A general remodeling and decorating of the Youth Center will take place including central heating and air-conditioning, new tile floor throughout. Improvements in the Kindergarten area, enlarged kitchen and snack area. Lowering the ceiling in the main room and building a fireplace and stage with corner seating around fireplace. Also a concrete slab in the yard for volley ball and basketball with lighting for night activities.

Changes will be made in the educational building by re-arranging the beginner and primary departments to better serve these two age groups.

Texas Mohair May Soon Go Into Army Blankets, Fisher Announces

Texas mohair may soon go into Army blankets.

Congressman O. C. Fisher of San Angelo has advised the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association that the Defense Personnel Support Center's currently outstanding contracts for manufacture of 1,815,132 blankets may contain 10 per cent of mohair.

"The Procurement Center at Philadelphia has requested 13 contractors to revise specifications to include the mohair content if at all feasible," Congressman Fisher said.

"The Philadelphia office is now awaiting replies from contractors before the amount of mohair to be included in outstanding contracts can be determined. The results of this effort will have bearing on specifications for mohair content when future procurement orders are placed."

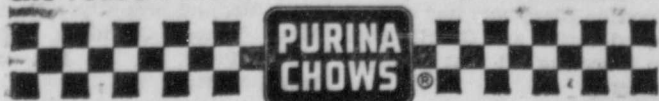

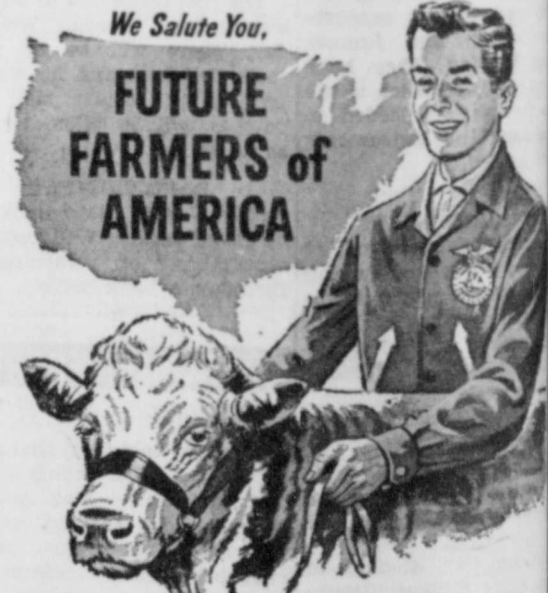

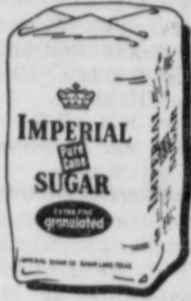

Sheep And Goat Raisers Favor New Animal Health Bill

The Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association is backing an animal health bill introduced in the Texas Legislature by Sen. Dorsey B. Hardeman of San Angelo and Rep. Tom Holmes of Granbury. The bill would allow the Texas Animal Health Commission to permit importation of sheep from scabies-free states into Texas with only an inspection and proper certificate. Present Texas law requires dipping of all non-slaughter sheep coming into Texas, whether from a scabies-free state or not.

A hearing is scheduled in Austin Thursday, February 16, at 9 a. m. before the livestock and stock raising committee of the House, said Rep. Holmes. This bill would liberalize entry of sheep from scabies-free states and extend to those states the courtesy most of them already extend to Texas. Few states require dipping of Texas sheep.

The bill also would close a loophole which has permitted importation of slaughter sheep without inspection but has not provided a follow-up to insure that they actually went to slaughter and not to the range.
