His Scouting service record has been in many fields; as a Troop committee-man, in every position in his community's annual Boy Scout finance campaign, District Chairman, Council Executive Board member, Council finance chairman, Council Vice-President; and during 1966 he served as President of the Comanche Trail Council.

An active member of the First Baptist Church, he has served as chairman of the Board of Deacons, Church Treasurer, and has taught a men's Bible Class for more than 15 years. He is a Mason, a trustee of Howard Payne College, and is serving as Chairman of the College's finance committee for 1967.

Mr. Duren is an active member of the Goldthwaite Lions Club with a long perfect attendance record; he has served as both its Secretary and President. As an official of Lions International he has been both Zone Chairman and Deputy District Governor. He has served for several years as the Chairman of the Mills County Park Board, Chairman of the Mills

County Chapter of the American Red Cross, and Chairman of the local Salvation Army unit.

The United States Treasury Department has honored him for his leadership in Savings Bond sales.

He is presently Director of District Ten West Texas Chamber of Commerce. During his career he has taught school, owned or managed several businesses before joining the Mills County State Bank in 1947, as its Vice-President.

In 1953 he became President of the Mills County State Bank, a position which he holds today. He has served in several leadership capacities in various banking groups.

Those attending were: W. J. Henry, president; W. W. Fox, secretary; and Wm. G. Bishop, a director.

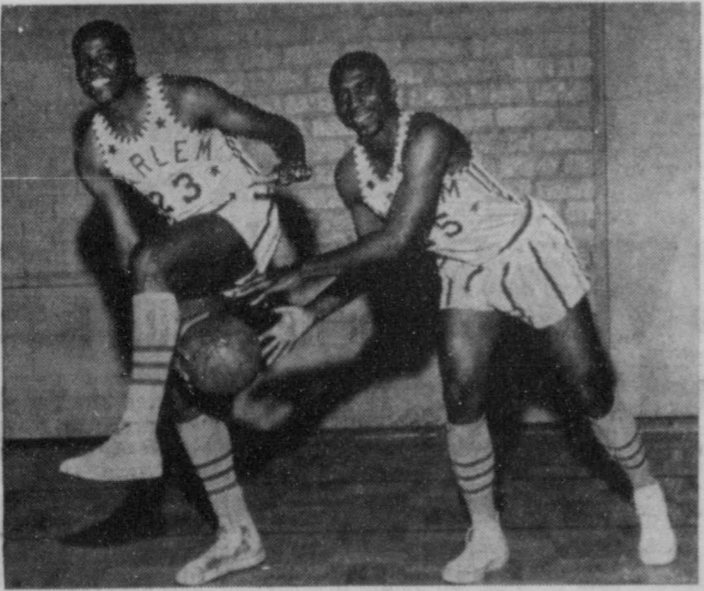

## Tuesday Last Day For Citizens To Register To Vote

Next Tuesday, January 31, is the last day for citizens of Mills County to register and be eligible to vote in the 1967 elections.

Mills County Sheriff, Tax Assessor-Collector H. G. Brooks announced Tuesday that 734 had registered up to Tuesday morning.

Registrations picked up considerably during the past two weeks, but there are still many who need to register if they want to vote.

Regular city council and school trustee elections will be held in April. Special elections could be called this year.

Everyone age 21 through 59 must register. There is no charge or fee involved.

Any member of the family may register other members of the family. Those who cannot come to the tax office to register in person may call or write that office for voter registration application blank.

## Mohair Promotion Mail Referendum Will Be Conducted February 6 - 17

The U. S. Department of Agriculture today announced that a mail referendum among mohair producers will be held February 6-17, to determine whether or not they approve a proposed agreement between the Secretary of Agriculture and the Mohair Council of America, Inc.

The agreement provides for

the Secretary to withhold up to 1½ cents a pound from producers' payments on mohair marketed during 1966-69. The payment deductions, authorized by Sec. 708 of the National Wool Act, would be used by the Council to finance advertising and promotion programs for mohair and mohair products.

The proposed agreement is

similar to those under which advertising and sales promotion programs for wool and lamb have been conducted since 1955.

The agreement was requested by the Mohair Council and is supported by the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association, the Texas Angora Goat Raisers Association, and the American Goat Breeders Association. The referendum will be conducted through the county offices of the ASCS. The county offices will distribute copies of the agreement and ballots to mohair producers early in February. Producers may cast their ballots by mailing or delivering them in person to reach ASCS county offices by the close of the referendum.

## Ernest L. Fisher Awarded Contract For New Mullin Post Office Building

Postmaster General Lawrence F. O'Brien has announced that a contract has been awarded to Ernest L. Fisher, Mullin, Texas 76864, to build the new post office building in Mullin, Texas, and lease it to the Post Office Department.

The announcement of the award to Mr. Fisher advances the new building closer to the construction stage. When fully operational, the Postmaster General said, the additional space and more modern equipment will, in the long run, more than offset the extra cost involved in producing more efficient handling of the mail, in accord with President Johnson's directive to provide the best possible postal service at the least possible cost.

"This project is in accordance with our policy of building new

post offices only where they are urgently needed," Mr. O'Brien said. "We are constantly re-assessing our construction program to determine whether present buildings can be altered or remodeled to take care of our expanding mail volume."

The new building will be occupied by the Mullin Post Office under terms of a 5-year rental agreement, with an option to renew it for an additional five years.

The new Mullin Post Office building is expected to be completed by June 1, 1967.

Mr. O'Brien explained that the Department's capital investment is limited substantially to postal equipment. The building will remain under private ownership, with the owner paying local real estate taxes.

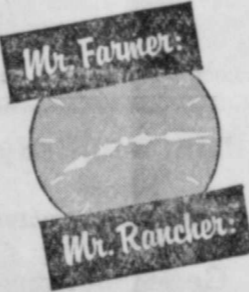

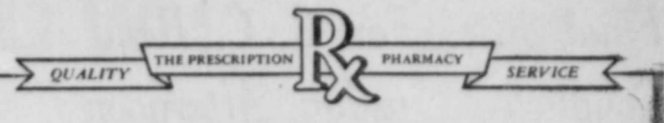
