chose William H. Gardner, Austin newsman, to serve as the citizen member on the Committee for Restoration of the Flag of Santa Anna.

Named to the Texas Surplus Property Agency were Ed Riedel, Jess M. Irwin Jr. and C. O. Layne, all of Austin; the Rev. Edward Maher Jr. of Dallas; Bill Bitner of Centerville; C. A. Roberson of Odessa; Carl Parker of Sherman; Garland Ferguson of Union Grove; and Grady Hester of Terrell. This agency administers the transfer of federal surplus property to state agencies. Riedel has served as chairman for several years. Layne, Bitner and Roberson also have previous service.

House Speaker Ben Barnes announced these appointments: Sen. Jack Hightower of Vernon and Rep. Delwin Jones of Lubbock as members of the Com-

mittee on Agriculture for the Southern Regional Conference of the Council of State Governments; Rep. Ralph Hayne of Plainview to the Committee on Economic Development for the Southern Regional Conference.

Lt. Gov. Preston Smith appointed Sen. Andy Rogers of Childress to the Senate's standing committee on Interstate Cooperation.

SHORT SNORTS

Governor Connally has appointed these five members-at-large to a state Election Law Study Committee to serve with five senators and five representatives previously appointed: Secretary of State John Hill, State Democratic Executive Committee Chairman Will D. Davis, Republican State Chairman Peter O'Donnell, Walter Sterling of Houston and Webb County Democratic Chairman Mike Volpe of Laredo.

New "Texas Calendar of Events" is available from State Highway Department.

Sen. Culp Krueger of El Campo, chairman of the Pollution-Multiple Use Study, Texas Waters Committee, called an April 4-7 meeting here to review progress of its work to date and future hearings.

Governor Connally announced approval of these nine projects under the Economic Opportunity Act: Limestone County, \$47,230; San Antonio, \$11,600; Cameron County, \$44,686; Snyder, \$1,493; Uvalde, Kinney and Real Counties, \$19,755; Coleman, Concho, Callahan, McCulloch and Runtels Counties, \$28,813; Tarrant County, \$34,290; Franklin, Hopkins, Tarrant and Raines Counties, \$19,916; and Laredo and Webb County, \$39,018.

Lt. Gov. Preston Smith named Sen. Jack Hightower of Vernon to the interim Committee to Study the Nursing Profession.

Secondary trading exemption of Saturn Industries, Inc., Dallas, was revoked by the State Securities Board.

An application for a state bank in Rockport has been filed with the Banking Department with proposed capital of \$120,000, surplus \$120,000 and reserves \$60,000.

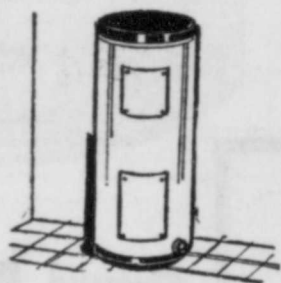

Texas Soil And Water Conservation Districts Enjoying Public Support

"Texas soil and water conservation districts have enjoyed public confidence and widespread endorsement since their very beginnings more than 25 years ago," says H. N. Smith, State Conservationist of the Soil Conservation Service. "In recent years increased support, by rural and urban folks alike, of the vital work Texas conservation districts are doing, is evidenced by the most tangible evidence of all—money," Smith goes on to say.

Figures recently released comparing dollar estimates of non-Federal contributions to Texas conservation districts for 1963 and 1965 amply back up Smith's statements.

Total non-Federal contributions for 1965 were \$3,576,000, an all-time high. Local units of government, primarily cities and counties, contributed about \$1,114,000, an increase of more than \$200,000 over 1963.

State government assistance to soil, water and plant conservation rose \$20,000 over 1963, from \$291,000 to \$311,000. Financial help from private individuals and institutions approximated \$2,151,000 during 1965.

According to a report from Work Unit Conservationist Elgin Smith, non-Federal assistance to the Mills County portion of the Brown-Mills Soil and Water Conservation District amounted to over \$3,000 in donated time and services.

Purposes for which non-Federal funds were spent during 1965 as compared to 1963 reveal changes of emphasis in conservation. For example, local and State funds spent for flood prevention increased from \$1,725,000 in 1963 to almost \$2,500,000 in 1965.

Non-Federal expenditures in other categories, such as information and education also increased. Smith, in conclusion, pointed out the foregoing estimates do not include donated time and expenses of more than 900 busy and dedicated soil and water conservation district supervisors.
