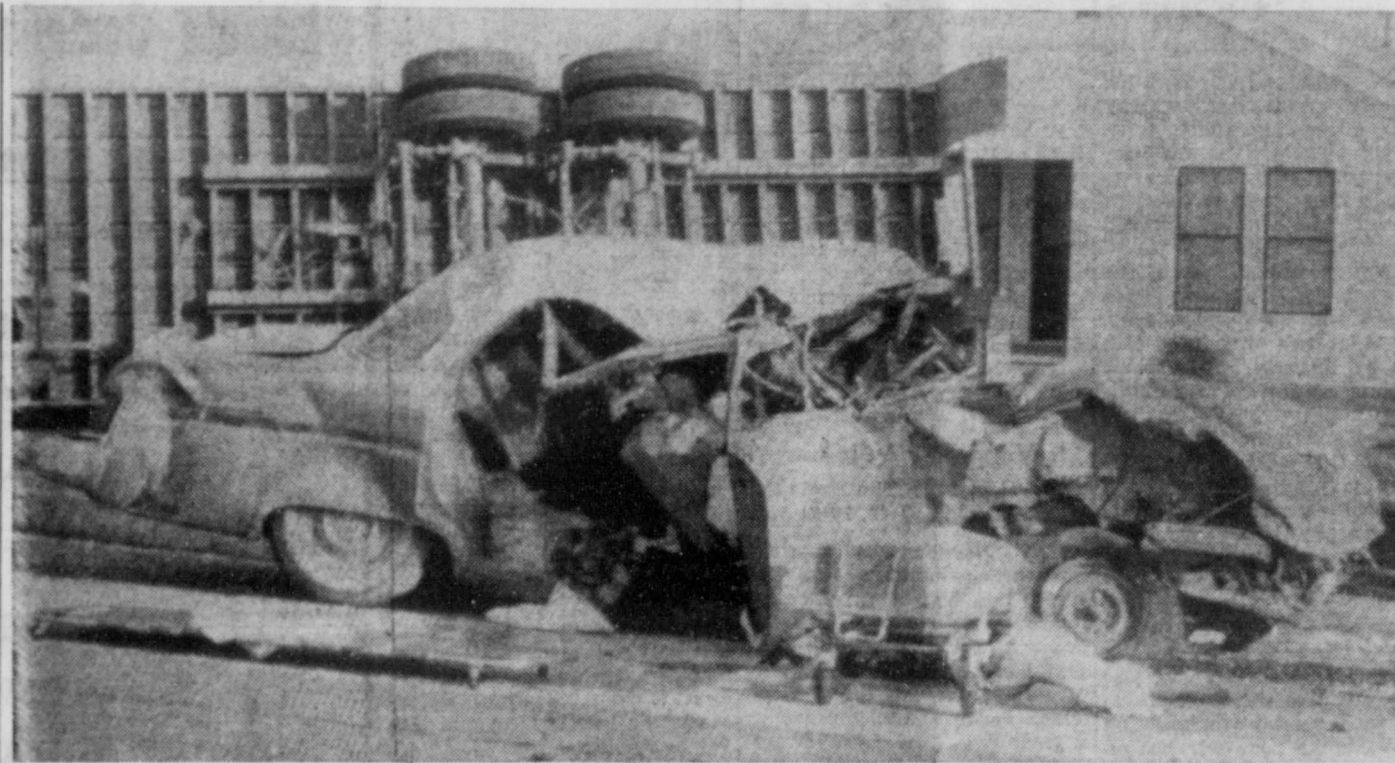

## Car-Truck Crash At Star Kills Eight

## Seven Members Of One Family And One Truck Driver Are Dead

A semi-trailer truck and car crash at Star late Tuesday afternoon killed eight persons and left four injured in one of the worst traffic mishaps in Central Texas history.

Seven members of one family of 10 and the relief truck driver were killed. Five of the Waller family and the truck driver were pronounced dead by Justice of the Peace E. H. Thorne at the scene, one died after arriving at the hospital here and the eighth died Wednesday morning in Temple.

The dead were identified by investigating officers as follows:

Mr. Earl Thomas Waller, 36, and his wife Pauline Kyle Waller, 31, both of RFD 7, Athens, Alabama.

Five of their eight children, Linda, 5, Frank, 3, Michal, 2, Eugene, 12, and Drenda, 10. Eugene died shortly after being brought to the hospital here and Drenda died in a Temple hospital about 10:00 a. m. Wednesday.

Robert Anderson, 40, of 480 27th Street, Hickory, North Carolina.

Surviving members of the Waller family were three children who were all injured and hospitalized. They are Robert Wade, 6, Eddie, 8, and Ray, 4.

Drenda and Ray were in critical condition and were first treated at Childress & Cruzcosa Clinic & Hospital here and then moved at 10:30 Tuesday night to Scott and White Hospital where the girl died Wednesday morning.

Eddie and Robert Wade remained in the hospital here and were described in fair condition Wednesday noon.

Also hospitalized was the driver of the truck, Paul Justice, 32, of Route 2, Connelly Springs, North Carolina. He was reported in fair condition at midnight Tuesday and in good condition Wednesday noon.

Ambulances were dispatched to the scene from Roy Wilkins Funeral Home in Goldthwaite and the J. Y. Hamilton Funeral Home in Evant. They brought the injured to Childress & Cruzcosa Clinic & Hospital here and all the dead were taken to Roy Wilkins Funeral Home. Hospital personnel, funeral home personnel, sheriff's officers and Texas Department Of Public Safety officials started the long task of establishing identification of the accident victims.

Taking part in the investigation were Mills County Patrolman Jack Straley, Sheriff H. G. Brooks, and Sgt. James England of Kerrville and Patrolman Buddy Hierholzer of Fredericksburg.

The accident took place in front of the H. G. Lee Grocery Store and Station, just East of the Star intersection about 5:30 p. m. Tuesday.

The Waller family was traveling west in a 1954 Mercury sedan and according to investigating officers apparently made a left turn in front of the truck which was traveling East on U. S. Highway 84, causing the head-on crash.

One of the surviving children said from his hospital bed Tuesday night: "We were going in there to get some gas." Officers reported that not one cent was found on any member of the Waller family.

After the impact the truck traveled along the ditch for a distance before it over-turned and came to rest in the front yard of the H. G. Lee home.

Anderson, the relief driver of the truck, was pinned under the wreckage and it took more than two hours to remove his body from under the semi-trailer. A maintainer was brought in by County Commissioner Fred Wall of Star, to assist in the work of removing the victim.

The driver of the truck was able to get out and assist with the dead and injured after the accident.

Funeral Home officials announced about midnight Tuesday that plans were being made for Anderson's body to be flown to North Carolina for burial. He is survived by his wife and twin children, they reported. Anderson's body was taken to Dallas by J. Y. Hamilton at 11 a. m. Wednesday for the flight to North Carolina.

Sheriff Brooks talked with the Sheriff in Athens, Alabama, Tuesday night and was informed that Mr. Waller had no living relatives on his side of the family except a sister who is hospitalized.

Mrs. Waller's mother was located by the Alabama officials and was informed of the tragic event. She and her sister and other members of her family are driving to Goldthwaite and are expected to arrive here late Thursday.

Funeral services for members of the Waller family were pending at Wilkins Funeral Home as the Eagle went to press.

## Donations Being Accepted For Waller Funerals

Donations are being accepted to help pay for burial expenses for the members of the Waller family. It was announced by Sheriff G. Brooks, as the Eagle went to press.

Seven members of the family died as a result of the car-truck crash at Star Tuesday evening. Both parents, two girls and three boys perished in the tragedy that has shaken Mills County and all Central Texas.

Many have inquired about making to the aid of this family tragedy and Sheriff Brooks announced that contributions will be accepted at the office of the County Judge or the Sheriff's Office in Goldthwaite.

Officials have announced that the family or relatives have no money for the burial expense.

## Cotton Allotment Transfer Vote Is Scheduled May 15-19

ASCS says that a vote of cotton farmers will be held soon in Mills County to decide whether they want to be able to sell or buy their upland cotton allotments for use on a farm in a different county, but within the state.

The Referendum will be held during the period May 15 through May 19.

Ballots may be returned by mail or delivered to the ASCS office during that time.

The affirmative vote by at least two-thirds of the county's cotton farmers who vote will permit such transfers during the next two years, 1968 and 1969.

Those who produce cotton in Mills County and don't receive a ballot are requested to ask for one.

## School Census Shows Decrease

The school census count for Mills County as of January 31, 1967, shows a decrease of 32 students from the count of a year earlier, according to official figures certified by County Superintendent and Ex-Officio County Superintendent, Cecil Woodard.

The nose count for the four districts this year is 728 while in 1966 it was 760. On January 31, 1965 the count was 802 and January 31, 1964 it was 833.

Goldthwaite district lost 20 students the past year, Mullin lost seven, Priddy lost four and Star lost 15.

they have read as many as 12 books.

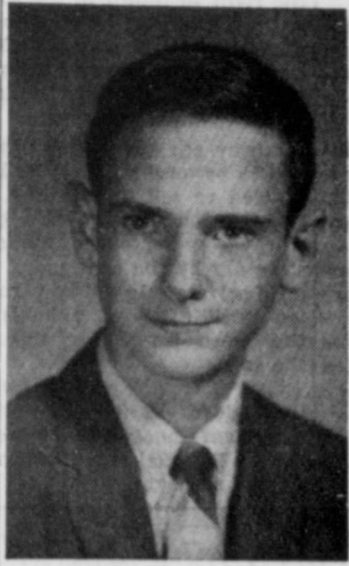

### San Saba PCA Stockholders Meet In Annual Session This Saturday

The stockholders of the San Saba Production Credit Association will hold their thirty-third annual stockholders' meeting at the Senior High School Auditorium in San Saba this Saturday, May 13th. Registration of the stockholders, wives, and guests will begin at 9:45 a. m. with the meeting scheduled to begin at 10:30 a. m., according to Mr. James M. Green, Director from the Goldthwaite Field Office Territory.

Frank McCullar, Treasurer of the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank of Houston, will deliver the principal address. As treasurer of the Credit Bank, McCullar, a twenty-six year veteran in farm credit, is charged with the responsibility of accounting for the more than \$570 million loan volume, the development of the Bank's operating budget, and the supervision of operational services to the thirty-five production credit associations in Texas.

McCullar, who will speak on current trends in interest rates and the cost of money, observes in connection with the address to the membership of the San Saba Production Credit Association, "The past eighteen months have been the most trying times in a tightening economy when interest rates jumped almost phenomenally to unprecedented highs, but thanks to corrective measures the situation is now nearing a more normal state."

### Bert Geeslin Receives Physics Honor At Baylor

Bert Geeslin was recently selected by the Baylor Physics Department as the 1966-67 Outstanding Freshman Physics Student at Baylor University, Waco. He was recognized for this distinction at the Annual Awards Banquet, sponsored by Omicron Delta Kappa, men's senior honor society. ### Pecan Case Bearer Population Ahead Of Normal Schedule

Population of the pecan nut case bearer seems to be developing ahead of schedule this spring in Texas. John G. Thomas, Extension entomologist at Texas A&M University, said that reports from entomologists in different areas of the state indicate the most destructive insect pest of pecans appears to be about 10 days ahead of last year's first appearances. Timing of the spray is very important to control this destructive pecan insect.

Malathion can be used at the rate of 3 pounds of 25% wettable powder per 100 gallons of water or you can also use emulsifiable concentrates in place of the wettable powder but use the same amount of active ingredient per 100 gallons of water. Or you may use 2 pounds of

Buyers are guaranteed proper papers because no sheep will be allowed to sell unless they are registered and up-to-date certificates presented to the sale secretary by the consignor. ### Cornelius And Watters Represent Mills County On Mohair Council

An organizational meeting of the Mohair Council of America was held in Junction, Saturday, April 22 in the Junction High School auditorium. The purpose of the meeting was to organize a permanent council with authority, by-laws, rules and regulations to operate in accordance with contracts between the Mohair Council of America and the United States Department of Agriculture.

Dolph Briscoe of Uvalde was elected president of the Council. Briscoe, Man of the Year of 1966 in Agriculture and temporary chairman of the Council for the past 18 months, initiated the agreement between the Secretary of the Agriculture Department in Washington and the Mohair Producers of America.

Al Dishman of Uvalde who has served the past 18 months as coordinator and chairman of the Planning Committee of the Council was elected vice-president.

Walter Pfluger of San Angelo was selected treasurer.

The council is made up of 60 directors selected from 20 districts in Texas and an additional three directors which will represent the remaining mohair producing states in America. The districts are determined by the amount of money received on the incentive payments from the United States Department of Agriculture. Almost all districts in Texas are composed of at least three counties which gives each county one or more representatives on the council.

Representatives from District 17 which is composed of Mills, San Saba, and Lampasas Counties are V. Z. Cornelius and David Watters, Mills; Mrs. James Lusty, San Saba; and Jimmy Martin, Lampasas County.

The executive committee is composed of Briscoe, Dishman, and Pfluger and eight other members to be appointed by the president from the board of directors and subject to the approval of the directors.

Officers of the Council will be located in Uvalde and temporarily staffed with a stenographer. The office of secretary which is to be approved by the board of directors will be staffed by a highly skilled administrator. Qualifications for applicants for this office will be made available in the near fu-

ture. The council which has been operating on the five cents per head voluntary contributions by breeders for the past 18 months has ample funds to continue its operations until government funds are available around the first of July.

Over 125 mohair producers attended the meeting and luncheon which was served by Dr. Ted Hokekamp, V. Z. Cornelius, director from Mills County, summed up the meeting this way:

"The purpose of the Council is to promote and supervise mohair productions, to help producers in better preparation of hair, and to encourage research, marketing and blending of mohair."

A meeting of the directors will be called in the near future. First item on the agenda for the new president will be a visit by Briscoe to Washington where a meeting will be held with Congressman O. C. Fisher who is making arrangements with the Quartermaster General to extend the government contracts of blankets, uniforms and other clothing for the use of mohair blending.

"We have great hopes that we can use the surplus mohair now in warehouses in the manner," said Cornelius.

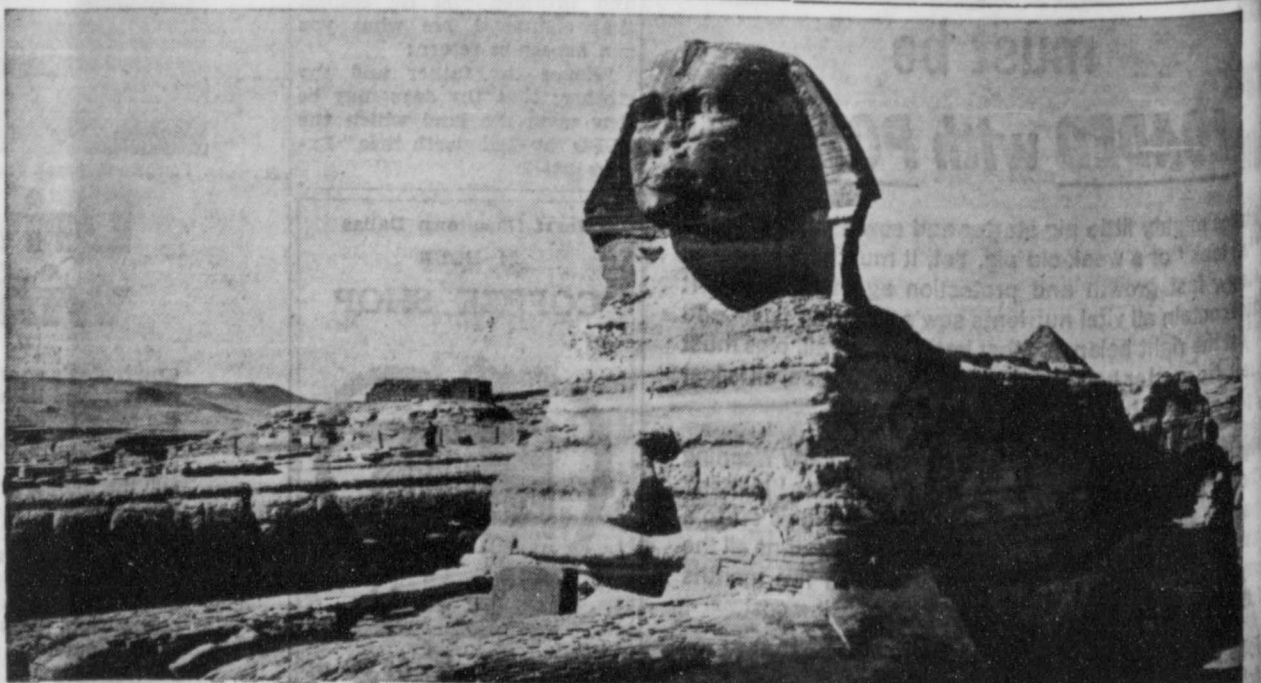

## Too Late To Classify

United States Postal Savings Certificates which are on deposit at post offices ceased earning interest for depositors on April 27, 1967, Postmaster Norman Duren announced.

Nationwide, the Post Office Department is holding more than \$90 million in the now obsolete program which was discontinued by the Congress on March 28, 1966.

As of April 27, a year ago, Postal Savings were discontinued, and no deposits were accepted by the Post Office Department. Certificates whose anniversary dates have been reached since last April 26 have earned their final interest payment, Postmaster Duren said.

On June 30, he said, all remaining funds in the program will be turned over to the Treasury Department to be held in a trust fund until liquidated. There they will remain available for payment without time limitation whenever proper claims are received.

Postmaster Duren urged that all Postal Savings depositors close out their accounts and invest their funds into United States Savings Bonds or the new Freedom Shares, which on May 1, will pay 7.74% interest.
