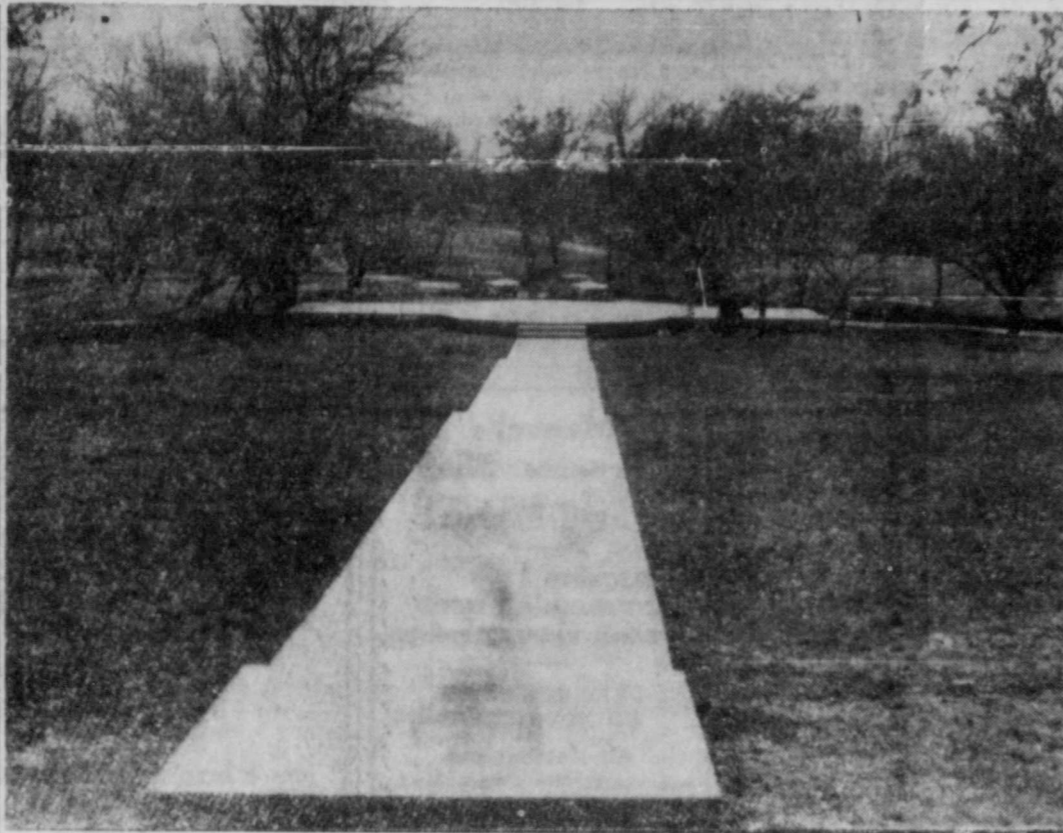
The theme for Soil Stewardship Week this year is: "Three Births Of The Land."

## March First Is School Trustee Filing Deadline

Next Wednesday, March 1, is the last day on which candidates may file for the school trustee election and have their name printed on the official ballots. Filing deadline is 30 days before the election which is scheduled for Saturday, April 1.

Two trustees are to be elected to the board from Goldthwaite, Mullin, Star and Priddy school districts. Two members will be elected to the County school board, one from Commissioner's precinct three and one from the county-at-large.

Candidates must file with County Judge Cecil Egger. Names may be placed on the official ballot by the candidate signing up in person or by petition signed by five regularly qualified voters of the respective districts.

Candidates nominated by petition also must sign the affidavit for candidate for public office in the office of the county judge 30 days before the election in order for the names to be placed on the official ballot.

## Park Maintenance Fund Drive Opens As Committee Makes Plans For 1967

The annual fund drive for maintenance of Mills County Park for this year will get underway on March 1, according to announcement by W. P. Duren, chairman of the park committee.

Plans for 1967 were outlined when the committee held a meeting in the community room of Mills County State Bank to start the ball rolling for this

season. The park maintenance fund, as usual, is depleted by this time and it is time to get started on this year's work and funds will again be needed for the project.

Members of the committee attending the planning meeting were: W. P. Duren, Harold Yarbrough, W. C. Barnett, Charles Conradt, Houston Duren, Lewis

T. Hudson, and Lee Roy Stacy. Vic E. Koleber also attended. One member of the committee, Ed Thornton, was not present.

Committee members are now in a receptive mood for contributions from all who are interested in the welfare of Mills County Park.

The committee needs a minimum of \$1,200.00 for the caretaker along through the growing season. The city plays a big part in the park project with respect to roads and other details.

Last year interested parties contributed \$1,307.45 to the maintenance fund. This was done without personal solicitation on the part of the committee and reflected splendid countywide interest in the park.

It was pointed out at the meeting that it is the time of the year again for park maintenance work to get underway.

On another page of this paper appears an official appeal from the committee for financial support of the project for 1967.

The committee hopes to enlist at least 100 persons to contribute \$12.00, or more, per year for park maintenance.

Last year a good many raised their contribution. A number gave \$25.00 or more which helped put the drive over the top. Committee members feel that this will hold true again this year.

The park committee hopes that interested persons will again respond with their donations as they have done in the past so that mail campaign and personal contact work will not be necessary to insure park upkeep for the season.

Past support is appreciated by committee members who are now ready to receive this year's contributions, Chairman Duren stated.

Honor roll of park maintenance fund contributors will be published along.

## Goldthwaite Rural Route Changes To Go Into Effect This Saturday

The Post Office Department has ordered that effective this Saturday, February 25, 1967, Goldthwaite Rural Route 1,

presently carried by Sebern E. Thornton, will be discontinued and patrons on this route will be served either on Route 2 or 3 out of this office. Mr. Thornton will be transferred to a rural route at Mullin, effective on the same date.

Generally speaking, here are the changes that will take place as a result of this change:

(1) Patrons who now receive their mail on Route 2, carried by Julian D. Evans, will receive their mail approximately one and one-half hours later than at present. There will be no change in their mailing address.

(2) Patrons living on Route 1 in the Big Valley area, and along Hanna Valley Road, and on Reynolds Street here in town will have their mail delivered by Mr. Evans at approximately the same time as they now receive it. However, these patrons should change their address from Route 1 to Route 2.

(3) The remainder of patrons served by the old Route 1 will have their mail delivered by the present Route 3 carrier, Delmar Sears, and it will be necessary that they change their address from Route 1 to Route 3.

Acting Postmaster Ray Duren announced that each patron should receive a notice from his office outlining the exact effect this change will have on their mail, as well as notice to what their new mailing address will be. He stated that he will be happy to discuss this matter with any patrons having questions.
