Eagles Open District Play Friday With 47-6 Victory Over Rising Star To Host Cross Plains Buffaloes For Homecoming Game This Friday

WEATHER REPORT

Goldthwaite received .31 inch of rain Sunday when a mild cool front moved across Central Texas.

This brings the total rainfall measured here for the month of October to .56 inch, according to official report from Weatherman Harry Allen.

Coach Les Johnson's GHS Eagles opened their 1967 district play last Friday night bringing home a resounding 47-6 victory over the Rising Star Wildcats.

The Eagles scored in every quarter against Rising Star for their district play win and their second win this year.

Quarterback Ted Roberts ran for two touchdowns and passed for one more while Larry Pierce ran for three touchdowns to lead the way for the Eagles.

The Wildcats failed to score until last few seconds of the game.

Roberts passed to Campbell for 42 yards to the Wildcat 10 to set up Goldthwaite's first play dirt for the evening. Roberts made eight of the final yards on the next two plays before Pierce pushed across from two yards out.

Gary Warlick kicked the extra point to make it a 7-0 lead. Warlick accounted for five extra points during the night.

Later in the first quarter Roberts hit Lynn Berry for 10 yards, then chalked up 25 yards in two runs for the second Eagle TD.

During the second quarter the Eagles tallied two more times with QB Roberts leading in both. He passed to End Mike Wright for one score then wormed his way through the line on a QB sneak for about 50 yards for another payday.

The score stood at 28-0 at the half time.

During the third period the lone Eagle touchdown was on a six yard blast by Danny Spradley.

Pierce took over again in the final period running 30 yards for one touchdown and then coming back for a 35 yard sprint for the second.

Warlick converted after the first Pierce score.

The only bright spot for the Wildcats during the entire game came when they made their last minute touchdown while the Eagles held a wide advantage in statistics for the night.

New Wing Announced For Heritage Home

A new wing for Heritage Home, in Goldthwaite, was announced Tuesday by Mr. and Mrs. A. K. Arnold, co-owners and operators of the nursing home here.

The new addition will consist of 10 additional rooms providing for 20 more beds. It will be added to the center of the present building at the back, extending west between the two present wings on the U-shaped building.

The entire new wing will be devoted to providing the additional 20 bed capacity which will bring the total number of beds available in Heritage Home to 80.

All other facilities of Heritage Home are of sufficient capacity to take care of the additional beds that will be added in the new addition, according to Mr. and Mrs. Arnold.

Construction is to get underway this week, with some of the

dirt work already done in preparation for actual construction.

The job is expected to be completed in 90 days.

Heritage Home was first opened here in July 1964 with 42 bed capacity. In 1966 a new wing was added providing an additional 18 beds for a capacity of 60. The new addition being started now will be opened in early 1968, bringing the total number of beds to 80.

Garden Club Park Committee Announces More Improvements

More improvements at Mills County Park in Goldthwaite by the Garden Club Park Committee were announced this week.

Mrs. M. F. Horton, chairman of the committee, stated Tuesday that the cactus garden at the park is now being worked on as the latest project of the Garden Club in developing the overall park plan.

The committee has planted 20

varieties of Cactus, eleven of the varieties are from Mexico.

Work on the garden will continue as more rocks and plants are donated to the project, according to Mrs. Horton.

Permits will be issued to qualified landowners or the appointed representatives between 8 a. m. and 5 p. m. on the date and location as indicated for each county. Permits must be drawn in the county where they are to be used.

Section 6 of Senate Bill 295, passed by the last legislature prohibits the Department from issuing permits later than 10 days prior to the opening of the deer season. If the landowner or appointed representative does not draw permits before the deadline, then permits cannot be issued for the 1967 hunting season.

In the Southeast and Northeast Texas Regulatory Districts, the population surveys have not been completed. If surplus deer are found, then times, dates, and locations will be announced.

Judge John Mathis of Brenham spent the first of the week in attendance upon district court.



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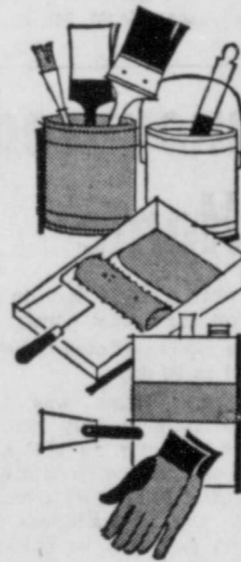

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Provisions Of 1968 Crop Program For Upland Cotton Are Announced

Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman today announced the provisions of the 1968 crop program for upland cotton.

The principal changes from the 1967 program are:

- 1—The required diversion for farmers who wish to be cooperators in the acreage diversion program has been reduced from 12.5 per cent to 5 per cent of the regular allotment. The payment rate will be 10.76 cents per pound.
- 2—The payment rate for voluntary diversion (up to an additional 30 per cent of the allotment) has been reduced to 6 cents per pound.
- 3—The rules for measuring cotton planted in a skip-row pattern have been changed to those rules used from 1962 through 1965.
- 4—Major program provisions which remain the same as for 1967 are:
- 5—The national acreage allotment remains unchanged.
- 6—A referendum will again be held by mail (Dec. 4-8) to determine if the program will be operative.

AUSTIN, Tex.—A multi-million-dollar Texas tidelands case once more is before the highest court in the land. It involves 37,000 acres of oil-rich offshore territory.

Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin and his aides have presented the state's arguments to the U. S. Supreme Court.

Key question is whether Texas as part of the permanent harbor system, Jetties in question are at Port Isabel, Port Mansfield, Port Aransas, Matagorda, Freeport, Galveston and Sabine Pass. They extend as far as four and a half miles into the Gulf of Mexico.

Decision for Texas would add four and a half miles to the three marine leagues (10.35) offshore boundaries allowed by the federal submerged lands act of 1953.

New case is the latest round in legal exchanges dating back to 1960. Then the Supreme Court held that the federal government had paramount rights over submerged lands. Later the submerged lands act reversed the decision and granted Texas title to all lands reaching three marine leagues into the Gulf.

Present controversy arose when the Texas School Land Board advertised a lease sale of mineral rights under a 1965 Supreme Court decision which established the California coastline as including "outermost permanent harbor works that form an integral part of the harbor system."

U. S. Government filed an injunction to prevent Texas from leasing, contending that the Texas shoreline was defined by the 1845 annexation agreement under which the state joined the union.

Texas claims jetties are a part of the permanent harbor system and to determine where the shoreline was in 1845 would be impossible.

POLITICAL POT BOILS

Political pot continues to boil at the state capitol:

As expected, 29-year-old House Speaker Ben Barnes announced for lieutenant governor. He said his move should not be interpreted as a tipoff to Gov. John Connally's plans. He stated that he would run as an independent, with no "ticket" affiliation with Connally or anyone else. Barnes immediately opened his statewide campaign headquarters in Austin.

Governor John Connally left for Canada and the National Governor's Conference in the Virgin Islands without revealing his decision as to retiring or running for a fourth term.

Lt. Gov. Preston Smith already is campaigning for governor. He predicts that Governor Connally will not run for an unprecedented fourth term and submits as evidence Connally's 1962 pledge not to do so.

Former Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr called on all three—Connally, Smith and Barnes—to run for re-election. It is a letter to Connally he said he may run for governor if Connally doesn't or for lieutenant governor if the governor seeks a fourth term.

Supreme Court races continue to draw increasing attention. Declared candidates are Houston District Judge Sears McGee, Texarkana Court of Civil Appeals Associate Justice Matt Davis, Amarillo Court of Civil Appeals Chief Justice James G. Denton and Austin District Judge Tom Reavley.

WATER BOARD MEETS

Texas Water Development Board met here Monday to review a variety of loan eligibility matters and a bond ordinance.

Titus County Fresh Water Supply District No. 1 is seeking eligibility finding for a \$2,200,000 loan to pay its share of the cost of the Titus County Dam and Reservoir near Mt. Pleasant.

City of Thorndale wants a \$130,000 loan to provide municipal water from a Soil Conservation Service reservoir.

Guadalupe-Blanco River Authority seeks a \$1,100,000 loan for facilities to provide Fort Lavaca with water from the Guadalupe River.

Wichita County WID No. 2 requested a \$1,500,000 loan for rehabilitating Lake Kemp.

San Patricio Municipal Water District requests formal approval of a \$900,000 loan application

for treatment, pipeline, pumping and water storage facilities.

Terrell asks approval of a bond ordinance so the city can go ahead with its application for a \$750,000 state loan for the first phases of a water improvement program which contemplates taking water from nearby Lake Tawakoni.

PARK GRANTS APPROVED

Three new federal grants for park improvement or development have been announced by the Parks and Wildlife Commission.

City of Diboll will receive \$174,500 (to be matched by equal amount of local funds) for buying 175 acres of land and to develop the city park.

A grant of \$211,214 from the federal land and water fund program will go to Waco for a \$422,428 jointly-financed 35-acre park on the banks of the Brazos River.

A \$69,550 grant will go to Webb County toward a \$139,100 park program, covering 218 acres, four miles east of Laredo on the banks of Lake Casa Blanca.

COURTS SPEAK

A proposed state constitutional amendment to wipe out the poll tax as a voting requirement and require annual voter registration is headed for a U. S. Supreme Court test.

State Supreme Court declined to alter an earlier ruling that an election which approved the amendment last November should stand.

AFL-CIO challenged the outcome of the vote, contending that voters did not realize that an annual registration feature was involved. Union promises to take the case to Washington.

Texas high court agreed to review the case of four Houston lawyers who contend that free legal service to the poor, under the War on Poverty, program unfairly deprives attorneys of fees. Court of Civil Appeals had upheld the district court's summary judgment against the group.

Court of Criminal Appeals affirmed the 99-year prison sentence assessed Goliad rancher Shaper Taylor on charges of killing his 38-year-old former "girl-friend" and her elderly husband.

Austin District Judge Mace Thurman Jr. is presiding over the court of inquiry here to look into allegations of malpractices by home improvement contractors and their agents.

VOTER REGISTRATION

Texas Secretary of State John L. Hill is warning persons who are 60 years of age or older and live outside cities of 10,000 or more population that this year, for the first time, they must register to vote.

Hill said that a special provision has been made for such persons to register during the period October 1 to January 31, 1968 at the county tax office or by mail to the county tax assessor collector.

73 RUN FOR LEGISLATURE

Seventy-three have filed as special election candidates for six vacant House seats and one Senate vacancy. Seven elections are scheduled for November 11, general election day, when six proposed constitutional amendments will also be voted on.

Twenty-one seek the senate place long held by the late Sen. George Parkhouse in Dallas.

Seventeen filed for the House post of the late Rep. Ira Kohler of Houston; 12 for former Rep. Lee Duggan Jr.'s House seat; nine for former Rep. Pat Cain's

Travis County place; six for the Cameron County seat of former Rep. Maurice Pipkin of Brownsville; five for the post formerly held by Otha Birkner, representing Wharton and Matagorda Counties; and three for the place vacated by former Rep. Jesse George who served Bailey, Cochran, Hockley, Terry and Yoakum Counties.

Duggan, Cain, Pipkin, Birkner and George resigned to accept other offices or positions.

BEACH STUDY LAUNCHED

Speaker Ben Barnes named three coastal House members to serve on a joint interim committee which will make a new study of Texas beaches.

They are Reps. Rufus Kilpatrick of Beaumont, Travis Peeler of Corpus Christi and Russell Cummings of Houston.

Three Senate members (selected by the lieutenant governor), the land commissioner, highway department chief engineer (or their representatives) and a citizen named by the governor also will serve.

Purpose of the body is to facilitate development of beaches as public recreational areas and tourist attractions. Group also will determine the best method of obtaining rights-of-way and easements for needed highway and parking areas.

Tommy Head Is Awarded American Farmer Degree At FFA Convention

Tommy Head, sophomore student at Tarleton State College, was one of 49 outstanding FFA members from Texas selected to receive the highest award given by the Future Farmers of America organization—The American Farmer Degree.

Mr. Head is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Thurman Head of Goldthwaite.

He was one of six FFA members from Texas Area VII to be so honored at the 40th Annual National FFA convention held in Kansas City, Missouri, last week.

Members were awarded the degree at the Wednesday afternoon, October 11, session of the National Convention.

Future Farmers of America, a national organization of vocational agriculture students studying in public secondary schools throughout the nation, Boys and Girls members on entering high school and may retain their membership until they are 18 years of age or three years after graduation. 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Tragedy At Sea Is Reported Capt. Richard C. Luiken

It began as a routine rescue flight from Viet Nam to Travis A. F. B., California on the morning of May 11, 1967. The aircraft, a C-141, was flying over the Pacific. The radio operator and the navigator both heard the chilling words, "May Day, May Day, May Day." The navigator, Captain Richard C. Luiken, is the husband of Mr. and Mrs. Norman Goldthwaite.

with flares and food and water. But all this was to small avail—many lives were lost—in fact most of the crew went down to their deaths. Two freighters were nearby—one Russian and the other Japanese. Both picked up survivors—a total of five. Many bodies were also pulled from the churning seas where the waves were 15 to 18 feet high and the wind blowing in raging gales. Another C-141 aircraft from Travis A. F. B. was nearby—but could only have spent 45 minutes over the sinking ship so they were unable to be of assistance.

The plane on which Captain Luiken is Navigator then was forced after four hours to head for Adak Naval Air Station in the Western Aleutians to refuel. The weather there was clear—their first day of sunny weather in 28 days. From there they took on sufficient fuel to fly to Elemendorf A. F. B. near Anchorage, Alaska where they refueled for the last leg of the trip back home to Travis A. F. B., some 50 miles north of San Francisco. He related these experiences via telephone to his wife's parents, the Harms, Wednesday evening, October 11.

The communications, set up and maintained by the C-141, might have served to save a few lives, according to Captain Luiken, but he commented upon the sad feelings of himself and the rest of the crew in their attempts to save fellow human beings from death. He said it was extremely doubtful if many of the crew of the vessel managed to board the life rafts due to the extremely rough seas—much less to grab from the water the flares and radio gear and food and water dropped to them by the Navy aircraft.

Each crew member of the C-141 out of Travis did his utmost to be of service—and each came home with the sad thought of doing his part and saving at least a few lives in this tragedy at sea. Captain Luiken mentioned the feeling of frustration they all had—and said it was rather like being "Oh so near and yet so far."

Medicare Claims For First Year

From national data released for the first twelve months of Medicare, Glen McNatt, in charge of the Brownwood Social Security Office, has abstracted these figures: A total of 4,403,797 claims from hospitals, covering 58,566,577 days of hospital care, were approved. The average hospital bill per patient was \$599, or \$45 per day. Medicare paid \$2,119,918,000, which was 80.3% of the total hospital charges.

Patients are responsible for the first \$40 of hospital costs, for personal comfort items, and for excess of private room cost over semi-private rate unless medically necessary.

On the supplemental medical insurance part of Medicare (the part costing \$3 a month premium), the year's experience shows 10,115,568 bills were paid by Medicare, totaling \$509,990,000.

Mr. McNatt called attention to the fact that the deadline date is December 31, 1967, for filing claims for medical expenses incurred during the last half of 1966.

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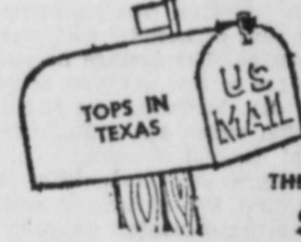

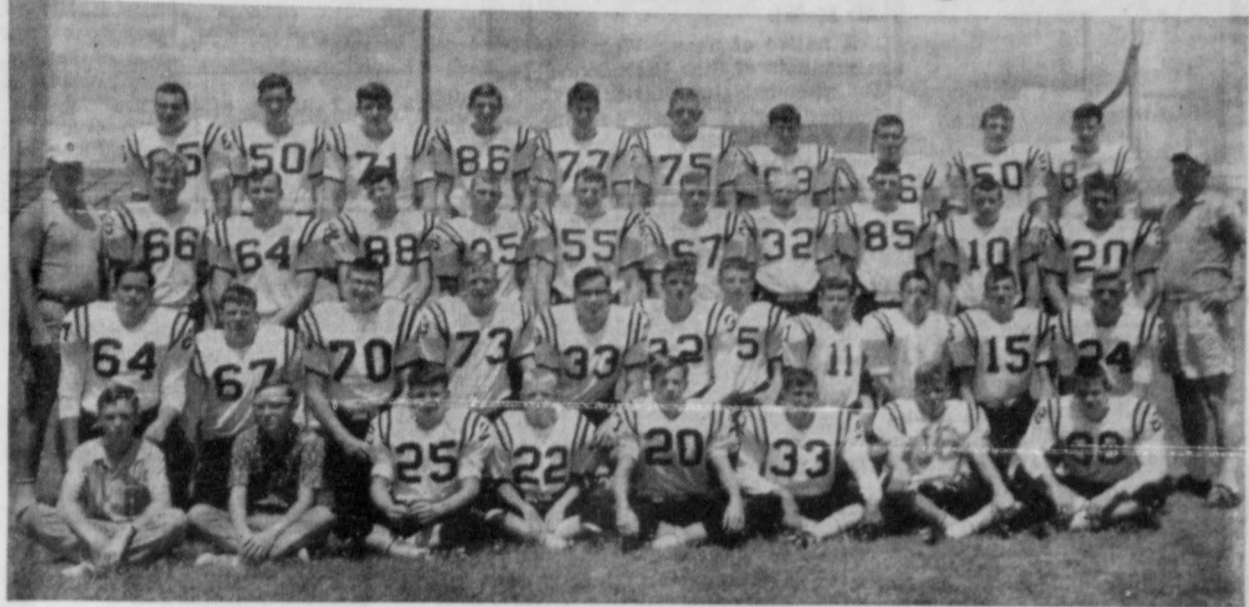

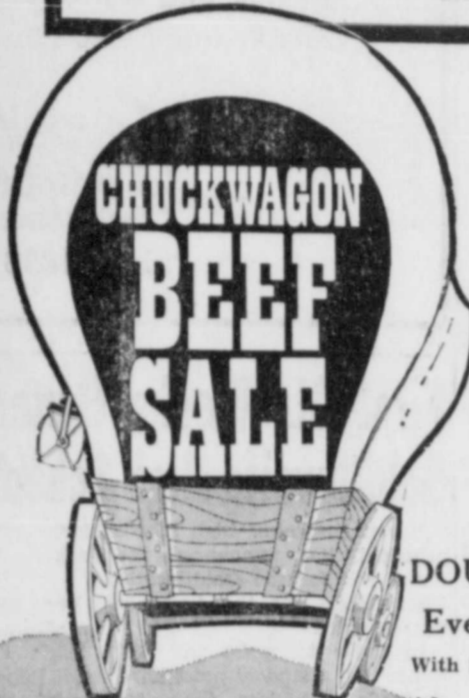
