## County Voter Registration Going Slowly

Mills County voter registration is creeping along at a very slow pace, according to announcement Tuesday by H. G. Brooks, Sheriff and Tax Assessor-Collector.

To date only 250 Mills County citizens have registered to be eligible to vote in forthcoming elections during 1967, according to Brooks.

This reflects a very small percentage of those who need to get registered in order to vote.

Everyone age 21 through 59 must register.

There is no charge or fee involved. The Poll Tax has been eliminated, and the registration has taken its place.

Deadline for registration is January 31.

Any member of the immediate family may register other members of the family. Those who can not come to the tax assessor's office to register in person may call or write that office for voter registration application form.

Yarborough and Duren, both natives of Mills County, have been partners in the business for 19 and one-half years. They formed the partnership in 1947 when they purchased the store from Yarborough's late father, O. H. Yarborough, who had operated the dry goods store for many years.

**GOATS**—Billy Kids and Doe Kids.

**FAT BARROWS**—Light and Heavy Weight. There will also be a Gilt class.

**HORSES**—There will be seven classes in the horse show: Three halter classes including colts foaled in 1966; colts foaled in 1965; and two's and over.

Four performance classes including reining, barrel racing, rescue race and pole bending. The horse show will also have an outside halter class for those who may want to show.

Ribbons will be awarded to the first through the fifth places in each class, show officials stated.

The following division superintendents have been named: Horses—Roger Sanders, Rodney Carlisle and James Green.

Sheep—Curt Singleton.

Hogs—Ernest Caldwell.

Goats—Jack Whittenburg.

Judging of the horses will be at 10:00 a. m. and this will be followed by judging of hogs, goats and sheep at 1:00 p. m.

A barbecue lunch will be served in the school lunchroom beginning at 11:30 a. m.

Barrie Ward, Kerrville, Texas, will judge the hogs, fat lambs and sheep for the show.

## Bank Deposits Show Nice Gain During Past Year

Deposits on December 31, 1966 were \$7,348,800.43 while a year earlier, on December 31, 1965 they were \$6,631,982.39.

Loans and discounts also are up by several hundred thousand dollars. On December 31, 1966 loans and discounts were \$4,294,009.59 while on December 31, 1965 they were \$3,810,904.75.

Total resources of the bank went up from \$7,313,742.13 on December 31, 1965 to \$8,103,695.25 on December 31, 1966.

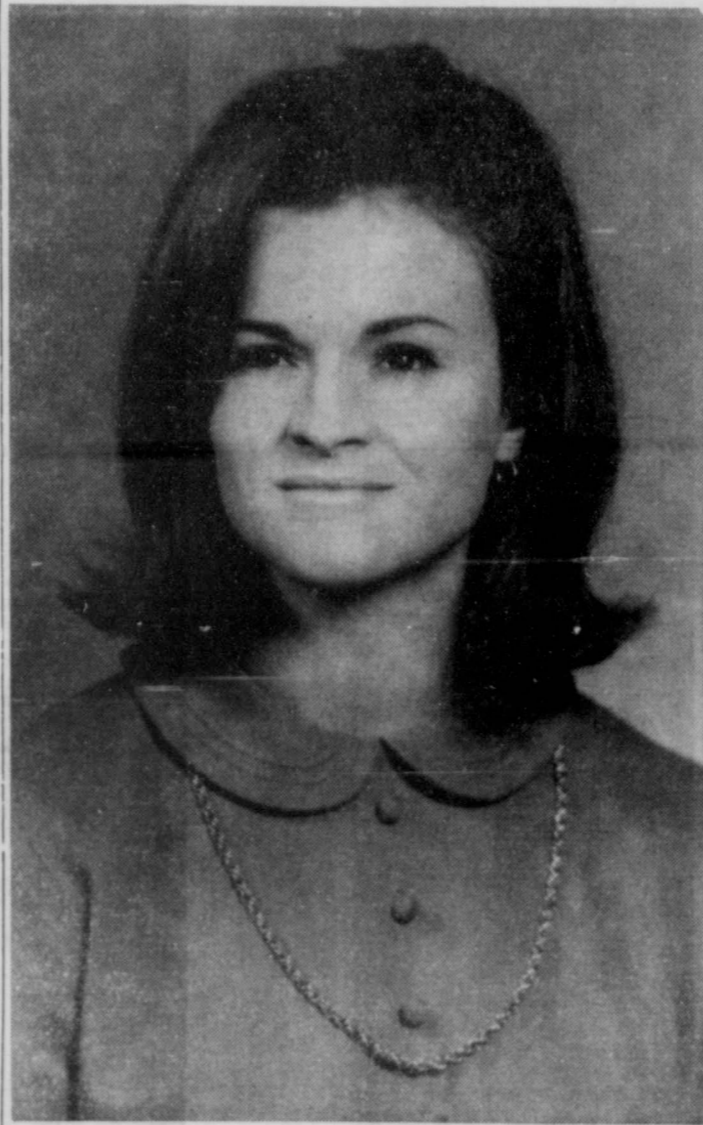
### Mrs. G. E. Howard Initiated Into Honor Society

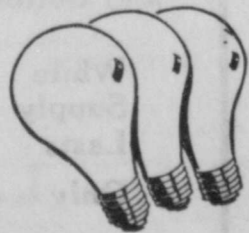

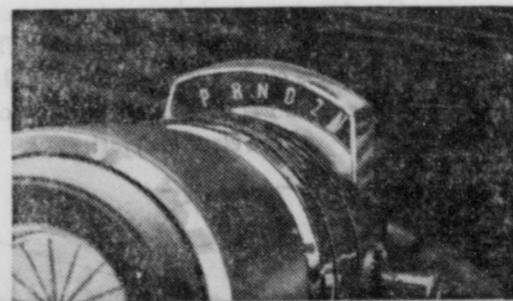

## All Aliens, With Few Exceptions, Must Report Address In January

District Director J. W. Holland of the Immigration and Naturalization Service stated that the annual alien address report program usually causes a sharp rise in the number of applications for naturalization.

The law requires all aliens in the United States, with few exceptions, to report their addresses each January. Throughout the United States, almost thirty per cent more applications for naturalization are received during the months of January, February and March than are received during the other months. Mr. Holland attributes this sudden rise to the Alien Address Report Program.

Aliens not required to make this report are diplomats and those persons accredited to certain international organizations.

Forms for making the reports will be available to aliens at all Post Offices and offices of the Immigration and Naturalization Service during the month of January. Mr. Holland indicated that aliens desiring information concerning naturalization or similar matters should obtain the forms at an office of the

Immigration and Naturalization Service where personnel trained in these fields will be available to answer inquiries.

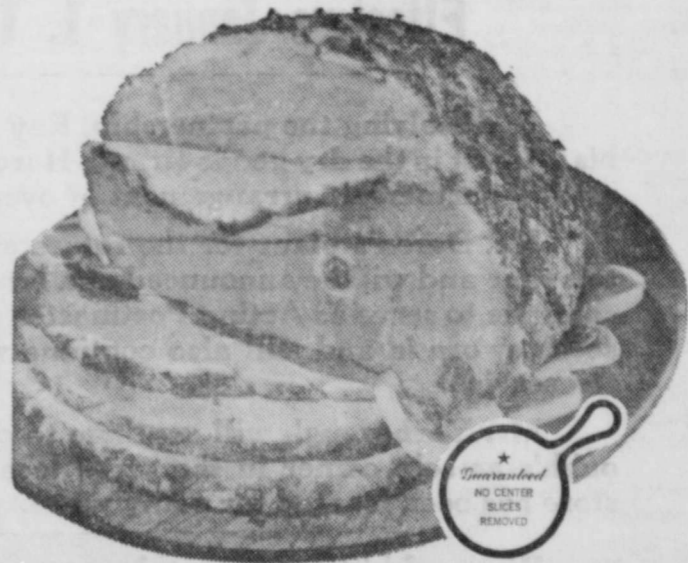

## Word Of Caution Is Issued About Damage To Mail Boxes & Contents

Mailboxes are protected by Federal law, and pranksters or vandals who damage or destroy the boxes and their contents may be in for a heavy fine or imprisonment. Mills County Postmasters warned today. This word of caution came from Postmasters at Caradan, Goldthwaite, Moline, Mullin, Priddy, and Star.

The Postmasters noted that some 25,000 mail receptacles were damaged or destroyed in the past year. It was also noted that 2,641 persons were arrested in the year up to June 30 for damaging or destroying mail receptacles.

The Postmasters quoted from the law: "Whoever willfully or maliciously injures, tears down or destroys any letterbox or other receptacle intended or used for the receipt or delivery of mail on any mail route, or breaks open the same or willfully or maliciously injures, defaces or destroys any mail deposited therein, shall be fined not more than \$1,000 or imprisoned not more than three years."

This applies to all mail receptacles and the mail in them, even though the boxes are bought by citizens and are their own personal property.

"Pranksters — and especially children who do not know any better — should be made to realize the seriousness of their ac-

tions," the Postmasters said. "A \$1,000 fine or a term in jail is enough to take the humor out of any prank."

Often the mailbox damage is the work of youths, who do it for "kicks," and the courts have shown little sympathy for this youthful means of expression. In Michigan, a justice sentenced two 18-year olds to 10 days in jail, including two on a diet of baby food. The diet specification, explained the judge, was because the youths "acted like babies." They were also fined \$25 each plus \$15 costs.

In New York state, five youths were fined \$25 each plus restitution or restoration, plus no driving for an indefinite period, plus an 8 p. m. curfew, plus a written analysis by each of a magazine article entitled "A Judge Gets Tough On Hoodlums."

Two Iowa youths who damaged 39 mailboxes were required to personally apologize to each boxholder in addition to making repairs or providing a new box.

In Missouri, three 17-year olds lost their driving privileges, were given a 9 p. m. curfew, and had to report twice weekly to juvenile authorities. They had damaged 63 mailboxes.

And in Arkansas, four juveniles faced the following: (1) no driving until further notice, (2) a 10 p. m. curfew, (3) return to court in a month with letters from their school principals reporting on grades and attitudes, (4) full restitution of all damages, and (5) wear a sign 30 days stating "I have not learned to respect the property of others."

## U. S. Bond Sales In Mills County Reach High Mark

The January-November sales were \$4,488 million, 7 per cent over sales for the first 11 months a year ago and a 10-year record for any January-November sales since 1956," Chairman Duren stated.
