## Postage Vending Machines Will Be Converted To Reflect New Rates

Nearly 10,000 postage vending machines, including those at Goldthwaite Post Office, will be converted over the next three months to reflect the new postage rates. Postmaster Norman Duren said today. New postage rates went into effect January 7, the postmaster noted. The new rates raise first class postage to 6-cents an ounce, air mail to 10-cents an ounce, and postal cards to 5-cents. The job of converting the thousands of vending machines found in post office lobbies from coast to coast is so massive that it will take several months to complete, the postmaster said. Five different types of machines are involved, he noted. Most of the machines now provide 5-cent and 4-cent

## City Council Meets Monday For Routine Session

The City Council met Monday night in the City Hall for a routine session. Operating reports of receipts and disbursements for the various departments covering the month of December were presented to the council by city manager W. C. Barnett. Barnett also presented the quarterly treasurer's report to the group.

The city manager reported on work projects that are underway. These include opening of Reynolds Street through the Carr property to Little Street with new six inch water line installed in the same area.

Extension of utilities to the site for the new Hickman Nursing Home on East Third and Fourth Streets.

Report was made regarding the new signal light system to be installed at Fourth and Fisher Streets.

The council approved sale of the old Boy Scout House which is situated on two lots reverting back to the city from Boy Scout Troop 45 which is not in existence any more.

The street committee, composed of V. A. Hudson and T. J. Blackburn, along with manager Barnett was instructed to get information regarding purchase of a street sweeper for the city.

"Post office vending machines can be a big convenience to postal patrons," Duren said. "The devices permit mailers to ignore waiting lines at stamp sales windows or to buy stamps to mail letters after the windows have closed."

## Social Security Law Changes Will Mean Increased Benefits To Many

(EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the first of 11 articles giving the pertinent details of the new provisions in Social Security.)

The changes in the social security law signed by President Johnson on January 2, 1968, will mean a benefit increase of at least 13 per cent in the social security checks of about 8,700 men, women, and children in the three-county Brownwood district.

The Social Security Administration's high speed electronic computers are now figuring the increases and will include the increases in the checks delivered early in March.

Beneficiaries need not take any action to get the increase. It will be sent to them automatically.

Some social security beneficiaries will receive more than a 13 per cent increase. The minimum benefit for workers retiring at 65 is increased from \$44 to \$55. The last increase in social security benefits amounted to 7 per cent, and was effective

January 1965.

About 3 out of every 10 beneficiaries receiving an increased check early in March will be someone under 65, many of them being the children of working fathers who died.

The value of social security survivors insurance is often overlooked. Social Security is more than just a retirement system. It is also income protection for the family in case of the breadwinner's death or disability.

With the increased benefit payments provided under the new amendments to the law, the face value of social survivors insurance protection is increased to about \$940 billion. This is just about equivalent to the value of all the private life insurance now in force.

Under the amended law, maximum payments to families now on the social security benefit rolls will go up from currently payable maximum of \$309.20 a month to \$322.40. In the future, the maximum payable monthly to any one family can be as high as \$434.40.

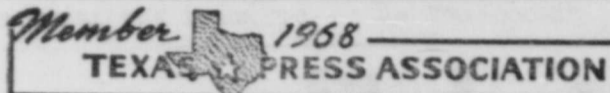

(PS0602) San Diego (FHTNC) Dec. 21—Marine Private John S. Petty, son of Mrs. Inez B. Petty of 1513 Queen Street, Goldthwaite, Texas, was graduated from eight weeks of recruit training at the Marine Corps Recruit Depot here.

He will now undergo from two to four weeks of individual combat training and then, after leave at home, will report to his first Marine Corps assignment.
