The Tuesday report showed that 57 have pledged support and will become stockholders in the non-profit organization. More will be added to the list during the next few days as contacts are made and pledges are turned in.

Purpose of the Industrial Foundation is to enlist the support of interested citizens in establishing a Legal Entity to provide information and help for prospective industry to locate here. The Foundation is considered as the only logical step for economic development of the community.

Financial participation is through stockholders on a minimum of \$100 per share with persons, or firms, allowed to take any number of shares. This is payable in cash, or ten per cent with pledge and the balance on a 30, 30, 30 basis which is payable on call from the board of directors as need may arise.

After all contacts have been made and all pledges turned in for the goal of \$25,000.00 capitalization a meeting of stockholders will be called to elect a board of directors. Then application will be filed with the Secretary of State for charter.

Officers will be elected from the board of directors.

Contract Is Let For Highway 84

A contract for 9.548 miles on US Highway 84 in Mills County has been awarded to a Nacogdoches, Texas firm, it was announced in Austin this week by the State Highway Commission.

R. W. McKinney & T. L. James & Co. submitted the low bid of \$1,175,019.92 on the project. Grading, structures base and asphalt concrete paving from Brown County Line to Mullin is expected to take 200 working days, according to E. M. Pritchard, District Highway Engineer at Brownwood.

Paul Henderson, Resident Engineer at Goldthwaite will be in active charge of the project while it is under construction.

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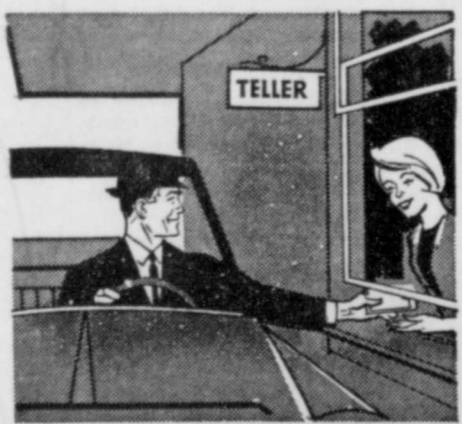
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Janan Gray And Phillip Carr Say Vows In Church Ceremony

Hicks Returns To San Diego From Vietnam

(M0891) USS BON HOMME RICHARD (CVA-31) (FHTNC) August 22 — Airman Jimmie D. Hicks, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Don Hicks of 4511 Avenue "F," Austin, Texas, and husband of the former Miss Rosanita Allen of Route 1, Mullin, Texas, returned to San Diego, California, aboard the attack aircraft carrier Bon Homme Richard when it completed an eight-month assignment as part of a carrier strike force off the coast of North Vietnam.

Operating from "Yankee Station" in the Gulf of Tonkin, the carrier launched its pilots on a total of 11,500 strike and combat support missions and averaged one major air strike every other day. She made a total of 10,865 arrested landings during her deployment. Her pilots are credited with destroying 14 enemy jet planes.

Pilots from the carrier were the first to locate and then demolish vital thermal power plants near the capital city of Hanoi, North Vietnam. In three successive air strikes, "Bonnie Dick" pilots reduced North Vietnam's electrical power production by an estimated fifty percent.

Targets for the carrier strike pilots included airfields, trucks, railroads, missile complexes, highways, bridges, strategic supply routes and numerous other sites. Carrier pilots delivered a total of 5,506 tons of ordnance on military targets on North Vietnam before the ship ended her third Vietnam combat tour.

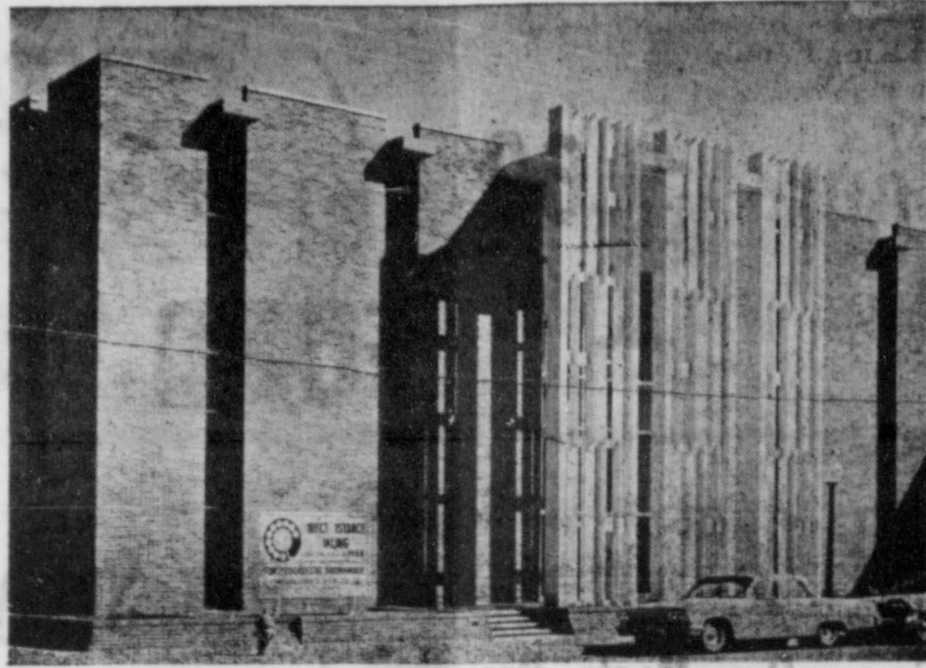

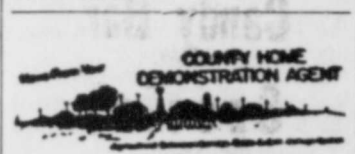

Table coverings offer endless decorative variety, but function is all-important when choosing cloths and mats. Table coverings should protect table surfaces and lessen noise as well as pay color and texture compliments to china and flatware. Measure the table—allow about 10 inches for overhang, more for formal cloths.

Coordinate napkins with cloths in texture and color for formal events. At other times napkins may coordinate or contrast. Place mats, in a multitude of designs and solids, lend themselves to casual setting; some suit even elegant luncheons. Lace cloths for special dinners come in cotton, polyester and rayon and in machine washable iron-free blends of synthetic fabrics. Many are machine washable, but check the label for care directions. For everyday use, lace designs reproduced on vinyl are available. Vinyl-cotton laminates are practical for outdoor use. They are waterproof, stain-resistant, and can be wiped off with a damp cloth.

Check quality before buying so you'll be sure of good service from table linens. Read all labels and tags carefully, and be sure you are buying what you want. Check to see that fabric is vat-dyed or color-fast, and for assurance of minimum shrinkage, especially on floor-length circular cloths. Any metallic threads woven into the fabric should be washable and non-tarnishable. Look for special finishes that offer resistance to both water and oil-borne stains.

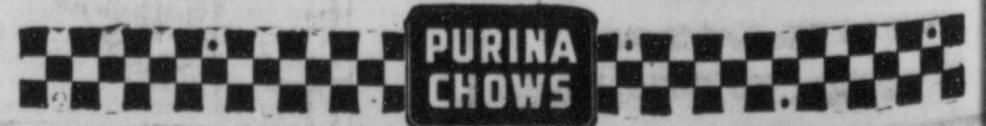

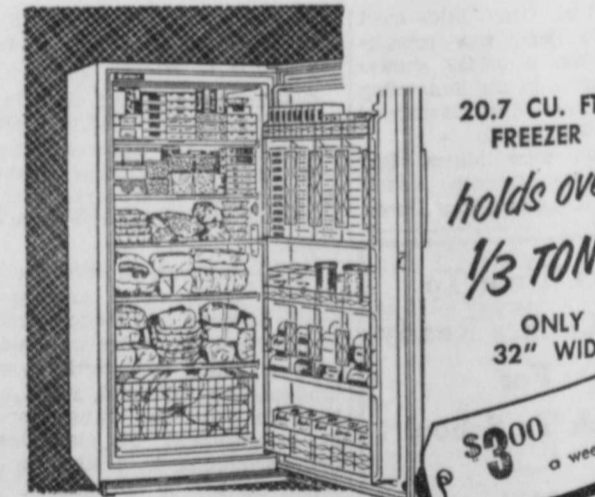

Change In Laws Effecting Accidents In Parking Lots

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, reminded Texans today of the change in the Motor Vehicle Laws which makes accidents occurring on parking lots reportable to the DPS.

Under the new section of the law, which became effective August 28, any accident involving a motor vehicle should be reported to the local police agency for immediate investigation and a written report filed with the DPS within 10 days. Forms for reporting are available from any police agency.

Accidents occurring on shopping center parking lots and those in areas where a particular store has provided free parking space are reportable, provided that any injury or death has occurred or there is a total of \$50 or more in property damage. The only accidents which are exempted under the new law are those occurring on private residential driveways or on a privately owned parking lot where a fee is charged for parking.

Parents To Accompany Teenagers To Court Under New Safety Laws

A little publicized provision of the State's new traffic safety laws requires that one or both parents of juvenile traffic offenders appear in open court with the youthful law breakers.

The law, which became effective August 28 also states that juveniles can plead guilty only in open court before the judge and that parents or guardians must be present before the teen is convicted or fined.

"In today's busy world it is difficult for many well-meaning parents to keep up with the actions of their teen age children. This provision of the new law should benefit conscientious parents and their youngsters," Russell H. Perry, President, Association of Texas Fire & Casualty Companies said when commenting on this phase of the new traffic laws.

"Up until now," Mr. Perry added, "teens could be arrested and fined without the parents

knowledge. Teens could and did build terrible driving records. In many cases, the parents could have called a halt to the dangerous driving; if only they had known what was going on." Mr. Perry also pointed out that the driving records of all members of a family household effect auto insurance rates under the Texas Driving Insurance Plan.

"A bad driver, either young or old, male or female can cause a family's insurance rates to climb. At least under this new law, parents will have an opportunity to do something about their teenage children's driving habits.

"By knowing when their youngsters are arrested for traffic violations, parents will be able to keep their children out of further trouble. Certainly, they will be able to keep their insurance rates at the lowest possible level," Mr. Perry concluded.

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Senator J. P. Word Appointed To General Investigating Committee

Lieutenant Governor Preston Smith today named Senator J. P. Word of Meridan as a member of the important Senate Investigating Committee. The committee was created by Senate Resolution 39, adopted during the recent Regular Session of the 60th Legislature.

The five-member committee is charged with the duty of inquiring into affairs and activities of governmental departments and investigating law violations. The resolution calls for a report by the committee to the 61st Legislature when it convenes in 1969.
