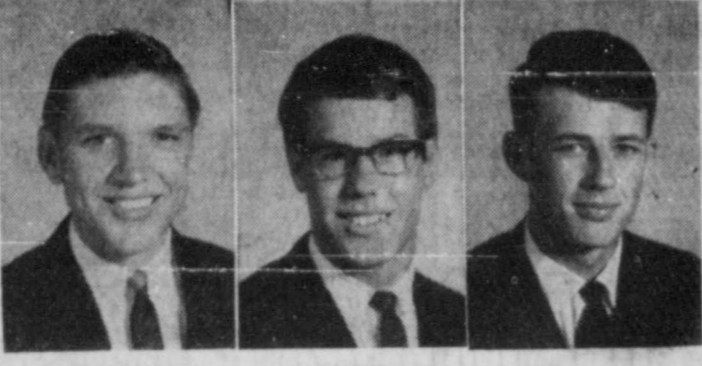

2,627 Mills County Residents Are Registered To Vote In 1968

Voter registrations for the 1968 elections as tabulated and officially released by H. G. Brooks, Mills County Sheriff, Tax Assessor and Collector, total 2,627.
The official list was completed last week after some delay

while the tax office waited for additional forms that were needed and then making final checks for duplications.
The number of voters that are qualified to vote in this year's elections represents a considerable increase than some

had estimated. This is due to the fact that everyone had to register to be qualified to vote under the new regulations. In previous years many who were exempt because of age did not have to sign up, or get exemption certificate, in order to vote. This has all been changed now and only those who have registered and are actually listed on the official tally list will be allowed to vote.

The voter registration will also effect some of the smaller boxes with respect to voting boxes being combined or annexed in August of this year.

At that time the Commissioners' Court is expected to take action to eliminate small boxes to meet the new legislation. Under the new laws voting boxes that do not have a voter registration of at least 50 are to be consolidated unless it is the only voting box remaining in the Justice Precinct.

H. L. Stone Declares Senior Citizens' Welfare Paramount
