Bennett Creek Receives Final Authorization

The Senate Public Works Committee has informed Senator Ralph Yarborough of final authorization for a water-shed project for the Bennett Creek watershed, it was announced today by the Senator's office.

Bennett Creek is a tributary of the Lampasas River. It begins five miles north of Goldthwaite and flows southeast and crosses the river in northern Lampasas County.

The water-shed covers an area of 165 square miles. The project provides \$917,900, of which the federal share will be \$458,950 to build four flood warding structures plus land treatment measures, which will benefit some 165 farmers and ranchers.

Coach Les Johnson's GHS Eagles battled their way into the state Class A football playoffs against Ranger with a 14-0 win over Santa Anna here Friday night.

The win reversed last year's verdict when Santa Anna surprised Goldthwaite with a championship game victory. The tilt left the Eagles 6-3-1 for the year and 4-0 in District 9-A play, while Santa Anna slipped to 8-2 for the year and 3-1 in the league.

Eagle back, Larry Pierce, opened the way for Goldthwaite's first score. After teammate Mike Wright received a leg injury late in the first period, Pierce turned on the steam and sprinted 74 yards to account for more than a third of the Goldthwaite yardage gained. Pierce needed only two more plays to gain the last 15 yards and put the Eagles ahead 6-0, on the first play of the second quarter.

Gary Warlick's kick was good giving the Eagles a 7 point lead that stood up through halftime.

With less than one minute left in the first half, Mike Conratt made the first pass interception of the night, and picked up 35 yards for the Eagles. The Eagles kicked to begin the last half, and on Santa Anna's third down pass, Conratt intercepted again and sprinted 26 yards for the second Eagle touchdown. Warlick added another good kick, to give the Eagles their 14-0 winning score.

Gary Warlick, the Eagles' field goal kicker, made two attempts Friday night from 23 and 35 yards out. The last attempt was blocked, and Santa Anna tackle Len Wristen grabbed the ball and took it 45 yards before Sam Campbell put him down.

Kent Geeslin proved to be quite a defensive standout with his tackling for the night. Helping him were Eagles Ronnie Aldridge, Lynn Berry, Danny Spradley, Sam Campbell, and the Quarterback, Ted Roberts, who also turned in some good running yardage.

Coach Johnson has expressed his pride in the Eagles as a team that works together. "I am real proud of our boys for the job they did Friday night with their teamwork. Our defense was outstandingly good." Johnson also reported that Mike Wright will be ready to play against Ranger.

In commenting on the bi-district game he stated, "We are looking forward to playing Ranger Saturday night. They have a real good ball club, but then so do we!"

GHS Eagles Meet Ranger Bulldogs In Brownwood For Bi-District Game

The Goldthwaite High School Fighting Eagles, district 9-A champions for 1967, will meet the Ranger Bulldogs, district 10-A champions for 1967, in the bi-district play-off this Saturday night, November 18, at Brownwood. Game time is 7:30 p. m., in Lion Stadium.

Details for the bi-district play-off were worked out last Saturday morning, when officials from both schools met at the Riverside Motel in Brownwood. George Jordan, of the Brownwood Chamber of Commerce, was host for the meeting. Those who attended from Goldthwaite were Superintendent LeRoy Beard, Principal Hoyett Browning, Coach Les Johnson, and Assistant-coach Carl Davis. Charles Conratt attended the meeting in order to check the stadium layout and availability of pre-game tickets.

Conratt, who is in charge of ticket sales, announced that reserve seat tickets and student general admission tickets for the game went on sale Tuesday and will be on sale here at the Production Credit Association, until noon on Saturday.

Advance sale reserve seat tickets are \$2.00 and student general admission tickets for the student section are \$1.00. All tickets sold at the gate will be \$2.50. This includes student tickets.

Everyone is urged to pick up their reserve seat tickets at the PCA office before noon on Saturday. Those who have not purchased their reserved seat tickets are reminded to do so as early as possible — while some are still available.

New Law Will Effect Local Voting Boxes

New legislation passed by the last session of the Texas Legislature will effect some voting boxes in Mills County when placed into effect, it has been announced by County Judge Cecil Egger.

Under the new regulations all voting boxes that do not have a voter registration of at least 50 will be consolidated with other boxes, unless the box is the only one remaining in the Justice of the Peace Precinct.

Mills County now has 13 voting boxes, after several of the smaller ones were annexed to other existing boxes some time ago. Some existing boxes are getting very small.

These changes will probably be made in August 1968, according to Judge Egger.

He said that the Commissioners' Court considered the proposition last August and deferred action until next year to give residents of the various boxes an opportunity to get out and register during the current registration period which ends on January 31, 1968.

The 1968 feed grain program, announced recently by Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman, takes vigorous action to produce total supplies in order to strengthen prices, according to Lee W. Tabor, Office Manager, Mills Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

The target is to divert from production about 30 million acres — 10 million more than were diverted in 1967 — in order to reduce feed grain stocks and gain much stronger prices.

Mr. Tabor listed the following key provisions of the 1968 feed grain program:

1. Farmers will divert to conserving uses 20 per cent of their base acreage of corn and sorghums in order to qualify for price-support loans and payments. No diversion payments will be made for this minimum diversion, except for small farm acreages—the same as in 1966 and 1967.

2. Additional acreage may be diverted up to a total of 50 per cent of the base or 25 acres, whichever is larger. The acreage diversion rate for this voluntary diversion will be 45 per cent of the total price support (loan plus price support payment) times the farm's established yield. In the 1967 program, there was no payment for diversion except from bases of 25 acres or less.

3. For small farms (with a base of 25 acres or less, a diversion payment will be available at 20 per cent of the total support rate times the farm yield for the first 20 per cent acreage diversion, and at the regular 45 per cent payment rate on the remaining acreage diverted to a conserving use.

4. As in 1967, producers with corn-sorghum base acreages up to 125 acres will have the option of temporarily reducing this base down to 25 acres and still be eligible for the small farm provision provided that no corn or grain sorghum is planted for harvest on the farm and the 25 acres are diverted to a conserving use.

5. Price-support loan levels under the 1968 program will be the same as in 1967—for corn, a national average of \$1.05 per bushel; for sorghum, a national average of \$1.61 per hundredweight. Price-support payments will continue at 30 cents per bushel for corn and 53 cents per hundredweight on sorghum, based on the planted acreage up to one-half the farm base times the projected yield.

6. Substitution provisions relating to wheat and feed grain acreage (including barley and oats-rye) will be continued.

7. Barley is not included in the 1968 feed grain program, and producers of this crop will be eligible for barley price-support loans regardless of the acreage planted.

8. Price-support loan levels for feed grain crops not covered by the feed grain program are national average of 90 cents per bushel for barley, 63 cents a bushel for oats, and \$1.02 a bushel for rye.

Mr. Tabor said that further program details will be announced prior to signup time. The questions still to be answered concern the availability of advance payments, the production of substitute crops on diverted acreages, and whether soybeans may be planted on corn-sorghum acreage in 1968 as in 1967 without loss of the feed grain price-support payments.

Signups for participation in the 1968 feed grain, wheat, and cotton programs will take place concurrently during February and March 1968.

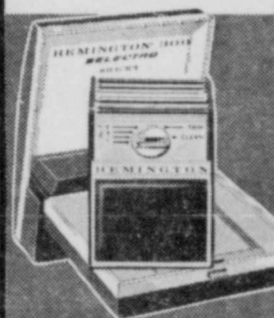

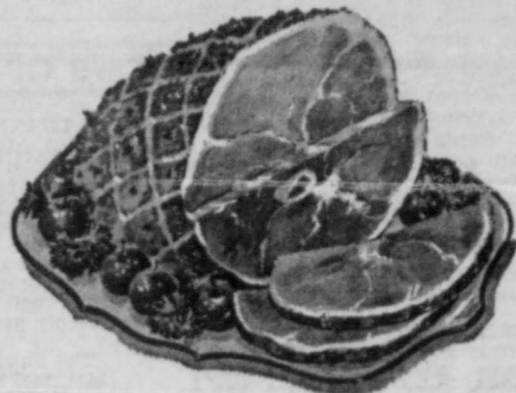
