Eastern Mills And Fashion Centers Giving Renewed Attention To Mohair

Mohair is drawing renewed attention in the Boston and East Coast textile trade, Al Dishman of Uvalde told the Mohair Council of America executive committee in San Angelo, Texas, Monday.

Dishman, Council vice president, just returned from a fact-finding trip to mills and fashion centers.

"Mohair is in the clothing lines for fall and winter of 1968," he said. "Practically every mill that can use mohair is attempting to do so."

He found many users "cautiously optimistic" about mohair's possible resurgence from a low-price situation that has brought economic difficulties to Texas Angora goat raisers. A large tonnage of Texas mohair has been sold in recent weeks, though at prices most growers would consider greatly depressed. Dishman said the Council's promotional activities have helped call attention to the quantity and competitive prices available.

"I found people up there talking mohair who haven't spoken the word in years," he commented. "We've at least stirred

them up."

Among items taking an increasing amount of mohair are knit sweaters and men's sports jackets. The Council plans to help circulate sample swatches of cloth and descriptive literature to retail buyers, showing them the variety of goods available from leading clothing makers.

"The best thing we have going for mohair in the medium-coarse grades right now is the chance of using additional volume in men's sports jackets and topcoats," said Dolph Brisco Jr. of Uvalde, Council president.

The Council's executive committee approved a second \$25,000 allocation to Prodesco, Inc., of Perkasie, Pennsylvania, for continued work on two principal product development lines: draperies and floor coverings. It recently entered into a \$39,600 contract with Chilton Research Services of Philadelphia for a major survey to determine best prospects for new or expanded uses of mohair. Other contracts in force include one with the Kairalla Agency of New York to help promote mohair use among style-setters.

The Council's funds come from mohair producers themselves through a 1½-cent-a-pound deduction from their mohair incentive payments.

Stock Show Officials Stress Need For More Prize Money Contributions

Stock Show officials this week stressed the need for additional contributions to provide prize money for the 1968 Mills County Livestock Show which is coming up on January 12 and 13.

This will be the 30th annual event to be sponsored here by the Mills County Livestock Raisers' Association.

The announcement that additional funds are needed came from R. L. Steen, president, Glynn Collier, treasurer, and Norman Duren, vice president and chairman of the catalog committee in charge of finances.

Those who have not been contacted are urged to send their check now to insure sufficient money to provide a minimum of prizes for the boys and girls who have worked all year in preparing their exhibits for the next show.

The new 1968 catalog giving details of the 30th annual show is in the final stages at the printers now and will be completed by next week when it will be ready for distribution.

First Phase Of New Christmas Lights Installed Around Courthouse Square

The first phase of a new general Christmas lighting and decorating program for the City of Goldthwaite has been purchased and installed around the courthouse square.

This is part of the general program that was adopted in December 1966 under the sponsorship of the Lions Club, when it was decided to undertake

plans for new Christmas lights. Dr. C. S. Cruzosa is chairman of the project.

Eight new holiday decoration pieces have been purchased and installed around the courthouse square. These were installed on existing poles with city crews doing the installation chores.

Cost of the eight electric pole decoration pieces was approximately \$800.


Dr. Chris announced Tuesday that the committee has hopes to get the rest of the job completed next Christmas. The entire job would place four decorations on each side of the street, with eight in each block included in the program.

Plans call for new decorations on Fisher Street from Second Street at Graves' Dental Clinic to Sixth Street at A&B Grocery. Parker Street from Third at the Hospital to Fifth Street at Barnes & McCullough. Also Fourth Street from Railroad Street at Johnson Bros. Texaco Station to Parker Street at the Post Office.

To do the entire job as outlined will require about 75 lighted decorative pieces and installation of a number of poles.

Cost of the eight pieces installed this year was taken care of without soliciting funds from merchants, Dr. Chris stated. The \$800 was paid by the Lions Club Christmas lighting fund, Mills County State Bank, City Utilities and the County Commissioners' Court.

For the next phase of the program business firms located in the various blocks to be covered with the new Christmas lights will be contacted and given an opportunity to give their financial support.





Failure to file the sworn statement or statements in substantial compliance with Section 4 shall extinguish and bar any claim of water right to which the Section applies. Instructions and forms for recording claims may be obtained without cost from the Texas Water Rights Commission, P. O. Box 12396, Capitol Station, Austin, Texas 78711.






