Mills County Youth Center Gets Extensive Remodeling And Repairs

A program of extensive remodeling and repairs for Mills County Youth Center is nearing completion, according to announcement by officials of the First Baptist Church.

The Youth Center is receiving the major portion of a \$16,000 improvement program that has been underway the past few weeks at the church, which includes some remodeling in the classrooms of some departments in the educational building.

Church officials anticipate that the job will be completed about May 1. Most of the construction work has been completed and only some interior items are yet to be finished.

This latest improvement program for the Youth Center includes a general remodeling, central heating and air conditioning, new tile floor throughout, improvements in the Kindergarten area, enlarged kitchen and snack area, lowering the ceiling in the main room, building a fire place and stage with corner seating areas. Also concrete slab for volleyball and basketball with lighting facilities.

The Youth Center, or part of the present building, was originally the Educational building for the Baptist Church. It was started in 1934 and completed and dedicated in 1935, as a U shaped building for class rooms located back of the old frame church building.

In 1951 the late Mr. Walter Fairman was granted permission in a resolution from the church to make extensive improvements on the building. He spent approximately \$15,000 in an enlargement program, which was completed in 1952 when the

Heavy Rain, With Some Hail, Hits Mills County Saturday Afternoon

Heavy rain ranging from a trace in some sections and up to more than two inches in others along with some high wind and hail hit Mills County Saturday afternoon.

Downtown Goldthwaite received one inch of rain in 13 minutes, Weatherman Harry Allen reported. Others reported one inch and more in 10 to 15 minutes.

The official measurement for Goldthwaite Saturday afternoon and night was .65 inch. This brings the total for the month to 1.57 inches.

A sprinkle of hail was reported

in Goldthwaite while some parts of the county reported damage from hail to gardens, trees and crops. Also windows were knocked out and roofs damaged. Most hail damage was reported from the area north of Goldthwaite to Mullin and the Ridge area.

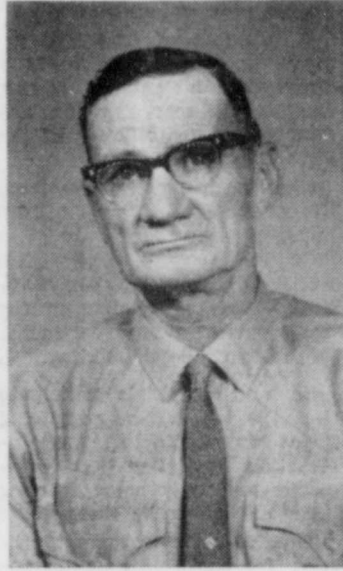

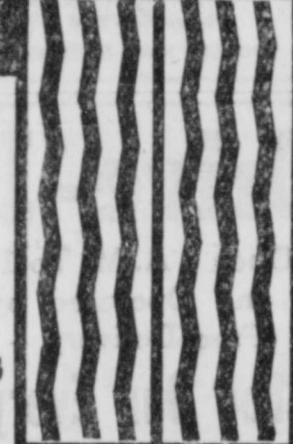

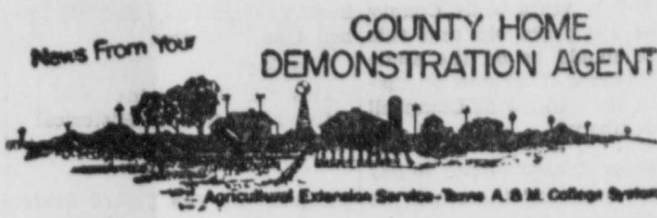

COMFORTABLE WORK HEIGHT IS IMPORTANT

A comfortable work height is important as you arrange your work area. The distance between the elbow and work surface affects the ease of working from sitting as well as standing.

When you sit to work, the basic position of the upper arm is close to the body and the lower arm is parallel to the floor—or at a right angle to the upper arm. You have more strength in your arms when they are in such a position than when they are bent sharply.

Latest research conducted in regard to jobs which call for people to sit while working indicates that sitting to work may be more energy-consuming than standing if (1) your chair is too low or too high; (2) there isn't room for your knees while sitting at a counter; (3) you must raise your arms to do the work; or (4) the job done requires that you get up several times.

Table tops and desks generally are 30 inches from the floor. If you are above or below average height, the standard distance may be wrong for you. The work height should be adjusted to fit your needs.

Be imaginative as you set up a suitable work area. To change the height of a work surface, you may use cushions on the seat of a chair, and a platform on which to rest your feet. The perch stool may be useful, especially for tasks of short duration. Or, you can have a work surface custom built for you.

Another factor for you to consider is the "sit-to-work" margin. That's the distance between the top of the thighs and the elbow and lower arm and when the lower arm is bent in a working position. The "sit-to-work"

margin is only 3 inches for the average person.

PRESSING NEW GARMENTS

Pressing can spell success or failure in the general appearance of a new garment. Did you know that when clothing is manufactured the person skilled in pressing earns more than the person who actually sews the garment?

Don't confuse pressing with ironing. Pressing is a lifting up and down, following the threads or grainline of the fabric. The weight of the iron never rests completely on the garment.

There should be a piece of fabric between the iron and the seam being pressed, even when using a steam iron. Cheesecloth, canvas or wool can be used. It is good to keep the ironing board set up so that you are not tempted to skip this step even once when sewing. Press any curved seam over a tailor's mitt or ham.

Some fabrics will respond to a steam iron, while others may need a dampened press cloth to assure enough moisture to help in molding and shaping.

In fabrics that seem to shrink, you may want to use only the dampened press cloth, so you can control the amount of moisture. Do not overpress or use too much heat on wool.

DPS Official Urges Texans To Check Tornado Safety Precautions

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, today urged Texans to review tornado safety precautions.

"While tornadoes can occur any time of the year," Garrison said, "April, May, and June are the peak months."

U. S. Weather Bureau records indicate that Texas leads the nation in total number of tornadoes per year. The annual average of 80.7 is based on a record of 1,200 confirmed tornadoes from 1951 through 1965.

"It is especially important for every school, church, hospital, hotel, business house, and industry to establish an emergency plan," Garrison said. "To know what to do when a tor-

nado is approaching may mean the difference between life and death."

A circular on tornado safety is available from most local Civil Defense offices.

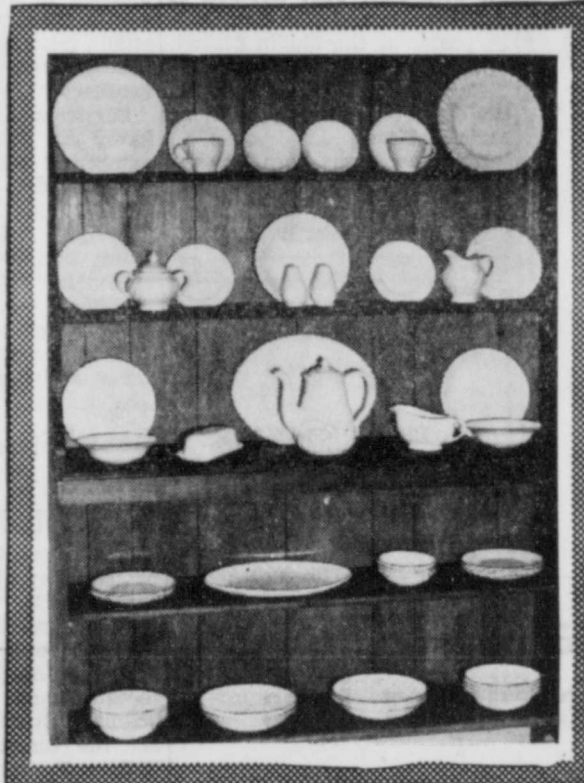
