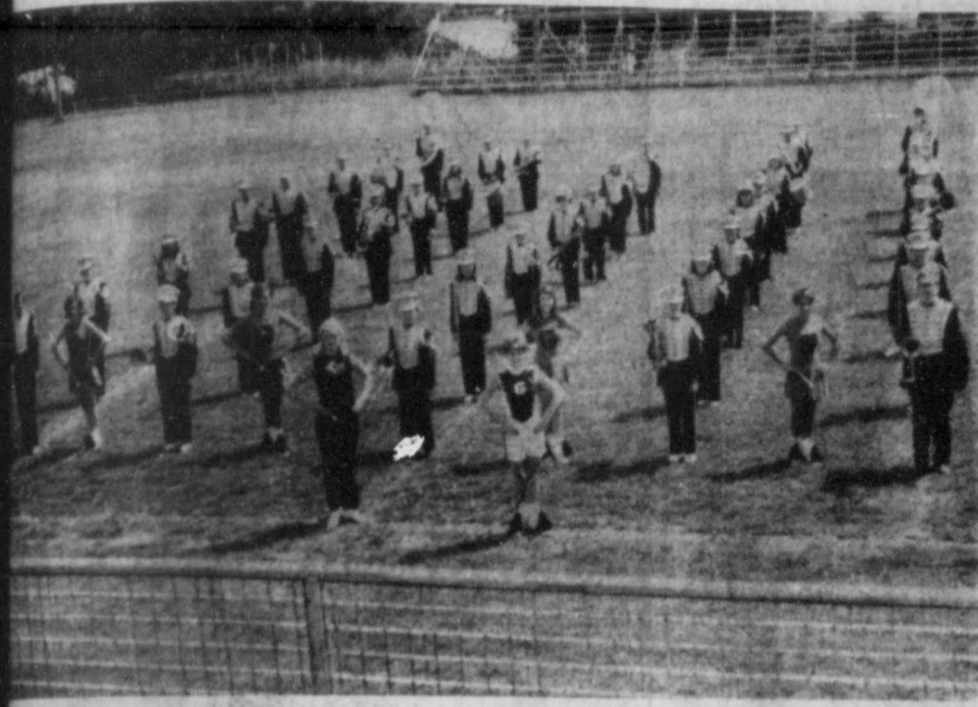

Pete Ribera fielded the opening Eagle kickoff on the Mustang 15-yard line, and ran it back the full 85 yards for the Mustang's first score of the game. Jay Frazier, Mustang quarterback ran over for the two-point conversion, making the score 8-0 just ten seconds into the game.

Scoring was at a standstill during the second and third quarters, as the Eagles managed to hold back the powerful Mustangs. The Eagles suffered two lost fumbles, but evened the score by recovering five fumbles from their opponents. Two pass plays by the Eagles were ruled incomplete, and both teams suffered several yards in penalties.

About halfway into the fourth quarter, Marble Falls came back with their second score of the game. Mustang quarterback, Paul Carmona, passed ten yards. Pat Riley in the end zone, scored a six-point addition to the scoreboard. Two attempts for extra two points failed, leaving the final score of the game 14-0.

Eagle Mike Covington played the final ball game, according to Coach Les Johnson. He carried the ball five times for twenty-two yards, blocked a punt, and

tackled a passer behind the line of scrimmage twice. Jody Langford showed up good with his blocking, and Sam Watson put in a good game on defense, according to Johnson.

## Increase In State Sales Tax To Start Wednesday, Oct. 2

The increase in state sales tax will go into effect next Wednesday, October 2, when the tax will go from two per cent to three per cent. Since Goldthwaite does not have a city sales tax the rate here will be three per cent.

Under the new schedule tax collections will be on sales starting at 17 cents instead of the present 24 cent sales.

Sales of 17c to 49c will be 1c; 50c to 89c will be 2c and 84c to \$1.00 will be 3c.

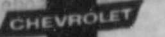

The Yard-of-the-Month award was announced. Guest yard was awarded to the P. L. Hancocks and member yard to Mrs. Henry Hudson.

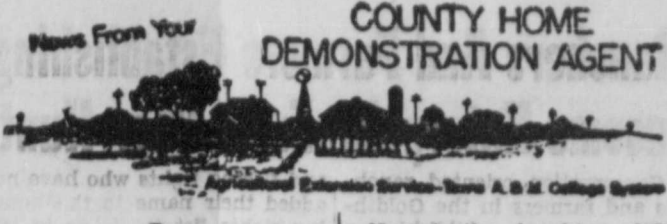

## Ranchers And Farmers Establishing Income Enterprise From Deer Hunt

Conservation oriented ranchers and farmers in the Goldthwaite area are establishing a significant income producing enterprise from harvest of deer.

Shooting preserve books were issued to 125 landowners in Mills County portion of the Brown-Mills Soil and Water Conservation District in 1967, and according to Benny Schriver, Game Management Officer, more shooting preserve books will have to be issued in 1968 to get an adequate harvest and control of booming deer populations. Schriver reports that the entire wildlife picture looks better than it has ever been because of the abundance of food and cover. Deer, turkey, quail, dove and squirrel have all produced abundantly and should provide a good hunting season.

Hollis Wiggins, Goldthwaite Jaycee President, reports that numerous inquiries about hunting leases in the Goldthwaite area are coming in from many of the larger towns across the state. He says that although more than 12,000 acres of hunting lease land has been added to the "hunting rights list," there are still more inquiries than there are leases available.

Wiggins states that the inquiries are for all types of hunting and encourages landowners interested in leasing hunting

and fishing rights who have not added their name to the hunting rights list to do so in the near future in order to get booked up for the coming hunting seasons.

Those desiring to lease hunting rights can report this information to any of the Jaycees, the ASCS Office, the Soil Conservation Service, or any member of the Mills County TAP.

Wildlife benefits are varied and many people receive these benefits besides the landowner. Hunters pour extra money into the trade territory through the local cafes, grocery stores and

service stations. It is estimated that approximately \$25,000.00 added to local economy in the county last year.

Soil Conservation Service personnel provide technical assistance in planning for wildlife habitat in their work with farmers and ranchers of the area. The Soil Conservation Service reports that there is a growing interest by landowners in planning for the management of their wildlife population in connection with conservation operations. Each year more and more people will be looking for recreation in the way of hunting or fishing and this adds to the opportunities for a new agricultural enterprise involving all phases of income producing recreation.

Mills County and Goldthwaite are in a good location to reap

the growing benefits of wildlife if progressive conservation continues to provide needed wildlife food and cover, according to Doug Sellars, Wildlife Conservationist, SCS, Goldthwaite.

**WATER PLAN**

Texas' monumental water program — to move surplus water from the Mississippi River and Northeast Texas to the drier areas of South and West Texas — is not to be released until late October or early November.

But the Texas Water Development Board, which is working up the plan, let some details slip out when it approved its budget request to be submitted to the Legislature for the two-year period beginning Sept. 1, 1969.

Board's budget requests a more than 50 per cent increase in appropriations for the agency so it can get the plan into operation before Texas faces economic disaster from a lack of water.

A time schedule for the project — estimated to cost around \$10 billion — will be presented to the Legislature, outlining what needs to be done in the next six years.

First step is gathering the surplus Northeast Texas water for the Trans-Texas Canal, which will move water west to supply Dallas-Fort Worth, then on through the concrete-lined canal to the South Plains and other areas of West Texas and the Trans-Pecos, all the way to El Paso.

Then by the end of 1971, negotiations must be completed to bring surplus water from the lower Mississippi, below New Orleans, across Southern Louisiana, then into either the Sabine River or up the Red River to the Sulphur and Cypress Rivers.

By the middle of 1974, federal, state and private sources need to agree on the construction of nuclear-energy power-generating plants to produce the electricity necessary to run the hundreds of pumps which will actually move the water.

South Texas will be served by a South Texas Canal, which will run from the lower Sabine River near Orange down the coast to the Lower Rio Grande Valley. This project will need to be approved by Congress by mid-1972.

State will probably have to pay 25-30 per cent of the cost of the project. This means that the \$400 million borrowing power the board now has will have to be expanded to at least \$2.5 billion. Legislature would have to approve this in January, with the people voting on it in 1970.

influence of vending machine operators on tavern keepers will hold hearings in Austin, Fort Worth, Houston and probably two smaller cities.

Dallas Attorney David Witts was named chief counsel and investigator of the committee by the five-member panel headed by Rep. R. H. Cory of Victoria, in conference with Texas Liquor Control Board Acting Administrator O. N. Humphreys Jr.

Panel, armed with sworn statements from tavern operators, will look into rumors of Mafia and crime syndicate activity. Only witness heard to date said he knew of no such outside influence in his area. But he testified vending machine operators should be prohibited from lending money to taverns and drinking clubs.

Donald R. Fishel is new chief of Texas Liquor Control Board enforcement division. Sherman McBeath of Wichita Falls will replace Fishel as assistant enforcement chief, and Leonard J. Lozano of Poteet will be LCB supervisor of investigations.

Gov. John Connally named Bryan Beck Jr. of Beaumont and H. J. (Bubbles) Shands Jr. of Lufkin to Lamar State College of Technology board of regents. He re-appointed Pat Peyton Jr. and Otho Plummer of Beaumont to new terms on same board.

William A. Wroe, Austin banker, has been appointed treasurer of the Republican Party in Texas.

Dr. Richard Tozer of Dallas is executive director of the Texas Nixon for President finance committee.

**LOUDER SENATE**

Newsman and spectators in the Texas Senate have been complaining for years that they can't hear what the Senators are saying to each other on the floor, making it rather difficult to follow debate.

A San Antonio firm is solving that problem, at the request of a special Senate committee created by the June special session.

Company plans to install a powerful amplifier and 55 speakers around the chamber — specially attuned so that deep-throated Senators and high-pitched ones, too, will be heard by all in the chamber.

Each senator will have an individual desk microphone, and a central panel at the president's desk will allow the Senators to be turned off and on by the Senate secretary.

Cost of the system will be from \$20,000 to \$25,000.

**ATTORNEY GENERAL SPEAKS**

A write-in vote for President and Vice President is valid and must be counted, regardless of whether the political party of the candidates "written in" has

qualified to have names printed on the ballot, Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin held. Martin said if the Secretary of State has not been notified as to identity of the slate of presidential electors for write-in candidates, inquiry may be made by him as to the electors' names.

In other recent opinions Martin concluded that:

A county judge performing duties of county school superintendent (where office of superintendent is abolished) is not entitled to office and travel pay or salary of an assistant in addition to his \$2,850 annual compensation for extra duty.

Palo Duro Canyon State Park revenues collected since last November 28 must be deposited in state parks fund with state treasurer.

Texas State Board of Registration for Professional Engineers can pay temporary employee to help handle its examination papers.

**NEW COLLEGE APPROVED**

Creation of new state senior colleges in San Antonio, Corpus Christi, Houston (two) and the Midland-Odessa area has approval of the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System. Board also recommended an "upper division" — junior and senior years — higher education center at Laredo.

Master plan being compiled by the Board apparently will contain a proposal to limit enrollments at state institutions beginning in 1972.

Board recommended creation of a new dental school although it declined to make recommendation as to site.

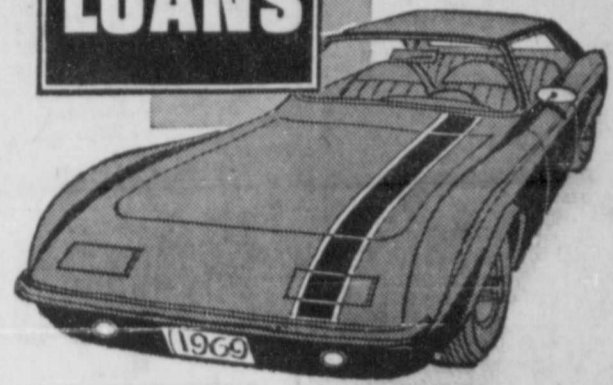

## News About Social Security

Because of an imminent change in the Brownwood Social Security Office whereby its type facilities will be used to report to social security centers in other cities, beneficiaries in Brown, Mills, and Comanche counties should send in any necessary reports to the Brownwood Office instead of to the

address printed on the post-cards they received when they applied for benefit payments. Glenn McNatt, in charge of the Brownwood office, said that these people were given pre-addressed cards for making reports of such things as change of address, marriage or remarriage, divorce, starting work, stopping work, etc.

The cards have the address of a social security payment center, such as Kansas City, Missouri; Baltimore, Maryland; and elsewhere.

Rather than send the cards to the printed addresses, people should change the address so the cards will go to the Brownwood office.

In that way the necessary action will be taken by the Social Security Administration more quickly. Mr. McNatt cautioned that the person's claim number should always be shown on any such cards or other correspondence.

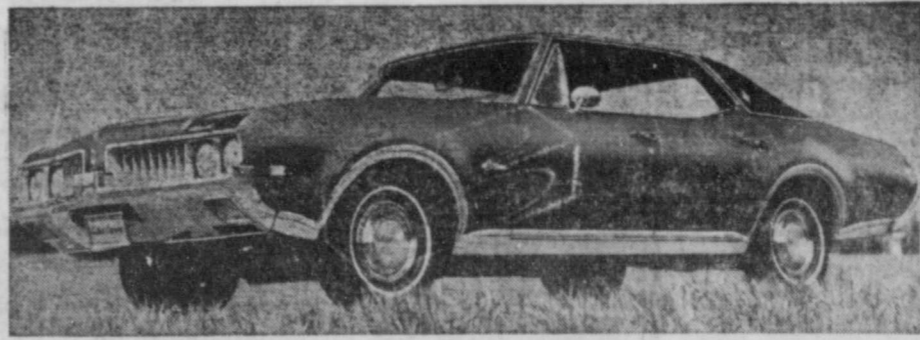

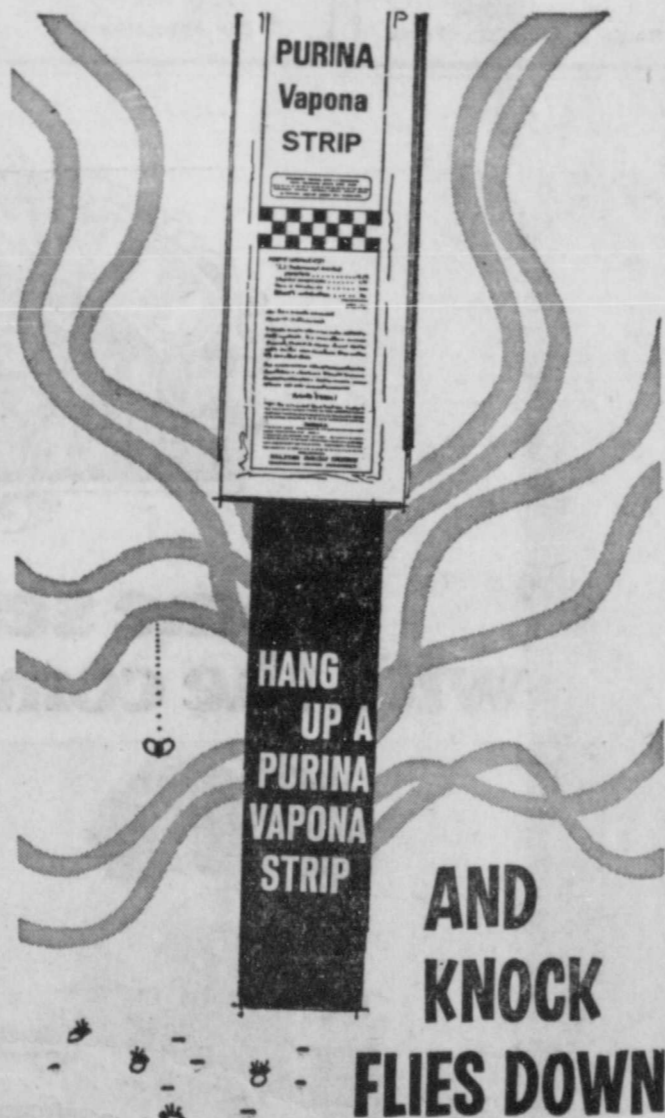

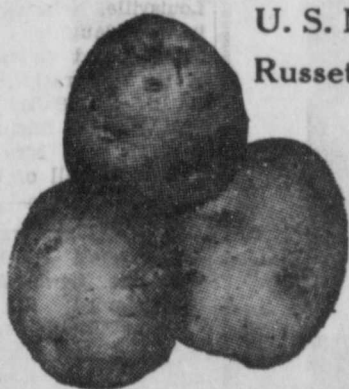
