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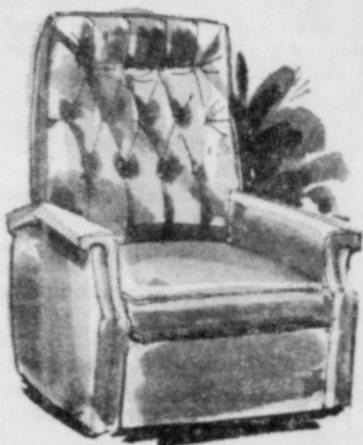

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COUNTY HOME DEMONSTRATION AGENT

It is brightening to think that Christmas is so near. I haven't made out a list yet. It's quite late for me that I don't get much Christmas malling. How about you? Do you have a friend or relative over? If you do, and you want to mail him a package it is probably too late to send it by regular mail in order to arrive Christmas Day. Packages will be sent by AIR MAIL. You will get to your boy by Christmas. There is a deadline of December 11. Personally I don't mind the crowd that date very much. It is better to be safe than sorry.

Proper wrapping is very important. If what you send is going to get there in good shape, you are sending a cake or cookies, here are some good wrapping tips to follow: Moisture proof cellophane or aluminum foil is best for interior wrapping to prevent moistness from drying. Heavy boxes or the rigid plastic containers with tightly fitting lids fare well when shipped. Crumpled tissue or newspaper in corners around items cushion food. Dry-to-eat cereal or unbuttoned popcorn also can be packed around the items. Wrap items individually or in pairs, stick to back and fasten by twisting the wrapping or using tape to secure it. Food should be cool before it is wrapped. Close the package securely and seal it with cellophane tape.

The Post Office Department suggests enclosing a list of the items in the package. Outer wrapping is also important. Use durable brown paper. If the package is especially fragile, cushion the container in heavy corrugated paper before wrapping. Print the name and address of the receiver and your own on the top and bottom of the package. If you use labels, print the addresses on the wrapper also, in case the label comes off. Packages should have labels saying "This parcel may be opened for postal inspection if necessary." "This is up," and "Fragile."

Cookies and cakes which are long-lived and can stand a few knocks can be mailed with confidence, regardless of distance. Soft drop cookies, chewy bar cookies, squared and filled cookies travel well. Applesauce, molasses, oatmeal and mince-meat cookies are good packers. Cookies flavored with honey and fruit improve with age. If cookies are too rich, they may crumble or turn rancid. Cakes are more difficult to

ship successfully because they dry and break. Syrup substituted for part of the sugar helps to prevent rapid drying. Fruit cakes and those made with applesauce remain moist for some time. Try sending cup cakes baked in fluted paper cups. Or, cut a square cake and frost pieces on all sides, wrapping each piece individually. To send a pie, use tarts or individual pies. They pack better. If you add some all-bran to the pastry dough it will help prevent the crust from breaking up. Firm fillings are less apt to soak through the crust. Do not send custard fillings. They spoil too rapidly to be safe. Here are three recipes that travel well:

HONEY HERMITS

Melt 1/3 cup shortening and add it to 1 1/3 cups of strained honey. Then add 2 eggs, 1/2 cup milk, 1/2 teaspoon salt and 1 cup chopped raisins. Sift together 3 1/2 cups flour, 1 1/2 teaspoons cinnamon, 1/2 teaspoon ground cloves, and 4 teaspoons of baking powder. Add the dry ingredients to the moist and mix well. Drop on greased cookie sheet and bake in 375-400 degrees oven until done.

APPLESAUCE LOAVES

Cream together 1/4 cup shortening and 1 cup sugar. Add 1 cup applesauce. Sift together 2 cups flour, 1 level teaspoon baking soda, 2 teaspoons cinnamon, a pinch of salt and a pinch of nutmeg. Add dry to moist ingredients, then stir in 1 cup chopped raisins and currants. Mix and bake in individual small loaf pans, using 350-375 degrees oven. Chopped citron or candied fruits can be substituted for a portion of the raisin-and-currant mixture, if desired. Bake for 30 minutes, then test with toothpick to see if done.

CRANBERRY CRUNCH

1 cup uncooked rolled oats
1/2 cup flour
1 cup brown sugar
1/3 cup butter or margarine
One pound cranberry sauce (jellied or whole)
Mix oats, flour and brown sugar. Cut in butter until crumbly. Place half of this mixture in an 8" x 8" greased baking dish. Cover with cranberry sauce. Top with the remaining half of the oat mixture. Bake 45 minutes at 350 degrees. Serve hot in squares topped with vanilla ice cream or - let cool, cut in squares, wrap and mail to your boy or friend overseas. Make some person happy by remembering them with goodies during this holiday season.

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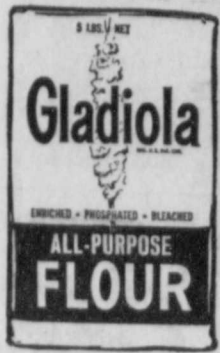

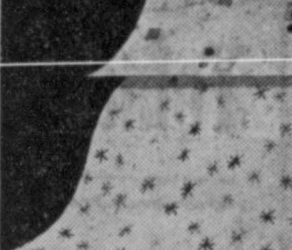

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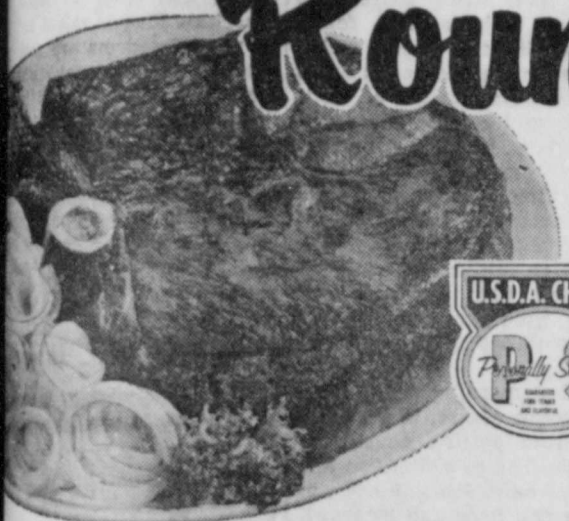

GI Relates Experience To Family Following Survival Training Week

Editor's Note:— The following story is a portion of a letter written by an American GI to his family following a week of survival training in California. The GI's wife is a good friend of Alice (Mrs. RV) Geeslin who submitted this copy to the Eagle.

"We attended Class all day Monday and had no chow, only black coffee. That night we ran and walked a total of two and one-half miles to the beach where we put up tents and started fishing and trying to catch crabs. For the last 9 years there have been 120 to 130 people fishing there every week, so you know about how much we caught. I had one leg to eat.

"Tuesday morning, we were taken by bus back to the class room and nothing but black coffee. Classes ran until 1:00 p. m., at which time we boarded buses for the school in which we started classes on survival, arriving about 3 p. m. About 6:00 p. m. they had us go set up our tents and then back to class until 11 with nothing to eat all day or night.

"Wednesday, it was the same all over again until 12:30 p. m. at which time we were turned loose to try to catch something to eat with string snares. We caught 6 rabbits and found some small yucca cactus which isn't bad when one hasn't eaten in three days. We got all of it cooked up by 9:00 p. m. and would you believe everyone's stomach was so small that after two or three bites we were full?

"Thursday we had an eight mile navigation hike over the mountains which were up to 4,235 feet high and were we ever a tired bunch of people. Nothing to eat all day or night Thursday.

"Friday morning we started our evasion course, which is to keep from getting caught by the reds. The course is two and one-half miles long and it was raining real hard and by crawling on my hands and knees and at times on my elbows and stomach, I managed to escape capture. At 10:30 they sounded a whistle which meant to come on in and get captured and go on to the compound phase or capture phase of the course.

"For escaping capture for the three full hours, I was roughed up three different times before being put on the truck to the POW Camp. It was still raining and all of us were soaking wet and cold. We were put into a pig pen on hands and knees and told to strip down to a pair of skivvie drawers in the rain. Let me tell you it was cold there in the rain. After they searched our clothes, we were put into POW Camp, and they started working us over again. Then came interrogation and more slaps when we would not tell them anything. None of the slaps really hurt for very long, so almost all it did was to make each and every one of us more

determined not to tell anything at all. We were busy until midnight Friday night, then were put into racks for four hours.

"Then got back up and same thing again until 05:00, which time the American Anthem was played. I felt about the tears rolling down my cheeks until I saw every one of the guys was crying and then I let the tears like a baby.

"Then is really when I know what the meaning of Freedom meant and also why we were fighting in Viet Nam. It's something that can be explained to anyone, but something is denied them, for the meaning of Freedom to me is home. If we could put some of these hippies, yuppies or protesters into one of these schools just for one day and were treated the way we were, I'm sure it would end all of their bunk they peddle.

"I can only say, before I was under Communist rule they have to kill me in my tracks for I'll never run from them any manner and Honey, never let anyone kid you, all of your freedoms are off for only a twenty-four hour period and then suddenly American Flag is raised and of your freedoms are restored there is an emotional release magnitude that is hard to believe and I'll say without doubt in all my life that never see anything more beautiful or offer more security than "Old Glory" being raised over Country that is completely and too stupid to realize it.
