



Disposal Of Paper And

Glass Pesticide Container Most pesticide products are sold for home use in paper and glass containers. These containers pose special disposal problems. An important part of pesticide use around the home is the correct disposal of all socalled "empty" containers.

There is a right way to take care of glass pesticide containers. You should make sure that the containers are never used again. Dispose of them in a manner that does not create a hazard to pets and members of the family

The best way to get rid of glass containers is to wrap them with several layers of newspaper and then break them with a hammer. Then place the package of broken glass in the garbage can or take it to a local supervised sanitary land - fill dump to be buried. You can bury them yourself if you choose an isolated area away from children, pets, and garden areas.

Paper containers present a problem because they are combustible. When you burn the paper containers you also burn the remainder of the pesticide powder within. The pesticide will either go up with the smoke settle somewhere nearby, or will remain as a residue withn the ashes of the fire.
