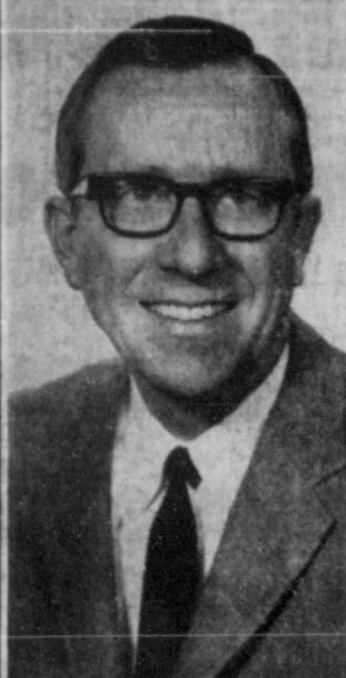
Sheriff Brooks Attends Seminar

First Baptist Church Schedules Revival Services Starting Sunday

The First Baptist Church has scheduled revival services August 11-18. Forrest Siler, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Lawton, Oklahoma, will be the evangelist. Pat Ragsdale, minister of music and youth at the local church, will direct the revival music.

In addition to regular Sunday services, three services will be held daily Monday through Friday. Business Men's Breakfast will be held at 7:15 each morning, with a brief devotion-

al service conducted by the evangelist. Morning services will be held at 10 o'clock, and evening services will begin at 7:30. The revival choir will rehearse at 7 o'clock each evening.

A special feature of the week will be Sunday School at Night, with all departments and classes meeting at 7:00 nightly in their regular places. There will be Booster Bands for children, and a variety of activities for youth are planned, according to announcement by Rev. Dale Gore, pastor of the church.

Rev. Siler, a native of Oklahoma, is a graduate of Oklahoma Baptist University, Shawnee, and Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, Fort Worth. Pastors include churches in Poyner, Plano and Uvalde, Texas. Before assuming his present pastorate he served Immanuel Baptist Church, Wichita, Kansas.

While in Kansas he served as president of the State Baptist Convention. Active in demonstration programs, he has been a member of the Southwestern Baptist Foreign Mission Board and trustee of several institutions.

Rev. Siler was an Army chaplain, serving in the European theater during World War II. He has made several trips to Europe and the Holy Land. He has ready for submission to a publisher a manuscript of a book of sermons dealing with prevention of mental and emotional problems.

City Council Has Routine Session

The City Council met at the City Hall Monday night for a routine session.

Monthly operating reports of receipts and disbursements for the various departments for the month of July were presented by City Manager W. C. Barnett.

The city manager also reported on work projects of the city now underway which include some small paving jobs that are being done. Also some areas that are being considered for paving as soon as residents of the streets involved get organized to do the job on a cost share basis with the city.

Other routine matters were discussed including the proposed study of sewer and garbage rates being charged residents of the city, with a view of revising the rates to more nearly offset the cost involved to provide this service.

Mills County TAP Offers Assistance To Rural Individuals, Communities

What is a Technical Action Panel (TAP)? A Technical Action Panel is composed of representatives of USDA, and other Federal and State agencies whose programs benefit rural people and are available in the State, area and County served by the Technical Action Panels.

Heads of County and City government and other interested people are also invited to be members of the county TAP.

Mills County TAP members are Doug Sellers, SCSS, Chairman; Roy Cozart, ASCS, George Reese, County Agent; Peggy Edwards, Home Demonstration Agent; Harold Kennedy, FHA, and Thurman Head, Vocational Agriculture Instructor.

Chairman Doug Sellers says these meetings held the last Monday of each month are open to everyone interested in Community and Rural Development.

The objective of this panel is to assist rural people and rural communities to identify the services they need for economic, social and cultural growth. Once these services are identified a unified effort of agencies and represented organizations will be made to assist in securing the needed services.

The panel will also assist individuals and groups with economic development plans, community development projects, inventories and surveys.

Sellers says there are over 80 types of federal programs ranging from Education and Small business loans to legal services and training and health programs available to assist rural people and rural communities.

There are also programs available from State agencies. In order for these programs to be effective a cooperative effort needs to be made by local people and TAP members to identify local community and individual needs.

Any group or individual may contact the TAP or its members for assistance. An effort will be made to provide assistance to all, according to announcement by Sellers.

Social Security Change Provides Benefits For Surviving Children

Henry Moore of Goldthwaite has recently received a check for \$413.00 from social security for his two boys, Harold and James. This represents 5 months social security payments based on their deceased mother's social security. She passed away in 1965.

James will receive \$41.30 a month as long as he is under age 18, or until age 22 if he remains a full-time student. His brother Harold will be able to use his \$41.30 a month to continue his education at the University of Houston, where he has been a full-time student the past year.

A recent change in the social security law made it possible for surviving children to receive

payments based on their mother's work even if the work was done many years ago.

Mr. Moore became aware of this change in the law when a friend mentioned it to him. He has given written consent to use his story as a means of informing other people who may be able to benefit by the change in the social security law.

Jim Jordan, field representative for Mills County, makes regular visits to the courthouse in Goldthwaite to take applications and answer questions regarding social security. His next visit will be on August 15 and he is scheduled to be in Goldthwaite again on August 29.

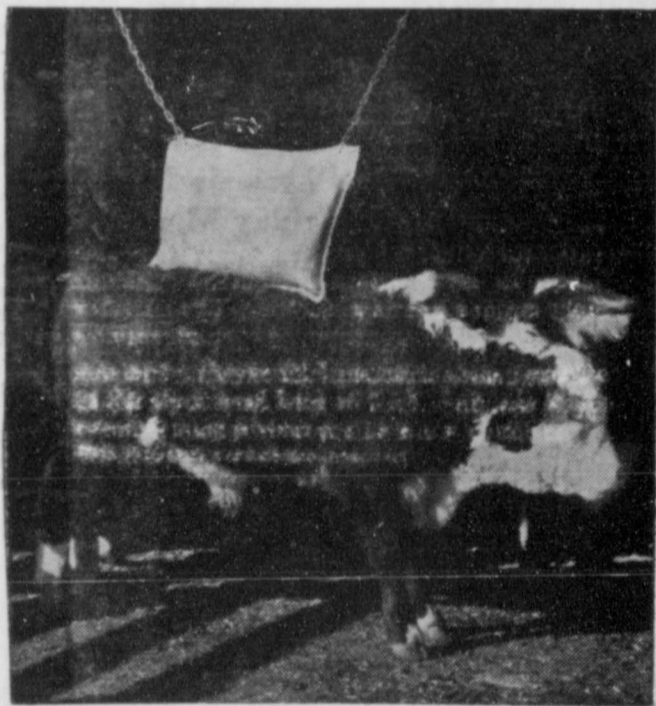

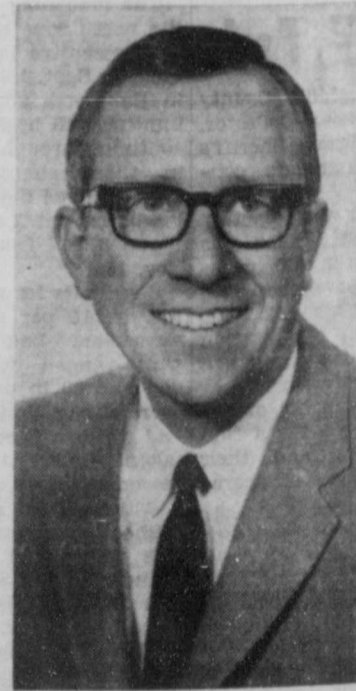

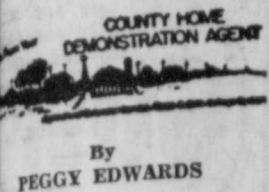

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

"FOR the amendment of Article III of the Constitution to provide that Dallas County may issue road bonds under Section 52 of Article III upon a vote of a majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of said county, and to provide that bonds heretofore or hereafter issued under Subsections (a) and (b) of said Section 52 shall not be included in determining the debt limit prescribed in said Section."

Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to add Section 64 to read as follows:

"Section 64. (a) The Legislature may by statute provide for consolidation of governmental offices and functions of government of any one or more political subdivisions comprising or located within El Paso or Tarrant Counties. Any such statute shall require an election to be held within the political subdivisions affected thereby with approval by a majority of the voters in each of these subdivisions, under such terms and conditions as the Legislature may require."

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a Section 1-f, to read as follows:

"Section 1-f. All merchandise, products, goods or wares in the temporary custody of a public warehouseman, who has no financial connection other than as bailee for hire with the owner, shipper, or consignee of the merchandise, products, goods, or wares, are exempt from ad valorem taxation if they are shipped to or from the warehouse by regulated or bona fide private carrier, are held by the warehouseman not longer than six (6) months, and have a predetermined out-of-state destination at point of origin. During the past year, Hemphill added, 42 changes were made in the Dun & Bradstreet Reference Book listings of Mills County businesses, including 11 names added, 9 names deleted, and 22 changes in the ratings of continuing businesses. The changes occurring in Mills County are about even with the rest of the country where a change of business significance is counted about every five seconds.

While credit reports are primarily used by business men who want to evaluate the credit risk of a business before shipping or selling, insurance underwriters, bankers, and other professionals also use reports.

"In making each and all of such investments said Board of Regents shall exercise the judgment and care under the circumstances then prevailing which men of ordinary prudence, discretion, and intelligence exercise in the management of their own affairs, not

in regard to speculation but in regard to the permanent disposition of their funds, considering the probable income therefrom as well as the probable safety of their capital.

"The interest, dividends and other income accruing from the investments of the Permanent University Fund, except the portion thereof which is appropriated by the operation of Section 18 of Article VII for the payment of principal and interest on bonds or notes issued thereunder, shall be subject to appropriation by the Legislature to accomplish the purposes declared in Section 10 of Article VII of this Constitution.

Section 1. That Section 51-a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, and the same is hereby amended, so as to read as follows:

"Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be determined by the Legislature to be deemed expedient, for assistance to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and any other services included in the Federal legislation providing matching funds to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, and for the payment of assistance to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and other services for:

- (1) Needy aged persons who are citizens of the United States or noncitizens who shall have resided within the boundaries of the United States for at least twenty-five (25) years and are over the age of sixty-five (65) years;
(2) Needy individuals who are citizens of the United States who shall have passed their eighteenth (18th) birthday but have not passed their sixty-fifth (65th) birthday and who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps;
(3) Needy blind persons who are citizens of the United States and who are over the age of eighteen (18) years;
(4) Needy children who are citizens of the United States and who are under the age of twenty-one (21) years, and to the caretakers of such children.

"The Legislature shall have authority to enact appropriate legislation which will enable the State of Texas to cooperate with the Government of the United States in providing assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of needy persons, and in providing rehabilitation and any other services included in the Federal legislation providing matching funds to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care and to accept and expend funds from the Government of the United States for such purposes in accordance with the laws of the United States as they now are or as they may hereafter be amended, and to make appropriations out of state funds for such purposes; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to or on behalf of any individual recipient shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds; provided that if the limitations and restrictions herein contained are found to be in conflict with the provisions of appropriate Federal Statutes as they now are or as they may be amended, to the extent that Federal matching money is not available to the state for these purposes, then and in that event the Legislature is specifically authorized and empowered to prescribe such limitations and restrictions and enact such laws as may be necessary in order that such Federal matching money will be available for assistance and/or medical care for or on behalf of needy

persons; and provided further, that the total amount of money to be expended per fiscal year out of state funds for assistance payments only to recipients of Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled, Aid to the Blind, and Aid to Families with Dependent Children, shall never exceed Seventy-five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000).

"Nothing in this Section shall be construed to amend, modify or repeal Section 31 of Article XVI of this Constitution; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers and functions of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision. Nothing herein shall be construed to permit optometrists to treat the eyes for any defect whatsoever in any manner nor to administer or to prescribe any drug or physical treatment whatsoever, unless such optometrist is a regularly licensed physician or surgeon under the laws of this state."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment raising the limit on the amount that may be expended in any one year out of state funds for Public Assistance payments only to Seventy-five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000)." SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 4 Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Section 48a of Article III thereof, so as to provide for contributions on the basis of the full salary of members of the Teacher Retirement System; providing for the submission of the proposed amendment to a vote of the people at an election and for proclamation and publication thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 48a of Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 48a. In addition to the powers given the Legislature under Section 48, Article III, it shall have the right to levy taxes to establish a fund to provide retirement, disability and death benefits for persons employed in the public schools, colleges and universities supported wholly or partly by the state; provided that the amount contributed by the state to such fund each year shall be equal to the aggregate amount required by law to be paid into the fund by such employees, and shall not exceed at any time six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid each person by the state and/or school districts; and provided that no person shall be eligible for retirement who has not rendered ten (10) years of creditable service in such employment, and in no case shall any person retire before either attaining the age fifty-five (55) or completing thirty (30) years of creditable service, but shall be entitled to refund of moneys paid into the fund. "Moneys coming into such fund shall be managed and invested as provided in Section 48b of Section III of the Constitution of Texas; provided a sufficient sum shall be kept on hand to meet payments as they become due each year under such retirement plan, as

may be provided by law; and provided that the recipients of such retirement fund shall not be eligible for any other state pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless such other state pension or retirement fund, contributed by the state, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid; providing, however, that this Section shall not amend, alter, or repeal Section 63 of Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas as adopted November, 1954, or any enabling legislation passed pursuant thereto."

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1968, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the following words:

"FOR the amendment to Section 48a of Article III allowing contributions to be made on the basis of full salary of members of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas." "AGAINST the amendment to Section 48a of Article III allowing contributions to be made on the basis of full salary of members of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said special election and shall have the same published as required by the constitution and laws of this state.

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (SJR39)

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 39 proposing an amendment to Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, relating to establishment of a retirement, disability and death compensation fund for officers and employees of the state, so as to create an agency of the State of Texas the Employees Retirement System of Texas, vesting the general administration and responsibility of the proper operation of said system in a state board of trustees to be known as the State Board of Trustees of the Employees Retirement System of Texas, authorizing said Board to invest assets of said system in various obligations and subjects of investment, subject to certain restrictions stated therein and such other restrictions as may hereafter be provided by law; providing that contributions of members and the state shall not exceed at any time six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the state; providing that such Amendment shall be self-enacting; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication; and declaring legislative intent that the adoption of this Joint Resolution shall constitute repeal of Senate Joint Resolution No. 3, previously adopted by this 60th Legislature, so that the proposition as set forth in this Resolution may be submitted to the voters of this state in lieu of the proposition contained in Senate Joint Resolution No. 3.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read hereafter as follows:

"Section 62. (a) The Legislature shall have the authority to levy taxes to provide a State Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the officers and employees of the state, and may make such reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classifications of officers and employees of this state as it deems advisable. The Legislature may also include officers and employees of judicial districts of the state who are or have been compensated in whole or in part directly or indirectly by the state, and may make such other reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classifications of officers and employees of judicial districts of this state as it deems advisable. Persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 1-a of Article V of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this subsection; and persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 48-a of Article III of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this subsection except as permitted by Section 63 of Article XVI of this Constitution. Provided, however, any officer or employee of a county as provided for in Article XVI, Section 62, Subsection (b) of this Constitution, shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this subsection, except as otherwise provided herein. The amount contributed by the state to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the state. "There is hereby created as

an agency of the State of Texas the Employees Retirement System of Texas, the rights of membership in which, the retirement privileges and benefits therefrom, and the management and operations of which shall be governed by the provisions herein contained and by present or hereafter enacted Acts of the Legislature not inconsistent herewith. The general administration and responsibility for the proper operation of said system are hereby vested in a State Board of Trustees to be known as the State Board of Trustees of the Employees Retirement System of Texas, which Board shall be constituted and shall serve as may now or hereafter be provided by the Legislature. Said Board shall exercise such powers as are herein provided together with such other powers and duties not inconsistent herewith as may be prescribed by the Legislature. All moneys from whatever source coming into the Fund and all other securities, moneys, and assets of the Employees Retirement System of Texas shall be administered by said Board and said Board shall be the trustee thereof. The Treasurer of the State of Texas shall be custodian of said moneys and securities. Said board is hereby authorized and empowered to acquire, hold, manage, purchase, sell, assign, trade, transfer, and dispose of any securities, evidences of debt, and other investments in which said securities, moneys, and assets have been or may hereafter be invested by said Board. Said Board is hereby authorized and empowered to invest and reinvest any of said moneys, securities, and assets, as well as the proceeds of any of such investments, in bonds, notes, or other evidences of indebtedness issued, or assumed or guaranteed in whole or in part, by the United States or any agency of the United States, or by the State of Texas, or by any county, city, school district, municipal corporation, or other political subdivision of

the State of Texas, both general and special obligations; or in home office facilities to be used in administering the Employees Retirement System including land, equipment, and office building; or in such corporation bonds, notes, or other evidences of indebtedness, and corporation stocks, including common and preferred stocks, of any corporation created or existing under the laws of the United States or of any of the states of the United States, as said Board may deem to be proper investments; provided that in making each and all of such investments said Board shall exercise the judgment and care under the circumstances then prevailing which men of ordinary prudence, discretion, and intelligence exercise in the management of their own affairs, not in regard to speculation but in regard to the permanent disposition of their funds, considering the probable income therefrom as well as probable safety of their capital; and further provided that a sufficient sum shall be kept on hand to meet payments as they become due each year under such retirement plan, as may now or hereafter be provided by law. Unless investments authorized herein are hereafter further restricted by an Act of the Legislature, no more than one per cent (1%) of the book value of the total assets of the Employees Retirement System shall be invested in the stock of any one (1) corporation, nor shall more than five per cent (5%) of the voting stock of any one (1) corporation be owned; and provided further, that stocks eligible for purchase shall be restricted to stocks of companies incorporated within the United States which have paid cash dividends for ten (10) consecutive years or longer immediately prior to the date of purchase and which, except for bank stocks and insurance stocks, are listed upon an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission or its

successors; and provided further, that not less than twenty-five per cent (25%) at any one time of the book value of investments of said Fund shall be invested in Government and Municipal Securities as enumerated above. This Amendment shall be self-enacting and shall become effective immediately upon its adoption without any enabling legislation."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 5, 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment amending Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas relating to the Employees Retirement System of Texas, revising provisions for investments of moneys and other assets of the Fund, and changing or existing provisions making other new provisions with respect to the administration of the Employees Retirement System."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment amending Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas relating to the Employees Retirement System and the Employees Retirement System of Texas, revising provisions for investments of moneys and other assets of the Fund, and changing or existing provisions making other new provisions with respect to the administration of the Employees Retirement System."

Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary Proclamation for the election and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Head Start Project Completed With Thirty Children Enrolled

The Goldthwaite Head Start Project ended Friday, July 26, with an interesting program presented by the children for their parents and friends. About forty persons attended the program and had lunch with the children afterward, according to Mrs. Phillip Nickols, coordinator.

A total of thirty children attended Head Start for eight weeks. Five of the children were from Mullin, seven from Star, and eighteen from Goldthwaite.

Each child enrolled in Head Start received complete physical and dental examinations and all the necessary shots for public school enrollment. Appointments were made for each child requiring dental and medical attention, and their needs will be cared for.

Dental hygiene, good grooming, cleanliness and good health habits were taught through daily practice and films.

A pupil evaluation team from the Comprehensive Pupil Appraisal Education Service Center in Waco, tested each child. This team included a speech therapist, hearing therapist, a psychologist and two assistants. They worked with the children for two days.

The children attended Head Start from 9:00 a. m. until 1:00 p. m., Monday through Friday. They were given a mid-morning snack and their lunch. Various educational experiences were planned daily for the children, both inside and outside the classroom.

In order for the children to learn more about the community, they were taken on trips to the stores, bank, post office, courthouse, blouse and mattress factories, fire station and newspaper office. They visited the housing projects many times and watched the different machinery, tools and materials being used. They took many excursions around the school grounds and surrounding neighborhood.

During the eight weeks, twenty volunteer workers gave a total of over one thousand hours to the Head Start project.
