New Streamlined Telephone Service Goes Into Effect Here September 2

A new concept in streamlin-
ing telephone service is being
placed into service at Goldth-
waite, effective September 2,
1966.

A. M. Chappell, division man-
ager for Southwestern States
Telephone Company, said Gold-
thwaite is one of 28 area cities
to be served from the "regional
service center" in Brownwood.

In this one centralized loca-
tion will be specially trained
people, records and equipment
necessary to perform all service
functions for Goldthwaite,
Chappell said. From this loca-
tion all records will be main-
tained and orders for service as
well as repair reports will be
received, assigned, dispatched
and recorded upon completion
of work.

"All this with only one call
by telephone from a customer,"
Chappell emphasized.

476 Students Enrolled Here On First Day

Goldthwaite Public Schools
enrolled 476 students on the
first day of school, Supt. LeRoy
Beard announced Tuesday
morning.

Of this number 243 were en-
rolled in elementary school and
233 in junior and senior high
school.

This year's total enrollment
for the first day is the least
enrolled the first week of school
for the past three years. 504
students were enrolled on the
first day last year, while in
1964, 492 students were enrolled
for the first week and in 1963
there were 479 students enroll-
ed.

Supt. Beard stated that sev-
eral more are expected to enroll
before the end of the week,
bringing the total up to a high-
er level.

In these counties, during the
six-day season, hunters may
take a daily limit of mourning
doves as well as the limit of
white winged doves.

For that privilege, the mourn-
ing dove season in those 21
counties is reduced by six days.
Nine of the white-winged dove
zone counties are in the north
zone.

The legal bag limit, then, for
hunters in the 21 county white-
winged dove zone, would be
twelve mourning doves a day or
twenty four in possession after
the first day as well as twelve
white-winged doves per day and
twenty-four in possession after
the opening day.

The shooting hours in the
special 21-county bracket are
the same as for the mourning
doves during regular seasons for
the remainder of the state—or
from noon to sunset.

The Texas Parks and Wild-
life Department suggested that
hunters take special note of the
two, three-day periods set up
for the white-winged dove har-
vest. They are September 3, 4
and 5, September 9, 10, and 11.

The Mills County Commissioners' Court will meet in regular session Monday and officially set the county tax rate at

70 cents on the \$100 valuation, the same rate that has applied in this county for several years.

Little activity has been had at the Mills County oil test at Trigger Mountain, northwest of Goldthwaite, this week. Drillers are waiting for casing to arrive to shut off water and plug back from 3,296, total depth, to a Caddo lime oil showing encountered at 2,615 feet.

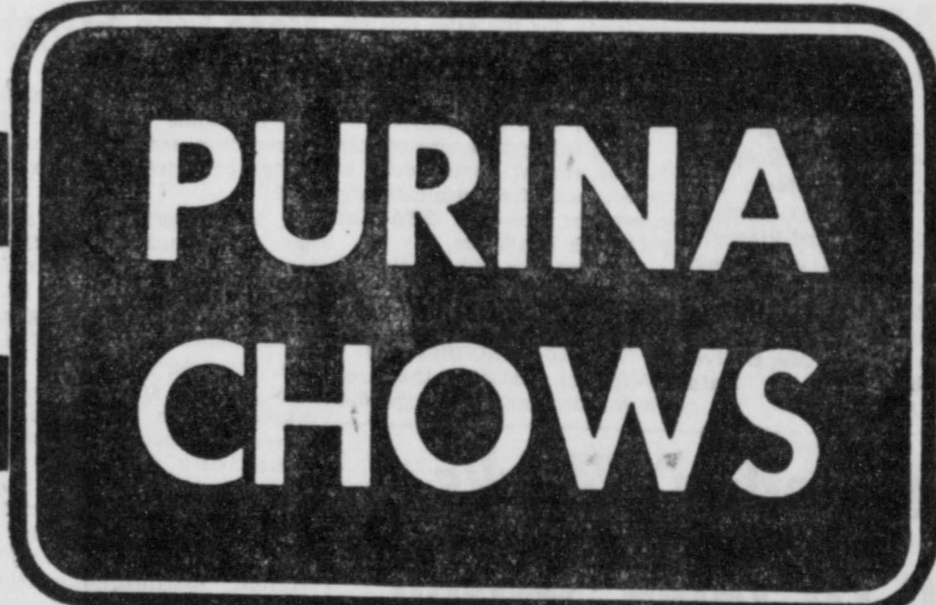

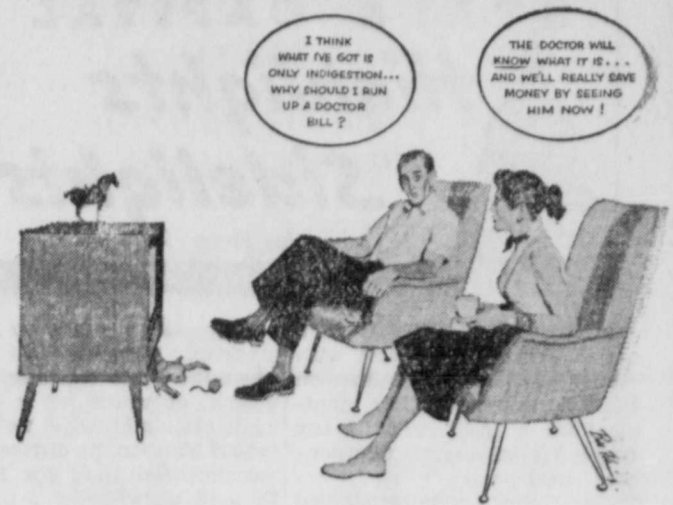

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

Austin, Texas—Officials from major Texas cities, beset with money problems, are calling on the Legislature to allow municipalities a 50-50 split in any new broad-based state taxes enacted next year.

Gov. John Connally pledged to recommend "very substantial new sources of revenue" for the cities after a group of metropolitan area mayors conferred with him.

Question as to whether the kind of revenue-sharing plan advocated by the mayors is permissible under the state constitution will be briefed by the Texas Legislative Council, at the request of House Speaker Ben Barnes.

Cities petitioned for a 50 percent refund of any increase in the state sales tax or an equivalent of any new broad-based tax, with the state doing the collecting and apportioning half of new funds where paid.

While agreeing to ask the Legislature for financial relief for the cities, Connally declined to spell out the precise form and amount he will seek. He did promise there will be "no strings attached" to his recommendation.

Connally also reported an agreement for regular conferences on urban problems between the mayors and top state officials.

What will happen to the cities' request for financial assistance in a legislative session where a state tax bill of more than \$200,000,000 is regarded as a certainty remains to be seen.

Some legal authorities do not believe a straight refund is possible without a constitutional amendment, although the Legislature could authorize the cities to levy their own sales tax with the state serving as collector.

NEW MANSION SOUGHT

At its initial meeting, the Texas Fine Arts Commission, created by the Legislature in 1965, recommended a new governor's mansion and said the present residence, completed in 1855, should be operated as an historic house.

Governor Connally has not

yet expressed his view on a new mansion. However, last year when the State Building Commission, of which he is chairman, recommended a new \$11,000,000 mansion, he differed and recommended that the money be used elsewhere.

Commission outlined a far-reaching program to encourage development of, and participation in, the arts including traveling exhibits, festivals, awards, night-time family entertainment in communities and revived band concerts on the square.

Former Atty. Gen. John Ben Sheppard of Odessa was named chairman of the new agency.

"RED MEANS WRONG"

You will be seeing lots of red if you drive the wrong way on a Texas freeway.

In a move to curb wrong-way freeway pileups, State Highway Department is installing red reflector buttons and pavement markers at entrances to interstate and other controlled access highways.

If you see a red arrow pointing at you from the pavement as you enter a freeway ramp, you are entering the wrong way. A straight red line pointing against you on the lane lines means you are going in the wrong direction.

Highway Department has spent or obligated \$76,600,000 in an overall four-year safety program.

LOANS

Tight money has made it hard for Texas colleges to sell their building loans. Some still are looking for buyers.

On a third try, buyers were found for the 4 per cent bonds of Angelo State at San Angelo (\$1,200,000); Stephen F. Austin at Nacogdoches (\$2,600,000); and Sam Houston State at Huntsville (\$2,500,000). But Southwest Texas State at San Marcos and East Texas State at Commerce still need buyers for their respective \$2,400,000 and \$2,300,000 bonds. Constitutional ceiling of 4 per cent makes the bonds less attractive to investors than other issues bringing higher returns.

MORE MONEY

Mounting demands of higher education in Texas seem certain to force a tax increase by the Legislature which meets in January.

Budget requests for the 22 state colleges are almost double those of the current two years, in large part because of a need for "catching up." Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, says that the previous practice of providing money based on past enrollments just won't work. Cash should be provided for the 22 state colleges and the 34 junior colleges on the basis of what their enrollments will be, instead of what they were.

Junior colleges, fast growing as they are, will be some \$16,000,000 short of operating money during the current two years. It will take \$100,000,000 to put senior college appropriations on a current basis.

Prospects for a surplus in the state treasury of \$75-\$80,000,000 have led to talk of increasing college tuition and fees, so students would pay more of the cost.

APPOINTMENTS

Governor Connally appointed Billy Gene Compton, senior Amarillo corporation court judge, district attorney for Potter and Armstrong Counties. He is a native of Borger and attended Pampa schools. Compton replaces Dee Miller, who resigned to campaign for the Congressional seat left open when U. S. Rep. Walter Rogers of Pampa decided not to run again.

SHORT SNORTS

State Health authorities last week reported 193 suspected and 65 confirmed cases of encephalitis (two strains) in Texas.

Texas Good Roads Association has warned it will oppose any move in the 60th Legislature to divert highway user taxes to other purposes.

Texas auto insurance companies are pledging "aggressive" support of highway safety measures next year.

Attorney General Carr advised Dist. Atty. William Hunter of Dalhart that a commissioners court in a county under 10,000 can pay travel expenses of constables using their private cars, but cannot buy them two-way radios.

AUSTIN, Tex.—How you drive that automobile during the next 12 months will determine what you pay for car insurance a year from now.

Traffic violations, as well as accidents, will appear on your experience record and will count against you.

New plan designed by the State Board of Insurance will hit where it hurts the most... the purse.

Or conversely, if you care to look at it that way, it will lighten the load on those who are penalized by higher rates because of the carelessness of others. And that's the way it really is, since some kind of increase is necessary.

Penalty points now are being assessed motorists for accidents and major violations... including speeding.

• One penalty point will mean a 15 per cent hike, two points 35 per cent, three points 60 per cent and four or more points 90 per cent.

• Major violations — like driving while intoxicated, negligent homicide, hit and run or felony driving offenses — will cost drivers three points.

• Two points will be assessed for driving while a license is suspended or for violations resulting in suspension.

• One point will be charged for accidents where there is injury or death — or property damage over \$50 — and for speeding. Speeding points are not counted until after one or two "free convictions" in the preceding year or three years.

After 1969, penalties will be based on driving records over a 36-month period.

Twelve exceptions to the "point" rule are listed, however, and one of them includes accidents in which the driver is not at fault.

Unlike the old retroactive, statewide plan of 1960-62 which created so much controversy, the current plan is based on experience in 26 separate rating territories and considers no offenses prior to August 1.

Cecil Faulkner Completes Thirty Years Service

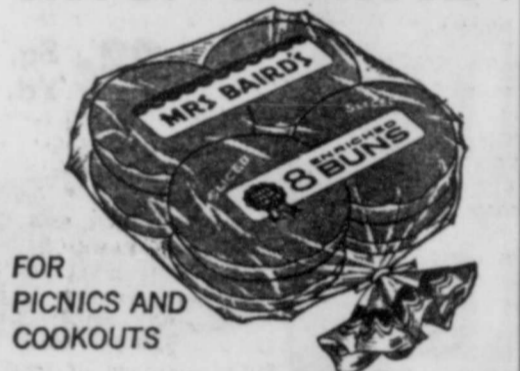
Cecil Faulkner, Field Gauge (Benedum) for Shell Pipe Line Corporation's West Texas Division observed 30 years of service recently.

COUNTY HOME DEMONSTRATION AGENT



By NORVA C. KUYKENDALL

Attention, Members Of Home Demonstration Council Don't forget the Council meeting date — September 7 — 7 p. m. in the Home Demonstration Office. Let's have 100% attendance.

Many people are complaining about the rising costs of food. There are some facts which may not be known to everyone. This information comes from Wallace Barr, Ohio State University Extension economist. Mr. Barr notes that food prices have tended to hold down the Consumer Price Index since food prices have not increased at the same pace as other costs of living. Also, he stresses, there is a big difference in the cost of food eaten at home and that eaten in public eating places, a factor which tends to show increases in overall food costs.

He points out that the same food for which one paid \$10 in the base period 1957-59 costs \$11.26 today when eaten at home. But when this food is eaten away from home, food which cost \$10 in the base period now costs \$12.14, and people are eating more of their food away from home now. Food which could be purchased at retail for \$10 during the 1957-59 period would have cost \$10.72 last year. But \$10 worth of other goods and services in the base period would have cost \$10.99 last year.

Dr. Barr states, "The disposable income of the average person has increased 29 per cent since 1957-59. The price of food eaten at home has increased 7.2 per cent, and the price of all goods and services has increased 9.9 per cent."

For a summer treat for your youngsters and their small-fry friends, you may want to use chilled grape juice. This colorful and nutritious food is plentiful and a good buy.

There are various ways for using grape juice. Try some of the following suggestions:

1. Grape freeze is breeze to make. Prepare whipped dessert topping according to package directions and fold in frozen undiluted grape juice, at the mushy stage, until the flavor suits your taste. Brighten with red food coloring if you like. Pour into a refrigerator tray or individual sherbert glasses and freeze until firm.

2. Grape-pineapple drink appeals to those who like the unusual. Mix 1 quart of grape juice with a No. 2 can of pineapple juice. Sweeten to taste with a mild-flavored honey. Grated lemon peel adds a tang that many like.

3. Sparkling grape punch is good for teenage parties. Follow your favorite punch recipe and substitute grape juice for at least half of the total fruit juice. The distinctive color and

flavor appeals to the younger set.

4. Grape-orange float is sure to please as a dessert for teenage parties. Fill a sherbert glass a little less than half full of chilled grape juice and add a scoop of orange sherbert. It's colorful and good.

CHOOSING AND SEWING LACE FABRICS

Lace is not difficult to sew with, but it is helpful to follow certain guides. When selecting a pattern, choose one with a minimum of seams, darts and special details, so that the lace itself will show to the best advantage. Take into consideration the weight and type of lace. Is it a one way design, all-over pattern or a panel design?

Lace may be worn over a slip, or be underlined completely. The method you choose depends on your personal preference, the lace you are using and your pattern. An underlining is usually required for sheer laces with lightly embroidered patterns on net-like backgrounds such as Alencon and Chantilly.

The underlining adds strength and body which takes some of the strain of wear off the fragile lace. The sleeves may be left unlined for a transparent effect. Heavier or re-embroidered laces such as Cluny or Venice may be underlined for an opaque effect or they can be worn over a slip. A nude color underlining gives a sheerer effect than a darker color.

When selecting linings, choose china silk for softly draped lines and taffeta for crisp, bouffant effects. Check the label on taffeta for color fastness. A lining of good quality cotton or man-made fibers is satisfactory for the semi-sheer look. The cotton lining is especially suitable for cotton lace.

You may need to make some adjustments on your sewing machine before you start to sew on lace. Check the pressure foot and loosen the tension slightly. A medium to long stitch with a fine needle, probably a number 11, should work for most laces. Be sure to use mercerized thread, either silk or nylon, depending on the fabric.

If you are lining the lace garment, tailor baste the lining and the lace together, being sure to baste down the center line of the darts. If the seams tend to pucker as you sew, stitch over tissue paper. For laces with opaque linings, press the seams open and finish them by pinking, stitching or over-casting the edges. For unlined laces, trim the seam allowance to the desired width; then use either a plain or zig-zag stitch. Use the hand sewn method for applying zippers in a lace garment.

You may use hem tape on lined lace garments, attaching the hem to the lining only. Or you may want to use horsehair braid on some lace garments.

Mark the hem and turn it up 1/4 inch. Catch stitch the braid to the hem edge. Turn the hem and hem the braid to the dress. Use a narrow braid on slim skirts. With fuller skirts, a wide braid can be used to make them stand out crisply.

When you press lace, use a press cloth to keep from catching the iron in the lace. Press the lace with the right side over a Turkish towel to prevent flattening the lace.
