College Station, (Spec.) — Howard Michael Hoover, of Goldthwaite, is one of 83 veterinary medicine students scheduled to graduate August 4 from Texas A&M University.

Hoover is receiving his Doctor of Veterinary Medicine degree, having completed the requirements of a seven-and-one-half-year college program covering all phases of applied sciences as they relate to veterinary medicine.

Dr. Alvin Price, dean of Texas A&M's College of Veterinary Medicine, said the August graduating class will be the largest in the university's history. The previous class was last year which totaled 69 students.

The College of Veterinary Medicine conducts graduation ceremonies separately from other units of the university because it operates on a trimester basis, rather than the standard semester.

Graduation ceremonies are scheduled for 8 p. m. in Bryan Civic Auditorium.

They announced that the outdoor theatre has been completed. The grass is growing nicely and the shrubs planted as a background for the stage are doing very well.

City Manager Barnett has had electrical outlets installed around the stage for night lighting and the theatre is now ready for use.

The committee also voted to place shrubs as a screen, or background, along the west fence, from the creek bed to the San Saba highway. Also some work is to be done on the old dam smoothing it down a little lower so that the tree area on the dam can be used for picnicing.

He has served as pastor of

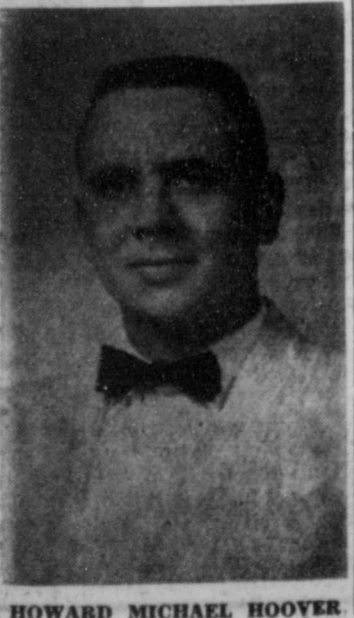

**Rites For Joseph S. Bowles II
Conducted In Fort Worth, July 28**

Joseph Sanders Bowles II passed away in a Dallas hospital July 27, 1967 after an illness of less than three months. He was born November 11, 1910, in San Saba, Texas, the son of the late Rev. J. S. Bowles and Flora Gatlin Bowles.

Col. Bowles was a graduate of Southwestern University, Georgetown, and taught school in Big Valley, Balmorhea, and Big Wells. He served in the United States Air Force during World War II in the Adjutant Gen-

eral's Department and rose to the rank of Lt. Colonel. His service was in the European Theater of the war and he took part in the Omaha Beach landing. He continued to serve after the war was over as an instructor and was retired at the time of his death.

On February 29, 1948, he married Vivian Paschall in Corpus Christi. At the time of his death he was employed as a supervisor in the Dallas Post Office. He and his wife operated a Chinchilla farm near Grand Prairie and he served as a State and National judge in Chinchilla shows.

Joseph was a member of the Aldersgate Methodist Church in Dallas.

His funeral services were conducted in the Brown Funeral Chapel, Grand Prairie, July 28, 1967, by the Rev. John Poe Hensley of Dallas, who was his schoolmate in the public schools of Groveton, Texas. Interment was in the Mt. Olivet Cemetery in Fort Worth with full military honors.

He is survived by his wife, Vivian Bowles of Grand Prairie; one sister, Mary B. Piccione of Media, Penn.; one nephew, Sanders Piccione; and one niece, Kathrine Piccione of Media; two aunts, Mrs. Minnie Woody and Miss Love Gatlin of this City; two uncles, O. C. Gatlin of Brownwood and J. O. Gatlin of Comanche.

He was laid to rest beside his mother and father at Mt. Olivet. Mrs. O. L. Woody, Miss Love Gatlin, and Haskell Gatlin of this city and Mrs. Florine Cartwright of San Antonio, attended the funeral services for Joseph Bowles July 28.

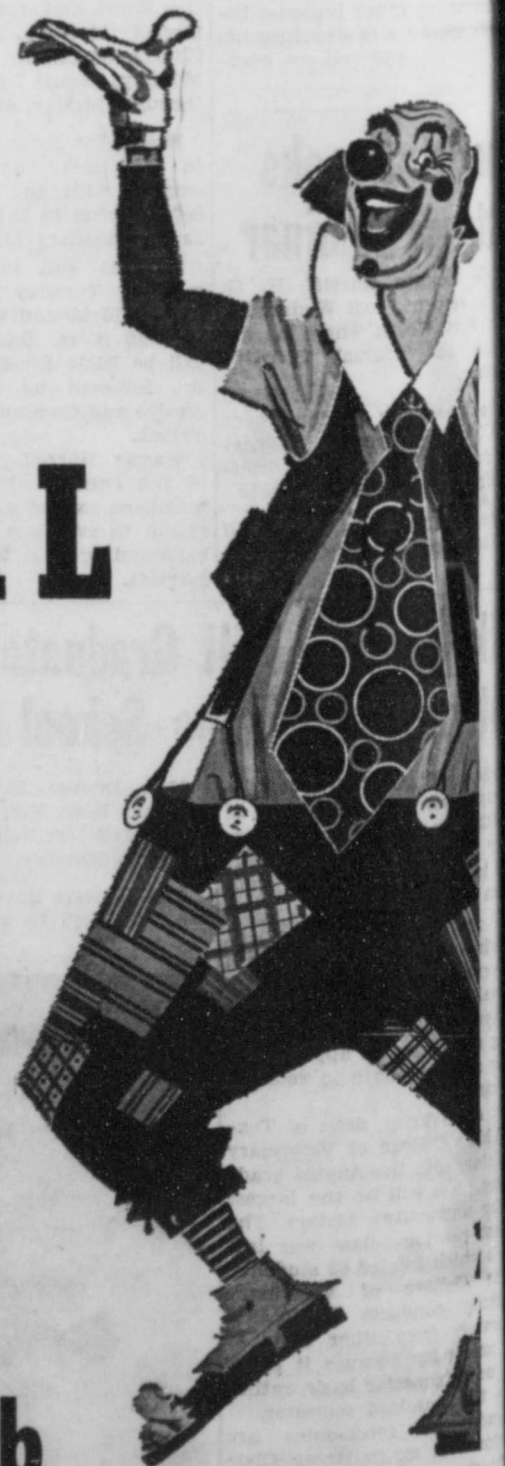

Ms. R. D. McKenzie Makes Solo Flight



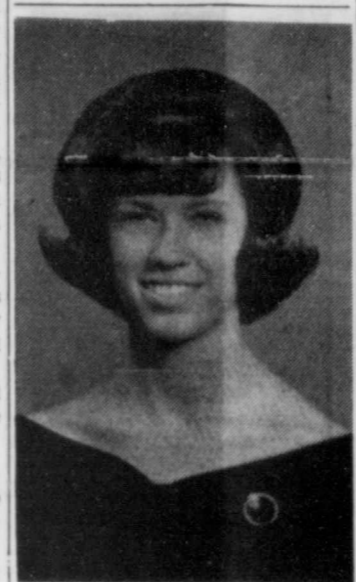

STATE Capital NEWS

AUSTIN, Texas — Newspaper readers throughout Texas soon will be seeing long columns of type about important issues as Secretary of State John Hill begins to advertise the six proposed constitutional amendments to be voted on November 11.

Fourteen additional amendments will be on the 1968 ballot.

Eight of the 20 amendments are of interest mainly to special groups (eg: legislators or state employees). Eight others would provide local governments with new powers or duties. Only four of the group directly affect most Texans.

Amendments to be voted on this year will appear on the ballot in this order:

• No. 1, House Joint Resolution 3, to permit counties to put all tax money in a single general fund rather than dividing income in specified amounts among separate funds for earmarked purposes as is now required.

• No. 2, HJR 37, allowing cities and other governmental units within hospital districts to levy taxes for participation in mental health and mental retardation community centers.

• No. 3, HJR 17, reviving the veterans land program and authorizing a total of \$400,000,000 in bonds to finance continued purchase of farm and ranch land by veterans, including those who have served in Southeast Asia during present hostilities.

• No. 4, HJR 6, authorizing counties to pay medical, doctor and hospital bills of county law enforcement officers injured in line of duty.

• No. 5, HJR 12, authorizing a \$75,000,000 state revenue bond issue for the development of state parks and recreational areas. Bonds are expected to be financed by a small admission fee.

• No. 6, HJR 27, permitting state officers and employees to hold non-elective positions under the state or U. S. governments where there is no conflict of interest and where the state might benefit.

That's all for '67. Top interest in these amendments doubtless will center on the park bond proposal and the veterans land amendment.

Hospital mental health and mental retardation groups will emphasize the importance of Amendment No. 2 to the new community center approach of treating mental patients close to home.

Calling the 1967 election for Veterans Day and a Saturday, undoubtedly, was to assure a large voter turn-out for the land fund amendment. A substantial campaign to urge its passage already is taking form.

Gov. John Connally is the principal backer of the parks bond issue. Last December he unveiled a 10-year plan for acquiring and developing 150,960

acres of recreational lands and historical sites. This would more than triple present state park acreage and open a variety of new facilities for outdoor recreation.

Only opposition to the amendment to date has been based on the \$1 a car park-entry fee, initially proposed by Connally to finance the vast program; and scattered complaints that facilities included in the governor's master plan do not adequately serve some areas of the state.

He is expected to spearhead an intensive fall campaign — supported by parks, recreational and outdoor groups — to put over the bond issue.

The veterans land amendment would add another \$200,000,000 to state bonds previously authorized and through which 35,300 veterans have purchased farm and ranch properties at low interest rates spread over a 40-year pay period.

This amendment would raise the amount which could be borrowed under the program from \$7,500 to \$10,000. The program

was initiated in 1949. Additional bonds were approved by voters in 1951 and 1956. Amendments to enlarge the bond authorization were rejected at elections in 1963 and 1965. Opposition came mainly from Dallas and Houston.

Opposition has adopted the argument that it is not the function of the state government to engage in the loan business and that veterans have had plenty of time to participate. Some also contend that "cheap money" invites purchases of land not needed and which will not be put to productive use.

Amendment No. 2 specifies that the legislature, in providing for creation of hospital districts, does not have to require that the districts assume full responsibility for community mental health and retardation centers and services. It would permit cities and counties to levy taxes and issue bonds for such services. Subdivisions within existing districts would be authorized to do so unless statutes creating the districts expressly prohibit.

An attorney general's opinion held that the constitution does not allow political subdivisions within the boundary of a hospital district to levy taxes for medical and hospital service. Under that ruling, cities and counties located in such districts were restricted from participating in establishment of community health centers. Therefore, only hospital districts could establish such centers, a key part of the mental health program.

Amendments No. 3, No. 4 and No. 5 are self explanatory and apparently non-controversial. Amendment No. 6 is aimed primarily at permitting educators, who are paid from state funds, to serve on federal advisory boards.

Survivors are his wife, Bertha Covington of Goldthwaite; also Aaron Stacy of Worth, whom he reared as own son; one brother, Lewis Covington of Goldthwaite; two sisters, Miss Edith Covington and Mrs. Mary Wall, both of Goldthwaite, and Mrs. S. Temme of Abilene.

Lt. Barnett graduated from Goldthwaite High School in 1958 and graduated from Baylor University, Waco, Tex., in 1962 with a B. A. degree. He was employed as a social worker with the South Texas Children's Home, Beeville, before entering the Army.

U. S. Bond Sales First Six Months Ahead Of Last Year

W. P. Duren, Chairman of the Mills County Savings Bonds Committee, reports that E and H Savings Bond sales during the first six months of 1967 totaled \$33,623. June sales for the county were \$1,629 and 37 per cent of the sales goal has been achieved.

January-June 1967 sales for Texas were \$83,851,046 and 46 per cent of the sales goal has been achieved. This is an increase of 8.6 per cent during the same period last year.

Nationally, sales of Series E and H Savings Bonds totaled \$408 million during June. This is the highest of any June for the past 12 years; 3 per cent more than a year ago. Sales for the first 6 months of 1967 amounted to \$2,617 million — 4.2 per cent above 1966.

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Wildlife Harvest Plans Announced Parks And Wildlife Department

The most comprehensive wildlife harvest plans in Texas history have been mapped almost entirely by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. The 1967 big game season has provided opportunities for the hunter, especially the deer hunter who will have an extra day of hunting in many counties. Hunters can look ahead to generous mourning and mourning dove hunts. The mourning dove season begins as usual at noon on September 1 Central Standard Time (1 p. m. Daylight Saving Time) and continues through October 30 with a daily limit of 12 and possession limit of 24. The mourning dove season begins on September 23 and continues through September 21 except in 21 counties having a concurrent white-winged mourning dove season. In these counties, the mourning dove season will close 10 days earlier. The mourning dove season was cut back four days this year. September 2-3 and September 9-10. Commission action opened the area along the Rio Grande River formerly designated as a nesting sanctuary. Bag limits will be 12 per day and 24 possession limit. Waterfowl enthusiasts will have a nine-day warmup period the third and final experimental teal hunting season September 22-30 provided they apply for a special teal hunting permit prior to August 18. Final decision on the duck and goose season cannot be made until late August to climax conferences on the regional and national level. Following is a summary of major harvest stipulations in the Possum Kingdom regulatory authority area which includes Mills County.

POSSUM KINGDOM

(Archer, Baylor, Bosque, Brown, Clay, Cooke, Coleman, Comanche, Denton Eastland, Ellis, Erath, Hamilton, Hill, Hood, Jack, Johnson, Mills, Montague, Palo Pinto, Parker, Shackelford, Somervell, Stephens, Tarrant, Throckmorton, Wichita, Wilbarger, Wise and Young Counties.)
DEER—Open season, November 11 through January 1. October archery season in Bosque, Coleman, Eastland, Jack, Montague, Palo Pinto, Stephens and Young Counties. The bag limit is 2 buck deer. Antlerless deer may be taken by special permit only in areas designated by the Parks and Wildlife Department. Not more than 3 deer in the aggregate may be taken.
SQUIRREL—No closed season; bag limit, 10 per day, 20 in possession except in Brown and Mills Counties which have no bag or possession limits.
QUAIL—Open season, November 11 through January 31; bag limit, 12 quail per day, possession limit, 36.
TURKEY—Open season, November 11 through January 1. October archery season in Bosque, Coleman, Eastland, Jack, Montague, Stephens and Young Counties. There is no open season in Palo Pinto County. Bag limit—one turkey per season, gobble or bearded hen.

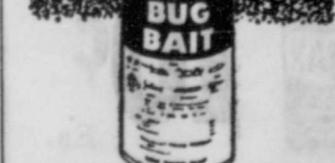

It was July 1891, month when the farmer has a brief respite from his labors, corn and cotton were "laid by," oats and wheat were standing in the field.

"Georgia Rattlesnake" water-melons were "smiling on the vine" most everywhere — not only in the melon patches but in the bottom lands along the Colorado; a consequence of that river's having been on a "high-horse" the year before, and having washed seeds everywhere, volunteer vines had come up along the "second banks."

"Ed, bring me my gun!" Sam Bull called from the front yard gate. Ed picked up the saddle gun from behind the jamb of the front door and ran out to where his Dad and "Little Sam" were waiting in their saddles.

"Where you goin' today, Pa?" Ed said.

"Cowhunting in the roughs below the Hinton Place," he said adjusting the scabbard that held the gun under his right leg. "Come back by Warren's Crossin'?"

"No, by the Goenhour Bridge — I never want to pass through the old Sand Thicket in the day or night."

Emily Bull came hurrying out of the house, wrapping a cold biscuit in a sheet of the Goldthwaite Mountaineer.

"Here's a buttered biscuit, Sam Earl," she said, handing the package to the small boy.

"Did you put some jelly on it, Ma?" the small boy said.

"I surely did—Now Sam, stop for the boy to eat when he gets hungry," she said to her husband.

Disposal Of Paper And Glass Pesticide Container

Most pesticide products are sold for home use in paper and glass containers. These containers pose special disposal problems. An important part of pesticide use around the home is the correct disposal of all so-called "empty" containers.

There is a right way to take care of glass pesticide containers. You should make sure that the containers are never used again. Dispose of them in a manner that does not create a hazard to pets and members of the family.

The best way to get rid of glass containers is to wrap them with several layers of newspaper and then break them with a hammer. Then place the package of broken glass in the garbage can or take it to a local supervised sanitary land-fill dump to be buried. You can bury them yourself if you choose an isolated area away from children, pets, and garden areas.

Paper containers present a problem because they are combustible. When you burn the paper containers you also burn the remainder of the pesticide powder within. The pesticide will either go up with the smoke and settle somewhere nearby, or it will remain as a residue within the ashes of the fire.

Burning of herbicide "weed-killer" residue in paper contain-

ers is to be avoided, because the residue will often drift with the smoke and settle on some susceptible ornamental plant or crop nearby. It can do extensive damage.

The safest way to dispose of paper containers is to take them to a sanitation land-fill dump to be buried.

TABLE LINEN TEXTILES

Classic linen tablecloths or lovely linen mats can lend distinction to your table, and are well worth the extra cost and care involved for special occasions. If it's linen you want, be sure that's what you're getting. Many fabrics are woven to resemble pure linen, so check the labels carefully and familiarize yourself with the following terms:

Irish Linen, or Made in Ireland—100 per cent linen fabric of high quality, woven in Ireland.

Belgium Linen — high-quality fabric, 100 per cent linen, woven in Belgium. Many novelty and plain weaves are available. Belgium's "oyster linen," is plain-woven solids and prints and is among the most popular.

Maderia Linen — 100 per cent linen, usually woven in Belgium or Ireland and embroidered in Maderia.

Linon or Linine — Usually misleading terms if you are seeking linen. These fabrics are usually cotton or rayon, woven to simulate genuine linen.

Damask — Reversible cloth usually in a floral design made from two weaves combined into one. For table linens, linen, cotton, and cotton-rayon blends are most frequently used. Damask is usually quite strong, but service depends on fiber and either double or single. The

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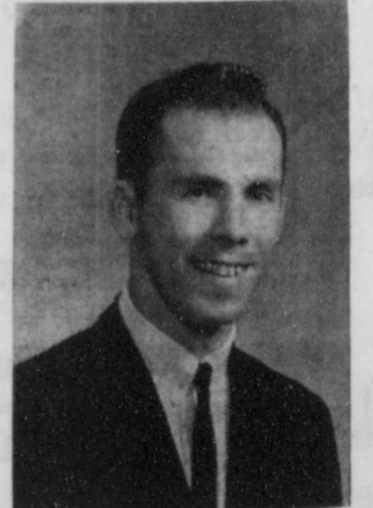

New Regulations Announced For Trot Line Fishing

Some new regulations covering trot line fishing have taken place with new laws passed during the last session of the Texas Legislature. Bennie Schriver, Mills County Game Warden, announced this week.

Schriver stated that changes relating to trot line fishing now in effect that will be of interest to local sportsmen include the following:

MEANS AND METHODS

"It is unlawful to take or attempt to take any fish by any means or method except as specifically allowed in this section. Only the following means or methods of taking fish may be used.

"(a) Not more than one hundred (100) hooks altogether which may be used in any combination of the following: pole and line, rod and reel, artificial and natural baits, hand line, set line or throw line and not more than two (2) trotlines with not more than fifty (50) hooks each; hooks on throw lines and trotlines must be spaced not less than three (3) horizontal feet apart.

"Exception: In the Colorado River in Mills County and in the Colorado River between Brown and San Saba Counties no trotlines may have more than twenty (20) hooks but there is no limit on the number of trotlines employed.

"No trotlines may be placed or set in the vicinity of any public boat dock, or public bathing pier, or public bathing beach, or any public place commonly used as a swimming or bathing area."
