## City Council Orders Election To Be Held On Tuesday, April 4

The City Council meeting in regular session Monday night at the City Hall ordered the regular city election to be held on Tuesday, April 4, 1967.

Purpose of the election is to elect a mayor and two aldermen for a regular two year term.

Aldermen whose terms expire this year are J. C. Wesson and T. J. Blackburn. Also the office of mayor will be filled for a two year term. V. A. Hudson has been serving as mayor pro tem since the resignation last November of the late Mayor J. Raymond Little.

Candidates will have until March 4, to file with City Secretary Glenn Collier, and have their names placed on the official ballot for the election to be held on the first Tuesday in April.

The annual report showed deposits, loans and discounts and total resources are at a new high for the bank which has served Mills County and this Central Texas area for 78 years. A ten year summary of the bank's deposits, loans and resources points out a new record growth.

## C & C Vocational Nursing School Will Graduate Four Friday Night

Childress & Cruzcosa Clinic & Hospital School of Vocational Nursing will graduate four members in the class of 1967 in their second graduating exercises to be held here this Friday night.

Rev. Dwaine Greene, former pastor of the First Baptist Church, will give the address.

Graduation Exercises will be held in the Chapel of the First Baptist Church beginning at 7 p. m. Official program for the event appears on another page of this paper. The public is invited to attend.

The Vocational Nurse training program was founded September 1, 1964 by Dr. C. S. Cruzcosa who serves as medical staff adviser.

Mrs. Carol Cruzcosa is the school director.

Childress & Cruzcosa Clinic & Hospital established the program in its desire to provide the best patient care possible and help solve the shortage of nursing help.

The training is given in accordance with the prescribed requirements of the State Board of Vocational Nurse Examiners. The course of study includes both academic training and hospital experience during a period of 12 months.

In the class of 1965 the school graduated seven members. The class of 1967 consists of four members making a total of 11 vocational nurses to graduate from the school.

Those graduating in the class of 1965 included: Mrs. Ruby Alldredge, Mrs. Robbie Dalton, Mrs. Eloise Duren, Mrs. Deanna Holland, Mrs. Dorothy Humphries, Mrs. Faye Leonhard and Mrs. Madeline Moreland.

The class of 1968 was organized and started their program of work and study Monday of this week. The new class has seven members.

Members of the new class are: Mrs. Irma Coffman, Mrs. Aline Griffin, Mrs. Elda Martinez, Mrs. Virgie Ripley, Mrs. Lois Slagle, Mrs. Alice Summy and Miss Nelda Swinney.

When this class of 1968 graduates it will mean that 18 nurses will have been trained through the local vocational nursing school to take their place in this professional field of service.

Dr. M. A. Childress and Dr. Cruzcosa have hopes that this will solve the critical shortage of nursing help that existed here when the school was started.

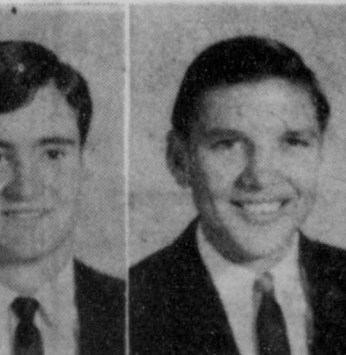

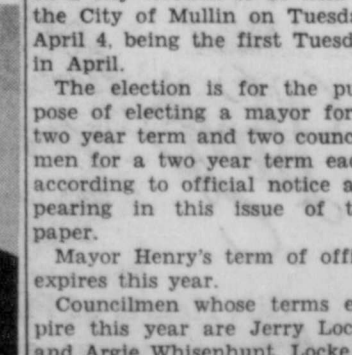

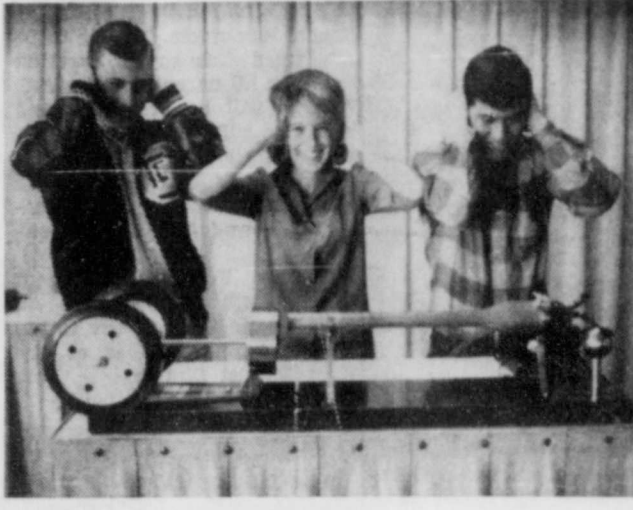

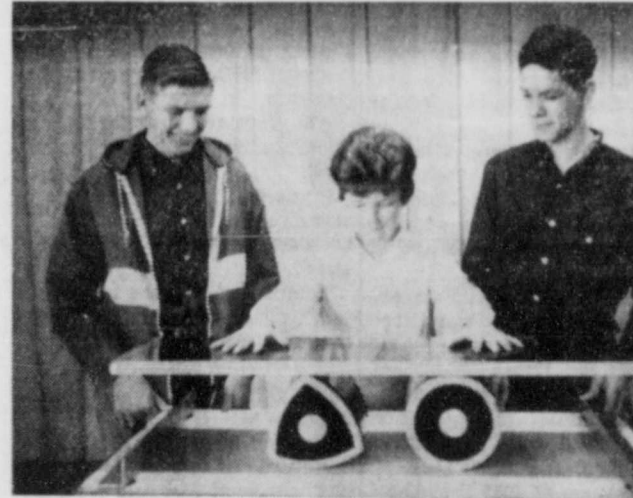

## Walter Fairman, Pioneer Citizen, Buried Here Saturday Morning

Funeral services for Walter Fairman, 91, long time resident of Mills County, were held Saturday morning, February 4, at 10:00 o'clock in the First Baptist Church. Services were conducted by Rev. Tommy Jones, pastor of the church. Burial was in Goldthwaite Memorial Cemetery under the direction of the Roy Wilkins Funeral Home.

Pallbearers were the following deacons of the church: E. B. Gilliam, Jr., J. D. Harper, Floyd D. Spradley, Jr., Charles Conradt, W. P. Duren and H. C. Schunke.

Honorary pallbearers were other deacons of the church.

Mr. Fairman was born September 27, 1875 in Bloomington, Illinois, son of the late Eli Fairman and Sarah Tansley Fairman. He passed away in Childrens & Cruzcosa Clinic & Hospital Thursday afternoon, February 2, 1967 after a long illness. He came to Texas with his family in 1882 and settled in what was then Brown County, and later moved to Williams Branch. In 1887 the family moved to Mullin and in 1889 to Goldthwaite, where he was associated with his father in the cotton gin business.

In 1907 he purchased his father's interest in the gin and continued in the business until 1927. He also owned gins in Big Valley and Mullin.

On April 14, 1904 he was

married to Miss Stella Prater in Goldthwaite. They made their home on Parker Street until Mrs. Fairman's death on May 26, 1949.

Mr. Fairman was a member of the First Baptist Church and he and his wife purchased the electric organ in the First Baptist Church in 1948; in 1949 the church burned. When the new church was built in 1950 Mr. Fairman gave the new pipe organ in memory of Mrs. Fairman.

In 1951, the Board of Trustees of the church gave the lot and old parsonage building where the Youth Center is now located. Mr. Fairman purchased a lot and moved the parsonage. He had the Youth Center remodeled, and deeded it to the First Baptist Church in memory of Mr. and Mrs. Eli Fairman and Mr. and Mrs. J. T. Prater. He also gave the church \$25,000 to be invested as directed by the trustees.

Mr. and Mrs. Fairman assisted as many as twenty young people through college and the university. He contributed to every laudable cause. He was a member of the Mills County Historical Society and a liberal donor to the expenses of the publication, "A No Man's Land Becomes A County."

Survivors are two brothers, E. T. Fairman of Waco and Mark Fairman, Sr., of Lufkin; and a number of nieces and nephews.

## Mohair Producers Facing Problem Of Promoting Their Own Products

"If we don't promote our own products, who is going to," said Howard Derrick today. Derrick, president of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association, made the comment after reviewing the promotion plans proposed by the Mohair Council of America.

The Council, through an agreement with the U. S. Secretary of Agriculture, is asking mohair producers to vote YES in a mail referendum scheduled February 6-17. If passed, the referendum would authorize deductions of 1 1/2 cents per pound of mohair from incentive payments mohair producers receive under the National Wool Act.

The funds would be used for promotion of mohair and development of new uses of the product.

"The mohair industry needs a promotion arm like the sheep people have in the American Sheep Producers Council. I think the Mohair Council of America can supply that need," said Derrick.

Fred Earwood, president of the Texas Wool and Mohair Warehouse Association, is in agreement. "Any new demand for mohair could change the picture overnight," he said. "Over the last couple of years, average consumption has been 2 million pounds per month despite the poor market," Ear-

wood stated. "We all could be better with a more demand."

The agreement requires approval by either of the thirds of the total number of producers voting, or by producers of two-thirds volume of production registered in the referendum.
