## Rainfall In Eleven Months Is 19.55 Inches

Goldthwaite has received 19.55 inches of rainfall during the past 11 months, January through November, according to official record kept by Harry Allen, weatherman.

This is considerably less than was recorded here in 1966 or 1965 for the same periods. In 1966, 25.34 inches was recorded in 11 months while in 1965 the measurement was 30.51 inches.

November 1967 made a good record with 3.08 inches of rain recorded here. In November 1966 only .14 inch was measured here.

## Claudia Cockrum Property Annexed To City Limits By Council Action

The Claudia Cockrum property located to the East of the city was annexed to the city limits by action of the City Council meeting in regular session Monday night.

Petition calling for annexation was presented by Mrs. Cockrum to the council and was accepted. The Council then adopted an ordinance annexing the property to the city limits.

The action adds a tract of land comprising two-thirds of an acre which is located just East of the W. D. Clements estate property which was annexed to the city limits at the council meeting in November.

Eigin Smith appeared before the council as a representative of the Mills County Technical Action Panel. He informed the group of the availability of service of the Panel to the city government and offered that group's cooperation with the city in a comprehensive sewer and water plan study.

Monthly operating reports of receipts and disbursements for the various city departments were presented to the council by City Manager W. C. Barnett.

The council authorized Mr. Barnett to get facts and figures together for a proposed electric sign for the city hall and also for a new traffic signal system installation at the corner of Fourth and Fisher to replace the outdated traffic light.

He is a 1955 graduate of Goldthwaite high school and graduated from Texas A&M University.

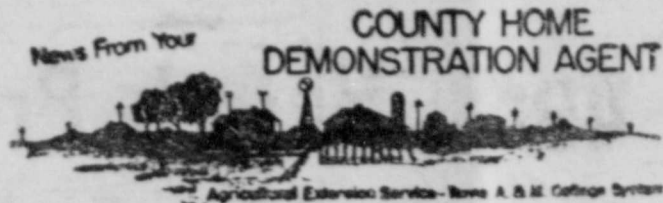

## Texas Drivers Need Eye Tests Officials Note

Drivers must see well enough to recognize danger in time to avoid accidents, and high speed driving makes the best of vision an absolute necessity.

These basic facts were emphasized in a news release by the Texas Safety Association and Texans for Traffic Safety when they pointed out that thousands of licensed drivers may well be driving in today's heavy traffic with defective vision.

"Each year in Texas more than two million drivers licenses are renewed without benefit of an eye examination. Visual capabilities often change, and sometimes rapidly. Advancing age, diseases and eye injuries can adversely affect a person's vision," Dr. Otto Lippman, Austin Chairman, Texans for Traffic Safety, said.

"It is not unusual for a 40 or 50-year-old driver who had good vision 20 years ago to have some visual problem now that calls for correction or treatment," he said.

"Some drivers with falling eyesight are aware of their problems, but many others are not. These drivers with unknown visual defects may endanger all other users of the streets and highways."

Both the Texas Safety Association and Texans for Traffic Safety strongly advocate vision re-examination at the time of driver license renewal. They also recommend all drivers, who think that their vision might be deteriorating, have competent eye examinations.

"They owe it to themselves, as well as others—for the unseen traffic hazard can kill or cripple," Dr. Lippman concluded.

## Senate Approves Two Projects For Texas Watersheds

Senator Tower said today the Senate Public Works Committee has approved two Texas watershed projects — the Bennett Creek Watershed in Mills and Lampasas Counties; and the Mill Creek Watershed in Van Zandt County.

Mill Creek is a tributary of the Sabine River, and an average of four floods occur annually on the creek and its tributaries. This project would seek to alleviate flood problems at a total cost of \$3,720,040, of which the federal share would be \$2,004,490.

Total cost of the Bennett Creek Project is \$917,900, with the federal share \$679,300. Senator Tower said the purpose of the project is flood control. It also will benefit the Stillhouse Hollow Reservoir by reduction of sediment being deposited in it. Bennett Creek is a tributary of the Lampasas River.

Under federal statutory authority only committee approval is necessary for authorization of such projects. Full Senate approval is not required.
