## Mills County Voters Will Decide Three Contests For Nomination

The first Democratic Primary election of 1968 will be held this Saturday, May 4.

Claudia Cockrum, Democratic Executive Committee Chairman, has announced that the polls will open at 8 a. m. and will remain open until 7 p. m. She urges voters to bring their Certificates of Registration with them when they go to vote, to avoid delays.

There are 13 voting boxes in Mills County.

Absentee voting has been light this year. According to County Clerk, Walter A. Bryant, absentee voting closed Tuesday, April 30, with 99 votes cast.

Six state offices will be in contest with two or more candidates making their bids in the primary election. There is a possibility of a run-off in more than one contest.

Three offices, one county-wide and two commissioner's precincts, are in contest in Mills County with the possibility of a run-off in one of them.

Candidates for Governor are Dolph Briscoe, Waggoner Carr, Edward L. Whittenburg, Johnnie Mae Hackworth, John Hill, Eugene Locke, Preston Smith, Alfonso "Al" Veloz, Don Yarborough, and Pat O'Daniel.

Three candidates are on the ballot for Lieutenant Governor, Don Gladden, Gene Smith and Ben Barnes.

Dallas Blankenship and Robert S. Calvert are candidates for Comptroller of Public Accounts.

For Supreme Court of Texas (Associate Justice, Place 1) there are two candidates, Sears McGee and Matt Davis.

Tom Reavley and James G. Denton are candidates for Supreme Court of Texas (Associate Justice, Place 2).

Candidates for State Representative, 54th District of Texas, are J. E. Ward and Herman L. Stone.

Other State and District offices are without contest.

### COUNTY

In Mills County three offices are being contested this year. They are County Sheriff, Tax Assessor - Collector, County Commissioner of Precinct One,

and County Commissioner of Precinct Three.

H. G. Brooks and R. E. "Bobby" Johnson are candidates for County Sheriff, Tax Assessor-Collector. Candidates for County Commissioner of Precinct One are Woodrow Long and Burthel B. Roberts.

The office of County Commissioner of Precinct Three has three candidates, W. M. Hodges, W. D. Shelton and W. R. Lindsey.

### REFERENDUM PROPOSITIONS

There will be three referendum propositions on the ballot May 4, for the voters to vote FOR or AGAINST. They will be voted on only as an expression of public opinion and have no force or effect as law. Referendums are listed on the ballot as follows:

1. "FOR or AGAINST—Enactment by the Texas Legislature of a law permitting the legal sale of liquor by the drink in wet areas only after approval by local option elections, and which sale would be subject to strict regulation, effective controls and taxation thereof."

2. "FOR or AGAINST—Enactment by the Texas Legislature of a law permitting horse racing with pari-mutuel wagering on a local option basis; creating a Texas Horse Racing Board with the power to regulate pari-mutuel wagering on horse races; granting two per cent of the total pari-mutuel pool each day to each county where there is a licensed race track; and apportioning among all other counties one-half of the total state net revenue from that source."

3. "FOR or AGAINST—Enactment by the Texas Legislature of a law creating the Texas Dairy Commission with the power to regulate and fix the retail and wholesale price of milk."

## Construction Contract Signed For Low-Rent Housing Project

Construction contract for the low-rent housing project in Goldthwaite has been approved and signed, according to announcement by L. B. Burnham, executive director, respectively of the Goldthwaite Housing Authority.

Work on the 36-units of low-rent housing, to be located on Greathouse Gin location, was to get underway Wednesday of this week.

L. Guyler Co., Lamar, submitted the low bid for the job and was awarded the contract for construction. The contract was signed last week at Fort Worth at the Housing & Urban Development where the bid with plans and specifications had been reviewed for the past

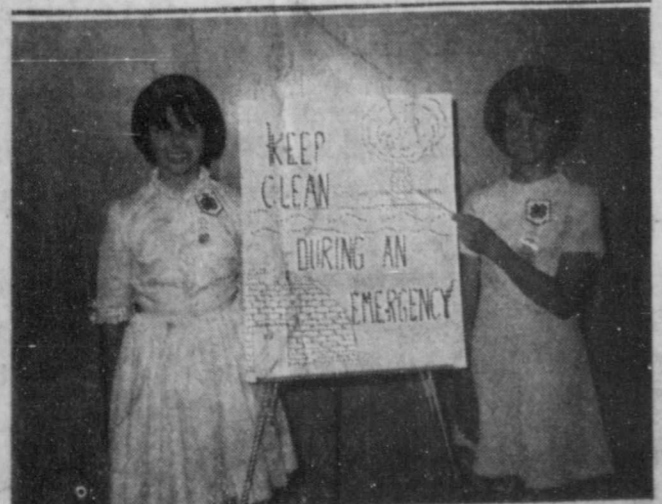
several weeks. The low-rent housing project for Goldthwaite has been underway for a long time with planning and selection and acquisition

The 36-unit project will include 24 units for the elderly and 12 units for low income families. All units will be of the design with two units building and of brick veneer construction.

Units in different locations were acquired by the Housing Authority for the low-rent housing units. The 24 units for the elderly will be constructed in two blocks of ground between East, Front and Main Streets. The property formerly known as the old

The 12 units for low income families will be constructed on a block of land acquired from Mrs. W. E. Fairman. It is located between West 5th and West 6th Streets bounded by Rossemann Street and McIntosh on the East and West.

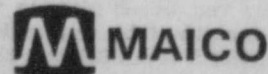

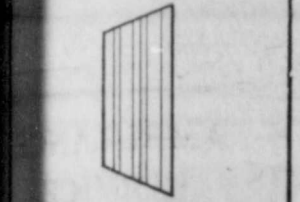

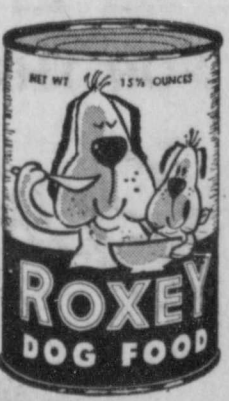

## Opportunity Loans Are Available To County Low-Income Rural People

Many Brown and Mills County low-income rural people have increased buying power, as a result of Federal opportunity loans, according to Harold D. Kennedy, the Farmers Home Administration local representative.

Over 2,700 opportunity loans have been made in Texas since the beginning of the program in January 1965 with more than 430 being made this fiscal year. The opportunity loans are part of the Federal anti-poverty program, which Congress enacted three years ago. The loan program is administered by the Farmers Home Administration for the office of Economic Opportunity.

Low-income rural people, through the local Farmers Home Administration office, may receive loans up to \$3,500 to develop income-producing business or to enlarge farming operations. Borrowers may take up to 15 years to repay the loan. For the first time, according to Kennedy, people who could never before qualify for loans

## New Postal Law Will Help Curb Mail Of Offensive Advertising

Mail patrons offended by panderling advertisements can now take steps to curb such mail, Postmaster Norman Duren said today in announcing plans for administering a new law which gives each family the right to decide that an ad is "erotically arousing or sexually provocative."

When an advertisement sent through the mails is offensive on these grounds, a postal patron can now ask the post office to direct the mailer to send no more mail to him and to remove immediately the patron's name from all mailing lists he owns, controls or rents.

To assist patrons, the Post Office Department has published a brief pamphlet—How You Can Curb Panderling Advertisements—which is now available at the Goldthwaite post office. In addition to explaining how the law works, the pocket-size leaflet contains a form letter one can use when sending his complaint to the post office.

The pamphlet explains that when a patron receives an advertisement which is, in his opinion, pandering, he must send the ad, its envelope and the form letter, or one which includes its language, to his post office with the words, "Request for prohibitory order" on the face of the envelope.

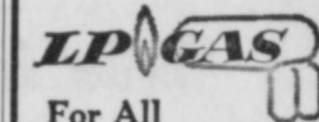
Postmaster Duren said: "This new law should give some protection to American families offended by advertisements they believe to be morally harmful, particularly to their children."

"Last year the Post Office Department received some 140,000 complaints from those offended by pandering advertisements. While in most cases the ads were not legally obscene and were therefore mailable, they are often offensive and are usually not the type of material one would want his children to read," Postmaster Duren said. He added that "because the law gives a mail patron the sole right to decide what is offen-

sive, and does not deny others the right to receive the same mail, the Congress felt it does not violate Constitutional guarantees of freedom of speech."

While the patron's complaint will only be directed to the sender, Postmaster Norman Duren believes that one or two complaints will provide substantial protection because "the great bulk of this advertising comes from fewer than 20 so-called 'smut dealers' who are frequently swapping mailing lists."

If a mailer does not strike a complainant's name from this mailing list, and the patron receives a second mailing 30 days after the firm has received the prohibitory order, he may bring the matter to the attention of the postmaster issuing the initial order by writing him and enclosing the second pandering ad with its envelope. If the

mailler still fails to respect the order, the Postmaster General may ask the Attorney General to apply for a Federal Court order directing compliance. Failure to observe the order may be punishable by a fine or imprisonment.

## Stone Restates Platform As Candidate For State Representative

"May I express to all of you my deep appreciation for your encouragement and support during my campaign for nomination as the Democratic candidate for State Representative of the 54th Legislative District," said Herman L. Stone as he tapered off his energetic visits throughout the five-county District.

He said "Your reception to my ideas on better educational facilities for our area, more respect for law and order, and a more understanding attitude toward our senior citizens has been most encouraging."

"As I stated when I entered the campaign for State Representative of the 54th District, I'm no out-and-out politician. But my views are shared by the citizens of Bosque, Hamilton, Johnson, Mills and Somervell Counties.

"They are in mutual agreement that we have sat back too long, while the rest of the state moved forward. Their encouragement has been a great asset to me, and I again thank them for the cooperation they have offered."

"In summary, I'd like to briefly re-state my platform. I can't put them in the order of one, two or three because they are all highly important, and each is different from the other," the Cleburne candidate explained.

"First, our educational system needs a new, hard look. We have good high schools and excellent teachers. But this rapidly-changing world of ours demands more than a diploma," he added.

A cattleman of wide reknown,

Stone pointed out that only 15 per cent of our high school graduates are able to enroll in college. This means that 85 per cent are footloose and fancy free, with no particular basis for the training and skills demanded by industry and business firms.

"I suggest," he said, "that we need more vocational and technical training in our high schools. This is not an impossibility. Our state education supervisors in Austin told me that such a program is optional, and high schools may enter them on a voluntary basis. I believe the high schools of our District should investigate this added facility offered by our state."

A veteran of World War II, Stone continued by saying, "Secondly, I believe our law enforcement officials need greater public support. And they most certainly deserve more respect than is now given them. I sug-

gest that the training of policemen in a police academy is a step in the right direction. Such a program could be established on a state-wide, county basis similar to the one in Arlington which is sponsored by 10 counties. This would only continually provide an area with trained law enforcement officers, but it would be an added boost to their reputation and prestige. Such a program would not degrade police chiefs and sheriffs because they must retain complete control of their departments."

"In the same category," he added, "is the need for higher wages for our law enforcement officers. Their hours are long, sometimes dangerous, but they pay isn't what it should be this day and age of inflation."

An employee of the Arlington General Motors plant for more than 14 years, and a resident of Johnson County during those years, Stone continued by saying:

"Thirdly, and just as important as the first two, is the need to recognize the plight of our senior citizens. Today senior citizens cannot live on their pensions alone. The age pension law does not allow them to work. But I think the outdated law should be changed. If a senior citizen has ability, health and ambition enough to work, he should be allowed to do so without loss of any of his pension rights. There is one restriction of the law which would work to change. I believe the entire old age pension law should be reviewed and changed to fit the needs of today's senior citizens. If elected, I promise to work for."

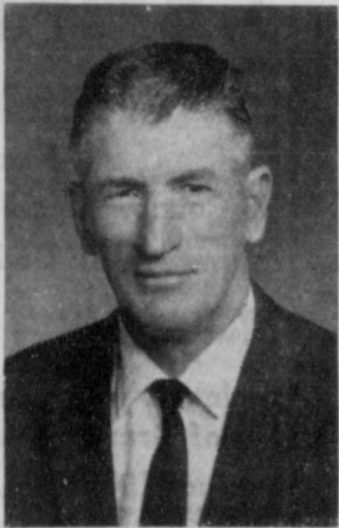

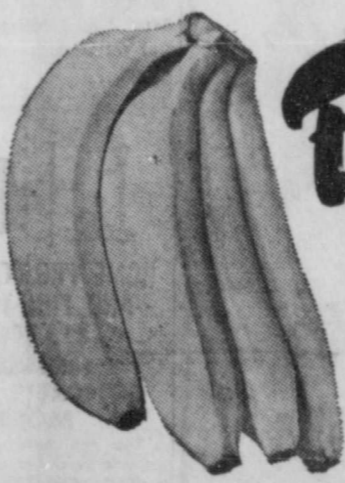

## Cattle Grub Losses Can Be Reduced According To County Agent G. Reese

Beef Cattle producers often fail to notice the hidden damage inflicted by cattle grubs. These losses begin when heel flies attach their eggs to cattle and continue through the period when the grubs appear as lumps in the back.

Cattle grubs cost livestock producers in the United States from 100-300 million dollars each year. Losses to the packer result from the necessary carcass trimming and devaluation and hide damage. On the farm

and ranch losses result from skin irritation, nervousness of the animals, below normal weight gains, lowered milk production and excessive running and frequent accidents to cattle feeding in infested pastures during the spring.

Grub losses can be reduced with timely applications of any one of the recommended systemic insecticides. These insecticides are called systemics because they are distributed inside the body of the animal and carried to the site where the grubs occur.

Each of the materials should be used between the time heel fly activity ceases in the spring and before grubs appear in the backs of animals. These systemic insecticides can be effectively used between May 15 and August 1 in Mills County.

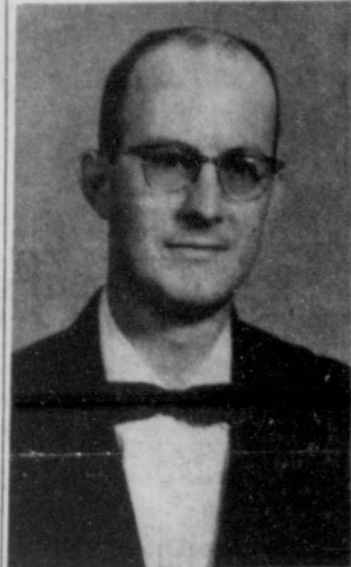
Methods of treating animals are spraying, pour-on and feeding. Be sure to read directions on labels of containers and follow directions for treating the animals.
