Eagles Lose To Armadillos 32-13; To Host Clifton Cubs Friday Night

Goldthwaite's traditional season opener with San Saba ended in a 32-13 defeat for the Eagles on the Armadillos' field Friday night. In what began as a tight game, the Eagles held the Dillos until the end of the third quarter when San Saba smashed ahead with three final touchdowns.

Ted Roberts, Kent Geeslin, Ronnie Aldridge and Mike Conrad served as temporary Captains for the Eagles.

San Saba received the ball in the end zone on the kick-off, and on the second down with 53 seconds gone in the game, Frankie Miller (31) broke through the strong Eagle line to run 74 yards for the first touch-

down of the game. A pass play for the extra points was good, making the score 8-0.

Halfback Gary Warlick received the ball on the next kick-off and charged through to the Dillos' 27 yard line before he was tackled.

Larry Pierce recovered a San Saba fumble on a fourth down punt, putting the Eagles back on the 43 yard line. After a series of first downs the Eagles pushed ahead to the Dillos' three yard line, and on a fourth down with one yard to go, Quarterback Ted Roberts handed-off to Warlick who dove across the goal line for a TD. The kick by Warlick was good to put the Eagles one point behind, 8-7.

Late in the first quarter Mike Conrad gained 18 yards for the Eagles with good blocking from Sam Campbell.

In the second quarter Mike Wright gained extra yardage including two first and tens. The Eagles were forced to punt on a fourth down giving the Dillos the advantage with a first down. With the second quarter half gone Phil Ledbetter (12) passed 55 yards to Keith Shahan (81), who crossed the goal to move the score up to 14-7. The pass attempt for the extra points failed.

Soon after, the Eagles triumphed their second touchdown, a 17-yard run by Gary Warlick. The extra point kick attempt failed, leaving the Eagles trailing by one point, 14-13.

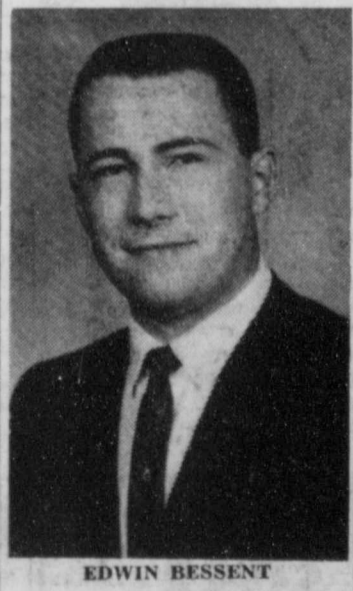
Early in the second half, Dale Straley showed up with some excellent tackling, along with Lynn Berry, a great asset to the Eagles.

A third touchdown came for San Saba in the end of the third quarter, when Bill Watkins received a 15 yard pass from Phil Ledbetter, making the scoreboard read 20-13. The Eagles succeeded in blocking the kick for an extra point.

Striving hard to get back in the game, Mac Rowlett and Ronnie Aldridge were successful in holding the Dillos back until John McRorey broke around the end for an 8 yard TD. Another failure for extra point put the Dillos ahead 26-13.

Ted Jones, playing center, and Danny Humphries, Kent Geeslin and Paul Kirkpatrick tried hard to keep the Dillos from making their last touchdown, a 30-yard pass to Shahan, which came at the end of the fourth quarter. The kick was no good leaving the final score of the game 32-13.

Coach Leslie Johnson had the following to say about the game and the Eagles, "They were still playing ball at the end of the game. Since they were adjusting to a new system and a new coach, it is just a matter of time and of ironing out a few mistakes. We are looking forward to a good game with Clifton Friday night."

Bennett Creek Directors Seek Easements For Floodwater Dams

Bennett Creek Water Control and Improvement District directors are seeking easements for four floodwater dams.

The four dams planned will give an estimated \$22,000 reduction in annual flood damages.

Elgin Smith, Work Unit conservationist, with the Soil Conservation Service, reports that Bennett Creek's request for a watershed protection program is one of 188 requests that have been made. Out of the 188 requests, 132 have been approved as feasible for a program. Eight of these watersheds have been completed, 16 are under construction and 24 have construction planned pending readiness of the local people. Bennett Creek is in this last stage.

WCID Director J. S. Owens received a letter from Congressman Omar Burleson in which he said, "Because of your personal interest in the Bennett Creek watershed, I want to report that this morning I appeared before the House Committee on Public Works in behalf of the project and urged its approval by the committee which, as you know, is required to make it eligible for the Government funds being sought (#879,232)." In a later letter Congressman Burleson reports,

"While final action by the Public Works Committee has not been taken on the Bennett Creek project, it is in good shape." Because in Texas only 5 to 8 watersheds can start construction each year and that Bennett Creek is vying with about 24 other watersheds for construction, the WCID directors report that they feel they must be ready when their project is approved. For this reason WCID Chairman Jim Soules reports the directors have set October 1 as the date to have the necessary local land-rights instruments completed.

The dinner, an annual affair of the club has faculty members, their wives or husbands in attendance, was held in the Elementary School lunchroom.

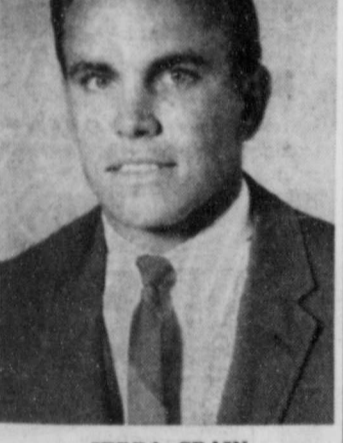

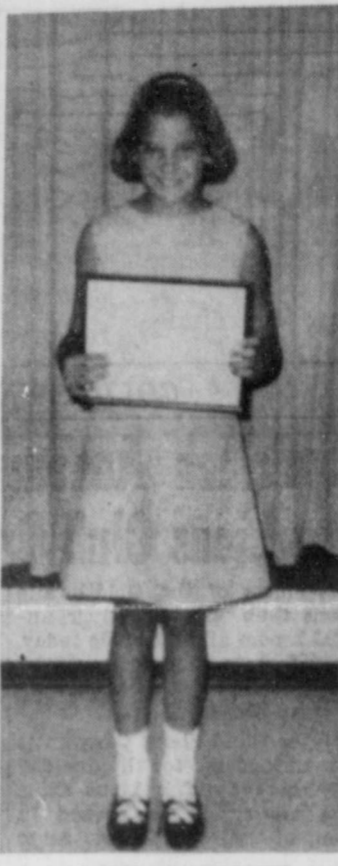
Frank Taylor has joined the army at Fort Worth and is in the Sixth Cavalry.

The city council held a special meeting Monday night, at which time the tax rate was fixed, as follows: General fund, 25¢; water works, 25¢; street 10¢; permanent improvement, 8¢, making a total of 68¢ on the \$100 valuation for all purposes. This is doubtless as low a rate as can be shown by any city in Texas and is far below the average rate, notwithstanding a system of water works has been installed, cement street crossings have been built, much street improvement has been made and other improvements have been made and expenses have been met. The mayor, members of the council and other city officials are entitled to the gratitude of the public for their economical management of the city's financial affairs.

**U. S. Bond Sales
Reported By Duren**

Savings Bond sales through July 1967 in Mills County totaled \$37,512, according to a report received today from Mr. W. P. Duren, Chairman of the Mills County Savings Bonds Committee. This is 42 per cent of the county's 1967 goal of \$90,000.

During the first seven months of 1967 Texans purchased \$98,079,008 in Series E and H Savings Bonds. Included in this state total was \$225,409 for the new "Freedom Shares" which were offered for the first time on May 1. Freedom Shares can be purchased only in combination with Series E Savings Bonds on a regular purchase plan through banks or payroll savings.

Nationally, during the first seven months of 1967, cash sales of Series E and H Savings Bonds

totaled \$3,027 million, which is an increase of 4 per cent over sales a year ago and an 11-peak for seven months.
