Cross Asks Emergency Funds for Flood Victims

Special appeal for disaster funds for victims of hurricanes and floods in South Texas has been issued by the Cross, according to announcement by Glynn Collier, secretary of the Mills County Chapter.

Reports indicate that unusually heavy expenses are called for in connection with providing relief to the victims throughout Texas and Northern Mexico. A special call is necessary for disaster relief contributions.

Collier stated that contributions may be turned in at the County State Bank or they may be given to any representative of the Red Cross chapter.

Improvements at Courthouse

More improvements have been made in connection with the program of repairs and remodeling project that has been going on for some time at Mills County Courthouse.

Projects that have been completed are a new tile floor in the Commissioners' courtroom and installation of Venetian blinds in the Commission room and the offices of County Judge and Ex-Officio County School Superintendent.

Cecil Egger announced that he included painting all of the woodwork and walls and the ceiling in the courthouse with the exception of the fourth or fifth floor. This was the first time in the history of the county that the walls and ceiling were not painted when remodeling was constructed.

Eagles Tie Mustangs 6-6; Go To Mason Friday Nite

The GHS Eagles and the Mustangs battled to a 6-6 draw at Marble Falls Friday night in a game that saw the Eagles plagued with 10 fumbles.

The Mustangs' only score came early in the first quarter when Quarterback Paul Carmona passed 26 yards to halfback James Shaw, following the recovery of an early Eagle fumble. The pass play for extra points failed, making the score 6-0, with only three minutes gone in the game.

Scoring seemed to be at a standstill through the second and third quarters, until Eagle Ted Roberts powered his way to the goal line from 35 yards out, to make the lone Eagle touchdown, with only two minutes left to play. Due to a fumbled snap, Gary Warlick's kick for an extra point failed, bringing the score to an even 6-6.

The crowd was on its feet and excitement was high as the Eagles came close to making two more touchdowns in the last two minutes.

Larry Pierce broke loose and made a spectacular run of 48

yards to the 11-yard line. Then with only 40 seconds left to play and the Eagles' last chance to win the game, Gary Warlick narrowly missed a 47 yard field goal, ending the exciting ball game in a 6-6 tie.

Eagle Coach, Les Johnson, said, "It was a real fine game, and several of our boys looked promising. Danny Spradley, Gaylon Jernigan, Charles McCasland, Paul Kirkpatrick, and Kent Geeslin all did fine jobs on defense; and our outstanding offensive players were Danny Humphries, Byron Harper, and Gary Warlick."

Johnson further stated that Mike Conradt suffered a broken leg in the game with Clifton and will be out of action about three weeks, when he can start kicking. It will be about five weeks before Conradt will really be able to play.

House PW Committee Approves Bennett Creek Watershed Project

WASHINGTON, D. C. — Congressman Omar Burleson (D-17th) and O. C. Fisher (D-21st) have jointly announced House committee approval of the Bennett Creek watershed project to be constructed in Mills, Hamilton, and Lampasas Counties.

Approval of the project came on a voice vote in the House Public Works Committee. Both had strongly supported approval of the project.

Part of the nationwide up-

stream soil conservation and flood prevention effort, the Bennett Creek project will bring flood prevention and watershed protection to 105,600 Texas acres.

There will be four floodwater retarding structures. Total storage capacity will be 14,688 acre-feet.

The Texas congressmen pointed out that the project will make available \$679,282 of federal funds while state and local funds will come to \$238,570.

Burleson stressed the high degree of local participation in the project. In his testimony, Congressman Burleson said, in part:

"The Bennett Creek watershed will provide watershed protection and flood prevention to agricultural lands, farm improvements, roads and bridges in an area of some 105,000 acres. Being within the Brazos River Basin, it is noteworthy that the improvement in soil and cover conditions will reduce sediment to flood reservoirs below, thus prolonging their life."

"It is a project to which I can and do give my wholehearted support, and I recommend it for your favorable consideration."

With the house committee action, it remains only for the Senate committee to act likewise and for appropriations to be sought next year to put the plan into operation.

Governor Calls Amendment Election

Proclamation
BY THE
Governor of the
State of Texas
41-1210

TO ALL TO WHOM THESE
PRESENTS SHALL COME:

BE IT KNOWN THAT I, John Connally, Governor of the State of Texas, do hereby order a Special Election to be held throughout the State of Texas

on November 11, 1967, and notice is hereby given to the people as required by law. The County Judge of each county is directed to cause said election to be held on such date in each precinct in the county in the manner required by law.

Said SPECIAL ELECTION IS ORDERED for the purpose of adopting or rejecting the following Constitutional Amendments submitted by the 60th Legislature of Texas at its Regular Session in 1967:

1. The constitutional amendment allowing counties to put all county taxes into one general fund.

2. The constitutional amendment to permit municipalities, other political subdivisions, and state-supported entities located within hospital districts to participate in the establishment, maintenance, support, or operation of mental health services, mental retardation services, or public health services.

3. The amendment to extend the Veterans' Land Program by authorizing the sale of bonds to increase the Veterans' Land Fund for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the Armed Services of the United States between September 16, 1940, and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the present armed conflict in Viet Nam, which amendment would amend Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, and provide for an additional \$200,000,000 in bonds, such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law.

4. The Amendment to the Constitution authorizing each county in this state to pay the medical bills, doctor bills and hospital bills for all Sheriffs, Deputy Sheriffs, Constables, Deputy Constables and other county and precinct law enforcement officials who are injured in the course of their official duties; providing that the county shall continue to pay the maximum salary of these officials while they are incapacitated, but such salary payment shall not continue beyond the terms of office to which they were elected or appointed.

5. The amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a new section to be known as Section 49-e of Article III, authorizing the issuance and sale of Seventy-Five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000) in bonds by the State of Texas to create the Texas Park Development Fund to acquire lands for State Park sites and to develop State Parks.

6. The constitutional amendment allowing non-elective state officers and employees to serve in other non-elective offices or positions under this state or the United States until September 1, 1969, and thereafter only if authorized by the Legislature, if the offices or positions are of benefit to Texas or are required by state or federal law, and there is no conflict of interest with the original office or position; prohibiting elected officers under this state or the United States from holding any other office or position under this state; and adding members of the Air National Guard, Air National Guard Reserve, Air Force Reserve, and retired members of the Air Force to the list of persons exempted.

Mills Included With 50 Other Counties Named

The U. S. Department of Agriculture last Wednesday offered haying and grazing privileges on reserve crop land taken out of production in Mills County in which drought has severely reduced pasture and ranch production. It was announced by Sen. Ralph W. Yarborough.

Mills County is in addition to fifty previously named Texas counties taking part in this program.

Haying and grazing privileges on retired acreages set aside under conservation reserve and crop land adjustment programs for land diverted under the annual commodity program are offered under emergency conditions to help prevent liquidation of livestock herds.

This action gives the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committees authority to permit livestock grazing and hay harvesting on land diverted from crop production in Mills County. Downward adjustments will be made in payments to farmers if these lands are grazed or harvested for hay.

Diverted Acres May Be Grazed October 1, 1967

Farmers who diverted acreage under the 1967 feed grain and cotton acreage diversion programs will soon be able to graze this acreage without losing program benefits, according to the Mills County ASCS Office.

Authority was recently granted to ASC State Committees to extend to 7 months the free grazing period for livestock on lands taken out of production under the annual commodity diversion program.

The starting date for such grazing, therefore, will be October 1, 1967 marking the end of the period during which the no-grazing provision was in effect under the diversion programs.

Extension of the free grazing period will give farmers an additional month each year for grazing livestock on these diverted croplands. It will permit program participants to glean their fields without the expense of erecting fences between lands on which they have grown crops and those they have diverted.
