Dr. T. C. Graves Named Chairman for Scout Camp Development Drive

Executive Board members—Dr. T. C. Graves, Warren P. Duren, Harold Yarborough and Dr. M. A. Childress. Need for the expansion and development of the facilities at Camp Billy Gibbons was shown in broad outline by the council's long-range plan, developed during 1964 and 1965, and adopted by the council in December 1965.

Accomplishment of other goals of the council's long-range plan has included the addition of a member of the council's executive staff, resulting in a boy membership growth of over 10% in 1966—an achievement which placed the Comanche Trail Council third among the 35 councils in Texas, Oklahoma, and New Mexico. Boy membership growth in the council has been steady and consistent for the past three years, and is "on schedule" as set by the long-range plan.

The use of Camp Billy Gibbons, located on Brady Creek, fifteen miles from Richland Springs, as projected in the council's long-range plan, will more than double by 1970. Present physical facilities at the camp will not stand such use.

A new electric feeder line from the sub-station to the northwestern part of the city was completed by city crews last Saturday morning and put into operation according to announcement by City Manager W. C. Barnett.

The new one mile line costing approximately \$5,000.00 was started last Fall when poles were set during October and November. Completion was delayed while the city waited for delivery of the heavy duty copper wire for the job. The one mile line required three miles of copper wire for the three strands.

Approximately 50 per cent of the residential section of the city including the schools will be served through this new main feeder line which extends from Hannah Valley Road south on Trent Street to 5th, then two blocks on 5th Street and then south on McIntosh Street to the San Saba highway.

The new installation will add approximately 50 per cent to the carrying capacity of the electric distribution system thereby insuring better service for all electric customers within the city, Barnett stated.

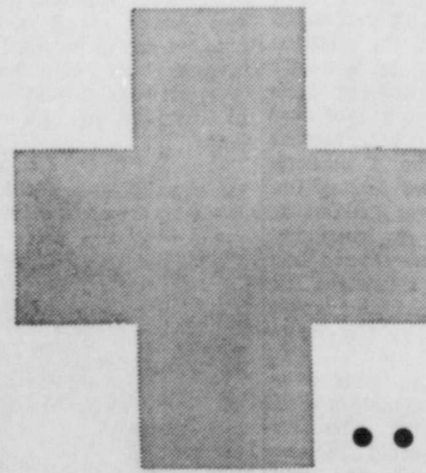

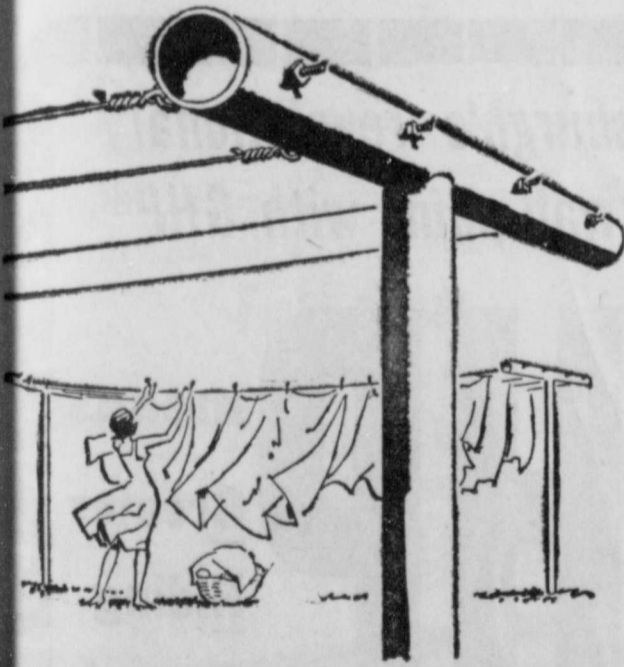

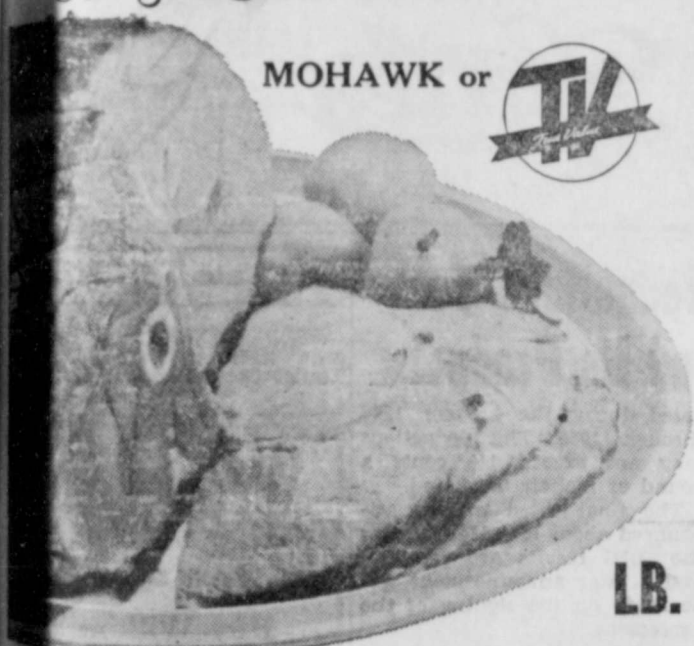

Collier added that the Easter Seal Society is continually seeking children and adults who can benefit from rehabilitation treatment and services offered by the society. The Easter Seal Society has provided treatments for children and adults suffering from Arthritis, Cerebral Palsy, Stroke, Multiple Sclerosis, Muscular Dystrophy, Polio, Speech Disorders, Hearing Conditions, Accidental Injuries and many other conditions.

Mr. Collier also announced that the 1967 Easter Seal Appeal would open February 20 and run through Easter Sunday, March 26, 1967.

Producers Favor Deductions To Promote Mohair And Its Products

The U. S. Department of Agriculture announced today that preliminary returns show producers have approved deductions from payments on mohair to finance the promotion of mohair and its products. In a mail referendum which ended February 17, 80.2 per cent of the producers voting, who owned 78.8 per cent of the Angora goats represented in the referendum, favored a proposed agreement between the Secretary of Agriculture and the Mohair Council of America, Inc. The agreement authorizes deductions for the promotion program.

To become effective, the agreement had to be approved by either two-thirds of the producers, or by producers of two-thirds of the production, represented in the referendum. The preliminary results show 5,184 producers voting of whom 4,158 voted for the agreement and 1,026 voted against it. The producers voting for the agreement owned 1,901,015 Angora goats, from which mohair is shorn, and those voting against the agreement owned 512,058 goats. Of the 5,184 ballots cast, 4,486 were by producers located in Texas. The remaining votes came from producers in Arizona, Colorado, Michigan, Missouri, New Mexico, Ohio, Oklahoma, Oregon, Utah and West Virginia.

The proposed agreement authorizes the Mohair Council, an organization of mohair producers, to conduct an advertising and sales promotional program for mohair and its products similar to the promotion programs for wool and lambs which have been in effect since 1956. To finance the promotion program, it authorizes deductions from payment under the National Wool Act on mohair mar-

keted during the 4 years, 1966 through 1969. The deductions may not exceed 1 1/2 cents a pound of mohair marketed.

The final vote will be announced about mid-March after the final results are received, and a later announcement will be made on the signing of the agreement.
