## 7 More Boosters Are Needed To Reach Park Maintenance Fund Goal

W. P. Duren, chairman of the park committee, announced Tuesday that while several more have joined the park fund honor roll of boosters an additional seven are needed to reach the goal for 1967.

The committee had hoped two weeks ago to complete the drive by issuing a last call for financial support for this year, but the response fell a little short.

The goal of \$1,200.00 can be reached with a few more contributors, it was pointed out this week, and the drive can be completed once again.

This minimum goal is needed to insure a park caretaker for the year.

The committee has been conducting the voluntary contribution drive for the past several years to provide money for the park upkeep.

When the plan was first adopted it called for enlisting 100 persons to give \$12.00, or more, to the park maintenance fund each year to take care of the project. This amounts to only \$1.00 per month for each contributor.

New budget approved by the council for the next year involves an estimated expenditure of \$184,000 for governmental and city utilities. This figure is less than the past year because last year the budget included an estimated \$17,000.00 for construction of new electric lines.

A petition for annexation from Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Harper was presented to the council. The council adopted an ordinance accepting the petition which brings part of the Harper property into the city. The petition covered 1.25 acres of the Harper property at the north edge of the city that was not in the city limits. The balance of their home site was already in the city limits.

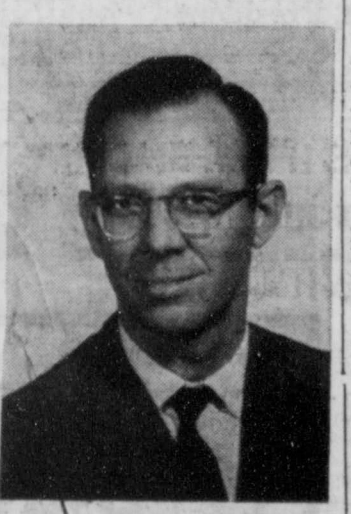
A committee reported that a new truck for the garbage department has been ordered.

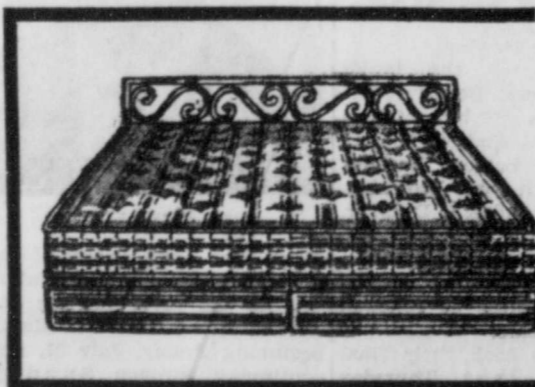

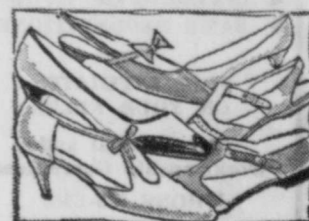

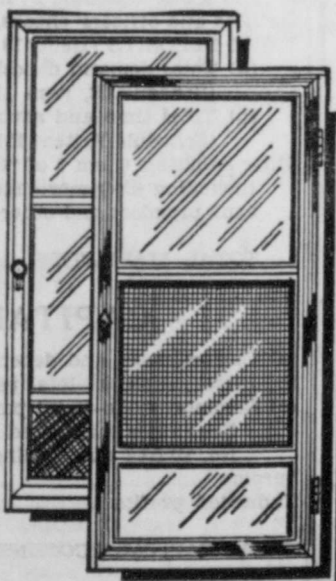

## STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

AUSTIN, Tex. — Within the next few months, residents of several cities in Texas may vote local sales taxes on themselves.

Some of the larger cities are considering elections under the new law which permits a community to levy a one per cent sales tax, if its citizens approve. This is in addition to the state's two per cent sales tax.

In Austin, a group of businessmen and civic leaders are urging the city council to call a sales tax election.

A statewide survey indicates that Houstonians — where the proposed tax could bring in as much as \$14,000,000 a year — will be among the first to vote. Mayor Louie Welch said the city council will be asked to call an election on the issue this fall.

San Antonio Mayor W. W. McAllister expressed support for the local sales levy and said a vote could be scheduled after September 28. Without the additional revenue, he said, San Antonio would have to reduce municipal services or inaugurate more service charges.

City officials in many smaller towns, on the other hand, indicate they have no intention of rushing into sales tax controversies. One, who probably represented views of many, said city governing bodies ought to wait on a call by citizens, through petitions or other formal requests, before setting any elections to impose new forms of taxation.

### AUTO INSURANCE GOING DOWN

Starting August 1, Texans will be paying slightly less for their auto insurance on a statewide average.

Some will pay considerably less, some more. But overall, the State Board of Insurance maintains that motorists will pay \$4,200,000 less in premiums. Av-

erage statewide saving will be about one per cent for all classes of coverage combined.

Board adopted, with minor changes, the recommendations of its staff as submitted at a public hearing on June 20. Changes related to commercial and miscellaneous classes for bodily injury, property damage liability and physical damage coverages.

At the same time, the Board authorized a study of so-called "good student" credit. Latter would make some reduction in stepped-up rates charged young males under 25, provided they are students in the upper scholastic achievement bracket. Board said it is strongly inclined toward allowing such a discount.

Another study will explore the possibility of creating additional statistical territories.

William C. Richards of Athens and E. M. Decker Jr. of Jacksonville to the board of managers of the Texas State Railroad (a five-mile state-owned line in East Texas).

Adequacy of current rehabilitation programs will be reviewed and discussed. Progress reports from chairmen of taskforces and county committees will also be given. Task-force Chairmen include James Vick, Frank Perdue, Ed Pugh, J. K. Kerr, Mrs. Sammie Rankin, Bill Chaney, and General Robert W. Stillman.

### Three-State Honors Are Won By Comanche Trail Boy Scout Council

The Comanche Trail Council, Boy Scouts of America, an eight-county association of which Goldthwaite is a part has earned two top honors among the 35-councils in the state Region Nine (Texas, Oklahoma, and New Mexico), Council President Manley A. Webb announced this week.

"Our council is ranked in first place in percentage gain in boy membership, the basic 'statistic' in council rankings," Mr. Webb said. "We have a 19% gain in boy membership over May of 1966. The second place council, Fort Worth, had a 10% gain. Our boy membership May 30, 1967, was 1,730, compared to 1,452 a year ago."

"In addition," Mr. Webb added, "We ranked in first place in percentage gain in Boys' Life magazine subscriptions — and 12th in the national rankings." "We do not sell Boys' Life for a commission, we believe that good reading habits are important as a part of the overall Scouting program. We are very happy that more boys than ever before are reading this fine boys' magazine in our council."

Mr. Webb further stated that the council's leaders feel that the present records being established by the Comanche Trail Council are a direct result of this long-range plan adopted by the council in December 1965. Other results of this long-range plan have been the addition of another member of the council's executive staff, and the successful completion of a camp development fund effort in May 1967.

In Goldthwaite the Comanche Trail Council receives operating funds through sustaining memberships. All funds for the operation of the Comanche Trail Council are received from donations, no tax funds support Scouting in any way anywhere in the United States.

White-winged dove census counts, just completed in the nesting areas of the Lower Rio Grande Valley, indicate a 17 per cent decline in the breeding population, according to Bill Brownlee, wildlife biologist for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Even with the decline, 1967 can be classified as the third best of recent years, Brownlee said. This year's count shows 667,000 birds while there were 804,000 in 1966, he said.

The best crop in recent years was in 1950 when more than a million birds were counted.

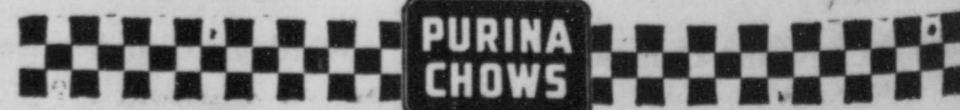

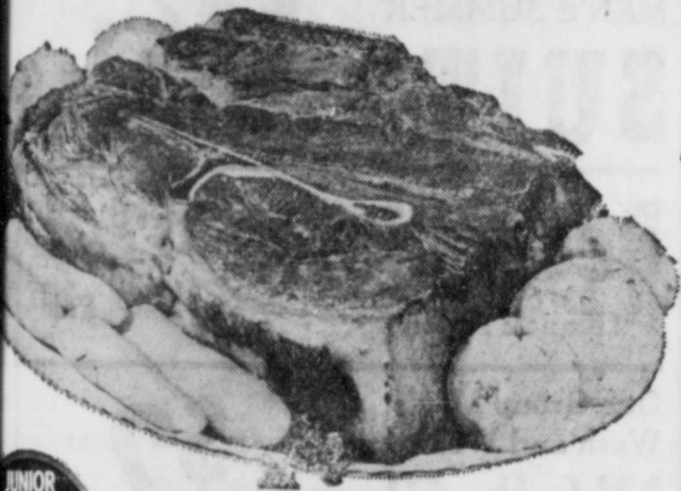

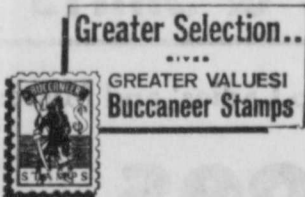
