A contract for junkyard screening has been awarded as follows:

Stephens County, US 180, 1.5 mi east of SH 67;  
Coleman County, US 84 & 283, 7.18 mi north of US 67;

Brown County, US 67, 3.2 mi east of Coleman County Line;  
Mills County, US 84, 0.5 mi north SH 16 & US 84 north of Goldthwaite;

McCulloch County, US 87, 2.0 mi west of Brady;  
Comanche County, US 67, 0.67 mi east of E. Jet. SH 36.

This contract has been awarded to an Arlington, Texas, firm, it was announced in Austin this week by the State Highway Commission.

Forest Park Properties submitted the low bid of \$9,471.25 on the project. The junkyard screening is expected to take 40 working days, according to E. M. Pritchard, District Engineer at Brownwood.

A. T. Jones of Route 1, Hamilton, and L. M. (Mickey) Stephens of Lometa were returned to their posts as directors of the Hamilton County Electric Co-operative in a ballot-by-mail

election poll of the Co-op's members tallied Friday, Aug. 4.

Jones defeated Lester Timmerman of Route 3, Hico, for place number 3 on the board, and Stephens defeated Clyde Glimp of Lometa for place number 5.

More than 1,000 ballots were cast.

Both of the successful candidates are long-time directors on the Cooperative's board. Jones was first elected in 1938 and Stephens in 1952. Stephens is president of the present board and Jones is secretary-treasurer. Arthur Gromatzky of Priddy is vice-president.

New officers will be elected when the board convenes for organization Monday, August 14. Other members of the five-county board are John B. Langford of Lampasas, Keith Brooks of Evant, Melvin Schrank of Pottsville, and Thurman Head of Goldthwaite. Weldon Groves of Hamilton is manager of the Cooperative.

Terms of the directors are for three years. An election is held each year to choose not less than two nor more than three directors.

## Texas Dove Season Regulations Are Now Available For Hunters

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department has released hunting regulations for the mourning and white-winged dove seasons. Digests of these regulations are now available to interested individuals from sporting goods stores, game wardens, and any regional or district office of the Department.

Two basic changes in white-winged hunting have been made since last year. The white-winged dove season has been set to open September 2-3 and September 9-10. The area south of Highway 83 and formerly designated as closed in the southern parts of Starr, Hidalgo and Cameron counties has been opened to hunters.

The retention of one fully-feathered wing on field dressed doves is no longer required except in the 21 counties where the mourning dove and white-winged are hunted concurrently.

Mourning dove hunting in the north zone will begin at noon central standard time (1 p. m.

daylight saving time) on Friday, September 1 and continue through sunset Monday, October 30 with a bag limit of 12 per day and 24 in possession.

South zone hunting of the mourning dove will begin at noon central standard time on September 23 and continue through November 21 except in those counties where white-winged and mourning doves are hunted concurrently. In these 12 counties, the season will close at sunset November 17.

Those 12 early closing counties are: Maverik, Dimmit, La Salle, Webb, Zapata, Jim Hogg, Brooks, Willacy, Kenedy, Cameron, Hidalgo and Starr. In these counties a limit of white-wings and a limit of mourning doves may be taken on each day of the whitening hunt.

**Housewives Asked To Join Fight To Protect U. S. Food Supplies**

H. N. Smith, State Conservationist of the Soil Conservation Service has recognized the need for additional cropland to meet the demand for larger supplies of food brought on by an increasing population. This emphasizes the fact that we must use our land within its capabilities to prevent damaging invaluable cropland. Some land is suited for grass only and some is capable of high production under cultivation. Housewives, office workers, professional people and others as well as farm managers must become more concerned with protecting land, the nation's basic resource for providing food.

President Johnson in his "State of the Union" message said that in order to feed an increasing population both at home and abroad we must increase food production and be prepared to maintain increasingly higher levels of production. He has already taken steps to meet this increasing need. In recent months, for instance, wheat allotments have been increased 30 per cent or about 16.5 million acres in the nation.

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service announced recently that nearly 10 million acres of land under the Conservation Reserve Program will be released from contracts by 1968. This land was formally cropped but because of surpluses that existed several years ago this land was converted to grass under government contract. Most of these acreages could go back to crops, Smith said. Careful selection and management must be practiced in planning the use of this land. Some of it is not capable of being cropped without being damaged. Some may be cropped to a high intensity and is very productive.

The SCS will take special action to inform people of the dangers of cropping some types of land. One needs only to consider the starving populations of India, China, and other countries to learn the tragic mistake of wasting land.

The SCS uses a system of land capability classification in

planning treatment of land so that it may be used to its highest potential within its capability without being damaged. Land capability classification is a broad grouping of different kinds of land into groups with similar problems and limitations. There are eight capability classes—classes I through VIII. These classes are based on limitations for use or risks of soil damage when mismanaged. The risks or limitations become progressively greater from Class I to Class VIII land. Classes I, II, and III can be safely cultivated when managed properly. Class IV land should be cultivated only occasionally or under very careful management. Classes V, VI, VII and VIII may be used for rangeland, wildlife and recreation, but are not generally suited to cultivation.

The system of land capability classification is an aid in planning for the safe and economical use of the land. For instance, Class I land is deep level, crumbly bottomland. There are very few hazards or limitations for its use. It is generally very productive. On the other hand, Class III land has more natural features which restrict its use. When cultivated it requires more careful management and lesser profits should be expected. SCS personnel are trained to help people determine the capability of their land.

### Questions And Answers About Selective Service

Editor's Note: Below are questions now being asked at draft boards. The answers are by Col. Morris S. Schwartz, State Selective Service Director, 702 Colorado St., Austin, Texas 78701. He will welcome your questions.

Q—What must I do to qualify for II-S classification as an undergraduate college student?  
A—You must file a written request with your draft board after June 30, 1967. At the end of each school year you must furnish the board with convincing evidence that you are continuing to pursue satisfactorily a full-time course of instruction.

Q—How is the phrase "satisfactorily pursuing a full-time course of instruction" defined?  
A—An undergraduate student taking a four-year course must earn 25% of the credits toward his bachelor's degree at the end of his first academic year, 50% at the end of his second, and 75% at the end of his third. If five years of study are prescribed by the school for a bachelor's degree in some field, a student must earn 20% of the total credits toward the degree each year.

Q—What is meant by a "student's academic year"?  
A—In determining a student's eligibility for classification in Class II-S (college student), his academic year shall include the 12-month period following the beginning of his course of study.

The affair is in honor of Mrs. Monroe Locke, member of the nursing staff; and Mrs. Franklin Rind and Mrs. Roger Horton of the office staff. The theme for the gathering is — "THINK BLUE."

### Mrs. Rosale Means Trammell Is Blind Postmaster At Big Wells

Mrs. Rosale Means Trammell, a 32 year old mother of an 8-year-old daughter, who serves as Postmaster of Big Wells, differs from all her colleagues who attended the recent Postmasters Convention in Austin. She is the only blind postmaster in America.

Mrs. Trammell, a native of San Saba, was appointed acting postmaster of Big Wells, a community of 1,000 population, in 1962, with permanent appointment in 1964.

The year 1966 proved to be a disastrous one for Mrs. Trammell. In January she lost the sight of one eye and by August she had lost the sight in the other eye.

In September she contemplated resigning from the postal service because she felt she couldn't continue serving Big Wells. Her daughter said to her, "Mommy, you are still the same Mommy," and her husband, John, advised her, "to do what she thought best."

After coming in contact with the State Rehabilitation Center for the Blind Mrs. Trammell, wife of a cattle rancher, decided to make the best of her situation and began to learn the difficult alphabet of Braille. She mastered the reading method in nine months, half the normal time.

Being postmaster is not like working in private industry. The U. S. Post Office is designed to speed public mails. It is a high speed business with thousands of dedicated individuals and Mrs. Trammell had serious doubts about her ability to continue her many responsibilities.

She contacted the Dallas regional office of the Post Office for advice. Regional Director B. M. Meyers and Personnel Director Debbs Hensley decided that

despite her loss of sight she could continue. The news was greeted as "just plain wonderful."

With the aid of a clerk, who sorts, boxes, separates and dispatches the mail, Mrs. Trammell began to forge a new daily routine at both the post office and her home.

She went to New Jersey to get a seeing eye dog, and became acclimated in half the normal six-week period. Jilda, a two-year-old female German Shepherd, joined the Trammell family. "The dog gave me freedom, mobility and independence," she said. "We go to work together."

At the office, she discovered patrons by the sounds they made as they walked in the door.

Permission was granted to remove the glass pane from the postage scales. Braille numbers were added to enable Mrs. Trammell to accept, weigh-in and affix stamps to packages, and "handle the whole operation."

She serves patrons at the window and has learned to use a specially designed template, which enables her to fill out money orders and collect post office box receipts.

She opens the safe with its specially unmarked dial to baffle potential burglars.

She was an accomplished typist before her blindness and now writes all her own correspondence, although her assistant must read all incoming mail.

She is now working on a system which will enable her to keep the daily books and records.

At home with her husband and daughter, Susie, Mrs. Trammell has learned to cope with her blindness. Many activities she formerly participated in have had to be curtailed.

As a normal mother, she attends to the needs of her daughter and husband, and as any mother, she cooks, washes, irons and fixes her daughter's hair.

After work, she "listens" to the news on television each night, listens to her talking magazines and books, visits friends around the small community and is still active in civic affairs.

As for advice to others who are sightless, she opined that "One should never think you can't accomplish anything."

Her numerous accomplishments have caused her to be nominated by her rehabilitation

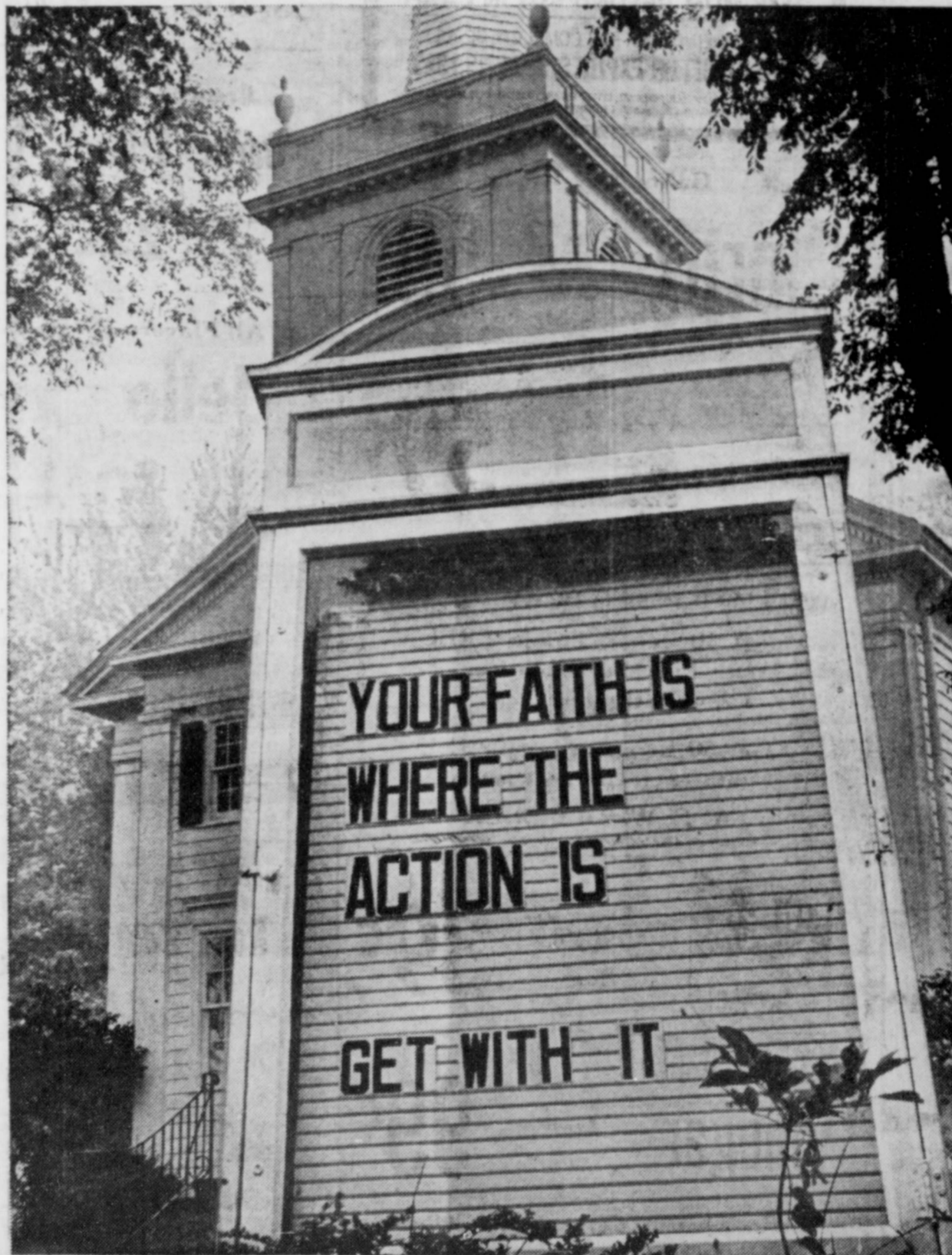

**PUBLIC NOTICE**

**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT**

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 33, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 33. The Accounting Officers of this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant upon the Treasury in favor of any person for salary or compensation as agent, officer or appointee, who holds at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust, or profit, under this State, except as prescribed in this Constitution. Provided, that this restriction as to the drawing and paying of warrants upon the Treasury shall not apply to officers of the National Guard or Air National Guard of Texas, the National Guard Reserve, the Air National Guard Reserve, the Air Force Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the Air National Guard, the Air National Guard Reserve, the Air Force Reserve, and the Officers Reserve of the United States, nor to retired officers of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, and Marine Corps. It is further provided, until September 1, 1969, and thereafter only if authorized by the Legislature by general law under such restrictions and limitations as the Legislature may prescribe, that a non-elective State officer or employee may hold either non-elective offices or positions of honor, trust, or profit under this State or the United States, if the other offices or positions are of benefit to the State of Texas or are required by State or federal law, and there is no conflict with the original office or position for which he receives salary or compensation. No member of the Legislature of this State may hold

any other office or position of profit under this state, or the United States."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment allowing non-elective state officers and employees to serve in other non-elective offices or positions under this state or the United States until September 1, 1969, and thereafter only if authorized by the Legislature, if the offices or positions are of benefit to Texas or are required by state or federal law, and there is no conflict of interest with the original office or position; prohibiting elected officers under this state or the United States from holding any other office or position under this state; and adding members of the Air National Guard, Air National Guard Reserve, Air Force Reserve, and retired members of the Air Force to the list of persons exempted."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment allowing non-elective state officers and employees to serve in other non-elective offices or positions under this state or the United States until September 1, 1969, and thereafter only if authorized by the Legislature, if the offices or positions are of benefit to Texas or are required by state or federal law, and there is no conflict of interest with the original office or position; prohibiting elected officers under this state or the United States from holding any other office or position under this state; and adding members of the Air National Guard, Air National Guard Reserve, Air Force Reserve, and retired members of the Air Force to the list of persons exempted."

**PUBLIC NOTICE**  
Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 49-e, as follows:

"Section 49-e. The Parks and Wildlife Department, or its successor, vested with the powers, duties, and authority which deals with the operation, maintenance, and improvement of State Parks, shall have the authority to provide for, issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed Seventy-Five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000). The bonds authorized hereunder shall be called "Texas Park Development Bonds," shall be executed in such form, denominations, and upon such terms as may be prescribed by law, provided, however, that the bonds shall bear a rate or rates of interest as may be fixed by the Parks and Wildlife Department or its successor, but the weighted average annual interest rate, as that phrase is commonly and ordinarily used and understood in the municipal bond market, of all the bonds issued and sold in any installment of any bonds, shall not exceed four and one-half percent (4 1/2%) interest per annum; they may be issued in such installments as said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, finds feasible and practical in accomplishing the purpose set forth herein.

"All moneys received from the sale of said bonds shall be deposited in a fund hereby created with the State Treasurer to be known as the Texas Park Development Fund to be administered (without further appropriation) by the said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, in such manner as prescribed by law.

"Such fund shall be used by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe by general law, for the purposes of acquiring lands from the United States, or any governmental agency thereof, from any governmental agency of the State of Texas, or from any person, firm, or corporation, for State Park Sites and for developing said sites as State Parks.

all bonds have been fully paid with interest, or after there are on deposit in the interest and sinking fund sufficient moneys to pay all future maturities of principal and interest, additional moneys received from admission charges to State Parks shall be deposited to the State Parks Fund, or any successor fund which may be established by the Legislature as a depository for Park revenue earned by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor.

"All bonds issued hereunder shall after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas.

"Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory nature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon, the following words:

"FOR the amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a new section to be known as Section 49-e of Article III, authorizing the issuance and sale of Seventy-Five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000) in bonds by the State of Texas to create the Texas Park Development Fund to acquire lands for State Park sites and to develop State Parks."

**Herman Jones Of Mullin Enrolls  
Herd In Angus Improvement Program**

Herman Jones, a registered Angus cattle breeder from near Mullin, has enrolled his herd in the American Angus Association's beef improvement program. The herd is scheduled to be classified in September by an official representative of the American Angus Association.

The program, called Angus Herd Improvement Records (AHIR), is designed to help cattlemen do a more professional job of breeding by measuring and recording the type, production and carcass producing qualities of his herd. All AHIR records are kept by the American Angus Association on a Honeywell 400 computer. These records are sent regularly on special forms to each Angus breeder enrolled in the AHIR program. The official classifier will

compare every animal in the herd against the ideal type Angus. Each integral part will be analyzed and a total score ranging down from an ideal of 100 points will be assigned to each heifer, cow and bull over one year of age.

When the classification is complete the American Angus Association's breed improvement department will compile a graph showing how the herd averaged on each part, such as feet and legs, head and neck, rump, loin, etc. A graph of each bull will also be made up on a transparent sheet of acetate. By placing the bull graph on top of the herd graph a breeder can quickly determine if his herd bulls can be expected to sire calves that are better on all points than the average of the herd.
