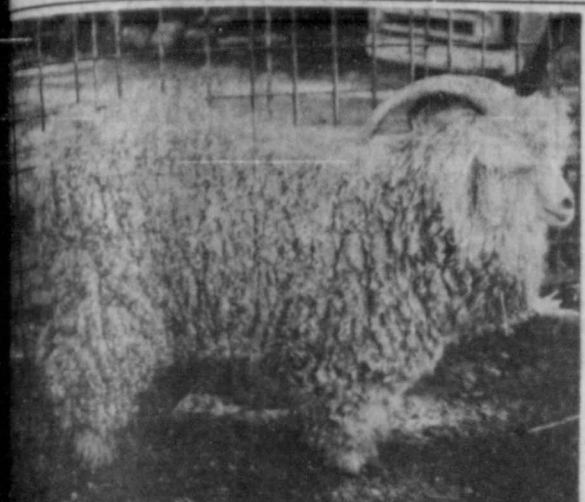

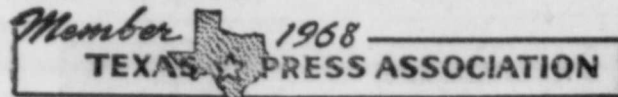

Mohair buyers estimate that \$100,000 worth of hair will be marketed in Mills County from the fall clip. Shearing has been slightly delayed on account of the rains, but most of the remainder of the clip will be in the hands of the buyers during this month. About a quarter of a million dollars worth of wool from the last clip is still in the hands of warehousemen here. The growers have not been paid for this wool, on account of the fact the government took over the wool clip — however, grading is being done and payment is beginning to be made.

Owing to the increased business at the post office, the Goldthwaite Postoffice has added Section No. 5 to the box section, making available 135 additional rent boxes which should take care of the needs of the patrons for the time being.

Dear Ed,

If you will open this envelope, some editors would, you may find enclosed a check for five bucks for another year's subscription to the Eagle.

I am not very well acquainted down Mills County way, anymore. In fact, it has been nearly fifty-one years since I pulled my picket pin and departed the Mullin community and the farm. And so, it is in the re-runs and reprints of fifty and sixty years ago that I find news of the old timers I used to know.

Of course, a great many have passed on, but there still seems to be some of the old timers in circulation. For one — Frank Shelton, and there is Willard Mosier, and that very fine gentleman, Mr. Henry Casey. Henry and I, didn't exactly go to separate schools together, but we did work for Uncle Sam in separate government departments. Related departments. At that time conservation was popular in Washington and it was quite in order for one conservative president to follow another.

We spent a great part of our summer vacation, among others, in putting forth strenuous efforts trying to influence a conservative president and a reluctant congress to grant us a salary raise commensurate with our worth. Maybe that was why it was so little.

We mustn't overlook another young, old timer, and to some, practically a new comer to Mills County, that stranger—Mrs. L. J. Vann. I was well acquainted at one time, with Mrs. Vann and her husband, the late Rev. L. J. Vann. The Rev. L. J. married my wife and I, in May 1918, the year I came to Dallas.

It hasn't been long now since I made my last contact with my good friend, Shelby Cox, and that was at the funeral of a mutual friend, Dr. Elmer Trout. When Shelby came to Dallas, then a practicing attorney, he

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located in Oak Cliff, the same as I did. Eventually, he became the Criminal District Attorney for Dallas and Dallas County. An office he held for two terms, declining a third. Later, he accepted an appointment to one of the Criminal District Courts which he held for several elective terms until ill health forced his retirement.

Shelby was born in Mullin, as no doubt, a great many of you recall. He was popular with the citizens of Oak Cliff. I say was, for ill health finally closed out a remarkable career as well as that of a very remarkable man. As regularly as the seasons came around, his Oak Cliff friends made him their man of the year or month, whichever was on tap.

I held down the job of citizen in Oak Cliff for thirty-two years plus, and somewhere near the demise of the plus, I developed an itching foot and decided to migrate eastward on the other side of the river, all of ten miles distant. I love to travel. Circumstances prompted me to locate close to one of our most ritzy suburbs, in this case, Highland Park, a community of culture and scholarly learning.

Telling my Oak Cliff friends, of many years, I was leaving for distant parts. I didn't say how distant, just then. They looked very concerned, and some even talked of the fatted calf. But I said, "Whoa, that's when you come back, the fatted calf."

"Okay," they said, "we'll just save it, for we know you will be coming back." However, they did take time out to warn me very solemnly to be careful of my Oak Cliff accent for it was very noticeable, and could be a dead-give-away to foreigners, such as those Highland Parkers. You can't be too careful around these people, they warned me afresh. If your brogue fractures their language barrier, they will immediately send you back across the river. And about the only time the Mayor will speak to you is when he's ordering you to go back to that penal colony across the river. However, penal colony didn't phase my friends, for they said, "Phooey, our culture is as good as theirs any day."

I promised my friends I would watch my LANGWIDGE. I didn't want to go back to that fatted calf, too soon.

So, now I am a resident of East Dallas. As a matter of fact, I have been here in my East Dallas home for eighteen years and past. Just a short walk-away from the Highland Park enclave. Their signs are all about, designating their boundaries. Some even inviting me to look twice before trespassing on their grass.

I drive twenty miles to church on Sunday. But unlike the Village Blacksmith, I don't have the pleasure of hearing my daughter's voice singing in the choir. She resides in another state. My church is in Oak Cliff, the Cliff Temple Baptist with approximately seven thousand members. I have been a member of Cliff Temple for forty-two years, and still I can't lay claim to knowing all of the members.

As I have said, I drive twenty miles to church. I have found a safe and pleasant way to go, all within the city. I don't care much for the freeways and the expressways. I avoid them when I can, use them when I must.

The cloverleaf is poison. It takes the quick eye of a quiz kid to read those fast approaching and fast disappearing signs

and put his money on the right one. If I slow for an instant to survey the field, the cars behind me commence honking their heads off, and the occupants, no doubt, are wondering who is that silly up ahead that is slowing them down.

The ONEWAY street isn't a picnic. Many tragic accidents occur on them. The pointing arrow, if heeded, is the sure way to salvation.

I have remained in good standing with my Oak Cliff friends, despite the passing years. I visit with them at times, apart from the church. The fears and forebodings of a former time seems to have been groundless. The Mayor hasn't ordered me back across the river; most of the Highland citizens think my Oak Cliff accent is cute. They want to know where they can get a dictionary.

Anyway, living, you might say, under the shadow of their walls, I have picked up a lot of their culture. You might say, "It has rubbed off on me." With a little effort, I have no trouble fooling my friends.

But nevertheless, they seem to have forgiven me for my long absence, and if I will just come back home, as they express it, once an Oak Cliffite always an Oak Cliffite, and once back home to show my good faith, they might just breakdown and make me their man of the WEEK. A high honor. But I have been this long in deciding, a little longer won't hurt.

Maybe by the time it comes time to re-new my subscription to the Eagle, I will have come to a decision. As I said, there's no need to be in a hurry.

SO LONG, as a certain gentleman is always saying, as a parting salute.

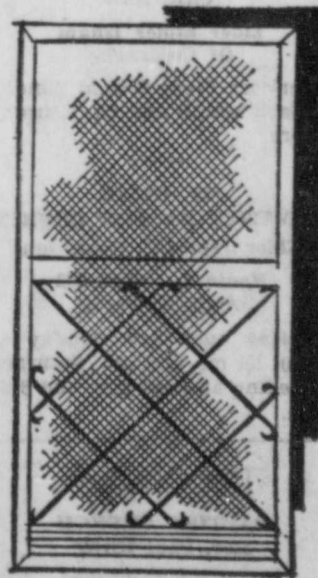

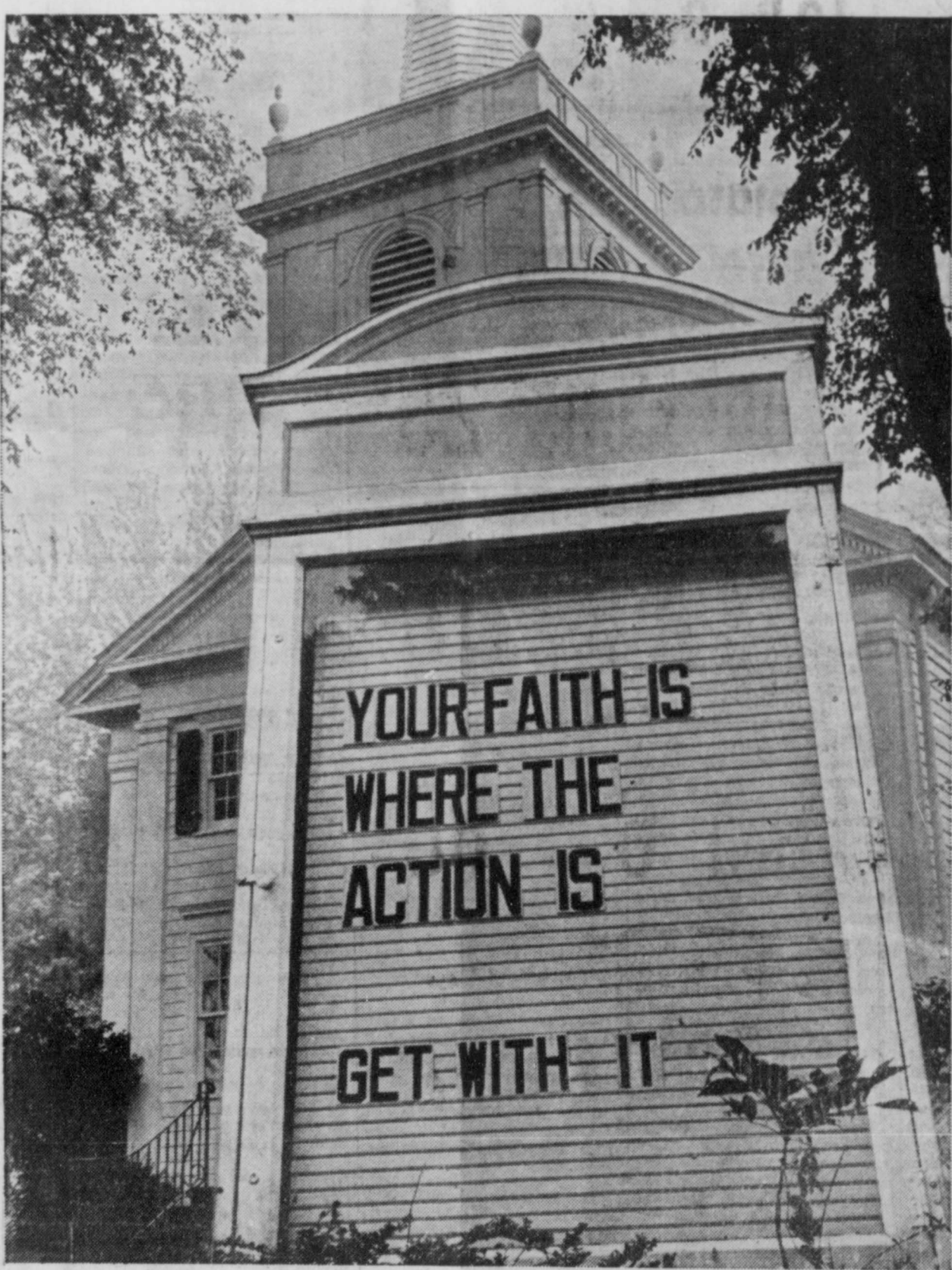

Declaration Of Estimated Income Must Be Revised For New Rate

Individual taxpayers who previously filed declarations of estimated federal income tax for 1968 must now revise their estimates to reflect the new surcharge tax recently enacted in the new law.

Ellis Campbell, Jr., IRS District Director for Northern Texas, announced. He also requested taxpayers to file Form 1040FY declaration of estimated income for 1968 will exceed their holding by \$40 or more.

Mr. Campbell said a new worksheet has been developed to aid taxpayers in computing the amount of revised estimated tax. It was mailed to taxpayers at the time they filed for their third quarter installment due September 15.

The worksheet will also be available at IRS offices around the first of September.

The new law imposes a 10 per cent annual surcharge tax relative to April 1 on individual tax returns. This means, Mr. Campbell said, that most

taxpayers who file on a calendar year basis will be required to pay a 7 1/2 per cent surcharge on federal income tax covering income received during 1968.

Mr. Campbell said a new worksheet has been developed to aid taxpayers in computing the amount of revised estimated tax. It was mailed to taxpayers at the time they filed for their third quarter installment due September 15.

A new Form 1040FY will be sent to fiscal year taxpayers in time to file and pay the surcharge tax by the due date, Mr. Campbell said. Form 1040FY was also made available at IRS offices the first part of August.

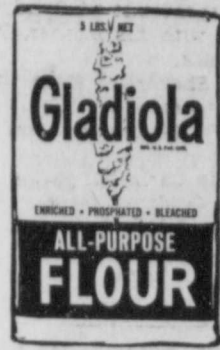

This will allow ample time for final testing of the equipment. With the accelerated production schedule, Rutland said the company will furnish the new service January 19, 1969.

"While we regret this delay in the new project for the seven communities, we are making every possible effort to speed the completion and to eliminate any inconvenience to our customers," Rutland said.
