International Official To Address Group, Make Award Presentation

Members of the Goldthwaite Lions Club will have a special International Banner Award night program next Tuesday night, October 25, with special ladies' night dinner and program.

The event, which promises to attract a large number of out-of-town dignitaries along with Lions and their ladies, will be held in the high school gym.

The affair will get underway at 6:30 p. m. with a reception followed with a buffet dinner and award presentation program starting at 7:30 p. m.

The Cleburne, Texas, club won 4th place this year.

Dr. Chris S. Cruzcosa is general chairman and will be master of ceremonies for the program. Dr. Chris was president of the club two years, 1963-65. Last year he served as zone chairman and this year he is Deputy District Governor at Large.

will welcome the guests and Lion Harold Yarborough will introduce the dignitaries while Lion Ray Duren will give the club representation.

Raymond Casbeer, president of the club last year during a award winning membership campaign, and now zone chairman, will introduce District Governor Harvey Palmer who will address the group. Palmer is a member of the San Angelo East Side Club.

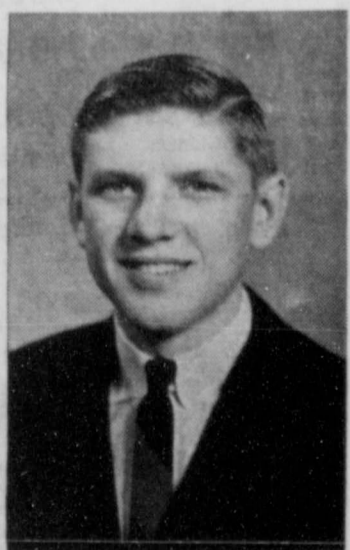
George Thompson, past District Governor, 1965-66, will introduce International 2nd Vice President Dave Evans who will address the group and be in charge of the banner presentation.

Goldthwaite Eagles overcame the Rising Star Wildcat in the first District game Friday night on Eagle

field in the first play of the ball game Goldthwaite fullback Moore plunged through Wildcats' line and managed to get 34 yards before he was tackled on the Wildcats' four

yard line.

Conrad intercepted a pass from Charles Blackburn and carried the ball into the end zone on a second down and four

yard line.

Rountree kicked the extra point to have an early lead over the Wildcats.

Conrad handed off to Blackburn and he carried a 35 yard pass to the end zone on the second down. Rountree also kicked the extra point to accomplish a score of 14-0.

Conrad intercepted a pass from Blackburn 40 yards from the line. With more than a minute left in the first quarter, a pass from Conrad to Rountree completed the touchdown for the Eagles with Rountree kicking the extra point to lead 21-0 over the Wildcats.

Conrad's 55 yard runback and a fourth down kick put the Eagles in fine shape on the second down and four yard line. Moore carried the ball over the goal line and a 27-0 lead in the first quarter.

Conrad came for Goldthwaite when guard Mac Rowlett intercepted a pass and ran for a touchdown early in the second quarter to complete the comeback for the half 33-0.

Conrad received the second down and with a return kick put the Eagles in

fine shape on the 13 yard line.

On a second down play Blackburn carried the ball over the line for a 9 yard touchdown to bring the score up to 39-0.

Ted Roberts recovered a Wildcat fumble putting the Eagles on the Wildcats' 28 yard line.

Rountree chalked up a 23 yard

touchdown and an extra point kick to lead the Wildcats 46-0.

The last score for the Eagles came in the later part of the fourth quarter when Rountree kicked a field goal to win the game 49-0.
