Eagles Lose To Armadillos 23 - 6; Travel To Clifton Friday Night

Goldthwaite Eagles were back by the AA San Armadillos 23-6 last Friday in the opening game of the football season on the road.

Captains Randy Holcomb, Bobby Rountree, and Blackburn lost the toss to the Armadillos, who chose to kick-off.

Blackburn, who did a good job of carrying the ball for 112 yards during the game, breezed past the Armadillos around the right end, and Bobby Holland and Bobby Warlich, to run 69 yards for the first touchdown of the ball game.

The Eagles tried for the two extra points but failed, and the score read 6-0.

San Saba covered a fumble made by the Eagles to put the 'Dillos in fine shape on the Eagles' 25 yard line. Chan Priest, SS QB, tossed a 19 yard pass to Bob Millican to put the 'Dillos on the Eagles' 6 yard line. McRorey charged through the line for a touchdown. Sanderson kicked for the extra point to lead the Eagles 7-6 in the first quarter.

In the second quarter David

Wiedebusch, Ted Roberts, Eddie Thornton, Randy Holland, Bobby Rountree, and Mac Rowlett did a fine job of holding the Armadillos' line to keep the score 7-6 for the first half.

The Eagles were still holding the 'Dillos into the 4th quarter until Priest broke through their line and ran for the goal line, but was tackled on the 2 yard line by Rountree. On the second down Little charged over the line for the second touchdown for the 'Dillos. With 4 minutes and 2 seconds left to play Sanderson ran across the goal line for the two extra points to lead the Eagles 15-6.

Gary Warlich, an Eagle full-back, slipped past the 'Dillos to gain 20 yards. The Eagles, holding their own on the 'Dillos' 30 yard line, failed when Priest intercepted a pass that was intended for Rountree, to run a 95 yard touchdown. McRorey made the two extra points to conclude the score 23-6 in San Saba's favor.

City Council Approves Annexation Of Proposed New Nursing Home Site

The City Council meeting in regular session Monday night in the City Hall approved an ordinance calling for annexation into the city limits some land on which a proposed new nursing home is to be built.

Tom E. Hickman, administrator of Hickman Nursing Home, appeared before the council with application and petition for the site to be added to the city limits.

The tract of land covers 3.10

acres and is located North of Fourth Street and to the right of Waco Highway as it turns off of Fourth Street.

The site has been purchased and will be used for the proposed new 48 bed Hickman Nursing Home.

Plans and details for the new project are expected to be announced soon.

In connection with this annexation and proposed new building project the council also discussed plans and details for providing water, sewer and electric service to this customer.

OTHER BUSINESS

The council approved city and water district tax roll for this year as presented by City Treasurer, W. C. Barnett.

Monthly operating reports of receipts and disbursements for the various city departments were presented to the council by City Manager Barnett.

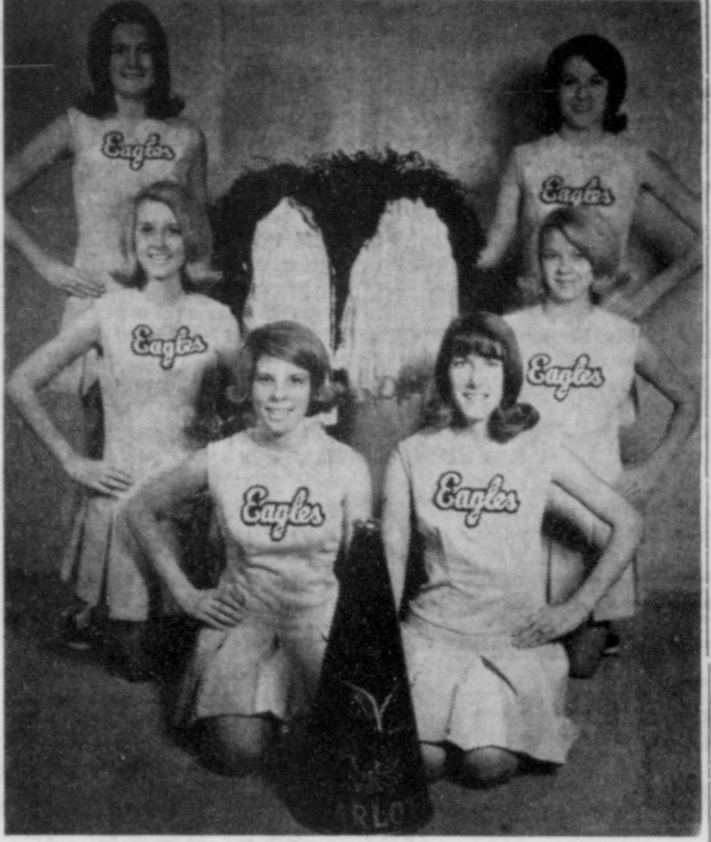
Report was made on progress of the Housing Authority in their plans for the proposed low rent housing project for the city.

Barnett reported that two blocks were seal coated and other street patching done since the heavy rains. Also a large amount of work has been done the past 10 days on the city dump grounds.

Six new mercury vapor lights have been installed in various locations and five lights have been installed in Mills County Park. Some additional new mercury vapor lights will be installed as the lighting committee continues with the project.

Report was made on the spraying and fogging done on September 5, for mosquitoes and other insects. This will be repeated next Monday, September 19.

Purchase of a tractor and mower for the city was discussed and a committee was authorized to check the matter further and purchase a tractor, with side mower and rotary shredder.

Goldthwaite school registration began on September 1, and was completed on Tuesday, September 4, with an enrollment that exceeded the previous year seven pupils.

Reports from the principals to superintendent's office, 50 in grade one; 49 in grade 2; 46 in grade 3; 44 in grade 4; 47 in grade 5; and 37 in grade 6.

In high school the average enrollment per grade is about the same with 52 showing up for grade 7; 49 for grade 8; 30 for

grade 9; 27 for grade 10; 42 for grade 11; and 27 for grade 12. This makes a total of 490 pupils out of a scholastic enrollment of 515.

Advanced degrees were conferred on a number of students at the summer graduation exercises held at Texas A&M College at Bryan. Among the number was Marshall M. Miller, Master of Science, Poultry.

Marshall is a graduate of Goldthwaite High School and a son of Mrs. Annie Miller.

Cruz Corona, a volunteer, has been selected to fill the Mills County September 25 call for one man, according to Selective Service Secretary O. H. Shaw. Corona will be sent to the Dallas recruiting station and from there he will be assigned to some army post.

Last Tuesday afternoon the car in which Charley McLean and Miss Eloise Slaughter were returning from Fort Worth overturned several times just the other side of Comanche, when the car struck wet pavement. The car was turned upright and they had driven several miles when it burst into flames and was totally destroyed.

Facilities are now complete for serving electric energy to all Goldthwaite citizens, far superior to any such ever having been built in Mills County. The hi-line from Lometa is set on 35-foot poles using No. 22 conductor wire, being 12,000 volts. This line has carrying capacity to serve a much larger load than is present in Goldthwaite, and will take care of the city's needs for years to come.

Arthur Solomon died at his home in Hamilton Monday and will be buried at 10:00 o'clock Friday morning at Cottage Hill. Mr. Solomon will be remembered here, as he and his family lived in Mills County a number of years ago.

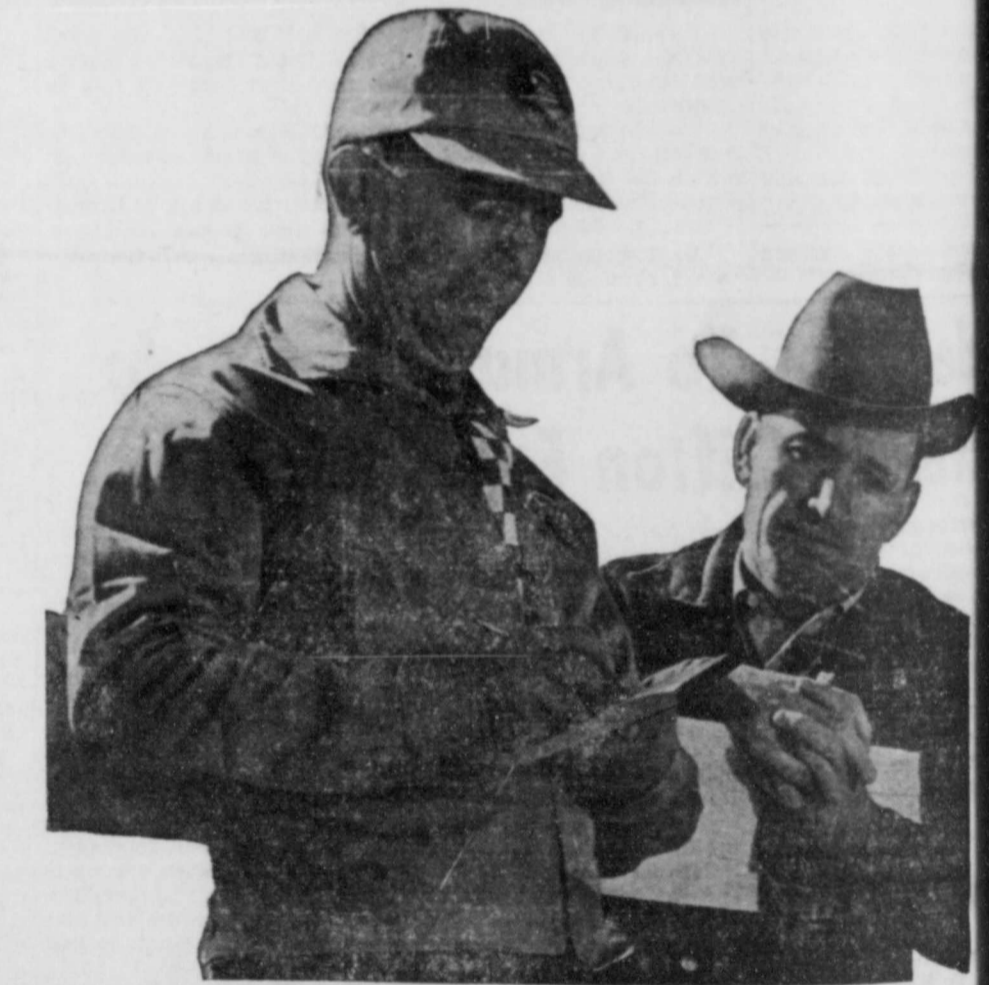

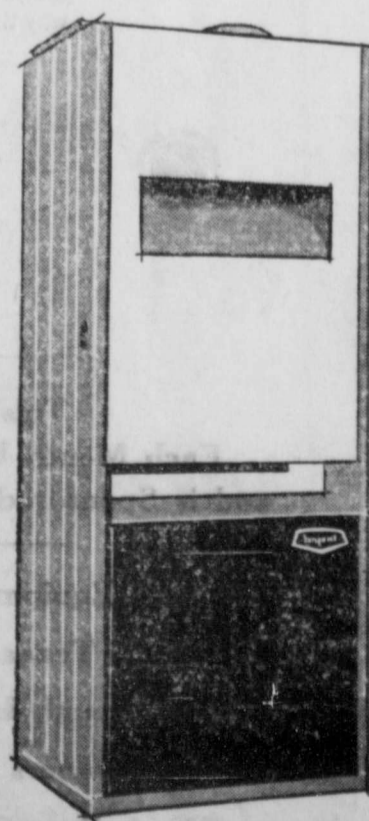

CLOTHING AND TEXTILE TIPS

Next time you go shopping to buy new fitted cotton sheets, here's a suggestion that will help you pick a long-wearing style and save you money.

According to recent tests made by the American Institute of Laundering, fitted bottom sheets with elastic sewn into the corners wear longer than those fitted bottom sheets with non-elastic corners.

In the research tests, sheets with elastic corners were used and washed for 52 weeks with

no repair needed. Fitted sheets with non-elastic corners had to be repaired after only 21 weeks of use. Both types of sheets were of comparable quality materials.

However, the fitted bottom sheets do not last nearly as long as flat sheets which can be rotated to distribute the wear more evenly.

Other factors to consider when shopping for sheets are the various qualities of fabric included in the sheets.

It may be more economical to purchase the better quality sheet at slightly higher cost than to attempt to economize on the price.

News About Social Security

Even though they were never employed under social security, many people age 72 or over not receiving social security cash benefits will be eligible for \$35 monthly starting with October, according to Glen McNatt, of the Brownwood Social Security Office. Special application forms for this payment are being mailed to persons who have already enrolled for medicare, but anyone now 72 or over who failed to enroll for medicare will have to get the blanks from a Social Security Office.

Those who receive old-age assistance from the State Welfare Department cannot receive the special age 72 payment. Also, those receiving a government pension such as railroad retirement, teacher's retirement, or civil service retirement, may not be eligible because the special age 72 benefit is reduced by the amount of the pension. However, workmen's compensation and Veterans' Administration payments based upon a service-connected disability or death do not affect the special age 72 payment.

Where husband and wife both receive the age 72 benefit, it will be \$52.50 for the couple instead of \$35 each.

A social security representative comes to Goldthwaite on regular trips on Thursdays to the Commissioners' Courtroom, and his schedule is in the post office.
