While some parts of the county received rainfall from two to three inches in small areas, Goldthwaite received only .15 inch. This is the only moisture recorded here for the month of July.

Official records of Harry Allen, weatherman, show that eight days this month have had temperature reading of over 100 degrees.

Highest reading was 103 degrees while two days were 100, one day 101, three days 102 and two days 103 degrees.

1966 Diversion And Price Support Program Payments To Be Made Soon

Cotton, Wheat & Feed Grain farmers who are taking part in the 1966 Diversion and price support programs will begin getting final program payments soon after August 1, 1966, Ralph Duren, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, said today.

The payments represent any unpaid part of the estimated diversion payment and the additional price support to growers who voluntarily signed up and then met applicable provisions of the program. Growers could request that half of the estimated diversion payment be made in advance at the time of the sign-up last spring.

Altogether, 295 cotton, wheat and feed grain growers in the County signed up to divert 3,604 acres from production under the 1966 diversion programs.

Mr. Duren said that there should be no delay in the prompt receipt of payments after the application for final payment is completed and signed.

Farmers were also reminded by the Chairman that, even though program payments are to be made in the near future, the approved conserving practices are expected to be carried

out on designated diverted acreage throughout the remainder of the year.

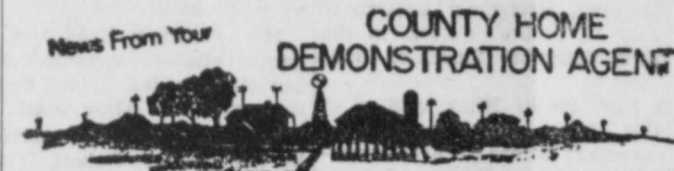
These students wrote an essay on "WHY I WOULD CHOOSE TO LIVE UNDER A DEMOCRATIC FORM OF GOV-

Texas Size Progress Made In Small Watersheds Program

"Texas-size progress is being made in the small watersheds program," says H. N. Smith, State Conservationist, Soil Conservation Service, in commenting on the status of such projects in the State as of January 1, 1966.

"This progress is possible only because of the teamwork by dedicated local people working through soil and water conservation districts, county commissioners courts, chambers of commerce, special interest districts, and municipalities," Smith added. "Federal and State organizations can and do give considerable help but the real prime movers are the local people. Farmers and ranchers through cooperation in planning needed conservation programs on their land also make a major contribution to the watershed program. Smith went on to say that watershed planning is completed or under way on 95 Texas watersheds involving 13,800,000 acres, 8 per cent of the State's total land area.

Almost a million acres of productive land subject to flooding will be protected, including urban and built-up areas.

More than 1,060 floodwater retarding structures and 100 miles of channel improvement have been completed to date. About 175 of these floodwater retarding structures are in the Brownwood Area. The structures, in addition to reducing floods, provide opportunities for many other types of water management. For example, almost 60 square miles of water surface provided by these structures are being used for public and private recreation. Fishing, picnicking, swimming, boating, water skiing, camping and other kinds of family recreation are available because of these structures. Landowners generally grant easements for construction of the lake at no cost to the local sponsors and also control recreational uses of the water. They are encouraged, however, to develop them for recreational uses because of the

growing need for out-door recreational facilities.

Many of these 20 to 70-acre lakes are located in sections which formerly had few if any such facilities.

Towns and cities are making use of the impoundments for storage of present and future supplies of water for municipal and industrial use. The City of Clyde is a typical example which is planning a municipal lake in the Upper Pecan Bayou Watershed.

Construction of these projects often means a real boost to the local economy. More than \$204,000,000 of Federal funds have been authorized to date for these projects.

More than \$90,000,000 of these funds have been spent to date. Annual expenditures of Federal funds now average about \$11,000,000. Substantial expenditures of local watershed funds boost these figures and higher.

"Folks in all parts of the State realize these projects are a real 'package deal.' They reduce flooding, protect present and future water supplies, such as Lake Brownwood, provide unequalled recreational opportunities and make real, continuing contributions to the local economy," Smith concluded.

Brush Control Is Major Problem In Large Area Of Mills County

Brush is a problem on a large area of the Mills County portion of the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District. Mesquite, shinoak, liveoak, lotebush, catclaw, cedar, whitebrush, prickly pear, tasajillo and other have become a major problem to the ranchman.

Some kinds of brush are useful for livestock feed. But woody plants use from 2 to 5 times as much water as good perennial grasses require to grow a pound of dry matter. So, if the brush can be controlled and replaced with good grass, forage production of the land is increased.

Brush control is a simple

matter. Contractors will spray, shred, chain, doze or rootplow it for prices from \$3.00 to \$15.00 per acre. Good production can pay that back. But, growing the good grass is the problem. This takes management. It may also need seeding if there are no good grasses on the land to produce seed and spread. If the grass is there, the land should be rested for a complete growing season after the brush is controlled. This will allow the grasses to make use of the extra moisture that brush is no longer using. If it is grazed following brush control, the good grass will be held back while weeds and other invaders grow in the dozer holes and bare spots. Brush control followed by poor management and overuse results in lower forage production.

Before controlling brush, the landowner should consider wildlife needs. If he is a quail hunter he will want to leave some or all of the dozed brush on the ground. Quail need nesting cover, dusting and loafing cover and escape cover near a good food supply. Proper brush control together with proper management can supply all of them.

If the landowner is interested in deer, he may want to control the brush in a pattern. He can leave blocks or strips for travel and escape cover. By using a good system of brush control and management the land can be made more productive for deer and livestock.

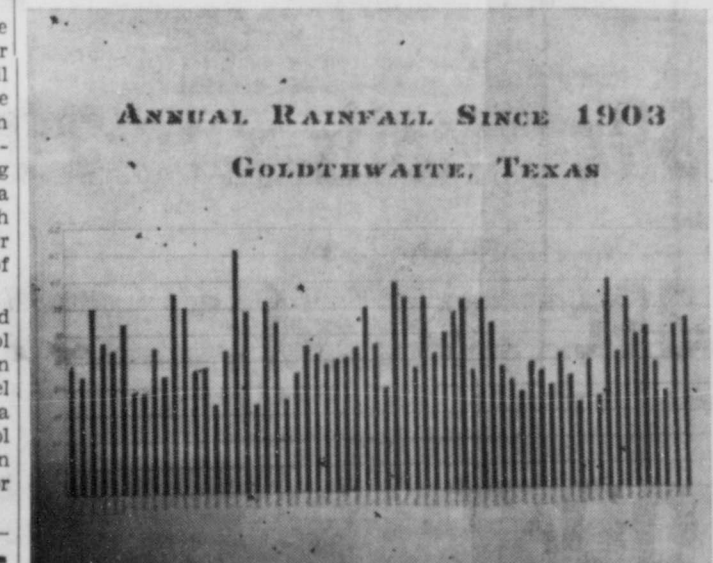

This was slightly more than 31.62 inches recorded in 1964 and considerably more than the 18.80 inches in 1963. It is interesting to note that rainfall recorded in 1957 was the second highest in the 63 year record. In 1957 Goldthwaite recorded 40.08 inches. Highest rainfall recorded here was in 1919 when it measured more than 45 inches. The chart shows that prior to 1957 there were 11 years of below normal rainfall. From 1946 through 1956 the amount of rainfall recorded here was below the long term normal average of 30.14 inches. The year 1954 was the record low of below 16.80 inches.

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Recreation Can Be Rich Crop Of Supplemental Farm Income

Frost on the fence post and a blast of cold air in the fall brings an itch to the trigger finger and a burning desire to go hunting, to nearly every man and boy, and to a large number of women.

Deer are one class of wildlife from which we get our fun and enjoyment of hunting. Some others in the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District are turkey, quail, dove, and waterfowl.

The sportsman and the "Sunday Hunter" concentrate on hunting during the open season of the game to be hunted. There is someone else that must consider wildlife the year around. He may be called a wildlife manager, although he is generally thought of simply as the farmer, rancher, or landowner. The wildlife is not his personal property. According to law, it belongs to the state. But unless the landowner maintains a suitable habitat for it, the "state property" will starve or move to a new area.

Considering the special job a landowner must do to encourage and sustain wildlife, often at a reduction in domestic livestock income, he should receive

some return for his job "Keeper of the Wildlife."

It costs money to belong to a club, to go to a football game or pay for something that brings them pleasure. Not hunting but picnicking, swimming, and camping high on the list of ways to spend our leisure time.

If we are willing to add our efforts to these pastimes, we can make them available to the public, herein lies an opportunity to supplement our farm income. This is being done today in our soil conservation district. Your place can be suited for a recreational enterprise. Not only is your conservation district willing to assist but the educational and agricultural agencies and the district will provide assistance in planning a recreational enterprise.

Recreation is a salable and ranch product. The landowner has the advantage of land and facilities; and he has powerful weapons in the patterns of crowded cities, jammed highways. For the recreation who can meet the challenge could be the crop in history!

State Capital NEWS

AUSTIN, TEX.—As State agencies charged with meeting the Federal deadline of submitting a Texas Water Plan by June, 1967, "wade" through all obstacles in the path of that plan, "water" is the topic at every turn in the capital city.

An unique statewide water plan of importance to all areas of Texas will be unveiled within the next few weeks.

In a brief preview, water experts revealed that the overall 50-year plan will cost more than \$2,000,000,000. Joe M. Kilgore, chairman of the comprehensive water planning advisory committee, said the proposals are "broader than ever before attempted by any government."

Joe G. Moore Jr., executive director of the Texas Water Development Board, said the plan will propose redistribution of water from surplus areas of northeastern Texas. Recommended diversion would follow the Trinity River, the Brazos River and a canal down the Texas coast.

He will also attend O. C. S. in Newport for four months.
