Section 1. That Section 6, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
TO BE VOTED ON AT AN SELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.
SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO, 33 proposing an Amendment to Section 6, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, to authorize state participation in programs financed with funds from private or federal sources and conducted by local level or other private, nonsectarian associations, groups, and nonprofit organizations for establishing and equipping facilities for assisting the blind, crippled, or otherwise physically or mentally handicapped in becoming gainfully employed, for their rehabilitation or restoration, or for providing in providing other services determined by the state agency to be essential for the better care and treatment of the handicapped.
