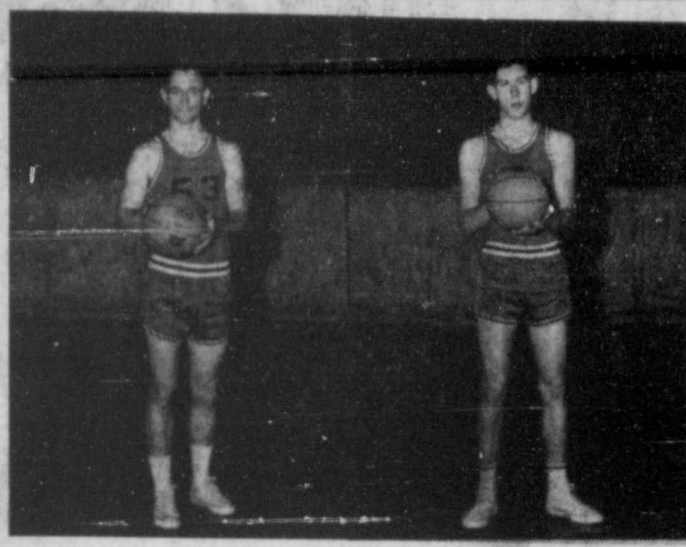

Sewer Charges And Expansion Of System Will Be Given New Study

City of Goldthwaite sewer charges and possible expansion of the entire system will be given a new look as a study gets underway on this pressing problem facing the city. A preliminary engineering survey was made about a year ago with estimates of cost to provide sewer service to all residents of the city. After the report was presented to the City Council it was discussed and tabled for the time being. The matter was revived at the last meeting of the council after a new request was received from some residents of the city for sewer service. It was pointed out at the time that there had been a number of requests for extension of sewer lines to a number of sections of the city where it is badly needed. Also pointed out at the meeting was the fact that the need for improving the sewer facilities of the city is today greater than ever before. Due to the period of heavy rains the past several months some sections of the city that are not on the sewer line and septic tanks are used, are facing a serious problem of drainage and a possible health hazard. A committee was named to give an overall study to charges now paid by city residents for sewer service. Serving on the committee are Lester Geeslin and T. J. Blackburn, members of the Sanitation committee, and City Manager W. C. Barnett. The council also requested that Manager Barnett contact Bob King, of Rady & Associates, for a new consultation on the matter. The Rady firm did the earlier survey.

Coach Tilmon Kirby Featured In Sports Column Of Temple Telegram

Tilmon Kirby, coach at Travis Junior High School in Temple, was recently featured in a sports column of the Temple Telegram. Temple sports fans consider Kirby to be the founder of a successful technique for throwing the shot put.

Kirby started coaching at Travis in 1963, and has since developed a sound shot put program that has made Travis High shot put king. Athletes are molded in junior high school, and Kirby gives them their first start in the ring at Travis. He has produced a state Jaycees finalist, a district shot put champion, a former state record holder, and is presently coaching the junior high defending record holder.

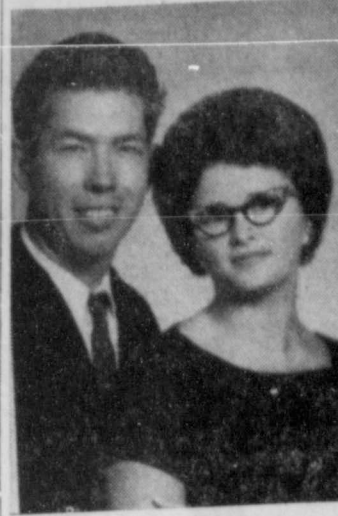
His intensified program maintains that it takes a smooth combination of timing, body movement and release of the ball to throw the shot effectively. Strength alone will not do the job. Kirby firmly believes that the three steps must be followed smoothly, and if done

correctly anyone can throw the shot.

Desire is the ingredient Tilmon looks for more than any other in a potential shot putter. He knows that a boy must want to work long and hard if he really wants to be good. He puts his boys through a rugged summer training program that means daily workouts of two hours each, but it pays off for the shot putters and for the school, which now has a highly regarded reputation in the sport.

Tilmon attended school at Goldthwaite, and in high school he weighed a mere 150 pounds. He remembers people laughed at his size when they first saw him about to throw the shot put. Their laughter soon died because he placed eighth in the state, relying mainly on form instead of physical build.

Kirby graduated from GHS, and received his degree from Texas Western College, El Paso. He is the son of Mrs. Willie Bell Doggett of Goldthwaite.

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State Draft Boards Receive Call To Furnish 2,378 Men For April

State draft boards are being called upon to furnish 2,378 men for the Army and Marines in April, Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, said Friday.

This compares to a quota of 1,948 for the Army in March and is the largest monthly call for the draft boards since October 1966, when the share was 2,845.

The draft boards will forward 8,500 men to the armed forces examining and entrance stations in April for the pre-induction physical and mental examinations in preparation to fill future quotas.

This compares to 7,200 being forwarded for this purpose in March, 4,590 sent in February, and 5,455 in January. The March pre-induction examination quota originally was 4,200, but was increased later because of higher induction quotas.

The April induction and pre-induction quotas were mailed to local boards by state Selective Service headquarters March 13.

The April call of 2,378 men for Texas is the state's share of a national quota of 48,000, the Army to get 44,000 of this number, and the Marine Corps 4,000.

The order of selection to fill the April and March induction

calls may be from among examined and acceptable men who are:

- (1) Delinquents 19 years old and older;
- (2) volunteers under age 26, and
- (3) nonvolunteers 19 through 25 years old, single and married, with those married after August 26, 1965, being selected ahead of those married on or before that date.

February Sales Of U. S. Bonds In Mills County

During the month of February the sale of United States Savings Bonds and Savings Notes in Mills County totaled \$2,735, according to a report received today from W. P. Duren, Chairman of the Mills County Savings Bonds Committee. The January-February sales totaled \$5,535 and 6 per cent of the 1968 goal of \$90,000 has been achieved.

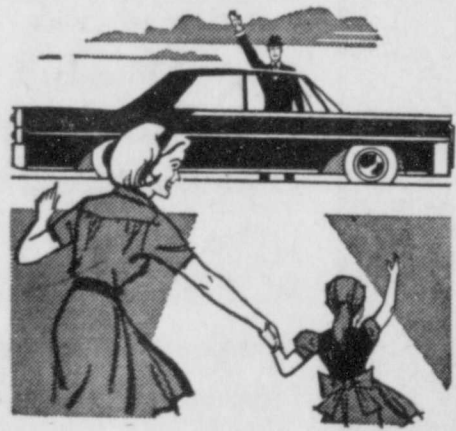

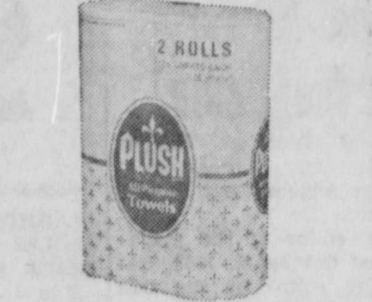

USDA Issues Recommendation For Immunization Against Hog Cholera

For immunization against hog cholera, give two doses of inactivated (killed) hog cholera vaccine 30 days apart, then a booster dose within a year.

That is the present recommendation of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, says County Agent George Reese.

Recent field problems with inactivated vaccines prompted the Veterinary Biologics Division of USDA to closely study the safety and effectiveness of this type of vaccine. Screening tests showed that the 2-dose immunization with inactive vaccine produces a higher level of protection than the single dose formerly recommended.

Swine vaccinated with an active hog cholera vaccine require a longer period of time to develop immunity than those vaccinated with modified live virus vaccine, the tests showed.

Formerly when swine received only 1 dose of inactivated vaccine, USDA recommended a 21-day period free from exposure to possible sources of cholera virus. Now the recommendation says that pigs treated with 2 doses of inactivated vaccine be kept free from sources of possible infection until after the second dose. Exposure, of course, should always be avoided if possible.

Veterinarians and swine producers are being notified of the change in the vaccination program. All labels are being changed to conform to the new dosage recommendations.

The USDA has recently issued a revised list of modified vaccines considered safe for use on pigs shipped across state lines. All inactivated virus vaccines are approved for use on pigs shipped in interstate commerce.

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AUSTIN, Tex.—All those candidates for governor got a hefty bit of pressure off them when both the state Democratic and Republican executive committees decided to put the question of liquor-by-the-drink on the May 4 ballot.

With increasing concern over liquor-law enforcement and the Texas Liquor Control Board, coupled with Gov. John Connally's push for liquor-by-the-drink, gubernatorial candidates have been pressured hard for their stand on the issue.

Now, with the question being put to the voters in a referendum, all the candidates have to say is that they will abide by the wishes of the voters.

Also on the ballot as referendums will be the question of pari-mutuel horse-race betting and the creation of a Texas Dairy Commission with the power to regulate and fix the price of milk and other dairy products.

Although none of the voters' answers to the three questions will be binding, the issues do assure a high turnout of the more than 4,000,000 registered voters. It will take an act of the Legislature to put any of them in effect. Ballots will merely say: "This proposition is only an expression of public opinion and has no force or effect as law."

Legislature directed the first primary vote on local option pari-mutuel gambling. Petitions signed by 119,000 voters called for voter opinion on creating a Texas Dairy Commission with power to regulate milk prices.

Both party leaders decided the liquor-by-the-drink issue is hot enough to warrant a check on that, too. This referendum will be the first opportunity Texas voters have had to express their opinions statewide since the repeal of prohibition in the 1930's.

Campaigns already are shaping up on the high-voltage drinking and gambling issues. Opponents of a dairy commission also are organized for battle. Anti-Crime Council of Texas has formed to combat organized crime and defeat the racing proposition. Committee for Tourism and Regulated Sale of Mixed Drinks stands ready to get back into action. Dry spokesmen report they have organized a fight liquor-by-the-drink. Texas Racing Association is ready with a campaign for a wagering proposal.

Meanwhile, House committee

studying liquor laws has asked for an attorney general's opinion on constitutionality of a mixed drink local option bill.

COURTS SPEAK

Fining of 22 whites for staging a civil rights sit-in at Cafe Raven in Huntsville was affirmed by the Court of Criminal Appeals. Same court also upheld the death penalty conviction of Tommy R. Vessels for rape of a Gray County woman and ordered a new trial in a fatal stabbing case.

State Supreme Court ordered a Bexar County jury trial to determine whether a group of San Antonio stockholders in the Uvalde Rock Asphalt Company has the right to inspect the firm's books and records.

Third Court of Civil Appeals reversed an additional workmen's compensation award to a Comal County woman hurt on the job because her lawsuit petition appealing the Industrial Accident Board decision was filed one day late.

ATTORNEY GENERAL RULES

Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin has held that county commissioners court may not legally sell to private concerns for commercial purposes duplicate copies of magnetic tape containing names of registered voters.

However, Martin said that county tax assessor-collectors and their deputies can prepare on their own time and sell copies of the registered voter list, providing the "moonlighting" does not interfere with regular duties.

In a separate opinion, Martin concluded that the State Liquor Control Board must turn down liquor license applications from persons who have not been Texas residents for the past three years.

BARRERA NAMED STATE SECRETARY

Roy Barrera, 41-year-old San Antonio attorney, is John Hill's successor as secretary of state. Hill resigned last month to devote full time to his race for governor.

Governor Connally named Barrera to the \$24,000-a-year job. His duties include service as the governor's top liaison man and as the chief state election officer.

Barrera is a member of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee, is a former chief prosecutor in the Bexar County district attorney's office and is ex-president of the board of trustees of Edgewood Independent School District.
