Eagles Host Santa Anna Friday Nite For District 9-A Championship Game

The Goldthwaite Eagles brought home a whopping 40-0 victory from the Early Longhorns Friday night, for their third straight district win. The Eagles are now preparing to meet the Santa Anna Mountaineers for the district championship battle here this Friday night, November 10. Game time is 7:30 p. m.

As Coach Les Johnson stated, "The game belongs to the team that wants it the most. Our boys are full of fire and vigor, and they will be ready for Santa Anna."

The game Friday night against Early showed a 34-0 half-time lead for the Eagles. Ted Roberts scored first on a one-yard plunge early in the game, and Gary Warlick's kick was good for an extra point. Warlick made four successful extra point kicks in the game.

Mike Conradt got into the scoring action on a 45-yard pass play from Ted Roberts. Mike Wright then smashed through for a 1-yard TD. Warlick broke around left end for a spectacular 60-yard sprint, after which Roberts followed suit with a 35-yard run, giving the Eagles their 34-point lead.

The second and third units played throughout the rest of the game, and displayed some very fine football tactics. Eric Wright accounted for the Eagles' last touchdown, a sprint from the 25-yard line.

"All three of our units looked good Friday night. They showed some fine blocking and play execution. They carried out their assignments well, and we're pleased with everyone of them," commented Coach Johnson.

Wayne Massey Receives Bronze Star Medal And Promotion To Lt. Colonel

Wayne Massey, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jess Massey, of Goldthwaite, has been presented the Bronze Star Medal for meritorious service in connection with operations in the Republic of Vietnam and he has been promoted from Major to Lt. Colonel, in the Marine Corps, it was learned here this week.

Massey enlisted in the Marine Corps on May 26, 1943. Mrs. Massey is the former Bobbie Obenhaus of Goldthwaite and they have a daughter, Cathy, 9 years old.

In connection with his service and being presented the Bronze Star Medal the following story appeared in the Henderson Hall Newsletter, of Headquarters Marine Corps, Arlington Virginia, on October 27, 1967.

"Major William W. Massey was presented the Bronze Star Medal with Combat 'V' last week by Brig.-Gen. E. E. Anderson, Deputy Chief of Staff (RD&S) for meritorious service in connection with operations against insurgent communist (Viet Cong) forces in the Republic of Vietnam.

Maj. Massey consistently performed his myriad demanding duties in an exemplary and highly professional manner.

Exhibiting exceptional initiative and resourcefulness, he supervised the numerous activities under the cognizance of the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-1, contributing significantly to the combat readiness posture of the section.

Through his extensive knowledge of staff organization, he was able to coordinate his functions with those of other staff

Six Proposed Amendments To Be Voted On Saturday

Six proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution will be decided by voters this week Saturday, November 11.

Mills County voters, along with all other Texans, will go to the polls this Saturday to cast their ballots on the proposed amendments in the special election.

Polls will open at 8 a. m. and will remain open until 7 p. m.

There has been a change in the form of marking the ballot this year whereby voters will be able to mark their X in a box indicating their vote "For" or "Against" the various propositions.

The six amendments to be voted on this year will appear

on the ballot in the following order:

1. The constitutional amendment allowing counties to put all county taxes into one general fund.

2. The constitutional amendment to permit municipalities, other political subdivisions, and state-supported entities located within hospital districts to participate in the establishment, maintenance, support, or operation of mental health services, mental retardation services, or public health services.

3. The amendment to extend the Veterans' Land Program by authorizing the sale of bonds to increase the Veterans' Land Fund for the purpose of pur-

chasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the Armed Services of the United States between September 16, 1940, and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the present armed conflict in Viet Nam, which amendment would amend Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, and provide for an additional \$200,000,000 in bonds, such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law.

4. The Amendment to the Constitution authorizing each county in this state to pay the

J. D. Priddy is having residence in the southern portion of the city modernized when it is completed he and wife will move back to the ranch.

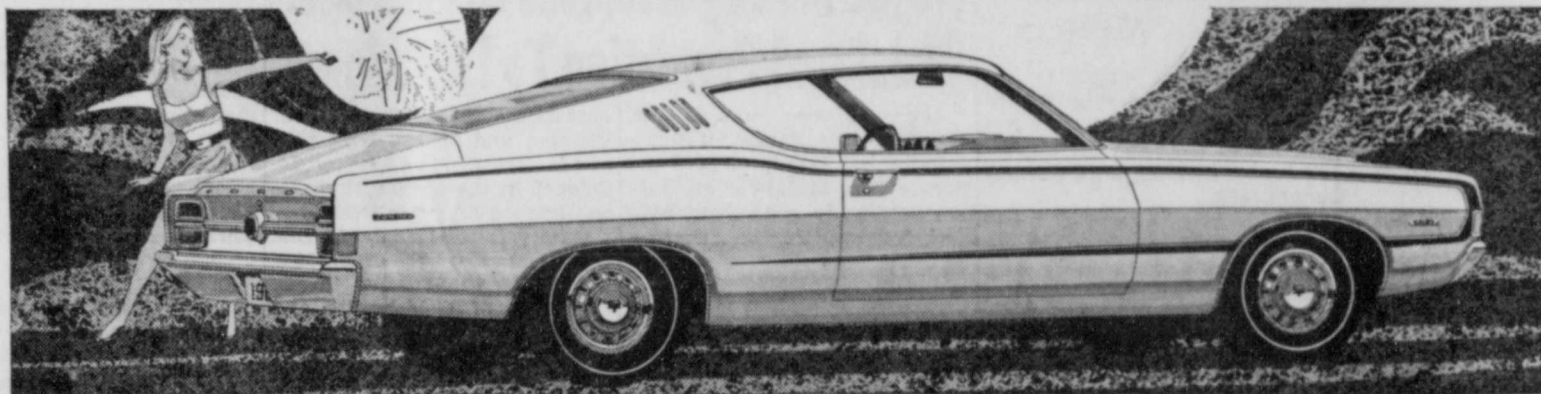

Good For Veterans, And
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HOW THE NEW VETERANS LAND PROGRAM HELPS VETERANS:

Each veteran would be permitted to purchase under a contract of sale \$10,000 worth of land with a 5 per cent down payment, appraisal and service fees of \$50, and legal and recording fees not to exceed \$100. Interest charged the veterans on past purchases has not exceeded 4 1/2%. Payments would be semi-annual and repayment would be amortized or retired over a period of 40 years. Any tract of land consisting of a minimum of 15 acres may be purchased under the program, there being no requirement as to use. A veteran may also select a tract costing more than \$10,000, but he will be required to pay the difference between the purchase price of the land and \$10,000, which is the maximum amount that would be paid by the Veterans Land Program for each veteran.

Mrs. Hastings, who is president of Montana Ministers' Wives Fellowship, is active in women's work, and writes and presents a variety of programs for both women and youth.

The family will be moving to the Crow Reservation the first week in November where they will be serving approximately 1,800 Crow Indians.

The Baptists have the major protestant work among the Crows, as they were invited by the Indians to begin work on their Reservation 63 years ago. At that time they gave the Home Mission Society several acres of land where the church, fellowship, and recreation halls are now located.

The mission home is also located on this same land, and is the center of much of the community life of this agency.

The government also maintains an Indian Hospital and Agency for directing Indian work at the Reservation.

About one mile from the Agency is the Custer National Monument, where General Custer's battle site is located.

The Crows were always known as a friendly tribe to the white people, and gave protection to the early white settlers and explorers who traveled through Montana. They still are faithful to many of their customs and family traditions. One of these is that a mother-in-law never speaks to a son-in-law and a sister-in-law does not speak to a brother-in-law.

Also as a part of their mission work the Hastings will be serving a church in Hardin which is 12 miles from the agency. Their two older children, Howard, 16, and Louise, 14, will attend High School in Hardin. The two younger children, Lydia, 11, and Linda, 8, will attend school on the Reservation. After November 1, the Hastings' new address will be Box 436, Crow Agency, Montana 59022.

The Hastings will be commissioned at the National Convention of the American Baptist Convention next June (1968) in Boston, Massachusetts.

Voters To Decide Veterans Land Bill

The Veterans Land Program of Texas was enacted shortly after the close of World War II to show the appreciation of the citizens of Texas for the time spent in the service of this country by Texas veterans. The program was designed to enable a veteran to purchase a piece of the land with only a small down payment, low interest rates, and payments covering a period of 40 years.

Since its inception in 1949, the Veterans Land Program has been successful and has made a profit for the people of Texas over and above its cost of operation.

A new Constitutional Amendment to the Program, to be voted on November 11, 1967, would give the Veterans of Vietnam an opportunity to buy land in Texas, along with other veterans who fought in World War II and the Korean War. It would include any veteran who served from September 1940 to the date of formal withdrawal of troops from the present armed conflict in Vietnam. All veterans who entered the service from Texas and are presently living in Texas would be permitted to purchase under the program. All those who have moved to Texas and have resided in Texas for at least five years prior to making application to purchase under the program would also be eligible.

The new measure will also provide a Veteran's Land Fund of \$200,000,000 for veterans to acquire up to \$10,000 in land at 5% down, maximum forty year term. The current rate is 4 1/2%. Under this program, the state purchases the land and keeps the title. A contract of sale is given to the veteran. He may transfer the contract after three years if he so desires or he may pay off the loan. If the amendment is approved on November 11, the Veterans Land Board will start purchasing land for the veterans of Vietnam and other wars.

Station-To-Station Rates Reduced On Interstate Long Distance Calls

General Telephone Company of the Southwest and Southwestern States customers will share in a \$120 million annual savings for telephone users in the nation.

The seventh long distance rate reduction in five and one-half years went into effect November 1.

The new rates will apply to station-to-station interstate long distance calls (between states).

Under the new after-midnight economy rate schedule, customers will be able to call the furthest point in the U. S. — excluding Hawaii and Alaska — for 75 cents, not including overtime charges and taxes.

Savings also will be realized by customers because the lower priced rate periods have been extended to include more hours. Station-to-station calls will have day rates Monday through Friday from 7:00 a. m. until 5:00 p. m. (Present rates cover a period from 4:30 a. m. until 6:00 p. m. daily.) However, calling periods will not be charged for intrastate messages (within the state).

New evening rates will be in effect from 5:00 to 7:00 p. m. Monday through Friday, and the night rate is scheduled to be Monday through Friday from 7:00 p. m. to 7:00 a. m., plus all day and night on Saturdays, Sundays, New Year's Day, July 4, Labor Day, Thanksgiving, and Christmas.

The special late night economy rate has been added for customer-dialed station-to-station calls between midnight and 7:00 a. m., except for coin telephone calls, third-number billing calls, collect calls, and calls on which time and charges are reported. However, exchanges that do not have Direct Distance Dialing equipment also will enjoy the new late night rates on station-to-station calls.

If a call during this time does not qualify for the special night economy rate because of previously mentioned conditions, it will be billed at the regular night rate. The special late night economy rate permits a call to the furthest point in the U. S. — excluding Hawaii and Alaska — for 75 cents, not including overtime charges and taxes.

Person-to-person calls will have day rates Monday through Friday from 7:00 a. m. until 5:00 p. m., plus all day and night on Saturdays and Sundays.

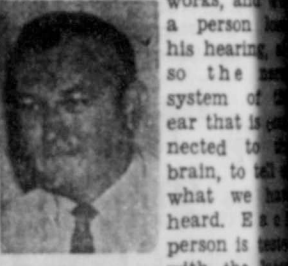

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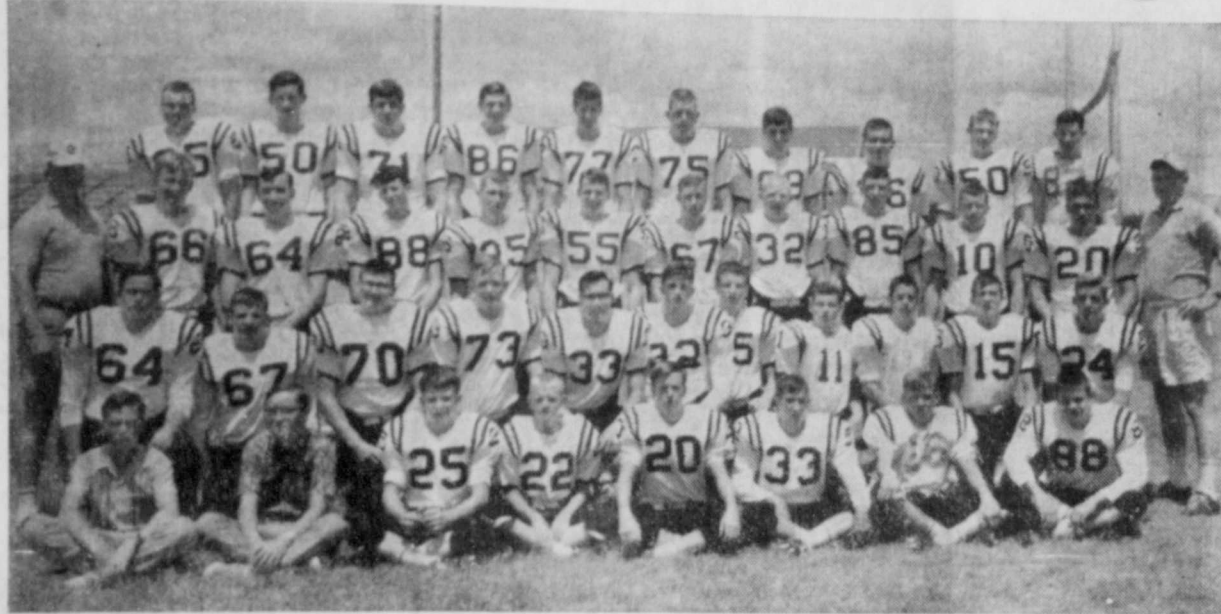

City Approves New Phone Rates After Compromise With Company

The City Council meeting in regular session Monday night at the City Hall approved new rates for local telephone service to Southwestern States Telephone after a compromise agreement was worked out with company officials.

Agreement was reached after the council and Carroll Rowbotham, Service Consultant, for the telephone company, went over proposals and counter-proposals to work out a solution.

The new schedule will give the company an increase in rates, but it will be short of the original request as presented by the company. This reflects some savings to local telephone users.

The request for new rates for local telephone service was presented to the council by Carroll Rowbotham, who pointed out at the time that this was the first request for change in rates the company has made to Goldthwaite in six years. The last increase in local phone rates was in 1961.

New rates will become effective on January 1, 1968.

Under the new schedule the rate for business one party will change from \$9.00 to \$12.00; business two party will change from \$7.25 to \$10.25 with business extension remaining the same at \$1.75.

Residence one party will change from \$5.75 to \$6.75; residence two party will change from \$4.50 to \$5.00; residence four party will change from \$3.50 to \$4.50 and residence extension will remain the same at \$1.25.

A comparison with other cities in the area shows that the newly approved rate for Goldthwaite is in line with, or a little below, a number of the towns. Towns covered in the comparison include Brownwood, Bangs, Blanket, Zephyr, Richland Springs, Brady, Kingsland, Lake Brownwood, Willow City and Menard.

medical bills, doctor bills and hospital bills for all Sheriffs, Deputy Sheriffs, Constables, Deputy Constables and other county and precinct law enforcement officials who are injured in the course of their official duties; providing that the county shall continue to pay the maximum salary of these officials while they are incapacitated, but such salary payment shall not continue beyond the terms of office to which they were elected or appointed.

5. The amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a new section to be known as Section 49-e of Article III, authorizing the issuance and sale of Seventy-Five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000) in bonds by the State of Texas to create the Texas Park Development Fund to acquire lands for State Park sites and to develop State Parks.

6. The constitutional amendment allowing non-elective state officers and employees to serve in other non-elective offices or positions under this state or the United States until September 1, 1969, and thereafter only if authorized by the Legislature, if the offices or positions are of benefit to Texas or are required by state or federal law, and there is no conflict of interest with the original office or position; prohibiting elected officers under this state or the United States from holding any other office or position under this state; and adding members of the Air National Guard, Air National Guard Reserve, Air Force Reserve, and retired members of the Air Force to the list of persons exempted.
