Plant pansies before 1st of November for winter and spring blooms.

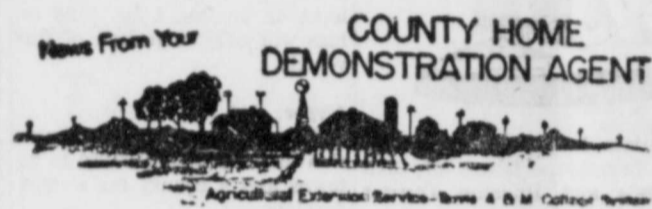

Clean out your seldom used storage areas such as attics, basements and garages. Get as much of the clutter in your house and out buildings OUT as is possible. Watch for oily rags and dispose of them. If you burn your own trash, be sure to have a safe place to do this, and a burner that will keep the sparks from flying away to dry grass or other spots that might catch from a spark.

Many consumers judge the quality of fresh fruit and vegetables by "what looks good." But in the industry, more than human judgment enters the picture in determining quality. A refractometer is often used to measure the interior sugar and solids of melons. A mechanical thumb performs a classic pinch test of tomatoes and peaches. 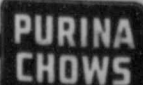

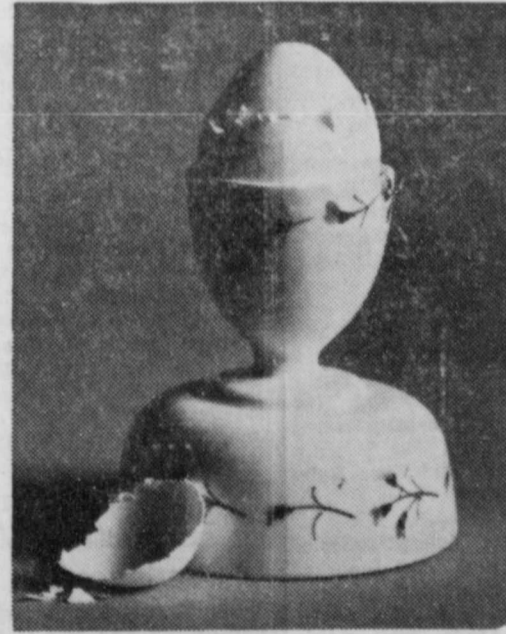

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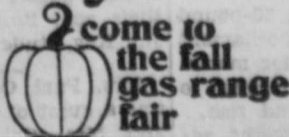

AUSTIN, Tex. -- Gov. John Connally dropped a political bombshell on the state capitol scene by reportedly telling 45 top supporters in a meeting at the Mansion that he has about made up his mind not to run for re-election.

Word of his unexpected reluctance promptly leaked to newsmen. Connally confirmed that the meeting was held and the possibility of a fourth term was discussed.

"My mind is not finally and irrevocably made up," he stated. "I have a pretty firm idea what I am going to do, but I am not prepared to announce the decision. I may decide within the next few days, but I think it will be longer—two weeks or later."

U. S. Sen. Ralph Yarborough's name figures increasingly in the list of prospective gubernatorial candidates following a disagreement between Connally and the senior senator over flood aid.

Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr has stated repeatedly he might run for governor if Connally does not.

House Speaker Ben Barnes says he will run for lieutenant governor regardless of Connally's ultimate decision.

Court Races Spotlights
State high court races are assured more than ordinary attention in 1968 primaries by the early announcements of three incumbent judges that they will not seek re-election.

Court of Criminal Appeals Judge Wesley Dice is the latest to reveal plans to step aside at the end of his present term. States Attorney Leon Douglas immediately announced as a candidate for the place.

Earlier announcements were made by State Supreme Court Associate Justices James R. Norvell and Meade F. Griffin that they will retire after next year. Potential candidates to succeed them include Austin District Judge Tom Reavley, Chief Justice James G. Denton of the Amarillo Court of Civil Appeals.

Miss Stokes Named To Distinction List At Southwestern U

Miss Margaret Ann Stokes of Goldthwaite was one of the 12 freshman students at Southwestern University named to the school's distinction list for the fourth time, according to Dr. F. Burr Clifford, Dean of Arts and Sciences.

This achievement represents recognition for academic performance during the Spring semester of 1967.

Miss Stokes is a graduate of Goldthwaite High School and daughter of Col. and Mrs. M. Y. Stokes, Jr.

New Inspection Items

Auto inspections, expanded by the new State law, are underway at 5,500 stations and will continue through April 15.

Don't be surprised at the additional items covered by the new \$1.75 fee. They will include:

- Required front seat safety belts on every car which has anchorages as part of the manufacturer's original equipment.

- Checking for "lash" or "play" in steering control. Vehicles will be rejected if steering wheel can be turned more than two inches without front wheel motion. It must also be possible to turn the wheels from full right to full left without jamming or binding. Vehicles with power steering must be checked with power on, and if fluid is below recommended level, car will not pass inspection.

- Wheels with defective or bent rim flanges or those with loose or missing bolts, nuts or lugs will cause rejection of the vehicle.

Airport Aid Allotted

Texas Aeronautics Commission has allocated \$467,260 to 24 towns and a county for airport development.

- Set a November 22 hearing on a Negro's suit against a Houston club manager who refused to serve him and allegedly jerked a plate out of his hand.

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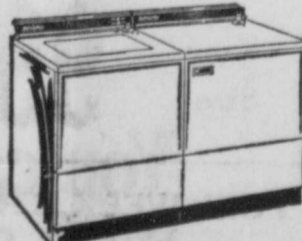

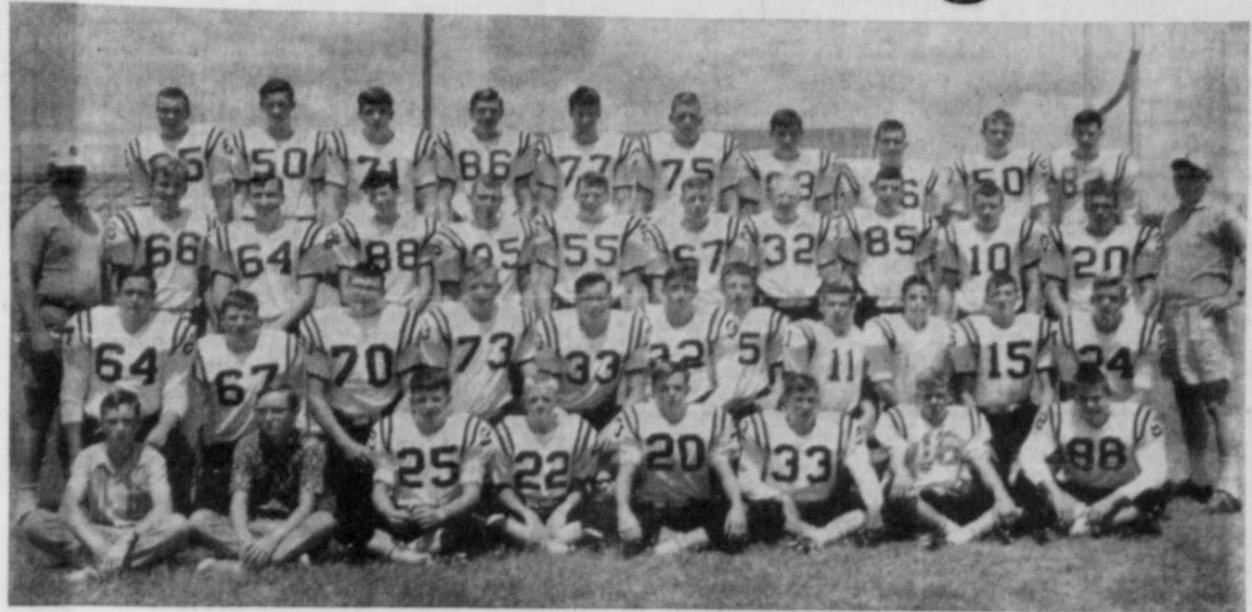

Santa Fe Plans To Discontinue Passenger Trains Thru Goldthwaite

The two Santa Fe passenger trains serving Goldthwaite will soon be discontinued if approved by regulatory agencies where approval will be requested in a few days by the Railroad.

These two trains, 75 and 76, east bound and west bound, operating between Houston and Clovis, New Mexico are included in the 16 trains, or 32 runs, for which Santa Fe will file proposals for authority to discontinue in the near future. The group includes Transcontinental, Regional and Texas trains operating over a wide area.

All mail will soon be removed from Santa Fe Railway's passenger trains, because of recent far-reaching decisions by the United States Post Office Department, according to John S. Reed, president.

Second, third and fourth-class mail will shortly be moving in Santa Fe's fast freight service,

tion of all 2nd, 3rd and 4th class mail at such a reduced rate it is no longer feasible or practicable to handle this mail in passenger train service.

"Nearly \$35 million of annual mail revenue, the backbone of

our passenger trains, will no longer be available to help support these trains, which already marginal or operate at a loss. The loss of mail revenue is a sudden devastating blow," rail president said.

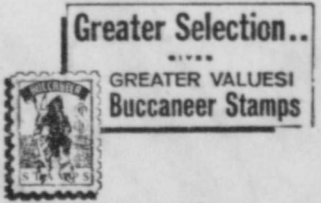

Fire Prevention Week Observance Urged By Fire Chief And FB Prexy

Observance of National Fire Prevention Week, October 8-14, in Mills County is being urged by both rural and city fire prevention leaders.

Goldthwaite Fire Chief Anle Morgan and Wayne Henry, president of the Mills County Farm Bureau, urge citizens of Mills County to pay special heed to the observance this year by taking steps to prevent costly fires.

"We urge everyone to develop good fire safety habits which include such things as care with matches and smoking, good housekeeping to get rid of rubbish, proper use of electrical fuses, appliances, and extension cords, and a constant general awareness of the ways fires start and how to avoid them," the local fire chief said. He added that fires killed over 12,000 people and the cost was approximately \$2 billion in the United States last year.

The local Farm Bureau President said the Fall and Winter months are the most vulnerable times of the year for rural fires. "When fire occurs on farm or rural property, damage is three to six times greater than in the average city fire," Mr. Henry said.

He stated further that Farm Bureau has two programs designed to help curtail fire losses. The local organization, in cooperation with the Texas Farm Bureau, sponsors the attendance of local volunteer firemen at the annual Firemen's Training School each July in College Station. The state and local Farm Bureau organizations also pay \$75 to local fire departments for each call made in rural areas involving fires of Farm Bureau insured property.

In addition to these programs, County Farm Bureau sponsors graphic 45-minute fire prevention demonstration presentations over one hundred times a year before schools, civic clubs, other groups by the TFB and Department. More than 100 dry chemical fire extinguishers have been sold to Farm Bureau members as a continuing program of rural fire prevention.
