

Mills County Voter Registration To Determine Voting Box Changes

The number of citizens that register to vote in Mills County, especially in the smaller voting boxes, will determine some of the changes that are scheduled to be made in the boxes later this year.

New legislation passed by the session of the Texas Legislature will effect some of the changes in the county when they are made into effect, it has been announced by County Judge Earl Egger.

Under the new regulations all voting boxes that do not have voter registration of at least 100 persons will be consolidated with other boxes, unless the box is the only one remaining in the precinct.

Official notice from the County Judge and Commissioners' Court regarding the proposition regarding residents of the county appears on another page of this paper.

2123 REGISTER THROUGH TUESDAY
2,123 residents of the county had registered through Tuesday of this week, according to H. G. Brooks, Mills County Sheriff, Tax Assessor-Collector.

Mills County now has 13 voting boxes. Some existing boxes are getting very small.

Proposed changes are scheduled to be made in August, 1968, according to Judge Egger.

The Commissioners' Court considered the proposition in August, 1967, and deferred action until this year to give residents of the various boxes an opportunity to get out and register during the current registration period which ends next Wednesday, January 31.

Stock Show Committee Is Well Pleased With Response To Stock Show Sale

Response from interested community stock show boosters for the club hogs and United States hogs that were offered for sale in the Mills County Stock Show was unusually good, according to report from Charles Conrad, chairman of the sale committee.

In fact, the response was so good that several club show members failed to get an animal from the hogs and lambs ran off before the list of buyers was set, Conrad reported.

Both hogs and lambs brought good premium prices for club members who offered exhibition stock for sale.

Fifty-two head of hogs and lambs sold for a total of \$2,417.50. The sale included 33 hogs and 19 lambs.

The committee expressed satisfaction with the sale results. Arrangements had been made in advance for buyers for all hogs and lambs that were to be offered for sale.

Conrad stated: "Business and professional people again responded in a splendid way to support the sale for the benefit of Mills County club boys and girls." Those who failed to get an animal on the buying this year will have another opportunity next year, the committee reported this week in reporting on the sale results. Tank Filling Rains Cover Mills County

Tank filling, and ground soaking, rains covered the entire Mills County area the past week with un-official measurements reported from six to 10 inches.

Goldthwaite received an official 6.30 inches from Thursday through Sunday, according to Weatherman Harry Allen.

The four day rainfall here came as follows: Thursday, 1.48 inches, Friday .55, Saturday 3.19 and on Sunday 1.08 inches.

This makes a total for the month of January 7.19 inches.

Other reports from over the county are as follows: Trigger

Mt. 7.80; Mullin 6.26; Ridge 6.75; Star 8; Big Valley 6.80; Moline 6.97; Priddy over 7; Center City 7.14; Regency about 7; Scallorn almost 8 inches.

Only two reported to The Eagle office that they had a large tank that was not filled from the four day rains. All other reports indicated that stock tanks were filled and running over.

BLANKET CREEK SEDIMENT POOLS FILLED

Elgin Smith, from the Soil Conservation Office here, reported that the four day rainfall of seven to eight inches filled the sediment pools on the three completed flood control dams on Blanket Creek.

These sites, number 18, 19 and 20, located on that portion of the drainage in Mills County, were completed in 1966, according to Smith.

Over the past weekend was the first time they have functioned as flood detention reservoirs. Monday morning between 2,500 and 3,000 gallons of water per minute was flowing through the draw-down tubes on the dams. This is water that is temporarily detained and released at a rate to prevent flooding downstreams, Smith stated.

Mr. Johnson, 41, is a native of Mills County and this is his first time to make a bid for public office.

He has lived in the county all his life except the time spent in the U. S. Navy. While still in high school he enlisted in the U. S. N. R. in May 1944 and spent the next two years, until May 1946, with the Amphibious Forces in the Mediterranean

area during World War II. He was called back in 1950 during the Korean Conflict and spent three months at the Amphibian Base at Coronado, California.

After his military service he was associated with his father in the Texaco wholesale and retail business until 1953 when he became associated with his brothers Wallace and Mike Johnson in Johnson Bros., in the same business. In 1957 he took over operation of the Texaco Station on Fisher Street which he operated until May, 1967.

In January 1966 he and Kenneth Shaw opened the B & G Cash Drive-In Grocery at Fisher and Sixth Streets. In November 1966 he and Mrs. Johnson purchased the interest of Mr. Shaw in the business and they have owned and operated the business since that time.

Mrs. Johnson is the former Alene Cryer of Mullin. They have three daughters, Carol, a student at SWTSC at San Marcos, Patricia, a junior in Goldthwaite high school, and Pam, a 7th grader in junior high school.

In announcing his candidacy for the office Mr. Johnson stated: "I am running for the office because I feel that I can take care of the job and I will appreciate the vote and support of everyone in the forthcoming primary election, May 4. If elected to the office I will do my best and will not let the people of Mills County down."

The pupils of the school are glad to have the young man's wife for their teacher. Mrs. Bedford McBride

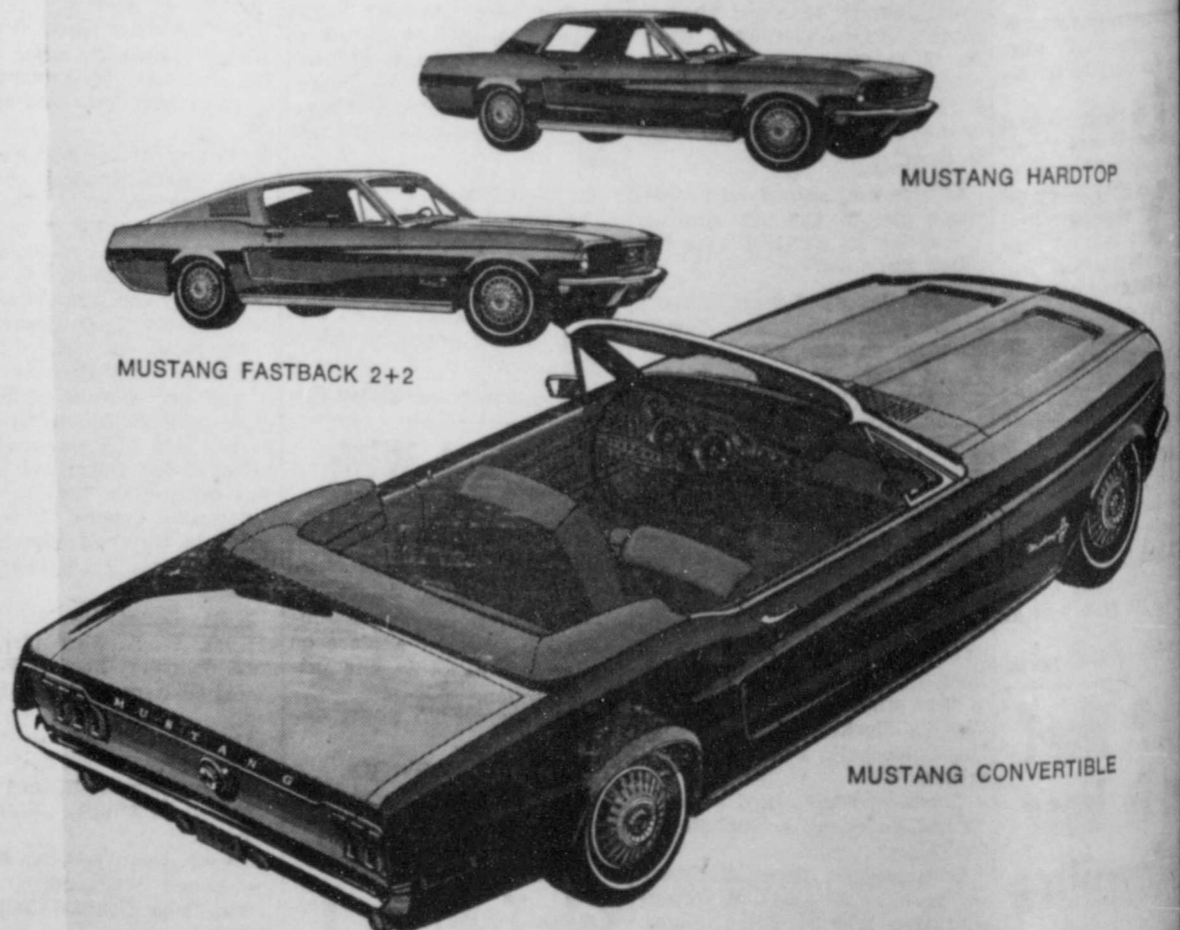

Following the adoption of the resolution, the Governor of Nebraska issued the first Arbor Day proclamation, and on April 10, 1872, Morton's birthday, more than a million trees were planted.
In less than a century after its origin, Arbor Day has become a national and international movement giving evidence of the people understanding the importance of trees.

Herman L. Stone, Route 1, Cleburne, this week authorized The Eagle to announce his candidacy for State Representative of the 54th District which encompasses Mills, Hamilton, Bosque, Somervill, and Johnson Counties.

He has filed his candidacy as a member of the Democratic ticket seeking a seat in the Texas Legislature.

A widely-known cattleman and youth leader, Stone's platform is built around greater educational opportunities for the youth of today, and a more positive action in establishing respect for law and order.

A resident of Johnson County for more than 13 years, Stone is a 1960 graduate of Texas Christian University with a degree in accounting. He has been an employee of the Arlington General Motors Assembly Plant for the past 14 years.

Married in 1950, Stone and his wife have three sons and a daughter. He is an Army veteran of World War II, and spent more than two years in South Pacific combat.

The 45-year-old political aspirant summed up his observations by saying, "My platform is oriented to the future. Personally, I'd prefer to sit back and let the world take its own course. But I can't. I'm compelled to take positive, direct action in helping develop the future economy, educational growth and youth guidance in the 54th District."

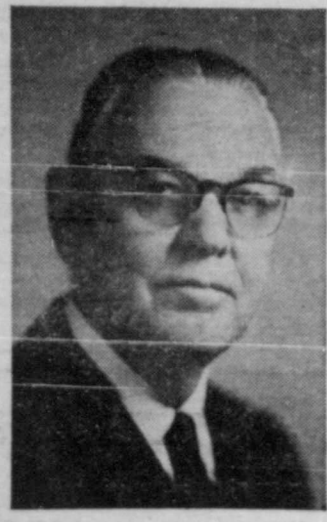

Social Security Law Changes Will Mean Increased Benefits To Many

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the second of 11 articles giving the pertinent details of the new provisions in Social Security.)

In my previous article I discussed the increased social security payments that would be coming to persons now on the social security benefit rolls in early March.

The new legislation also increases the benefits of all future beneficiaries at least 13 per cent.

Thus for these workers who have been earning and who will continue to earn wages of \$6600 a year or less, the new amendments will mean sizeable increases in their future benefit payments — and without comparable increases in the social security tax contributions they were scheduled to pay under the old law.

A worker earning \$6600 a year will pay exactly the same amount of social security taxes, including Medicare costs, in 1968 as he paid in 1967. In 1969 and 1970, he will actually pay \$6.60 less for the year than he would have paid under the old law. In years after that he will pay only slightly more, with his maximum contribution no more than \$1.38 more a month than he would have paid under the law as it stood before the enactment of the benefit increases.

Beginning with 1968, earnings up to \$7800 a year will be subject to social security contributions and will also count toward social security benefits.

For a worker earning the maximum of \$7800 or more a year, this will mean additional social security contributions of \$4.40 more per month in 1968, rising to a maximum additional contribution of \$7.28 per month in 1967 and later, including the

amount he pays for his and his wife's hospital insurance under Medicare.

These higher paid workers who will be paying substantially more in social security contributions are, however, the ones who will also get substantially higher benefits, ranging up to 30 per cent higher than under present law.

For example, a young man now 27 or younger who pays social security contributions on \$7800 a year until his retirement at age 65, will collect 30 per cent more in monthly benefits than he would under present law — \$218 a month for himself — \$323 a month for himself and his wife. His family's benefit protection in case of his disability or death is also substantially improved.

Even the higher paid middle-aged worker who is much closer to retirement age will find his benefit prospects greatly improved. For example, a worker who is 50 in 1968 and will pay social security contributions on earnings of \$7800 a year for only 15 years will collect a retirement benefit of \$188.80. This compares with the \$155 per month he would have collected under the old law, an increase of 21.8 per cent. He and his wife together will be eligible for \$283.20 a month, instead of \$232.50.

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FREE ESTIMATES ON YOUR NEEDS

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Aliens Must Register Address During January

Information furnished by an alien in making his annual address report to the Government is confidential.

According to John W. Holland, District Director of the San Antonio District Immigration and Naturalization Service office, the information furnished by aliens in reporting their addresses has been declared confidential by statute.

These reports must be submitted during January each year by all aliens in the United States, with few exceptions. Forms on which to submit the reports are available at any Post Office or office of the Immigration and Naturalization Service. Persons who are unable to pick up a form because of illness, or other reasons, may have a relative or friend obtain a card for them.

The card should be returned to one of these offices.

Parents or guardians of aliens under fourteen years of age submit reports for such children.

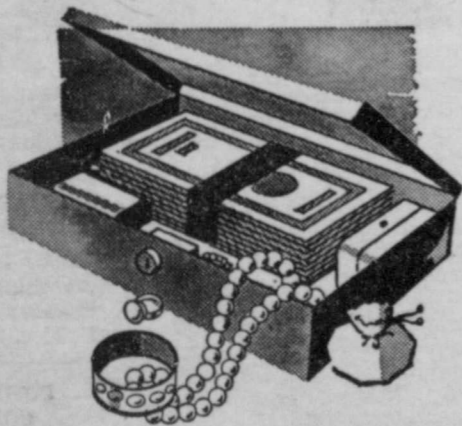
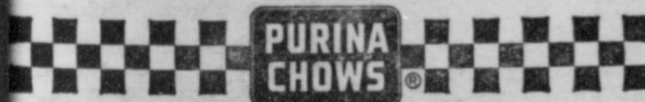

Postmaster Duren Announces New Airlift PP Rates For Overseas

Packages up to 30 pounds for American military personnel served by Army and Fleet Post Offices overseas now can be sent by air transportation at special low rates, Postmaster Norman Duren pointed out today.

"All residents using this new airlift service will get much faster delivery on parcels to military personnel overseas," Postmaster Duren said. He said the airlift is available on a space-available basis upon payment of the domestic parcel post surface rate plus a flat \$1 fee.

Packages weighing up to 30 pounds and not more than 60 inches in combined length and girth qualify for the new special

airlift rate, Postmaster Duren said.

Postal patrons can get the airlift service on packages mailed to all military personnel at APO and FPO addresses overseas, and in Alaska, Hawaii and Puerto Rico. Postmaster Duren noted that the new airlift also applies to parcels mailed back to the States by servicemen from these military post offices.

Parcels on which the \$1 fee is paid get air transportation all the way—from here to the port of embarkation, and from there to the overseas base. Postal patrons formerly had to pay air-parcel post rates to get similar service, Postmaster Duren said.

He said that in many instances the new airlift rates are considerably below comparable air post charges. He cited these

examples:

• A mother here sending a 15-pound package to her son in Vietnam pays \$3.35 for the new airlift service. The air parcel post rate for the same package is \$9.79.

• An eight-pound package going from here to Frankfurt, Germany, costs \$2.75 under the airlift service. The air parcel rate is \$5.87.

Postmaster Duren pointed out, however, that it is not always to the mailer's advantage to use the airlift service. On some light packages air parcel post rates may be lower than the airlift charges.

"Postal patrons should check with the Post Office for information on the best way to mail parcels to servicemen overseas," Postmaster Duren emphasized.

The new airlift service went into effect January 7. It was authorized under the postal rate bill signed into law December 16 by President Johnson.

Postmaster Duren explained that the regular postage on parcels mailed to servicemen overseas is based on the distance the package is hauled within the United States. No charge is made for carrying the package between the U. S. port and the overseas base.

Until January 7 airlift for parcels to servicemen overseas was restricted to packages weighing up to five pounds. Upon payment of the regular parcel post rates, these packages get surface transportation to the port of embarkation and are airlifted from there to the overseas posts on a space available

basis. There is no charge for this partial airlift and overseas parcels weighing up to five pounds will continue to receive service, Postmaster Duren

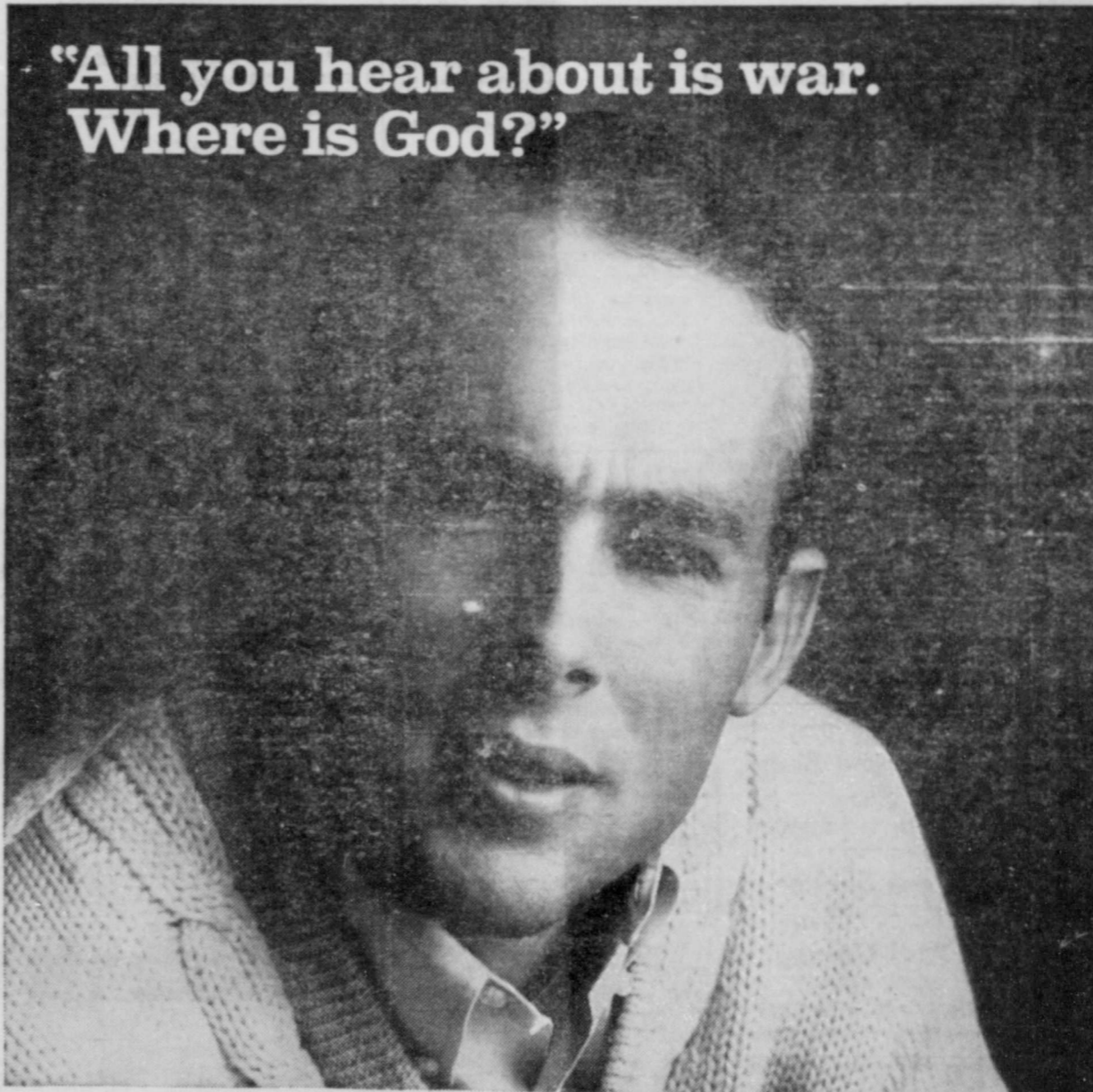

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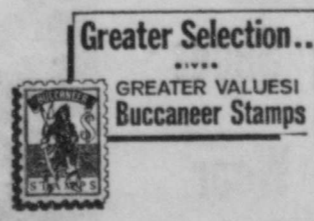
