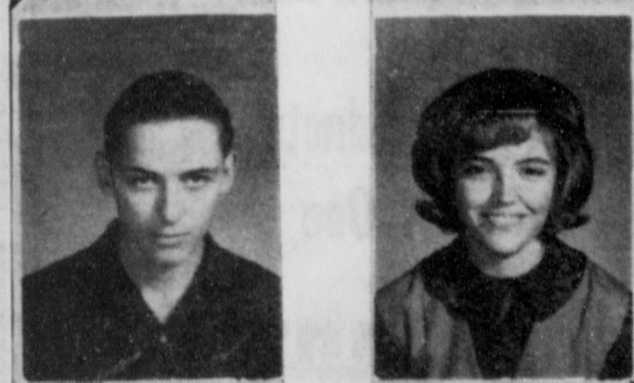
District Opens Hosting Wildcats For Homecoming Game At 7:30 P.M.

The Eagles soared past the Class AA Comanche Indians 34-0 last Friday night at Comanche to win their third straight non-conference game of the season. Goldthwaite received the kick-off and pushed the Indians back to their 10 yard line with Bobby Rountree chalking up a 35 yard run in one carry. Hard luck followed the Eagles as Comanche intercepted a pass to prevent the Eagles from scoring. Good defensive work from the Eagles held the Indians and forced them to kick on the fourth down. On a first and ten situation Charles Blackburn broke around his own right end on a counter play to outrun all of the Comanche Indians for a 39 yard touchdown. After receiving a penalty on the extra point kick that set the

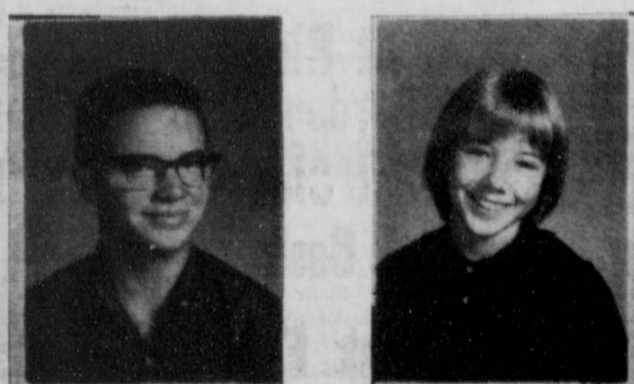
quarterback Mike Conradt called a fake kick and passed to end Sam Hudson in the end zone for the extra points to lead the game with the score of 8-0. With less than three minutes left in the first quarter and seven yards for a first down, Blackburn on the same counter play wheeled around the right end and sped past Comanche for 57 yards and his second touchdown. Rountree's kick for the extra point was good to bring the score to 15-0. Rountree forced Comanche to punt as he blocked a long pass on their third down that would have put the Indians deep in the Eagle territory. In the early part of the second quarter the Eagles were forced to punt for their first time. As the Indians managed to get within the Eagles' 20 yard line, things were looking scary for the Eagles when center Eddie Thornton made a gallant play by intercepting a pass thrown by Indian quarterback Billy McDonald to save the Eagles. With only five seconds left to play Blackburn handed off to Warlick who was forced to pass but, the pass was incomplete to end the first half of the ball game. A third touchdown for Charles Blackburn came in the early part of the third quarter on a second down and four yards to goal play when he charged through the middle of the Indians' line and crossed the goal line. The extra point kick by Rountree was no good but the Eagles had a wide lead of 21-0 at the close of the third quarter. Fullback Harold Mogre set up the early fourth quarter touchdown as he managed a 69 yard gain for the Eagles to put them on the four yard line. On a quarterback sneak Conradt carried the ball into the end zone with 5:14 left in the game. 28-0 was the score after Rountree kicked the extra point. The final touchdown came for the Eagles when Bobby Rountree intercepted a pass on the Indians' 30 yard line. In the later part of the quarter Goldthwaite worked the ball to the 8 yard line with Conradt on a first down play plowing over the goal line for the touchdown. The kick for the extra point failed but the Eagles had a winning score of 34 over the scoreless Indians.

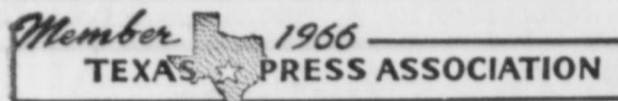

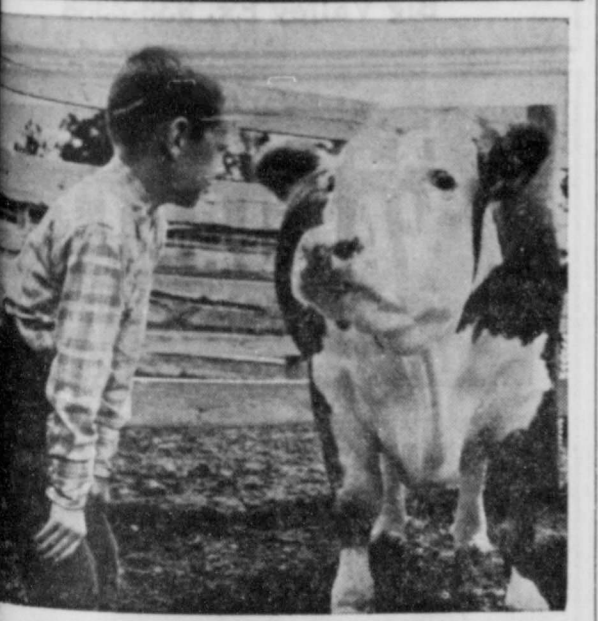

Producers Approve New Deductions To Finance Wool-Lamb Promotion

The U. S. Department of Agriculture announced today, on the basis of preliminary returns from all States except Alaska, that sheep producers had approved increased deductions from wool payments to finance the promotion of wool and lamb.

In a mail referendum which ended September 23, 79.8 percent of the producers owning 79.2 percent of the sheep represented in the referendum favored a proposed new agreement between the Secretary of Agriculture and the American Sheep Producers Council, Inc., which provides for the increased deductions and continuation of the promotion program.

To become effective, the agreement had to be approved by either two-thirds of the producers, or by producers of two-thirds of the volume of production, represented in the referendum. The preliminary results show 59,905 producers voting for the new agreement and 15,137 producers voting against it. The producers voting for the agreement owned 10,858,445 sheep and those voting against the agreement owned 2,844,580 sheep.

The proposed agreement authorizes continued deductions from payments made under the National Wool Act on wool and unshorn lambs marketed during the four years, 1966 through 1969. Deductions are authorized

at rates up to 1 1/2 cents per pound on shorn wool and 7 1/2 cents per hundredweight on unshorn lambs, compared with 1 cent and 5 cents in the past.

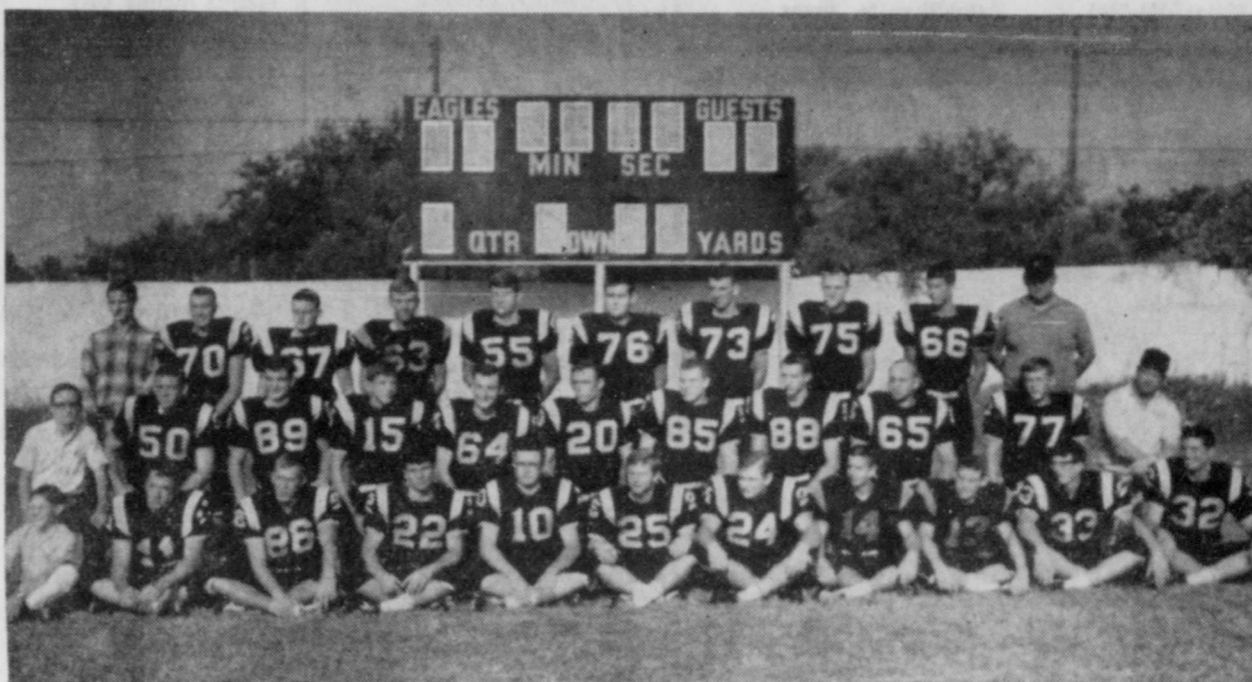

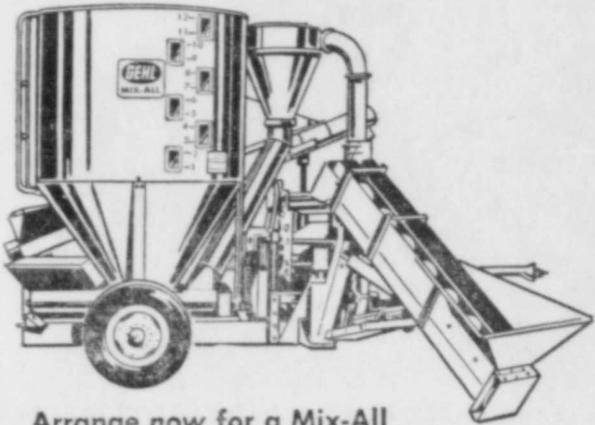

**Veterans' Land
Sale Announced
For November 15**

Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler announced that a Veterans' Land Board Forfeited Land Sale would be held on November 15, 1966, in the General Land Office. He pointed out that the Program has exceeded all expectations in its success and value to the people of Texas. Sadler said that the delinquencies on veteran contract payments are lower today than at any time in the history of the Program. Land prices are higher and the Program is making a \$2-1/2 million profit per year for the taxpayers of Texas.

in addition to helping veterans own a tract of land that they fought to preserve.

We have purchased some three million acres of land for 35,300 Texas veterans and placed some \$243 million in circulation to boost the economy of this State. Although new purchases under the Program are no longer possible, a vast amount of work remains to be done in servicing veterans' contracts. Carving out homesites, issuing fractional severance deeds and paid-in-full deeds, approving oil and gas leases, and issuing easements have to be performed throughout the life of a veteran contract.

"I pledge to the people of Texas, as I have in the past, that I will give them the best service possible in the Land Office at the least possible cost to the taxpayers of the State."

These sales, such as the scheduled for November 15, make a few tracts of veteran land available to successful bidders with financing under the Veterans' Land Program as down payment for a forty-year contract and payments made on the contracts annually at a low rate of interest. Those interested in purchasing land should take advantage of this sale," Sadler said.

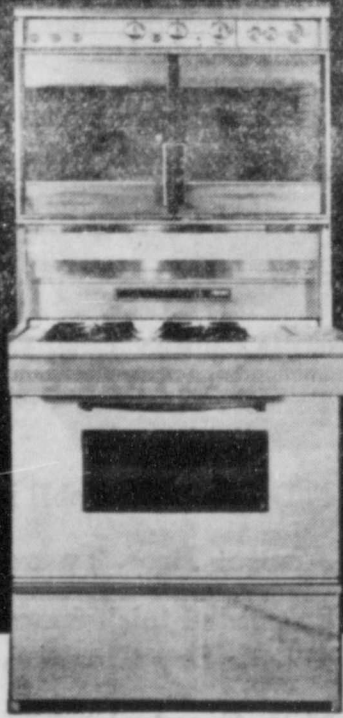

Seguin Gazette, to head the planning group. Committee met immediately and drafted its plans. Serving with Taylor on the Planning Committee are Paul Barham, Texas Mesquite, Mesquite; Rick Taylor, DeSoto Star; J. A. Newborn Jr., League City Suburban Journal; Frank Luecke, Cameron Herald; Max Thomas, Kerrville Times; and Dr. Davis and Prof. Olin Hinkle, UT Department of Journalism.

Taylor reports that the clinic will feature several state and nationally known newsmen as guest speakers. In addition, three panels on various aspects of the news field have been scheduled along with questions-and-answers sessions.

Topics will cover such realms in news reporting as crime and court coverage, and the legal aspects of news writing, including libel laws. Other subjects pertain to make-up, cutlines, publicity and how to handle it, local news columns for both small town and metropolitan newspapers, feature writing and photojournalism.

This is one of five specialized meetings sponsored annually by the Texas Press Association, explained President Barnhill.

These include a Mid-Winter meeting in January; a summer convention in June; a mechanical conference in March; an advertising session in September; and the news-clinic reportorial workshop in November.

In completing the cards, only the street address and city and state are required. Individual names should not be listed.

Acting Postmaster Duren emphasized the importance of including a return address on the front of the cards so they may be returned after addresses have been coded.
